FFA-4-H Project Show

With a total of 300 entries, this year's recent FFA and 4-H Fat Stock Show provided plenty of competition for local young men and women who entered their animals. In addition to the 28 entries in the gilt division, there were 142 barrow, 95 lambs, and 25 steers entered. There were 10 entries in the horse halter class, an event initiated in the show for the first time last year.

David Hunt walked off with Grand Champion honors in the barrow division with his medium heavy-weight crossbreed which also took the award for breed champion in its division. Reserve honors in the barrow division were taken by the medium heavy-weight crossbreed animal shown by Brenda Bowen, which also took the honors for reserve breed champion.

NEWS AND COMMENT by Buford Davenport

News & Comment
After quoting from a report from Austin about potential increase in taxes for counties and cities if federal revenue sharing stops, I received further information. Counties and cities that put revenue sharing money into the general fund for routine expenses would face a tax increase should revenue sharing be stopped. Counties and cities that use revenue sharing funds for capital improvements only would not be forced to increase taxes for routine operations. However, additional taxes would be needed if a progressive schedule of capital improvements continued. I called upon Abernathy City Manager Larry Fields to extricate me from this fiscal web and to explain to the taxpayers under what conditions taxes might have to be raised. His comments follow:

Dear Buford,
I hope the enclosed report on Federal Revenue Sharing will prove helpful to you. I have tried to explain my views on the effect a discontinuance of this program would have on us locally. As you will see, I can not agree completely with the recent views of Mr. Bullock. I do agree that if these funds are cut off we will eventually feel the impact of added burdens on our local revenues, but only in the area of capital improvements not the everyday operating costs of the city.

I thank you for the opportunity of expressing myself on this subject and continue to enjoy the cooperation I have received from you and the Review.

Recent figures released by State Comptroller Bob Bullock regarding the amount of tax increase that would be placed on the local tax rate, if Federal Revenue Sharing funds are discontinued, do not represent a true picture. Mr. Bullock reports that the City Tax rate will have to be increased 28.8 per cent if Federal Revenue Sharing funds are discontinued. This 28.8 per cent figure does represent the tax increase the city would have to enact to replace revenue sharing funds we now receive. However, the assumption that taxes would have to be increased if revenue sharing is

discontinued is untrue. Since the inception of the revenue sharing program in 1972, these funds have never been incorporated into the general operating budget of the city.

If revenue sharing funds are discontinued the city will not have lost any of their operating expense funds, so the operating budget of the city will not be affected. Revenue sharing funds are maintained in a separate Capital Improvements fund. Thus far revenue sharing money has been used for the following capital improvements:

- Public Transportation Street Paving and Maintenance--\$48,388.00
- Public Safety Fire Hall and E.O.C. Center--\$41,328.00
- Ambulance Service--\$4,700.00
- Environmental Protection New Water Well Development--\$27,081.00
- TOTAL--\$121,497.00

By placing revenue sharing funds into a separate capital improvement fund it will avoid placing a tax increase burden on the general operating budget should the funds be discontinued. Nevertheless, one can readily see, that without the revenue sharing money the above mentioned improvements could not have been accomplished without an additional source of revenue. To have acquired this additional revenue the city would have had to gained it through the only sources available to it, taxes or utility rates.

In summary, Federal Revenue Sharing funds have been most beneficial to the city by providing revenue for needed capital improvements. It has allowed the city to accomplish these improvements without placing the cost burden on the tax structure or the utility rates. If revenue sharing is discontinued it will not mean an immediate 28.8 per cent increase in the tax structure, as reported by Mr. Bullock, but rather it would mean future increases, if needed capital improvements are to be continued.

