Fifteen per cent of that total, \$4,638.98, was related to the County of Hale. Lubbock County's 15% rebate for that period amounted to \$37,329.02. Gross amount paid in Lubbock County mixed drink taxes for the period was \$248,860.11.

Comptroller Bob Bullock reported the payment to the City of Abernathy on the city sales tax for January, 1976, was \$1,870.14.

Delta Kappa Gamma Holds Meeting In Floydada

The Iota Tau Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, an international association of women educators, met Saturday, February 14, at Floydada. A coffee, hosted by the Floydada members, preceded the meeting.

The program, under the direction of Marian Struve, of Abernathy, consisted of sketches from the lives of women from Revolutionary War days who not only fought beside their men, nursed and kept their homes going, but also wrote and used their influence to secure legal recognition of women's rights. Besides the well-known Molly Pitcher, whose real name was Mary Hayes, there were: Mercy Warren, poet laureate and historian of the war and agitator for women's rights; Margaret Corcoran, first woman to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor, and a half-pension for outstanding courage and action under fire; Nancy Wheatley who was captured as a young girl in Africa and sold to a Boston family who taught her to read and write. She later wrote many poems and stories. Many others were also presented. Chapter members participating in the program were: Mary Nell Hall, Seleta Hughes, Martha Hall, Alice Scarborough and Carolyn Davis, all of Petersburg, and Bette Hardin of Abernathy.

METHODIST CHURCH SCHEDULES SECOND ANNUAL MISSIONARY CONFERENCE MARCH 12, 13, 14

The second annual Missionary Conference at the First United Methodist Church here has been set for Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, March 12, 13 and 14, according to Mrs. Arno Struve, general chairperson, and the Rev. Al Jennings, pastor.

Speakers for the weekend conference will include Juanelva Rose, of Tulsa, who is a missionary to Taiwan; Bill Matthews, vice-president of the Methodist Mission Home, San Antonio, and a former missionary to the Philippine and Fiji Islands; and the Rev. A. W. Pringle, elementary school principal of the McCurdy School at Espanola. Music for the Missionary Conference will be led by Johnny Ray Watson of Lorenzo.

A Missionary Conference is an intensive missionary program designed to stimulate interest in missionary concern. Last year's Missionary Conference resulted in over \$7,500 being given toward missionary work during the past 12 months, much of it being used in our own community. With a goal



of \$7,500 last year, over \$13,000 was designated by Faith Promise, with well over \$7,500 already having been given and almost two weeks left before the end of that 12-month period.

This year's goal is \$7,600, set recently by the Missionary Conference committee. "\$7,600 in '76" ties in with the Bicentennial theme, and has a "ring of remembrance," reminding us of the "faith of our fathers," as well as helping to remind us of the com-

mentments of Christ in our outreach to others.

Beginning with an evening meal Friday, followed by a 7 p. m. service the Conference will include a men's breakfast meeting Saturday morning; noon luncheon for ladies and for the youth Saturday; evening meal and a 7 p. m. service Saturday; and morning and evening services Sunday.

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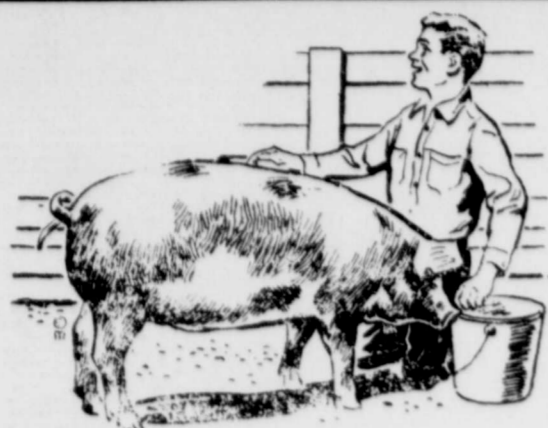

LOCAL SENIORS TO RECEIVE USEFUL HANDBOOK FROM U. S. ARMY

Sourcebook, a magazine designed to be a source of information, entertainment and inspiration to seniors during their final months of high school will be given free to Abernathy High School seniors compliments of the U. S. Army.

The 72-page handbook addresses questions seniors often have close to graduation, such as what to do after high school; what others have done; how to find jobs; and how to face adulthood. A number of other articles focus on adventure, sports and travel.

