The Abernathy Weekly Review is in the process of being moved to a new location in downtown Abernathy. The Review office, along with a commercial printing plant, will occupy the south portion of the building at 916-920 Avenue D, formerly housing Abernathy Floral. The building was recently sold by Ed and Sarah Graham to Jack P. Barton and Richard Havens.

(Abernathy Floral has moved to a new location at 304 Main Street, the building which formerly housed the Abernathy Neighborhood Center. The Neighborhood Center has moved one door east to 302 Main Street.)

The north portion of the building at 916-920 Avenue D will be occupied by Jack P. Barton's real estate office, a division of W. H. Nelson Real Estate. A portion of

that building is rented to former Abernathians Milton and Angela Pope, who will move here from Lubbock to establish an insurance business.

Meeting with the local steering committee last Thursday night was the Rev. Wesley Daniel, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, Littlefield, who has had Missionary Conferences in the church he formerly pastored at Spearman. ## Meeting of School Trustees Is Held

### Improvements Set For School Plants

At the January 6, 1975, meeting of the Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District, the board approved preliminary plans for remodeling and renovation of the high school auditorium. The board also approved acceptance of bids on extensive repair and renovation to the athletic field bleachers.

Routine items included an examination of the budget progress report for the first five months of the school year; the enrollment report which showed a decline of students during the month of December; the total enrollment as of December 20th showed 1230 students. The tax collection report revealed 95.05% of the current taxes as having been collected. Unpaid taxes will become delinquent as of February 1, 1975. Also reviewed

was the cafeteria report showing daily participation for December of 778 students. The board discussed the county available school funds that will be divided on a per capita basis for Hale County school districts. These funds became available after the Commissioner's Court sold school land in Bailey County in 1973. The receipts from this sale of land can be used only for capital improvement within a school system. The first money will be divided at the Commissioner's Court on January 21, at 11:00 a.m.

In other action, the board accepted the resignation of Rebecca Sison, Bilingual T.V. instructor and also employed Ann McLain as a second grade teacher to replace Terry Dutton. No replacement has been made for Rebecca Sison.

### AREA BOY SCOUT NEWS

The South Plains Council has appointed Lonnie Hollingsworth, Lubbock Businessman as the 1975 Sustaining Membership Chairman responsible for raising \$105,000, Jack Baker, Council President announced.

Assisting Hollingsworth in the twenty county effort will be Ransom Galloway of Spur and Neal Ellis of Levelland.

The \$249,000 budget is financed by 15 United Funds who contribute \$130,000 plus earned income of \$14,000 leaving \$105,000 to be raised by Sustaining Members. A Sustaining Member is a person who has a financial interest in scouting, according to Baker.

The twenty county council is divided into seven districts Baker stated. Each of the seven district Finance Chairmen are currently recruiting their Community Chairmen. When fully organized the campaign will have over a thousand workers calling on 5,000 prospects in 35 communities.

Levels of membership are pegged from the Benefactor \$5,000 level to the "Support a Boy" \$25 membership.

The Scout Council provides training for leaders, operates 3 camps, maintains a Council Service Center and provides a corps of 10 professionals who guide and counsel the 2500 volunteer leaders, Baker stated.

Last year's most successful Sustaining Drive with a \$95,000 goal was headed by Bob McKinsey, Lubbock television station manager. It featured a council wide Saturday morning Kickoff Breakfast using a T. V. program beamed into each of the 35 communities. The T. V. program featured Eagle Scout Jim Carlen and Scout Executive Bob Bouse.

