BETTY CROCKER SCHOLARSHIP TEST TO BE GIVEN HERE SOON

The 22nd Annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living, a \$110,000 college scholarship program sponsored by General Mills, gets underway Tuesday (Dec. 2). High school seniors here and throughout the country will join in a written knowledge and attitude examination which will determine individual college scholarship awards of \$500 to \$5,000.

Participating seniors will compete in a 50-minute examination prepared and graded by Science Research Associates, Chicago, who are responsible for all judging and selection of winners. The local winner will receive a certificate from General Mills and will, together with other school winners, remain in the running for state and national honors.

On April 25-28 of next year, the 51 state Family Leaders of Tomorrow will gather in Washington, D. C.,

for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city. Personal observation and interviews of the state winners during the tour will be added factors in the selection of the 1976 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow and three runners-up. Scholarship awards to the four national winners will be for \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

More than ten million students have been enrolled in the Betty Crocker Search since its beginning in the 1954-55 school year.

Abernathy Receives Rebate Check

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks totaling \$14.5 million to 670 cities and towns last Friday, rebating their October city sales tax.

Bullock said his office has rebated a total of \$223.7 million to cities collecting the sales tax so far in calendar 1975. During all of calendar 1974, he said, a total of \$233.7 million was rebated. Abernathy's portion

of the tax rebates totaled \$4,259,65.

With a normal November and December, Bullock predicted city budgets will enjoy \$25 million to \$30 million more revenue from the sales tax this year over 1974.

The Comptroller said 154 of the total 824 cities collecting the sales tax will not receive their rebate until the end of the December quarter, because they fell below the \$500 cutoff for monthly rebates.

RESIDENTS URGED TO KEEP RURAL ROADS PASSABLE FOR MAIL CARRIERS

The cooperation of rural and suburban postal customers in helping to keep private roads passable and approaches to mail boxes clear during the coming winter months was requested recently by Postmaster J. H. Lambert.

"Postal customers are responsible for keeping approaches to their mail boxes clear of snow and other obstructions that would make mail delivery difficult or impossible," Postmaster Lambert said. "People should be aware that failure to clear paths to mail boxes promptly after heavy snows may temporarily prevent carriers from making deliveries. Customers will be contacted if they have an obstructed mail box."

There may also be a need to ask postal customers to relocate their boxes on a new line of travel if excessive and extended detours are necessary, the postmaster said.

"Highway officials are responsible for keeping public roads passable and in good repair," Postmaster Lambert said. "But in areas where mail service is provided over roads not maintained by road authorities, the owner of the road is responsible."

Rural and star route carriers will make every reasonable effort to serve the greatest number of customers during severe weather, the postmaster said. "But service on foot when roads are impassable is not required. Also, when state highway authorities

are or local police consider road travel hazardous, postal service may be curtailed until the inclement weather abates," he said.

The postmaster urged anyone with a question on winter weather road conditions and mail service to contact the Abernathy post office.

Most of Abernathy's downtown stores and businesses will be closed in observance of the holiday, and will resume business at their usual hours the following day, Friday, November 28.

Exceptions may be those firms that serve area farmers during the cotton harvesting season. They will either be open or will have someone on call for providing parts, fuel, and other harvest necessities.

FARMERS SHOULD APPLY PROMPTLY FOR LOW-YIELD DISASTER PAYMENTS

Reports from Hale County Farmers coming into the Hale County ASCS Office are that the production county wide appears to be off from one quarter to one-half bale per acre.

Pat Guy, the Executive Director, of the local ASCS office, reminds all farmers that they are to make application for low yield disaster payments within 15 days after harvest. Production records do not have to be turned in at the time application is made, but it is important to file application within 15 days after harvest.

Also applications for weather adjustments of cotton yields are to be filed within 15 days after harvest just the same as the applications for disaster payments. Some farmers in the county may produce enough cotton so that they will not be eligible for the disaster provisions, but probably every farm's production will be low enough whereby the farmer would be eligible for consideration of the yield adjustment. This is most important to the farmer as it will have its affect in future years.