"Career Directions" offers five alternative graduates could consider after high school, including junior and community college; co-op college programs; trade, technical or business schools; apprenticeships; and industry training programs. Each choice is discussed in terms

of what the program involves, advantages and disadvantages, and where to get more information. A step-by-step job hunting article is also included.

For seniors looking for something to do this summer, a number of travel articles are featured in Sourcebook. "Travel in Europe" includes everything a first-time visitor needs to know about going abroad; while "Where the Beaches Are" discusses popular student beaches around the country. For a slightly different vacation, "Tipping" suggests excursion ideals ranging from bluegrass festivals to wilderness expeditions.

Other articles in Sourcebook include "Mind Control-How To Become a Better Learner," "A Student's Primer of Everyday Law," and "Adventure Sports-A Beginner's Guide to Kayaking, Cross-Country Skiing, Soaring, Scuba Diving and Mountain Climbing."

Seniors received their free copies of Sourcebook on Feb. 24, 1976.

After I had finished, I took my leave--not knowing that anything was amiss. Later she told me that her children could not sit under my teaching because I had told them about Satan and sin. (She didn't believe that there was a Satan or that children were born in sin.) She believed that children

did bad things because they would hear people talk about them. The problem was--not that I had told them--but that after I left they began to ask questions such as--Who is Satan? Who made him? Where does he live? Where is heaven? How do you get there? What is sin? This continued all afternoon until she was frantic and purposed in her heart that never again would her children listen to me. She didn't know the answers and her children were curious. Eventually she relented and let them listen--this progress will be shared with you. The mother began to listen--read--ask--questions and later accepted the Lord Jesus. She has consistently kept her children under the teaching of God's Word both in the home and church. She, too, began to grow in grace and in the knowledge of His Word. Several years ago she shared with me a poem that she wrote which so pictures the life of a Christian that I want to share with you.

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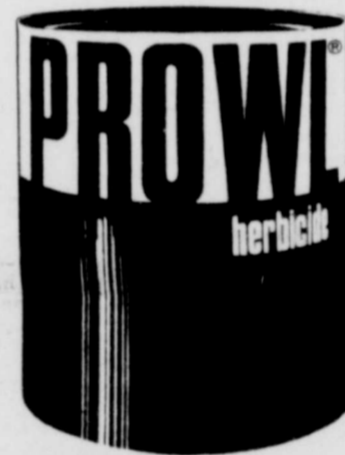

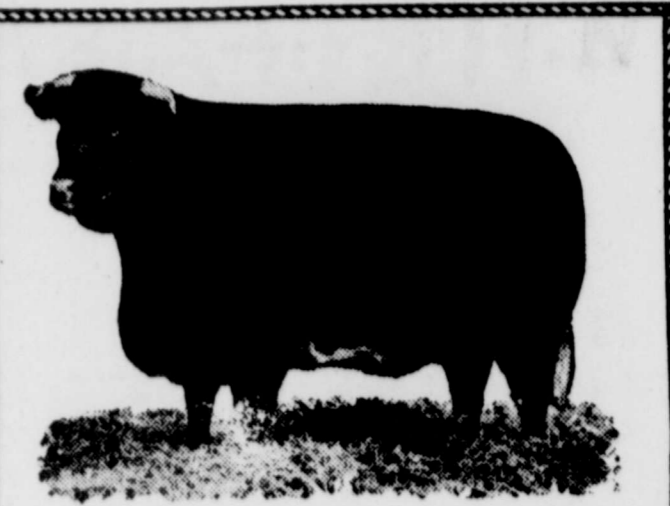
### Harp Named Distinguished Student At A&M

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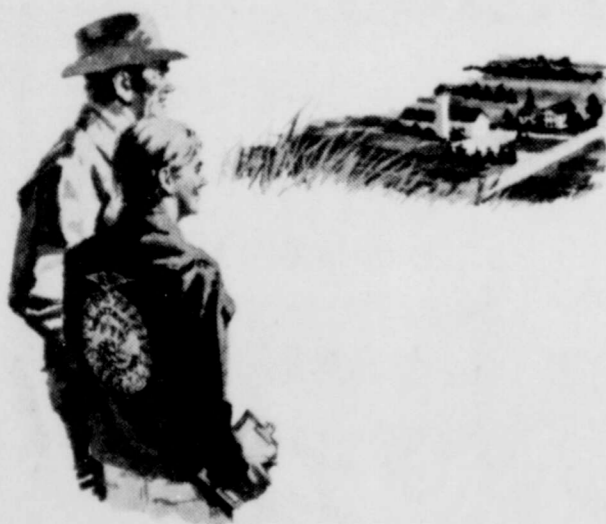