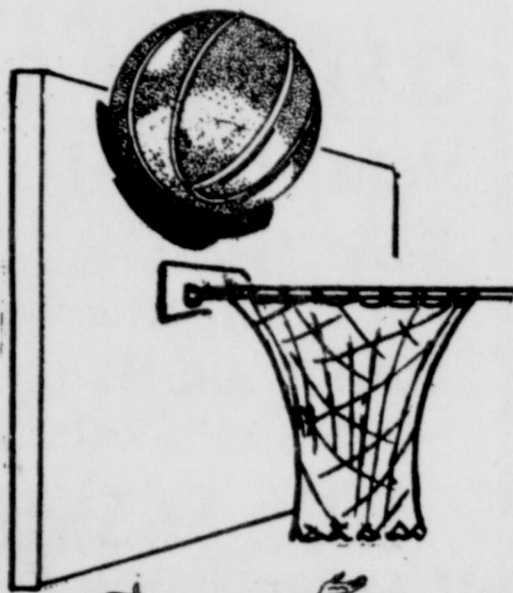
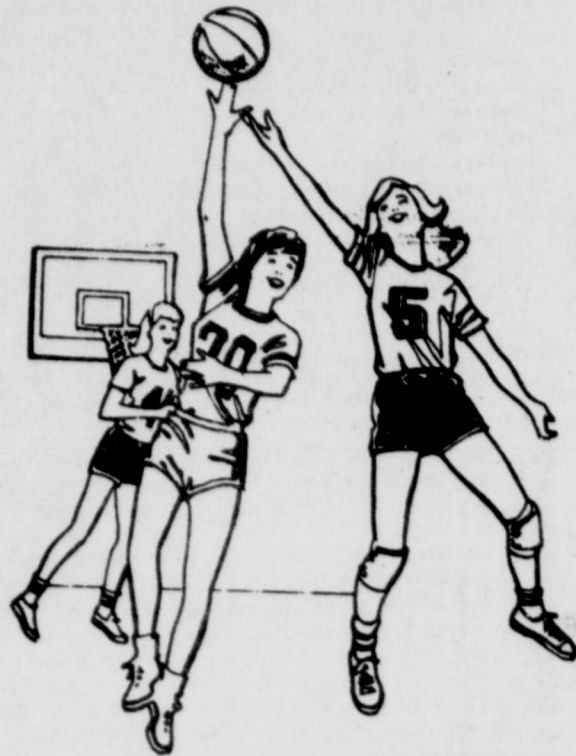

# Gun Victims Found On Dirt Road

## Couple's Hasty Exit Indicated At Home

SHERIFF'S investigators late Monday said they had no motive for the gruesome murders which left a semiretired couple dead in the snow Sunday on an isolated dirt road near their New Deal home.

Sheriff C.H. "Choc" Blanchard, who said his deputies found an empty Social Security envelope at the farm home, said he doubts robbery led to the gunshot slayings of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Andrew McKay, the county's third and fourth murder victims this year.

"I don't think they would have had any money," Blanchard said, "and if they did, it'd have been the Social Security money."

**Tire Tracks Found**  
Blanchard theorized McKay, 61, and his 55-year-old wife, Odessa, were forced from their

farm home to the isolated dirt road where they were gunned to death.

"We've got some tire tracks (at the murder scene) which match some there at the house," Blanchard said. "They were forced from the house and taken out there... it's about two to two and a half miles."

The couple, both of whom had worked for Texas Tech University, was found beside a dirt road about three miles northwest of New Deal late Sunday by three teenagers en route home from Abernathy.

**Bodies Described**  
Paul O'Brian, his sister, Cindy, and Phillip Pickard said they originally thought Mrs. McKay's body was a sack thrown in the road, but realized it was a body as they drove past. After stopping, the three teenagers discovered McKay's body, face-down and partially covered with snow, lying in a barrow ditch.

Capt. Charlie Montgomery said Mrs. McKay had been shot at close range behind her right ear. Her husband suffered gunshot wounds behind his left ear and in his back, Montgomery said.

"But McKay apparently was hit in the back with a blast from a shotgun," the investigator said. "Wadding from a shotgun shell was found in his coat."

**Pools Of Blood**  
Deputies, who were notified

at 10:55 p.m., found large pools of frozen blood beneath the bodies. Though both were dressed for the frigid 12-degree temperatures—they both wore coats—Mrs. McKay's body had no stockings or shoes, deputies said.

"He had a billfold with several credit cards and driver's license, but no money," Montgomery said. "There were pictures of her in his wallet, but no identification on her."

From an address on McKay's driver's license, investigators went to 306 Vernon Ave., but learned from neighbors the location of the McKays' farm home.

Deputies Ernest Rector and Alton Hobbs said there were no signs of a struggle at the McKays' modest farm home. However, they said a television set still was on about 1:30 a.m. Monday. Lights were on in a living room and kitchen, and an electric blanket also was switched on.

Blanchard said officers found at close range behind her right ear. Her husband suffered gunshot wounds behind his left ear and in his back, Montgomery said.

Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy ordered autopsies and the couple's clothes were taken to the Department of Public Safety lab for analysis.

Texas Rangers were assisting in the investigation.
