Purchasers Make Stock Show Biggest Success

A grand total of \$81,660.71 worth of livestock was auctioned off Thursday at the annual auction sale of prize winning animals concluding the 40th Plainview Stock Show.

This year's total topped last year's sale in which \$78,287.03 was spent and set a new show record.

Hale Center Co-op Gin and Hale Center Wheat Growers combined to buy the Grand Champion steer from Kala McDaniel, of Hale Center, at \$1,877.00 or \$1.55 a pound.

48 Steers Sold
A total of 48 steers were sold during the individual auction sale and \$39,112.61 was spent on the steers.

The grand champion barrow, shown Wednesday by Jeff Oswalt of Abernathy brought the youngster \$699.00 at \$3 per pound. Buying the barrow were representatives from Ragland Western Wear, West's Pharmacy, Doc Cross Carpet, Blair Drug, Marce & Son and the Plainview Daily Herald, all of Plainview.

The reserve grand champion barrow was bought by Jimmy Dean Meat Co. of Plainview at \$643.30 or \$2.70 per pound. The barrow had been shown by Gregg on Wednesday.

Lamb Sale
The champion medium wool lamb brought the most total money of the lambs, though the champion Southdown had a higher price per pound. Growers Send, Lubbock, Abernathy Co-Op Gin and Co-Op Grain Company of Abernathy bought the champion medium wool lamb for \$301.50 to Glenna Tullis, Ronald Morris Raymond Akin, Gene Harris, Dr. Joe Webb, Dr. Webb and Webb and C. A. Robinson, all of Plainview, bought the Southdown champion at \$4.25 per pound.

The champion fine wool cross lamb was bought by Harts Enterprises Inc. Quarter Way Gin, J. Bassett Smith Construction and Shook Tire of Plainview for \$463.25.

The champion fine wool was bought by Ragland's Western Wear, West's Pharmacy, Doc Cross Carpet, Blair Drug, Marce & Son and the Plainview Daily Herald at \$414.

Eighty hogs were sold at \$22, 218.00 and 59 lambs went for \$20,229.50.

NAMED TO DISTINGUISHED STUDENT LIST

Tarleton State University has recognized 541 students for academic achievement during the 1974 Fall semester, John M. Whiting, registrar, has announced.

"A" honor roll for students who have completed 12 credit hours or more during a semester with a grade of "A" in all courses taken for credit. "B" honor roll is for students who have made a grade of "B" or above in each course taken for credit and have completed at least 12 semester hours during the semester.

Distinguished students who have no grade below "C" and have completed at least 12 credit hours during the semester and have maintained a grade point ratio of 3.25 on a 4.0 system.

CITY ACCEPTS LOW BID OF \$48,609.25 FOR CONSTRUCTION OF WATER PIPE LINE ADDITION TO PRESENT SYSTEM

Derral Conklin, Contractor, of Plainview, was the low and successful bidder for the installation of 8,854 feet of 10-inch pipeline for the City of Abernathy. Bids were opened during the City Council meeting Monday night, March 17.

"This will be a turnkey job," stated City Manager Larry Fields, adding that in addition to the 8,854 feet of pipeline, the job would include 9,000 feet of buried signal cable. The new line will extend from a developed well in the northeast corner of City Well Field in Section 20, Block L, Hale County, to the existing well supply line on the Airport property and connect this well into the system.

City officials were "pleasantly surprised", not only at the low bid, but at the number of bids that were received. Nine other bids, ranging from the low bid to a high of \$72,705.00 were submitted. Conklin's bid was \$48,609.25.

"With this bid, the job will run approximately \$55,000 for the total project," Fields stated. "Earlier estimates for total cost of the project were in the neighborhood of \$100,000," the city manager added. The project will be paid for out of revenue sharing and water and sewer revenue.

The City of Abernathy will install a pump and motor in the existing well, which, according to tests, will produce nearly 2/3 as much as the other three wells put together. A 75 horsepower motor will be installed.

According to reports, the total capacity of the three existing wells is 990 gallons per minute, or 1,425,600 per day. In a study of the monthly water usage records for the first 11 months of 1974, it was determined that July was the peak month, with an average daily usage of 849,000 gallons, and a peak usage of 1,509,000 gallons on a given day.

This means that with only the three existing wells, on a peak day water usage the supply would not be able to keep up with the demand.

From tests made in December on the well to be added to the system, it was determined that the well has the capability of producing 600 gallons per minute. Adding this to an average of 250 g.p.m., or 1,944,000 gallons per day will be possible.

"At the present, if a well should go out, we would not be able to pump the maximum that is used, especially during the peak months," Fields pointed out. He added however, "With the new well, even if a well goes out, we still will be able to meet the maximum requirements."

"This is a very needed project, and with these bids, it is not going to cost nearly as much as previously believed," Fields concluded.





TEXAS TALK

by Harold Thompson

Q: How much water is actually needed for the production of a good cotton crop?

A: In most areas of Texas, with the exception of a couple of times of the year, the most prevalent answer would be "All we can get". More specifically, authorities now estimate the weight of water evaporated from an acre of cotton during a typical summer day to be as much as 68,000 pounds. That's equivalent to more than a quarter of an inch of rainfall a day. Considerably more than we can count on having. Irrigation supplements the rainfall wherever possible to provide an effective 20 inches of moisture during the average growing season.

In some areas of the really arid Southwest, farmers sometimes irrigate enough to provide the equivalent of 32 inches of rainfall through the course of a full year. Rainfall can be most harmful just after planting when the water may lower the soil temperature below 58 degrees.