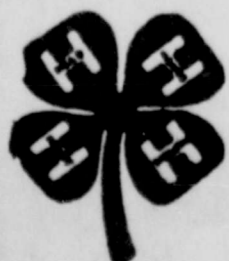

# Waits' Flowers Shown At Dallas Trade Show

Began in 1964 on a limited basis, the dried flower business owned by Monroe Waits of Waits Farm Store has since increased to include customers all over the United States.

Mr. Waits says that he began his business by selling mistletoe to florists during the Christmas season in 1964, but has since discontinued the plant, and now concentrates on dried plants for floral arrangements.

He also says that the firm no longer sells to individual florists, but to arrangers, who in turn sell the finished arrangements to larger-volume buyers. Arrangements made from plants from Waits Farm Store have been seen at shows in Atlantic City, New Jersey; Washington, D. C.; Atlanta, Georgia; Memphis, Tennessee and Chicago, Illinois, to name a few.

Waits and his wife traveled to Dallas last week to attend the Dallas Trade Mart, where

arrangements of their dried plants were being displayed for buyers. The arrangements were displayed in booth 155 from February 22-27.

Before leaving for Dallas, Waits said that he would have some of the arrangements sent back to Abernathy, where local people could see the end result of the business that begins at Waits Farm Store. He added that he was especially eager to attend the Dallas show, as he had never seen any of the dried flower arrangements himself.

Gathered from early fall through the harvest season, the plants used at the store include everything from cotton buds to jimson weed, and are prepared by first being bleached to a neutral white, and then dyed in one of eight colors.

Waits says that most of the plants are gathered from either his fields in the South Plains, or from desert and mountain areas in New

Mexico and Colorado. Other plants included in the operation range from curly-leaf weed, yucca, teasel, century plant and sorghum sudan, to okra pods, broom weed and wild iris.

In preparing the plants, Waits Farm Store first bleaches and dyes them, then removed the seeds from pods and affixes them to wire florists' stems. They are then shipped in cartons, mostly by motor freight, to buyers all over the nation.

Waits says that as many as 200,000 cotton buds may be gathered by the store for a single year, and this is in addition to the 200,000 okra pods, 10,000 broom weeds, 100,000 sorghum heads and 100,000 teasel plants gathered. As many as 16 persons may be employed by the store during the gathering season, with the usual staff

limited to six.

Waits said that he was particularly enthused about the Dallas show last week because with this showing, dried plants from Abernathy, Texas "have really been shown all over the nation."

The plants are dyed, using a heated cellulose dye, in any of eight colors, including the bleached white, or neutral shade. These are yellow, blue, orange, chartreuse, emerald, pink and brown. Most of the bleaching process uses standard chlorine bleach, but different methods are necessary to get good results from different plants.

According to Waits, the store is continually looking for new plants to be used in the operation, with the requirements being durability, and retention of shape after drying.

### Tips On Pest Control by Lindsey Webb

January and February are the usual months to apply dormant sprays to trees and shrubs to prevent scales from forming. But, due to unusually warm weather, we have had many of the trees, especially fruit trees, beginning to show pink buds; and some are in full bloom. If the buds are not showing signs of swelling, a light dormant spray is recommended. Another problem we face when the weather starts to warm up is borers. At this time of year, they are dormant under the ground, but will soon start working their way up tree trunks to lay their eggs. To prevent this and kill any eggs already laid; apply an insecticide to the trunk and wrap trunk with nursery paper, foil or newspaper up to about the first branch. The nursery wrapping paper is recommended because it will stand up to about any of our weather conditions. Most shrubs are still dormant, any anytime until their buds swell would be a good time to apply a dormant oil to prevent scales, especially the Eucymus scale, (small white scales underleaves and on branches) For lawns, apply a pre-emergent herbicide with fertilizer to prevent germination of weed seed.

'Manson family' member baptized

FRONTERA, CALIF. (RNS) Susan Atkins, the one-time "Manson family" member who is serving a life sentence for her part in the 1969 "Sharon Tate mass murders," has become a Christian.