Opportunistic New Deal Advances Over Hart 28-7

PLAINVIEW—Opportunistic New Deal used two slashing touchdown runs by reserve Aaron Stark in the fourth quarter to whip Hart 28-7 in a Class A bidistrict tilt here Friday.

The upset vaulted the Lions into the regionals against Sanford-Fritch, a 13-6 winner over previously unbeaten and state-ranked Wellington.

The Lions were stunned by a 66-yard TD pass from Kerry George to tight end Bryan Irons less than two minutes into the contest, but after that completely dominated the tilt.

New Deal recovered five fumbles and intercepted two passes, managed seven penetrations, and the three times it failed to score, it lost the ball at the 4, 7, and 5-yard lines.

Hart won the toss and elected to receive. On the game's fifth play, George dumped a short pass over the middle to Irons, who caught the ball at the 45 and slanted away from two defenders and was in the clear at the Lion 40.

When George booted the

PAT, only 1:46 had elapsed in the game.

Gregg Ford got off a booming, 42-yard punt which carried to the Longhorn 1 and that proved to be Hart's undoing. After failing to move, Eliazar Castillo managed only a 17-yard punt to the 22. And six plays later, New Deal was even.

Clark Agnew got his first TD on a 3-yard run and Ford booted the PAT with 3:14 left in the quarter.

Less than two minutes later, Castillo had only a 14-yard punt and the Lions drove 31 yards in 11 plays with Agnew going the final 3 yards with 9:55 left in the half and Ford tacked on the PAT.

In the second half, New Deal marched to the 5 where a fourth-down fake field goal failed to produce and then in the fourth quarter, Stark took over.

With 9:55 left in the game, Ford recovered a Hart bobble at the Longhorn 23, and three plays later, the game was iced.

Stark got the TD on the best run of the evening, from 9 yards. After taking the handoff from Chuck Thiel, Stark was hit no less than six times but managed to bll his way into the end zone with 8:49 left.

On the first play following the kickoff, Hart fumbled and Jimmy Thiel recovered at the 20. Six plays later, Stark struck again from the 4 and Ford tacked on the final point of the game.

Thiel picked off two passes and Tim Attebury had two fumble recoveries for the Lions.

Agnew was the game's leading rusher with 97 yards on 19 attempts. Ford added 50 yards, Stark 39, and Jimmy Thiel 27.

The Lion defense limited Hart ace Barry George to 32 yards on 12 attempts.

New Deal will carry an 8-3 mark into the regionals, and Hart finished 9-2, with both losses coming to the 4-A champions New Deal and Petersburg.

BICENTENNIAL NOTEBOOK

Donald Whisenhunt

Two hundred years ago this month Britain was anxiously seeking soldiers to fight in America to put down the rebellion there. As an already mentioned in an earlier column unsuccessful overtures had been made to Russia. Negotiations were also underway with several German princes to employ mercenary soldiers.

Britain realized early that it would be very difficult to entice British soldiers to fight in America against people that were often relatives to many and certainly countrymen to all. Therefore, a possible alternative was to hire soldiers from other countries.

Another possible source of troops was Ireland. However, then as now, Britain had trouble controlling Ireland and docile subservience was certainly not guaranteed.

In November 1775 Britain proposed to the Irish House of Commons that 4,000 troops in Ireland be sent to America to be replaced by 4,000 German Protestant soldiers who would be hired for the purpose.

The debate in the Irish commons was intense. A number of Irish leaders not only resisted the suggested troop movement but also protested the British action to crush the Americans. Lord Ponsonby is reported to have stated, "If we give our consent we shall take part against America, contrary to justice, to prudence, and to humanity." Fitzgibbon also protested: "The war is unjust, and Ireland has no reason to be a party therein."

Despite the vocal opposition raised by friends of America Britain still had power enough that the measure to send Irish troops passed by a vote of 121-76. However, the resolution to replace them with German Protestants failed.

By November 1775 Britain more clearly recognized that the submission of the Americans would probably not be as easy task as originally assumed.

Meanwhile in Spanish Texas isolation was a fact of life. Located so far out on the northern frontier there was virtually no opportunity for the average citizen to have direct contact with Mexico or Spain.

