## Contract Signed Here Tuesday For The Haskell Mental Health Center

A large number of interested persons were present Tuesday morning, May 26, in the Grand Jury room, courthouse, for the signing of a contract between Haskell County and the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

County Judge B. O. Roberson signed the agreement with Dr. Frankie Williams, Supt. of the Vernon Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center to place a Mental Health Center in Haskell as a subsidiary of the

Vernon Center. The Haskell Center will be located near the hospital and will have a staff of three persons, a psychiatrist, a caseworker and a clerk typist.

The Haskell Center is scheduled to open June 15. Aubrey Headstream, formerly of Rochester, has been named caseworker for the center. Dr. Frankie Williams will be serving as psychiatrist on a one-half day basis each week.

The Haskell Committee for Mental Health has been named as follows: Mr. Myron Beard, Mrs. Luther Burkett, Mrs. Tom Bevel, Mr. H. V. Woodard, Rev. R. D. Williams and Rev. Aubrey Headstream.

Members of the Commissioners Court, C. A. Thomas, Slover Bledsoe, Ray Perry and E. C. Collins, were also present at the meeting along with Larry Milder, Regional Co-ordinator for Mental Health.

Haynes was involved in an accident Sunday night, April 5, on U. S. Highway 277 in front of the First Baptist Church, Haskell, when the vehicle he was driving struck two pedestrians, Mr. and Mrs. Speck Sorrenson.

### New Hearing Is Due In Contract Suit

AUSTIN—South Builders, Inc. will get another hearing in its attempt to avoid paying damages in a breach of contract suit. The State Supreme Court Wednesday, May 20th, refused to hear an appeal from the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland.

South Builders was sued by Edwin L. Brown, Lonnie E. Williams and W. A. Peavy, subcontractors on a state highway contract.

The three were doing business as Brown, Peavy and Williams Co., and the company sued for full recovery of the contract price, lost profit, rental value of equipment that was idle when South Builders delayed furnishing crushed rock for resurfacing, and also for recovery for blading, grading and removing concrete from a road surface in Jones County on another subcontract.

The suit was brought when South Builders delayed in delivering the crushed rock materials for surfacing.

District Court in Haskell ruled that Brown, Peavy and Williams should be given what they asked for, and South Builders appealed to the 11th Court of Civil Appeals.

That court reversed the decision and sent it back for a new trial on one of South Builders' points of error. The appeals court ruled that Brown, Peavy and Williams had not showed sufficient evidence for the jury to decide a fair value for the idle equipment and that it would only allow the jury to speculate as to the extent that South Builders was negligent.

Brown, Peavy and Williams appealed to the Texas Supreme Court and that court affirmed the appeals court's decision by refusing to hear the case on a no-reversible-error ruling.

The case was tried in a week-long proceedings in District Court here, in March 1969. Dennis Ratliff of Haskell, and Douglas Herne of Austin, represented the Plaintiff, D. D. Crawford of Dallas and P. D. Andrews of Stamford represented South Builders, Inc.

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The Haskell Memorial Hospital board members, E. O. Morgan, of Rule, president; John Payne, secretary; Lennis Tibbitts, Rochester; Dan Griffith, Paint Creek; Eddie Sanders, Weinert; and Administrator, Alfred Turnbow, in regular meeting Thursday, May 21, approved in their minutes to build an addition to the hospital and designated it as "Phase 1", if architectural and financial plans are approved as planned by the board.

The expansion and modernization project will include enlarging offices and lobby, a large room for medical records, new and modern bathroom facilities, air-conditioning, heating, office and lobby furniture. Mr. Turnbow said the board is considering moving the nursery and nurses station which would include two "O.B." rooms, with private bath. Turnbow said the next step of the board would be to contact an architect to secure plans and blueprints for the project.

**A—**Yes. You should apply for pension. When a veteran is qualified for both compensation and pension, the VA pays the higher benefit.

**Q—**I am attending school under the G. I. Bill, and my wife has given birth to a son. How do I notify the VA for this additional dependent?

**A—**Forward immediately to your VA regional office a copy of the child's birth record. Be careful to write your VA file number on the document. It is

advisable to attach a note advising the VA that you are training under the G.I. Bill.

**Q—**My husband was killed in service, and I am thinking of taking advantage of the educational benefits available from the Veterans Administration. Will the VA assist me in working out a program?

**A—**Yes. You may apply to the VA for vocational counseling. Professional counselors may be able to help you decide on a productive and rewarding program.

