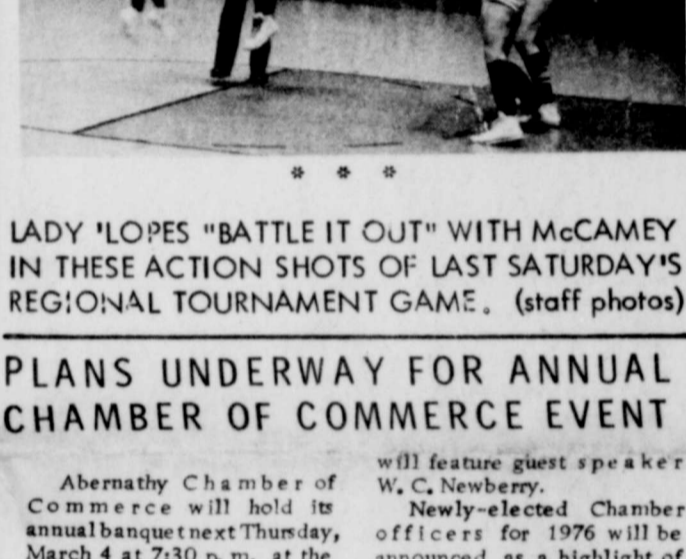

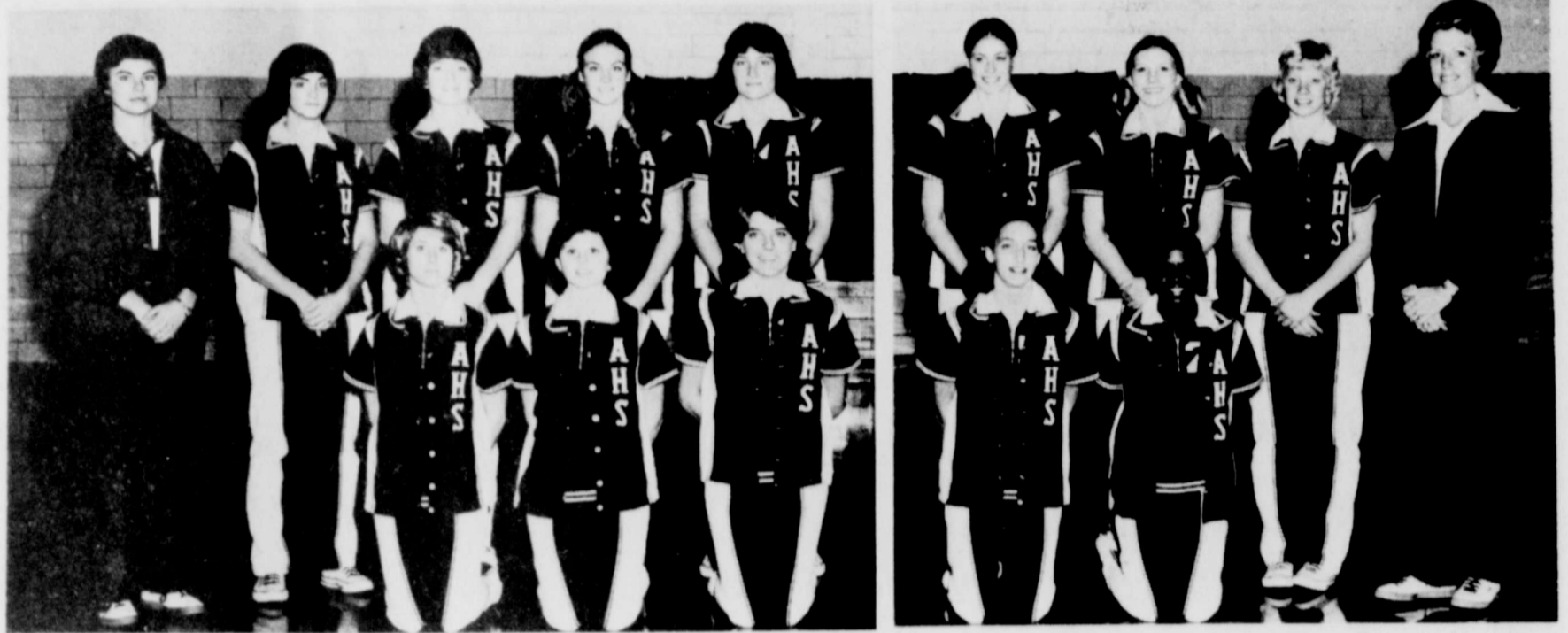

Patterson Tells Of Missionary Work In Peru

As related by R. C. Patterson, Jr., during the monthly meeting of the Nazarene Men's Prayer Breakfast and fellowship, to which the ladies and other guests had been invited. This meeting took place Saturday morning, Feb. 7, after R. C. had arrived from Peru the afternoon before.