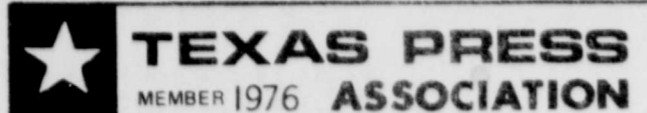

PROCLAMATION AMERICAN AGRICULTURE DAY March 22, 1976

WHEREAS, the abundant food and fiber supply raised by farmers and ranchers is the strength of America; and
WHEREAS, farmers should be made more aware of the business they are in and of what people in farm and non-farm production and marketing are doing to build and maintain American agriculture as the largest industry in this nation today; and
WHEREAS, urban Americans should have a better understanding of how their lives and often their jobs are touched by agriculture each day; and
WHEREAS, one of the key objectives of American Agriculture Day is to organize a pattern of activities in states and communities so that rural or urban people can better understand each other;

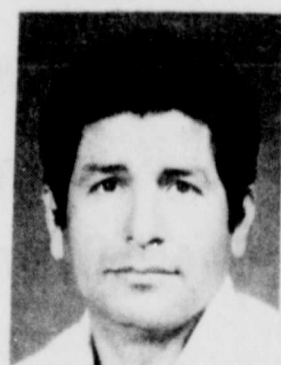

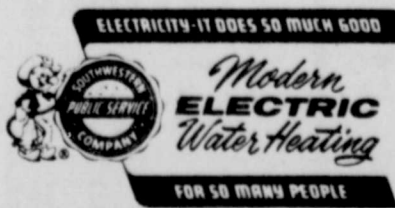

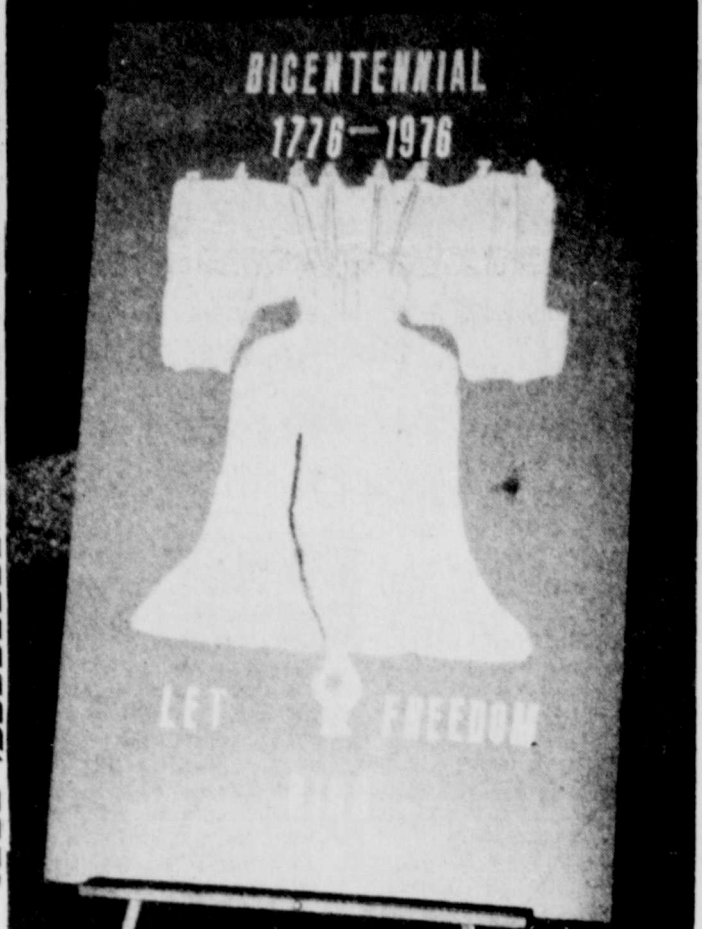
MINCE MEAT CAKE

2 eggs	2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup hot coffee	1 tablespoon allspice

In order to prepare for the contest March 18, Idalou schools will be dismissed at 2:45 p. m.