### The Do's And Don'ts of Lawn Care Logic

Let's face it—good lawns don't just happen by accident. They need plenty of tender, loving care to prosper. So, if you want a lawn to turn your neighbors green with envy, cultivate these do's and don'ts suggested by the gardening experts at Diston:

DO water a new lawn lightly and often enough to keep the soil moist until it is established, but DON'T water it if the rainfall has been adequate. Excessive watering brings on certain lawn diseases.

DO soak an established lawn to a depth of three to six inches, but DON'T water again until the soil becomes dry and crumbly.

DO keep a newly planted lawn at a height of one to two inches, but DON'T mow it until it is three inches high. The one exception is bentgrass, which must be kept much shorter.

DO use shears, like the Diston Cordless Electric, around shrubs, trees, patios and sidewalks, but DON'T chip your mower blades or damage your greenery by trying to use that mower where it doesn't belong. ### FIRST AID TRAINING IS NEEDED IN RURAL SECTIONS

In an effort to provide adequate first aid to accident victims on the highway and on the farm, the American Red Cross has redoubled its effort to train people in first aid, according to Ray Lusk, Chairman, First Aid and Water Safety, Haskell County Chapter, American Red Cross.

"The long-term goal of the Red Cross is to have at least one member of every family trained in first aid procedures," said Robert M. Oswald, national director Red Cross Safety Programs. "In the rural setting, medical facilities often are not immediately available, making it imperative that first aid be given at the scene."

Emergency medical transportation and first aid care arrangements have been secured in some areas through the training of law enforcement officers, firemen and ambulance drivers, he said. Even more important, however, is the need for a first aid trained person on the scene to give immediate help.

**7,500 Die Each Year**

Each year approximately 7,500 persons who live on farms lose their lives in vehicle accidents work accidents and accidents in the farm home. President Nixon has proclaimed July 19-25 as National Farm Safety Week to emphasize the importance of being careful in the rural environment.

Farm residents, both young and old, trip, stumble and break bones, get bruised, cut and caught in machines. Many others accidentally shoot themselves, or drown, suffocate, or get burned.

Workers on farms should wear comfortable, close fitting clothing, sturdy gloves, safety shoes with steel toes, eye and head protection and take work breaks to prevent fatigue.

Thousands of children are injured and hundreds killed in farm accidents that could have been prevented by keeping children safely out of the work area and off farm machinery.

Farm equipment can be dangerous when not properly handled. Workers can get tangled up in moving parts that are not adequately shielded. It is advisable when walking by such machinery to stay at least six feet away. A moving vehicle's speed should be adjusted to ground conditions, avoiding ditches, steep hills and obstacles.

There has been a rapid increase in the number of farm ponds and deep irrigation ditches thus creating another hazard on the farm, he pointed out.

Every farmer should install a "safety post" beside each farm pond or swimming pool. This is a four-by-four post to which is attached a reaching pole, such as bamboo fishing rod and a small inflated tractor inertube with a line of rope attached to it, so that the inertube can be thrown to a drowning victim," said Mr. Oswald. "However, the best safeguard against drowning is knowing how to swim."

Falls are the number one accidental death cause in the rural home as in its urban

### June Draft Call For Texas Is Below May

The June draft call for Texas is 801, and no man will be selected and ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 170. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said. The June quota is down from 834 in May, which is being filled with men having random sequence numbers no higher than 145.

The state quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in June is 2,320, down from 5,828 in May. Men sent for these examinations will be limited to those with random sequence numbers 1 through 215.

Deferred or exempt men, such as teachers, college students, and vocational or trade school students, with random sequence numbers 1 through 215, may be forwarded for these examinations if they are likely to lose their deferred or exempt status during the next six months, Colonel Schwartz said.

No men with random sequence numbers above 215 will be forwarded for examination until further notice. Men born in 1951, who have no random sequence numbers, will not be called for this purpose. A drawing will be held later this year to establish the numbers for the 1951 group.

All volunteers at the draft boards must be inducted ahead of the non-volunteers selected and ordered to report for induction by random sequence number.

The Texas induction quota of 801 for June is the state's share of a national call for 15,000 men, all for the Army.