"It's good to be home. I told the fellows that my only concern was, when I came home, that I could convey the message that I have in my heart. I also told them that it was going to be hard for me to talk, because I'm not going to cry, I know. I'm not ashamed of it, but I can't get the message across and just cry. So, the Lord being my helper this morning, I want to convey a message to you that I have received. Thanks to the Lord and to our own local church for making it possible for me to go and to represent our church... our local church... along with the district men who went. It was one of the greatest experiences that I feel I will ever get to experience.

"I'll give you just a little run-down. There were 20 of us who went in a group. There were 10 of us who left here at 9:40 on a Friday morning, and we went to Dallas-Fort Worth. The Church, the churches there, I should say, met... we had two hours or so lay-over... so they had made arrangements with the Braniff counseling room and we all gathered in there. They showed us a travel film of Peru, and incidentally, it is true. But we didn't go as tourists, we went as workers, so it didn't fit our particular situation.

The vegetation down there all has to be watered, so what you see in Lima, as vegetation, flowers and so forth, the water has to be put on it. Their average rainfall is one inch per year even though they are right on the coast.

"So, what we will be showing you as pictures, and later on as slides... we have access to any number of slides if we can be able to pay for them... so you keep this in mind, that Lima, as a tourist attraction is beautiful, but Lima as a working group, as we saw it is on the other side. The only beautiful part about it was the people....

"It was amazing to see these people come out of these homes and houses, most of them with dirt floors which were hard and cleaner than some floors here, but they looked as clean as you do this morning. They were neat. They wore good clothes. The majority of the women wore pant suits, as you see here in America.

"They were clean and neat and well-groomed. This is the working type of people that we were in contact with. Of course, the kids are kids everywhere. They got dirty.

"The area there was sand. If they had the wind that we have in West Texas, they couldn't live there. If we had a breeze, we would go out one morning and sand would be drifted along... with little ripples. The next morning, maybe it would be in this direction. So, this was all the breeze we had. The temperature ran from 70 at night to 85 in the daytime, but the sun was hot. It blistered. My wife told me if I'd have stayed another two weeks I'd have looked like they do, because I was out in the sun on Saturday without a cap and also Sunday without a cap and by Tuesday my head was peeling. So I wore a cap at work.

"Ten men joined us in Fort Worth, and as a group we went down to work. Now I want to read one scripture which stood out to me as we sat in the Sunday School class on Sunday, and the teacher who was a nuclear physicist, he was the only doctor of physics in Peru... he's a Nazarene, he went to Nampa, Idaho, he went to Berkeley, and he got his doctor's degree in South Carolina. He's able to speak English real well, and he taught the Sunday School class.... of course, it was in Spanish, and occasionally some of it was in English, but basically Spanish is spoken throughout the area....

"As he taught the lesson that morning, he read the scripture from the Sunday School lesson, and I'm sure many of you will remember it in Matthew 10, the 16th verse: 'Behold, I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves; he ye therefore wise as serpents, and harmless as

loves.' Then over in the 13th chapter of Hebrews, the fifth verse: 'Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee.' And I experienced this throughout our trip, even until we hit the runway yesterday afternoon. I know the plane was in trouble, because of the position of the wing, which was something similar to this (illustrated) going straight, not turning... he put the power to it to come up, and when he came up he came out of an overcast, and here was the ground right here. He hit the runway hot... he used all the runway to stop... I know the Lord was with us.

"Throughout the trip, God was so good. And as we left, the church there said 'We'll be praying for you fellows.' And I said, 'Well, that makes it on both ends of the line, because our pastor had said everytime you think of R. C., breathe a prayer. And I know God was with us. It was one of the greatest experiences that I'll ever experience.

