To avoid undue burden on small farmers and to reduce processing costs, a short version of the census report form is being mailed to the over one million addresses estimated to have had both farm receipts and expenses of less than \$2,000 in 1973. All other addresses are receiving the standard form.

Forms are being mailed to a list of the following persons who filled out Schedule F of the 1973 individual income tax return, persons listed with other Federal agencies as associated with agricultural operations, and those reporting large or unusual farm operations in the 1969 census (such as institutional farms, farms on Indian reservations, etc.). This combined list of addressees forms a pool of potential respondents in the census.

The final total of farms counted is expected to be well under three million, as it was in 1969.

20th CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE UNDERWAY

The 1974 Census of Agriculture got underway the week of December 29th with the mailing of approximately four million report forms to farms and ranches in the 50 States according to Vincent P. Barabba, Director of the Bureau of the Census. The Bureau is part of the Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

Farmers and ranchers are being asked to report on their agricultural operations during 1974. This 1974 census is a series that started in 1840, will update data most recently obtained in 1970 for 1969 operations. Primary emphasis will be on obtaining information about farms and ranches with sales of \$2,500 or more annually. Such operations accounted for 98 percent of the total value of all agricultural products sold in 1969.

Completed forms are to be mailed back as soon as possible. Census by mail allows operators to fill out their reports at their convenience and use their farm business records. Estimates are acceptable and should be reported in the absence of records.

Recipients of census report forms are cautioned not to discard them. Follow-up mailings costing additional postage will be required until all forms are received. Even if the recipient is not farming, the form should be returned with that fact noted.

First Agriculture Census in 1840

The United States took its first Census of Agriculture in 1840. Until 1920 they were taken every ten years; since then, there has been one every five years, recently covering years ending in "4" and "9."

The five-year censuses are the only source of statistics on agriculture that are comparable county by county for the entire Nation. They are the sole source of comprehensive agricultural data tabulated for each State and for the

RED CROSS GIVES WARNING

The newly-begun SSI program has been marred recently by fast buck thieves taking advantage of elderly and unfortunate citizens. The clever robbers call on people eligible for SSI and offer to prepare the short SSI application and "pay the fee." The catch is that there is no fee for application or information on SSI or any other Federal, state or local aid program.

SSI is a payment to blind, disabled (children or adults) or elderly people (65 or over) in need. Benefits are for those not working whose income is below \$160 a month (\$230 for couples) and for those working whose income is below \$365 a month (\$505 for couples). People on Social Security are eligible for SSI. SSI also qualifies people for Medicaid, regardless of age. Those who believe they are eligible should contact the Red Cross or Social Security office.

Disaster Declarations Asked For Hale Area

AUSTIN — Governor Dolph Briscoe has requested Secretary Of Agriculture Earl L. Butz to declare Castro, Floyd and Hale Counties as disaster areas because of prolonged drought and other adverse weather conditions. To date, the governor has requested disaster declarations for 77 Texas counties because of the drought. Forty-eight of these counties have been approved and two were rejected.

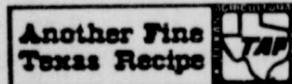
Purcell moved up from field representative at the Plainview office, a position he held for 6 1/2 years.

TEXAS CARROT FRUIT CAKE

- 1 cup (8 ounces) diced mixed candied fruit
- 1 cup (5 ounces) chopped pitted dates
- 1 cup (5 ounces) dark seedless raisins
- 1/2 cup brandy
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 1 1/2 cups vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 3 c. sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 Tbsp. double-action baking powder
- 2 tsp. cinnamon
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3 cups finely grated carrots
- 1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped pecans

Soak fruits in brandy overnight; drain. Combine sugar and oil. Beat in eggs one at a time. Sift together flour, baking powder, cinnamon, soda and salt; reserve 2 tablespoons. Gradually add flour mixture to sugar mixture; mix until smooth. Coat fruits with reserved flour mixture. Stir in fruits, carrots and nuts. Pour into prepared 10x4-inch tube pan. Bake in 350-degree oven 1 hour 10 minutes to 1 hour 20 minutes. Cool 20 minutes. Remove from pan, cool on rack.