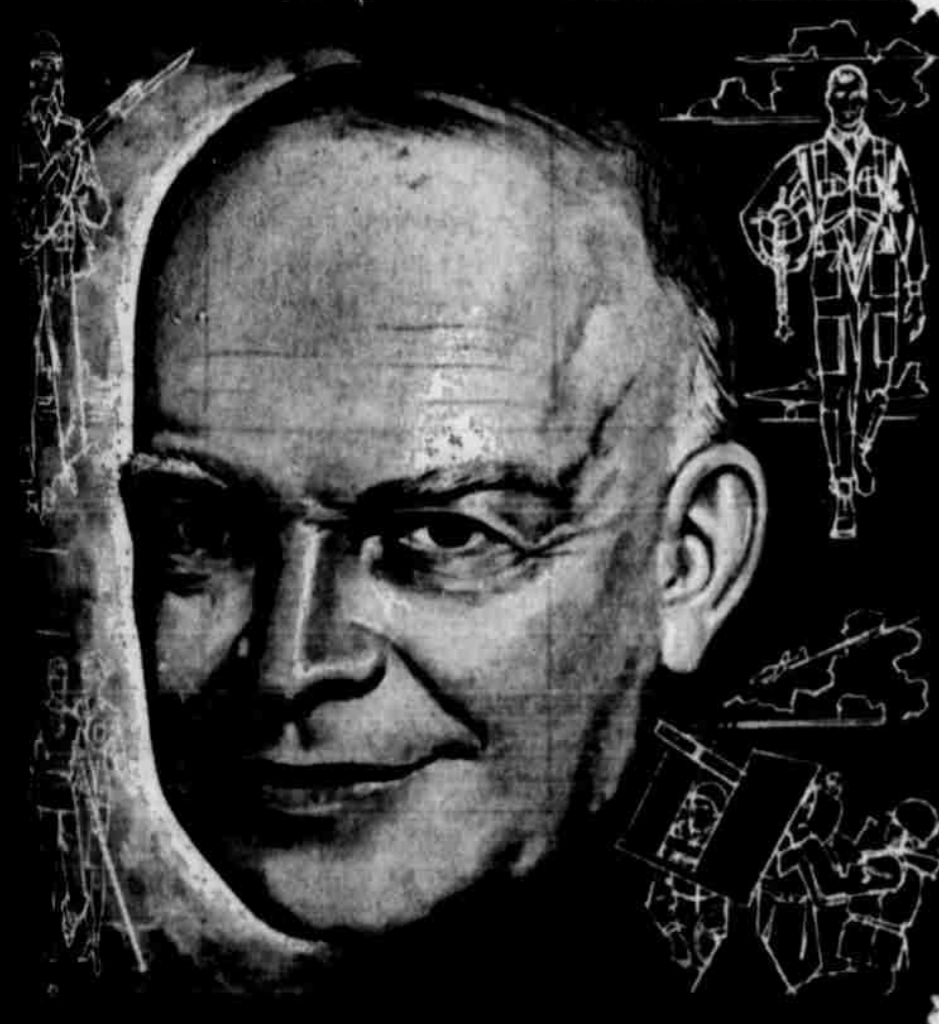

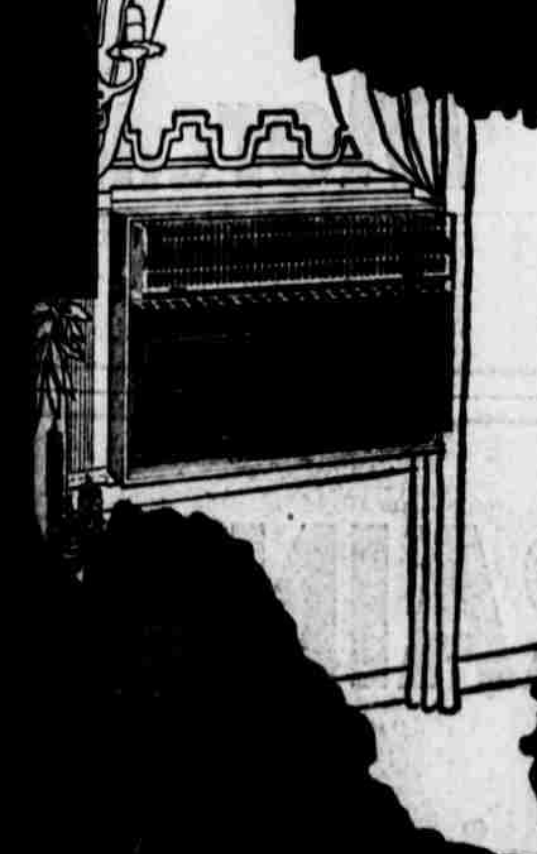

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The total self-interest of the United States should govern her actions in all foreign affairs. There can be no real justification otherwise for the expenditure of taxpayers' money in any relation with other countries whether it be at war, trade or aid. Defining and identifying our own self-interest is a matter of human judgment. Should we be directly attacked militarily, there would be no question about defending ourselves. It is another thing to believe that we are defending our own shores by fighting wars in other places before it reaches home. In a direct attack our cause would be obvious. In the longer range view, we entered World Wars I and II believing it was in our own self-defense. In the present situation in southeast Asia, we became involved as a subscriber to the

Southeast Asian Treaty Organization (SEATO). The United States entered an agreement with the Philippines, Australia, France, New Zealand, Pakistan, Thailand and the United Kingdom to jointly defend that area against communist expansion. We believed it to be in our own self-interest on the long term basis. We believed it was in our own interest to become a signatory to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) as a buffer against the Soviet Union. Our Government spent billions of dollars on the Marshall Plan to rehabilitate Western Europe after World War II believing that those nations must stand militarily and economically independent of communist Eastern Europe.

No treaty exists in the Middle East but there are those who apparently feel obligated for Israel's defense by contending that Israel is largely a creation of our making and that we have a responsibility for protecting her. Many of those of this feeling condemn our presence in Vietnam. Almost obscured by the concern over crossing the somewhat vaguely defined borders of Cambodia is a developing crisis in the Middle East. What is our self-interest in the Israeli-Arab conflict? It carries the usual elements of military and economic interest on which judgments in similar situations have been made in the past. It also involves heavy emotionalism in our Nation.

On the material side is Soviet expansion and influence in the whole Middle East, Africa and the Mediterranean Sea. At stake, besides the emotional ties to Israel, is the vast oil supplies in the Arab lands which would be a prize to the Soviet Union, if controlled by them. Dominance of the Mediterranean and its ocean outlets by unfriendly forces would seriously jeopardize the shipping of the free world. These are factors which would come under consideration should a full conflagration develop.

Our Nation has never been an aggressor. We have never sought by forceful means any economic hold in foreign lands. The possession outside our borders were acquired for their protection and not for colonization. Who determines our own self-interest? How do we arrive at the great decisions? A myriad of opinions go into making pol-

