Abernathy's observance of the nation's 200th Birthday, under guidelines set by the national American Revolution Bicentennial Administration, will center around the three thematic areas; Heritage '76; Festival USA; and Horizons '76.

According to ARBA statements, the inclusion of "at least one" activity for each of these three areas is "highly desirable" by the national ARBA because it increases awareness of the full scope of the Nation's Bicentennial program, "A past to remember; a future to mold."

"At least ONE activity"?? On the contrary, after seeing a copy of our proposed Bicentennial activities in the city, one can see just why we were approved for Bicentennial status. Abernathy has, not "at least one" activity for each of the three thematic areas, but at least FOUR, and in some cases, as many as EIGHT.

And every one of the 22 projects described in Abernathy's application for Bicentennial status promises to be not only a credit to the city, but a memorable contribution to the area's heritage.

Though the Bicentennial projects are too numerous to fully describe here, they will include activities aimed at preserving the history of the area, (under the Heritage '76 theme); patriotic musicals, discussions, church services and exhibits; and beautification of the city, (under the Festival USA theme); and, (under the Horizons '76 theme), plans toward a better future for Abernathy through the addition of the Bicentennial Mini Park, the expansion of the public library, the completion of the new gold auditorium at AHS, and the training of an efficient Emergency Medical force to serve the area.

Other lasting evidences of the city's Bicentennial observations will be the beautification of the city square with the planting of trees in memorial of past citizens, the burial of a time capsule devoted to Bicentennial activities, (to be opened at the U. S. Bicentennial), and the erection of a historical plaque at the old Clisbee hall stage, which served the city prior to the 20th century.

Bicentennial activities in Abernathy will eventually become a part of the state and national Bicentennial records, to be published in the national ARBA calendar of events.

All in all, the activities and hard work of our Bicentennial committee, headed by general chairperson Polly Tucker, should make this Bicentennial a truly a memorable time for Abernathy. However, your help is needed, and participation by members of the community is a major aim of the committee. No matter what your interests or talents, there is a place for you in the scheme of things for this, the 200th anniversary of our Nation's independence.

AREA HERITAGE IS THEME FOR BICENTENNIAL PROJECTS

Much of the emphasis of the Bicentennial celebration will be upon the events of the two hundred year period since the founding of the nation. But in our particular area we will be limited to the portion applicable to our own history since the buffalo hunter and cowman came to the plains.

The source material for recalling the past will be whatever recorded articles and newspaper stories that we can find. The Heritage Committee has the responsibility of collecting whatever information can be had and making a permanent record of such information.

This committee is planning a special edition of selected Abernathy newspapers beginning with one as early as 1911. We have a couple of papers published in 1918, two editions in 1922, and one from 1931. In addition to these we will select one from each decade since that time using only the front page of each edition. This will make a ten or twelve page special paper giving a sampling of news events of our town. It is proposed that this edition will be on sale at \$1 per copy.

In addition to this all the newspapers we can find printed prior to September 1963 will be microfilmed as a complete record of the happenings deemed newsworthy at the time of publication. This microfilm record will be for the complete edition of the paper in each case. Added to this microfilming project will be the recording in like manner of other historical documents that might be available such as histories and historical records.

Some of the clubs of the town have taken the Bicentennial as their 1976 theme. In particular the 1935 Study Club is having studies of all phases of U. S. history as their year's goal.

Sometime during the year there will be a dedication and placing of a historical marker commemorating the earliest mail stop that served this community. It was the Clisbee Stage stop which was located northeast of Abernathy about 10 miles.

Another heritage special event will be the ceremonial burial of certain records that

will be available for removal during the Bicentennial of the United States. These records will include the microfilm history described above plus the record of the Bicentennial events of 1976 and perhaps other pertinent material.

Any suggestions that might be brought to the attention of the Heritage committee that would enhance this portion of the effort would be greatly appreciated. Mrs. Cal Tucker or Arno Struve would be happy to receive any such suggestions.

Mini-Park Is Bicentennial Project For Chamber

In the spirit of the Bicentennial, the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce has recently developed an overnight Campers Park. Named the Bicentennial Mini-Park, it is located at North Avenue D and Highway #87 South Service Road. The Park provides overnight facilities for camper trailers including a dump station.

DONATED TREES WILL ADD TO BEAUTY OF CITY SQUARE IN BICENTENNIAL PROJECT

A program to help beautify the Abernathy City Square has been initiated by members of the city's garden club and Chamber of Commerce. The program is designed to add color and shade through the planting of donated trees in preparation for next year's Bicentennial and Fourth of July celebration.

Private citizens wishing to

donate trees for the project may do so by contacting city hall, and trees may be donated as memorials to loved ones, or as a benefit to the appearance of the square.

Trees available for donation have been selected according to the suggestions of two Lubbock nurseries. Trees suggested for the project are red oak, silver leaf maple, honey locust or shademaster, scopulorum and pecan. Prices for donating any one or several of the trees are available at city hall. A total of 18 trees will be planted in accordance with landscaping suggestions made by the two nurseries.

