## AHS Girls Lose In Opening Round Of Regional Tourney

The Abernathy girls basketball team's hopes of advancing to the state tournamentwere stymied Saturday in the first round of play in the Regional tourney in Lubbock's Municipal Coliseum.

Taking on the Badgerettes of McCamey, the Lady 'Lopes of coaches Diana Lewis and Betty Cagle played catch-up ball the second half and at one time during the fourth quarter held a six-point lead, only to see it dwindle in the closing moments of the con-With only 47 seconds left, the Badgerettes bad pulled within three points of of the Lady 'Lopes, 47-50, then added another twopointer to close the margin.

As the Abernathy guards attempted to bring the ball down court, Susan Davenport was fouled by McCamey's high scoring Joy Harris and the 'Lopes' Karen Lambert stepped to the free throw line. Karen had hitsix consecutive free throws that quarter, and with the clock showing only 17 seconds remaining in the contest, she took careful aim,

shot, and the ball hit the rim and bounced in, making the score 51-49, Abernathy. However, Karen's second shot of the 1-1 situation, hit inside the rim and bounced out. McCamey's guards came up with the rebound and hurridly worked the ball down-court with Miss Harris hitting the basket for the tying score. A last-second desperation long shot by Abernathy's Cheryl Rogers hit the rim and bounced away, putting the two teams into an overtime

The three-minute overtime period was all McCamey, as the Badgerettes scored six points while the Lady 'Lopes failed to add any to their accumulation of 51 points. It wasn't that they didn't try.... their shots just wouldn't go in the basket, including two free-throw

"It's good to be home. I told the fellows that my only concern was, when I came home, that I could convey the message that I have in my heart. I also told them that it was going to be hard for me to talk, because I'm going to cry, I know. I'm not ashamed of it, but I can't get the message across and just cry. So, the Lord being my helper this morning, I want to convey a message to you that I have received. Thanks to the Lord and to our own local church for making it possible for me to go and to represent our church... our local church... along with the district men who went. It was one of the greatest experiences that I feel I will ever get to experience.

"I'll give you just a little run-down. There were 20 of us who went in a group. There were 10 of us who left here at 9:40 on a Friday morning, and we went to Dallas-Fort Worth. The Church, the churches there, I should say, met...we had two hours or so lay-over...so they had made arrangements with the Braniff counseling room and we all gathered in there. They showed us a travel film of Peru, and incidentially, it is true. But we didn't go as tourists, we went as workers, so it didn't fit our particular situation.

The vegetation down there all has to be watered, so what you see in Lima, as vegetation, flowers and so forth, the water has to be put on it. Their average rainfall is one inch per year even though they are right on the

"So, what we will be showing you as pictures, and later on as slides...we have some slides and we'll have access to any number of slides if we can be able to pay for them...so you keep this in mind, that Lima, as a tourist attraction is beautiful but Lima as a working group, as we saw it is on the other side. The only beautiful part

about it was the people..... "It was amazing to see these people come out of these homes and houses, most them with dirt floors which were hard and cleaner then some floors here, but they looked as clean as you do this morning. They were neat. They wore good clothes. The majority of the women wore pant suits, as you see here in America.

"They were clean and neat and well-groomed. This is the working type of people that we were in contact with. Of course, the kids are kids everywhere. They got dirty. "The area there was sand.

If they had the wind that we have in West Texas, they couldn't live there. If we had a breeze, we would go out one morning and sand would be drifted along, .... just sifted along .... with little ripples. The next morning, maybe it would be in this direction. So, this was all the breeze we had. The temperature ran from 70 at night to 85 in the daytime, but the sun was hot. It blistered. My wife told me if I'd have stayed another two weeks I'd have looked like they do, because I was out in the sun on Saturday without a cap and also Sunday without a cap and by Tuesday my head was peeling. So I wore a cap at work.

"Ten men joined us in Fort Worth, and as a group we went down to work. Now I want to read one scripture which stood out to me as we sat in the Sunday School class on Sunday, and the teacher who was a nuclear physicist. . he was the only doctor of physicis in Peru...he's a Nazarene, he went to Nampa, Idaho, he went to Berkley, and he got his doctor's degree in South Carolina, He's able to speak English real well, and he taught the Sunday School class..... of course, it was in Spanish, and occasionally some of it was in English, but basically Spanish is spoken throughout the area....

"As he taught the lesson that morning, he read the scripture from the Sunday School lesson, and I'm sure many of you will remember it in Matthew 10, the 16th verse: 'Behold, I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves: be ye therefore wise as serpents, and harmless as