# Tax Questions And Answers

(This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service, and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.)

Q) Instead of making an estimated tax declaration, can I just increase my withholding?

A) Yes. To determine your additional withholding, use the worksheet that came with the estimated tax package. If you did not get an estimated forms package, the Form 1040ES worksheet may be obtained at your local IRS office.

Q) My father died last year and my wife and I are now supporting my mother. Are her social security benefits counted as income?

A) Social security benefits are not counted in determining whether she had gross income of \$600 or more. These benefits are counted, however, in determining whether you provided more than half her support. To meet the support test, you must provide more than half the cost of her food, clothing, shelter, medical and similar expenses for the entire year.

Q) I forgot to claim my Blue Cross premiums when I sent in my return. Is it too late to do it?

A) No. Generally you may make a change in your return by filing Form 1040X, Amended U. S. Individual Income Tax Return. Copies of this form and instructions are available at local IRS offices.

Q) Where on my tax return should I report the excess reimbursement I get from my company for travel expenses?

A) This should be reported on Schedule E, Part III. Other miscellaneous income that should be reported here include alimony, prizes, awards, and state income tax refunds.

Income from Schedule E should be entered on line 14 of your Form 1040 along with income from any Schedule C, D or F you are filing.

Q) Last year my teenager made about \$350 a year on his newspaper route. Is this taxable to him or me?

A) His income is not taxable to you. Your son should report this income if his total earnings from all sources amount to \$600 or more for the year. If his total earnings were less than \$600 but income tax was withheld, he must file a return to claim a refund.

**HOG ORDINANCE**  
 An ordinance regulating keeping hogs within the City of Weinert and providing a penalty for the violation thereof.  
**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF WEINERT, TEXAS.**  
 Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully keep hogs within a distance of 150 feet of the property line of any other property owner within the City limits of the City of Weinert, Texas. That keeping hogs near another person's property shall be deemed a nuisance which may injure or affect the comfort or public health of the citizens.  
 Section 2. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.  
 Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and become operative from and after its publication and it is so provided.
