

#### Course Qualifies Drivers For Insurance Discounts

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie Tuesday said 35, 000 Texas drivers could forfeit automobile insurance dis-

counts this fall. Christie said drivers who completed the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course in the Fall of 1972 will lose their eligibility to a 10 percent discount on insurance premiums unless they

re-take the course, He said the discount program, established by the State Board of Insurance, is valid for a three-year period, but former DDC graduates can renew their eligibility for another 36 months by complet-

ing the 8-hour program.
"Over 400, 000 Texas motorists have completed the course in the past three years and statistics show that DDC graduates have 32 percent fewer accidents. Fewer accidents mean lower rates, Chrisite said

The Texas Safety Association, which administers the DDC program in Texas, reports that the DDC program has been revised, Christie

The new program contains many new films and visual aids, as well as new information on traffic laws, driving habits, road design and engineering innovations.

### TEXAS TALK

By Harold Thompson Getting it together may be

the secret for grain sorghum planting in the next few years. Results from agricultural experiment stations indicate work will probably be intensified toward a grain sorghum which will grow well in rows as narrow as ten inches. Soil fertility scientist Dr. Lawrence Morrill at the Oklahoma Experiment Scation says major yield in-creases are possible with a hybrid developed for the narrow rowleaf angle and toleration for a high plant population. In experiments with current varieties of sorghum, the extremely narrow (10 inch) rows showed consistently better yield with 40,000 plants per acre than with 80-thousand. The highest yields recorded in the test plots with non-irrigated sorghum involved planting 30 inch rows with 80,000 plants per acre and 120 pounds of applied nitrogen. Tests on irrigated sorghums are under-





2. Make your letters short and to the point. Avoid



needless words and information, as this will bog a reader down and cut down on the urgency of your message.

3. Choose your stationery carefully. A crisp paper with a well-designed letterhead makes a positive statement about your company. And cotton fiber (rag) paper handsomely reveals the detail of a good letterhead, contributing greatly to a quality