"I came back with a new sense of pride for our country. It's not what we would like to see it, but we have a great country. We have a country in which we can pick up a newspaper and read it and we know it's not controlled. Down there, you read a newspaper, it comes only through the government... what they want you to read... which is a communist dictatorship....

"I went as a representative of Christ, to show to the people what God can do for them, and what He can do for us. As a group of men there were 20 working, then there were two who joined us later, making a group of 22. There was not one cross word the whole time we were there. We had a representative from every craft in the building trade... and everybody worked. (R. C. related here how Dr. Ekley, District Superintendent of the West Texas District of the Nazarene Church worked side by side with the others).

"...Everybody worked. The people there were amazed at how much foolishness went on and how much work was accomplished.

"I'm proud of our local church fellowship. "Our evening meals were in the Wycliff translators headquarters. They have a group of people who go out into the field to work with the people, the nationals of every dialect and language, and then they come back in to this headquarters which has several dormitories and places to live. They also have a large dining hall where they feed them. So our missionaries there had made arrangements for the men to go there every night and eat....

"At noon we had sandwiches just like on the job here. We boiled our own water. They told us anything we could wash and peel or open, we could consume. Otherwise, no....

"God has worked with our missionaries there in providing stuff that was unavailable anywhere else. Many of the contractors there in the building trade could not go down to the cement factory and buy two, three or four sacks of cement. Our missionary had 600 sacks of cement stacked in a building right close to our shop. God opened the doors and the concrete people delivered it and it was stored right close to where we were. This happened in all areas of the work.

"When we went down they had the walls of the church up... we put in the floor on all the church. We put it in the fellowship area, which, incidentally, they gather and have meals together as a church, just as we do here. On the second Sunday afternoon they had a big gathering and meal together. The missionaries brought in food, the church people brought in food, and we had a great time of fellowship there in the old sanctuary....

"We went on a first name basis, strictly, except Dr. Ekley. We did call him Dr. Ekley. But all the other fellows, including four or five preachers on the job, and the missionaries, we were all on a first-name basis. And Clyde (Gollagher), who is the senior missionary, as a District Superintendent of all the Lima work, was in charge there.

(Here R. C. related that Clyde's wife, Leona, was in California, having been called there due to the severe illness of her father.) "I brought back a number of prayer requests, but I want

to close with those prayer requests and let you in on a little of what some of our missionaries face.

(R. C. related some of the internal problems the people of Peru face, and told of the conditions in Peru, primarily around Lima, such as roads, driving conditions and driving habits and customs. "I think our time is almost gone, so I'm going to close by asking for a prayer request for a missionary couple there on the field.... he has been in an accident and she has had encephalitis. The Lord has touched her and she is alive and well except that this disease has affected her emotionally, and she's having a hard problem. They asked us to remember her in prayer and I told the missionaries as we left that this morning between 8:00 and 9:00 o'clock we'd be praying especially for her and also her husband who is on crutches and in a back brace because of an injury.

"There is also another request that I want to place here. Barbara and Jerry Brown,

our own daughter and her husband and the two children will be going to Africa the middle of March. They have signed up for two years instead of one and this is preying heavy on our hearts because, going into world conditions as they are, you never know, but yet in God's hands we know they are safe. Whatever He sees best, we will have to accept or we will accept knowing that living in His will is the happiest place there is. So, if you will remember them this morning in your prayers as you pray.... and we're going to have special prayer now for these missionaries and I'm going to ask Irma May, our Missionary President, to lead us as we close in prayer, remembering these special requests of these two couples."

It said in part: "Your family has been chosen to be part of a special celebration of our nation's 200th birthday." and "...I have chosen only the names that are significant to American history." The letter went on to relate that a man named George Davenport was a famous Indian fighter who was a Colonel in the famed Black Hawk Wars. It seems that George's most famous honor was having the city of Davenport, Iowa, named for him. Concerning my name, Vic Lamb has been giving me a hard time about the way I pronounce it. His latest fibe is written on the back of the envelope containing his original cartoon about my retiring Jan. 1, 1975. On the back of the envelope, where any postal person who wanted to could read was: "You don't know how to pronounce your name. It's DAVenport, not DAVEport."
