BASKETBALL GAME SET JANUARY 31 TO BENEFIT LOCAL AMERICAN HEART FUND DRIVE

THURSDAY, JANUARY 29, 1976

The Abernathy Heart Association will sponsor a benefit basketball game at the high school gym on January 31 at 7:00 p.m. to launch the month-long, nationwide Heart Fund campaign.

The game will pit coach Pete Wilson's ex Lady Lopes against faculty women from the city's schools. Coach Wilson, who served as girls' basketball coach in the schools here from 1953 to 1962, will return to coach his former players. Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent of Abernathy schools, will coach the faculty team.

In ancouncing the game, Mrs. Ralph Davis, chairman of Abernathy's Heart Fund drive, also reported that this year's goal is \$1,000, as

compared to the \$700 collected in 1975.

"Heart and blood vessel diseases kill more than one million Americans annually, ' Mrs. Davis said. "The toll is greater than all other causes of death combined. Your Heart Association needs your support in its fight to conquer the nation's number one

TAX REFUNDS MAY PROVIDE RESPITE FROM AFTER-CHRISTMAS CASH PINCH

Dallas, Texas--Christmas bills are coming in, winter cold forces the utility bills up and, if you are like most people, there is not a handy supply of spare cash you can get your hands on. What to

People do not usually think of the IRS as a source of quick cash, but, according to North Texas IRS director A. W. McCanless, the nation's tax collecting agency is willing and eager to help. "The majority of North Texas taxpayers will receive a refund from the IRS this year, " Mr. McCanless said. 'This is true in most years, but especially this year because of the Tax Reduction Act of 1975, which substantially reduced the tax liability of the average taxpayer. "

The federal tax official said that taxpayers who are due refunds will get their checks within four or five weeks if they file a correct tax return during January or February, when the IRS workload is relatively slow compared to March or April. File later than February,

Mr. Royce Hart, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency, and the department of Agricultu-Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas AGM University

Mr. Hart is a native of Upshur County, Texas, and was reared on an East Texas farm. He graduated from Union Hill School near Gilmer, Texas. He received a B. S. degree in Agricultural Engineering from Texas A&M, in 1960. He was owner-manager of a truck and tractor company in Gilmer for a number of years. For four vears Mr. Hart was involved in sales, planning, and installation of feed handling and storage equipment Prior to joining the Agricultural Education Adult Specialist Program on January 1, 1975, he participated in an intensive welding training program.

The short course at Abernathy is scheduled to begin Feb. 9, 1976 at 7 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Hart will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide onthe-farm instruction, accord ing to Jerry Adams and

Walter Cox. Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of schools, Dr. Delwin Webb, at 298-2566, or the teachers of vocational agriculture, Mr. Jerry dams or Mr. Walter Cox at 298-2555. An entry fee of \$10 will be charged. Farm Arc Welding Short Course certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends the training sessions.

Mr. Hart states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers 'enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operator in running a bead and striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe

"Short courses in welding, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas ASM University,' stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coord-

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

DISABLED VETERANS; DEPENDENTS MAY CLAIM TAX EXEMPTIONS UNDER 1975 LEGISLATION

Thousands of disabled veterans, will be able to claim property tax exemptions in Texas this year. The exemptions were made possible by the passage of a special law by the Legislature in 1975, according to Herbert Hardin, Veterans Service Officer for Barton-Hood Post

No. 500. Eligible for the property tax exemptions are veterans who have service-connected disabilities which are rated 10% or more disabling by either the Veterans Administration or a branch of the Armed Forces. Also entitled are the widows of veterans who had a service-connected disability of 10% or more in effect at the time of their deaths, and the widows of servicemen who died while on active duty. In addition, minor children of certain deceased veterans and active duty personnel may also be eligible for the tax exempt-

authority in Texas.

The eligible person must contact each tax office where his or her property is assessed. It is the responsibility of the tax collector to determine the evidence necessary to claim an exemption. The Veterans Administration plans to mail letters of eligibility to those veterans and widows who are entitled to the exemption and who

are currently receiving VA benefits. Such letters are to be mailed by the VA within the next two months. Persons who believe they are eligible for the tax exemption, but who have not received their VA letter by April 1, 1976, should make a request for the needed evidence. Those who will not automatically receive the VA letter, and

mit individual requests for same, will include the widows of veterans and deceased servicemen who are not currently receiving any Veterans Administration benefits. Persons who believe they are eligible for the property tax exemption should be advised to discuss the matter with the local tax collectors, or visit their Veterans Service Officers.

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





Employers May Be Able To Gain Tax Credit On Wages Paid to AFDC Employees

Employers can gain a 20 per cent tax credit on the wages paid employees hired from the rolls of the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) welfare program, according to Emil Schattel, Regional Director for Financial Services of the State Department of Public Welfare.

The tax credit applies both to employers of domestics engaged as household workers, and to employers in a trade or a business. There also may be compensation to the employer for training the worker, for erecting training facilities, or for providing day care for the worker's child or children.

"When a person on welfare moves into a job, it's a step up for a lot of people, "Schattel said. "The worker's job is more profitable to him than receiving welfare alone. The nation gains in two-fold measure. Welfare payments are reduced and the newlyemployed worker starts paying taxes. Now employers can realize personal gain by recovering a sizable share of the employment costs by hiring workers from the welfare rolls,"

Further information may be obtained from the State Department of Public Welfare office in the employer's community.



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