It was stressed that tree donors should express their desire to donate a tree to city hall personnel. Members of a committee made up of local garden clubs will make the selection of trees to be used.

Once a tree is donated, it becomes the property of the city of Abernathy, and the care of the tree will become the responsibility of the city. If future expansion of city facilities necessitates the relocation of a tree, it will be moved.

Total cost for the purchase and planting of the proposed 18 trees will run about \$1,000.

Also stressed was the fact that those who wish to donate trees should contact city hall as soon as possible, so that all of the 18 trees will be accounted for in order to make early planting possible.

In addition to the planting of trees, the city square will be prepared for next year's Bicentennial observance with the planting of new grass behind city hall, and of red, white and blue flowers in front of the building.

AMBULANCE SERVICE; BICENTENNIAL HIGHLIGHT AGENDA AT CHAMBER MEETING

Topics of discussion ranged from local ambulance service to the American Revolution Bicentennial at last Thursday's meeting of the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce.

City manager Larry Fields reported that the city will receive its new ambulance vehicle pending a decision by Lubbock County commissioners. Although the four other area cities participating with Lubbock County Hospital District in the Emergency Medical Service have had their contract with the commission approved, there has been a delay in the approval of Abernathy's contract due to the fact that the city lies within the boundaries of both Lubbock and Hale counties.

Because of its position on a county line, Abernathy's contract may have to be amended before it can be approved by the county commissioners, according to Fields.

In addition, Fields reported that the annexation by the city of Abernathy of the Bicentennial Mini Park on north Ave. D. had been completed. He continued by bringing to the Chamber a request by members of Mrs. Susan McAlexander's Home and Family Living class at Abernathy High School for permission to complete the painting of tables and awnings at the park as a Bicentennial project.

In other business, the Chamber heard a report from Arno Struve on another Chamber-sponsored Bicentennial project. Struve reported that the microfilming of a near-complete file of the Abernathy Weekly Review can be accomplished at a cost of approximately four cents a sheet. The Chamber postponed a decision on the project pending further discussion.

In other business, the Chamber heard a report from Dave Cavitt of Southwestern Public Service Co. to the effect that the installation of Abernathy's Christmas lights was near completion. He added that two cases of bulbs for the seasonal lights had been purchased.

Dave Pinson reported that the Chamber's annual banquet has been scheduled for March 4, with W. C. Newberry tentatively named as speaker for the event.

Charles Bowen thanked the Chamber for its aid in the

volunteer fire department's annual "Santa Claus Project", saying that the Chamber's support of the project was necessary due to the fact that fire department funds had been depleted this year with the purchase of a new fire truck. He added that the Abernathy Lions Club may also participate in the project this year, aiding with the purchase of candy for the

school children of the city. The Chamber voted to participate in the program "in the same manner" in which they did in 1974.

Guests at the monthly meeting included Joe Price, District Manager, Pioneer Natural Gas; and Jerry Guthrie, Executive Vice President and General Manager for Hale County Savings and Loan Association.

ushers at the door to take the food items and they will be placed under the Christmas tree in the front of the church.

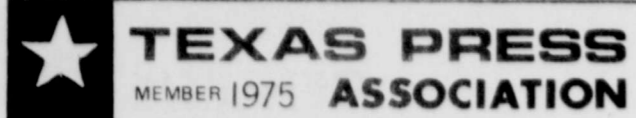
Food items suggested, are chili, Treet, Spam, Vienna Sausage, or canned vegetables or food items that will keep in the pantry.

Corn production meetings slated

Insect and disease control, fertilizer and irrigation requirements, cultural practices and the economics of corn production are subjects to be discussed in a program on corn production, according to Ollie Liner, County Extension Agent.

This meeting is scheduled on Tuesday, December 16 at the Hale County Agricultural Center beginning at 2:00 p.m. and ending at 5:00 p.m.

"In 1975, well over a million acres of corn were grown on the Texas High Plains," says County Extension Agent, Ollie Liner.

"Next season we expect the acreage to climb even higher. Many farmers are debating whether to plant corn or sorghum and many others are deliberating the prospects of disease and insect problems and fertilizer and irrigation costs.

Topics to be discussed include weed control in sorghum, corn, cotton, sunflowers and wheat, as well as new research developments in controlling problem annual and perennial weeds.

The meeting is one of three area-wide symposiums sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University System and USDA-Agricultural Research Service.

Harris stated that they will have application to fill out for the course and explain about the 10 weeks of training.



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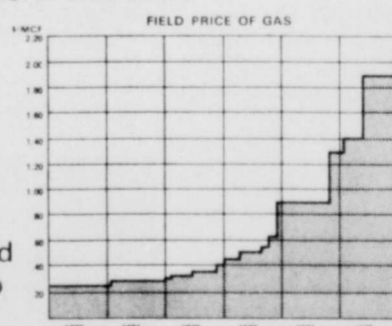