Transportation was so limited that the occasional visitor who made the long journey northward was welcomed as a special guest. Stories and news were eagerly sought by a people who had cut themselves off for life

from friends and relatives. Despite the distance and the isolation the culture of Texas remained Spanish for sometime and the resentment and resistance that developed on the Atlantic coast did not occur in Texas. Loyalty to the crown and the church remained strong even among the generations born in Texas. The later emigrants from the United States would be the ones who eventually decided to pull Texas away from the mother country.

**LOCAL FAMILY HAS ANCESTRAL TIES
WITH AMERICAN HERITAGE**

A local family's tie with America's heritage was revealed when young Amber Simpson, daughter of Merwin Simpson, participated in a fifth grade play and musical production entitled "The Greatest American."

The play, presented last Friday by fifth grade music students of Mrs. Ruth Fulton, included a segment of Sacagawea, the Shoshone Indian woman known to history as a guide for the Lewis and Clark expedition in the early 1800's.

During rehearsals for the production, Amber revealed that Sacagawea, wife of Toussaint Charboneau, interpreter for the expedition, was her great, great, great grandmother.

According to history, Sacagawea and her husband joined the Lewis and Clark expedition at Fort Mandan in what is now North Dakota. The expedition then moved westward along the Missouri River, guided by Sacagawea.

The leaders of the expedition, appointed by President Thomas Jefferson, hoped that the Shoshone woman could lead them to the tribe of which her brother, whom she had not seen since childhood, was chief. It was hoped that the tribe could be persuaded to provide horses for the men of the expedition.

Amber and her three brothers, Carl, Jarrett and Brandon, are direct descendants of Sacagawea and her husband through their father, whose grandmother, Belle, married Wesley Charboneau. Mrs. Charboneau's husband was the son of Eugene Charboneau and the grandson of Sacagawea and Toussaint Charboneau.

Belle Charboneau and her

daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Kirby, (who is the grandmother of the Simpson children), visited in Abernathy last week and attended the dress rehearsal of the play, in which Sacagawea appeared.

In the production, Sacagawea was portrayed by Kristi Ortiz and Angie Attebuty. Other "great Americans" included were Col. John Glenn, portrayed by Mark Riddell and Roger Gragg; Clara Barton, played by Yolanda Ortiz and Susan Stone; Abraham Lincoln, played by Billy Nunn and Lonnie Howard; and George Washington, portrayed by Jay Harrison and Barry

Tilley. Amber Simpson played the part of Miss Allen, teacher of the students in the production, which was a play within-a-play. She shared her roll with Kathy Raybon.

In the play, the students portray members of a fifth grade class who, with the help of their teacher, Miss Allen, plan and present a historical pageant. The five "greatest American" characters appear in this pageant.

An additional highlight of Friday's production was the performance of patriotic songs by all members of Mrs. Ruth Fulton's fifth grade music classes.

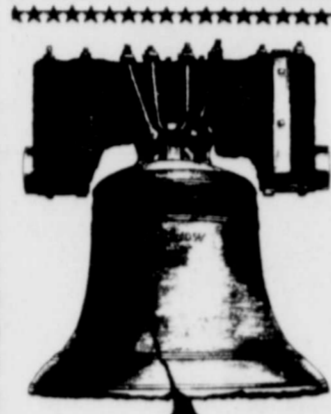

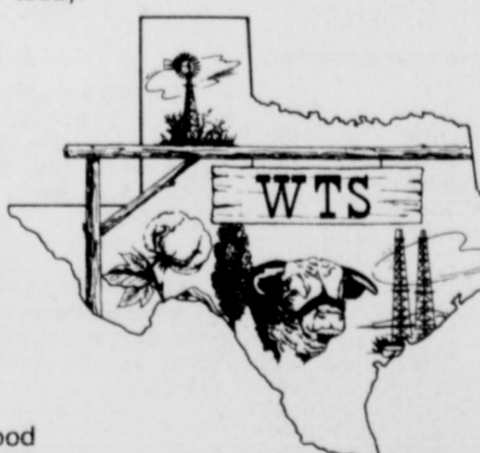