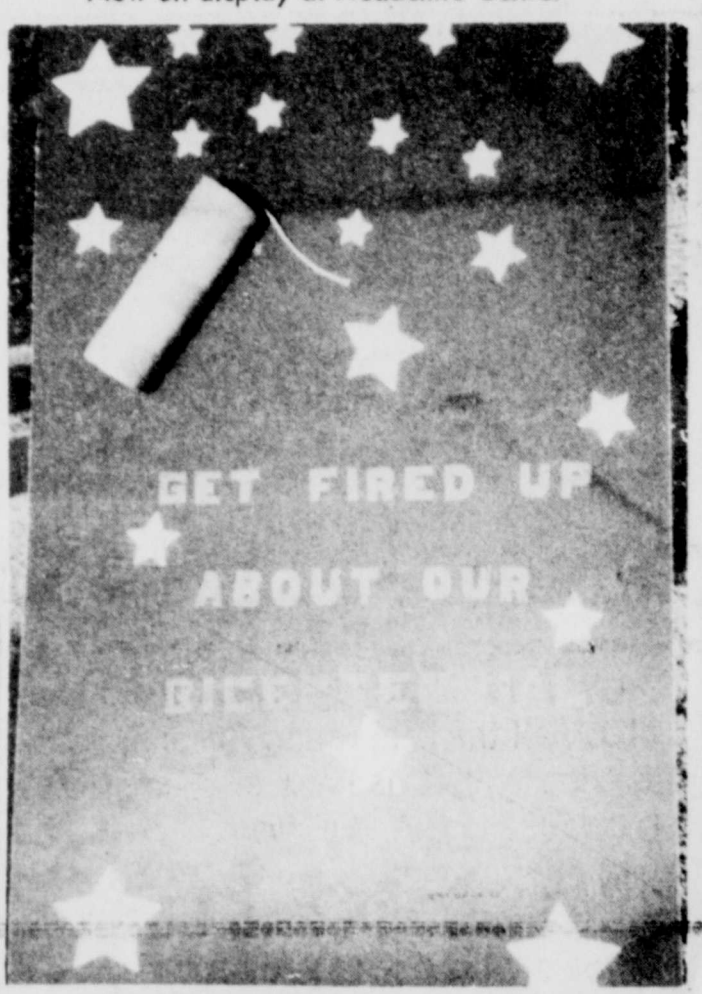
One act plays will be presented by district high schools beginning at 2 p. m. and concluding at 8 p. m. April 1.

March 21-27 is National Poison Prevention Week. According to reports, an estimated 600,000 children will be poisoned this year. Greatest hazards for children are household and laundry cleaners and medicine.

Anytime is tornado time, but most come in the spring and early summer. Abernathy has been straddled by two major tornadoes; June 2, 1965, at Hale Center, causing four deaths, 76 injuries and \$5,000,000 in property damage; May 11, 1970, in Lubbock, causing 26 deaths, 500 injuries and \$135,000,000 in property damage; April 15, 1973, in Plainview, causing two deaths, 26 injuries and an unknown amount of property damage. Also, New Deal has sustained wind damage to structures in the past few years. How long will Abernathy's luck hold out? How long can we beat the law of averages? Many of the homes built in Abernathy the past several years have basements for storm protection. The Academic Center building, the "round" building north of the high school, is considered a safe place to be during a tornado. That building will be open for use by the public during storms that come in after-school hours.

The School Board and Administration drew up a set of rules governing general public use of the building for storm protection. If the school will provide a set of these rules, we'll publish them for the public's information.

-News & Comment-

Representative George Mahon is scheduled to testify Monday, March 15, before the House Ways and Means Committee in support of a House bill which he is cosponsoring with Representative Omar Burlison and others to increase the value of exemptions for taxable estates under the Internal Revenue Code from the present \$60,000 to \$200,000. The \$60,000 figure was adopted by Congress in 1942.

"When enacted several decades ago, the inheritance tax law was a reasonable measure, but in view of the recent years of heavy inflation, it is now completely inadequate," Mahon said. The Congressman's mail indicates widespread interest in the proposed legislation.

PUBLIC COOPERATION NECESSARY FOR PROMPT, EFFICIENT EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICE

Most of you, by now, have seen the checklist below at least once in the pages of the Review. It gives the necessary procedures for obtaining ambulance service in Abernathy. However, perhaps the checklist does not make clear the fact that the local Emergency Medical Service personnel MUST have the information listed in order to make an ambulance run. Not only may your cooperation in this matter help to facilitate ambulance operations--it MAY save a life.