She reportedly made her decision in an isolation cell in September 1974 and was baptized by immersion on Feb. 23, 1975, outside the prison chapel at the California Institute for Women here.

The news of Miss Atkins' conversion was not publicized until recently because of fear that it would meet with cynicism and skepticism, according to a California Baptist couple who have been in contact with Miss Atkins. They related the events to a reporter for The American Baptist magazine in Valley Forge, Pa.

Miss Atkins, now 27, has attracted international attention as one of the members of the bizarre "Charles Manson family" convicted of the 1969 mass murders.

Today, she is described as a "changed person" by those who have been in contact with her since her baptism. Pete and Carol Bekendam of First Baptist Church of Pomona, who were among the less than a dozen people who received prison clearance to witness the baptism, they said they believe the conversion is genuine.

She was baptized by the Rev. Sarge Wright, Miss Atkins' childhood United Methodist pastor in San Jose. In describing the baptism, Mrs. Bekendam said the pastor asked the new convert, "Daughter, do you know what this means... that your sins are forgiven, everything you've ever done?" Miss Atkins said "Yes,"

and was baptized.

In a letter to Mrs. Bekendam, dated Dec. 30, 1975, Miss Atkins said she is writing a book on her life, with proceeds to go towards the building of a foundation for girls who may be on the road I was on...

In August 1975, a week after she was moved out of isolation, Miss Atkins wrote, "Last night the Lord gave me the precious privilege of leading a young woman in the sinners' prayer. She's the first person He's allowed me to witness to and see the actual salvation.... I'm so thankful that He can use me."

She has continued in her Bible studies and in witnessing to fellow inmates. In September, she wrote, "It truly is a joy to show fellowship with the sisters in Jesus here. There is a prayer meeting here in my room nightly or as the Holy Spirit guides the hearts together."

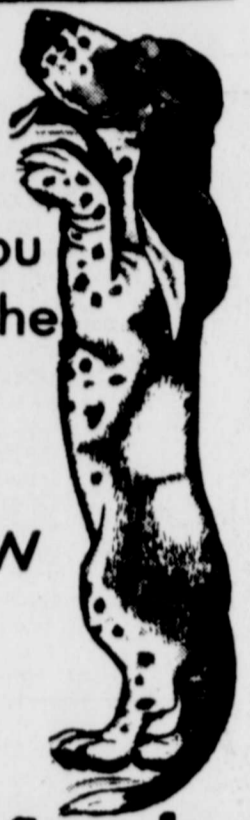

Cotton Farmers Cautious; '76 Planting to Drop

AUSTIN—Planting of one of the state's major crops, cotton, officially began in the Rio Grande Valley February 1, but Texas farmers apparently are not

going to increase acreage drastically. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service estimates there will be only a 10 percent increase in acreage this year, lower than some observers had expected.

"Farmers are looking very closely at costs of production this year as well as the world market. Costs have become so high they cannot afford to gamble as they have in previous years,"

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said. The cotton outlook for 1976 is better economically than it was last year.

"The simple fact for this year is that demand is up while supply is decreasing. This is what makes the cotton outlook for 1976 better than 1975," White stated.

The 1975 cotton crop was the lowest in 29 years. Production was only 2.4 million bales.

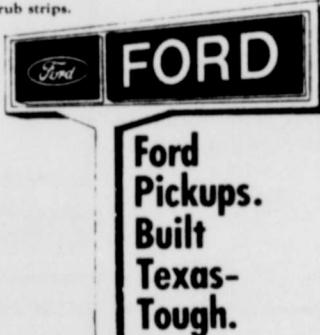


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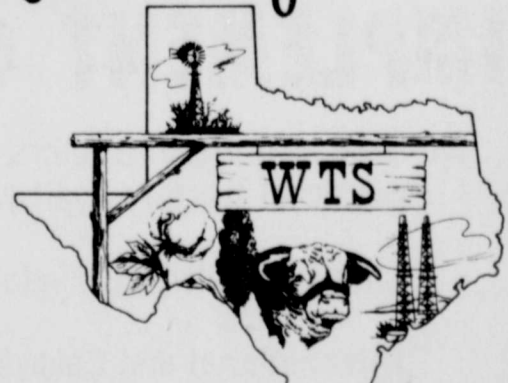
