First bales of cotton from

the 1974 cotton crop were delivered to area cotton gins last week. The bales were ginned free and other considerations given farmers who delivered the first bales. Following is first-bale news in order of sequence as reported to The Review. Tim Barton delivered two bales of cotton to Martin Gin & Fertilizer Co. Nov. 13. He had on 4, 720 pounds of seed cotton that produced 1,090 pounds of lint and 1,960 pounds of seed. Ray fartin Gin & Fertilizer is located three miles north and seven miles west of Abernathy on FM 54.