Though it is easy, in an emergency situation, to experience a feeling of panic and urgency, please remember that much of the success of Abernathy's ambulance operation depends on YOU. Your full cooperation in answering the necessary questions is a major part of making the local Emergency Medical Service team's job a little easier, and not only will help them to do their job better, but will help YOU to get the efficient, competent ambulance service you need.

Remember, then, that when you find it necessary to make a call to the dispatcher, you WILL be asked certain questions. Please keep in mind, too, that these questions are truly necessary to the EMT team to make the ambulance call with as much speed and efficiency as possible.

In addition, try to speak calmly and remember that the ambulance dispatcher is not asking the question to pry, but is merely attempting

to obtain the information which will be required by the EMS team when they answer the call. Item number six on the checklist below asks that you give the dispatcher your preference as to what hospital the patient or victim should be transported. This item has not been included in the list in the past, like the others, is a necessary piece of information which will aid the ambulance personnel in doing their job efficiently and with the least amount of delay possible.

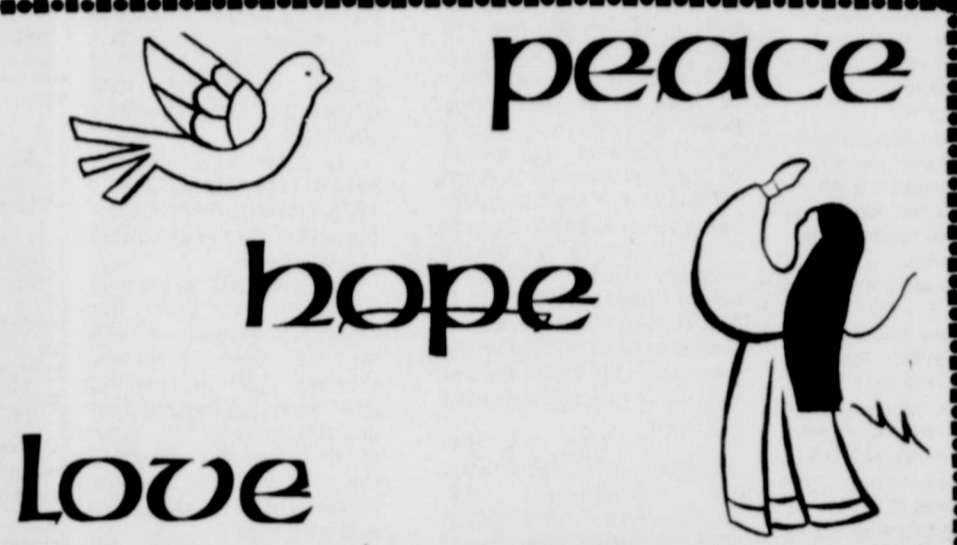

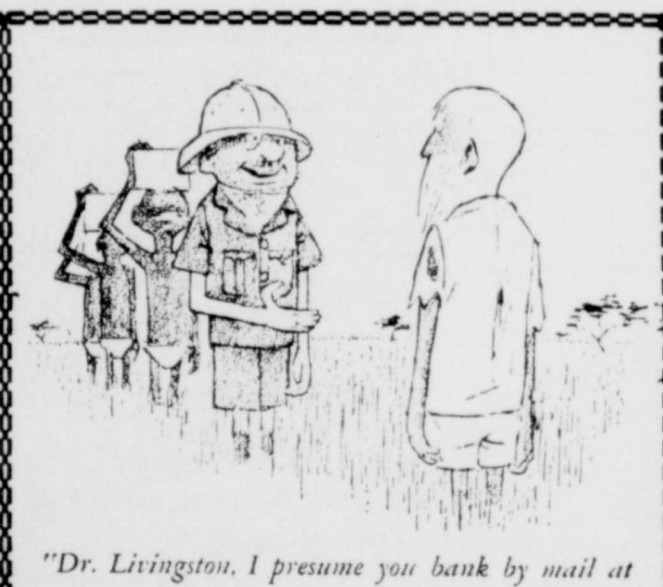
We were privileged to have Mr. Otis Pope with us for Sunday morning services and give his testimony and speak to us. Each one present received a great blessing from having him and his wife with us.
