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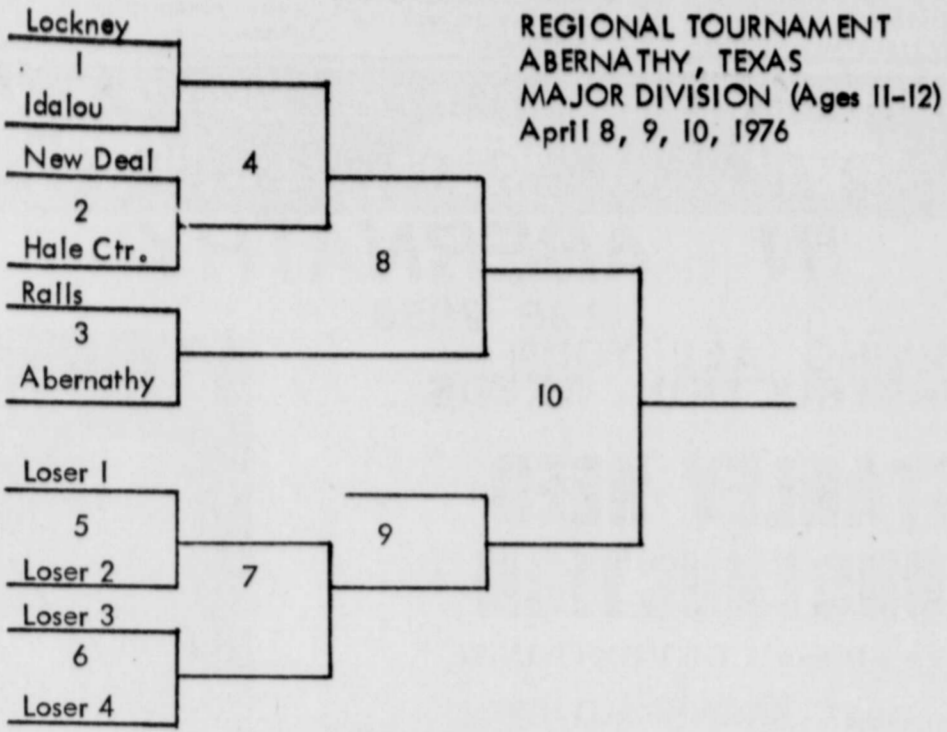
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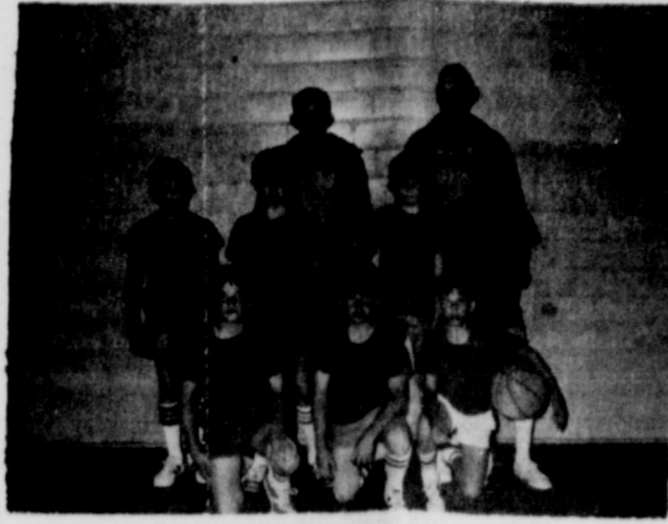
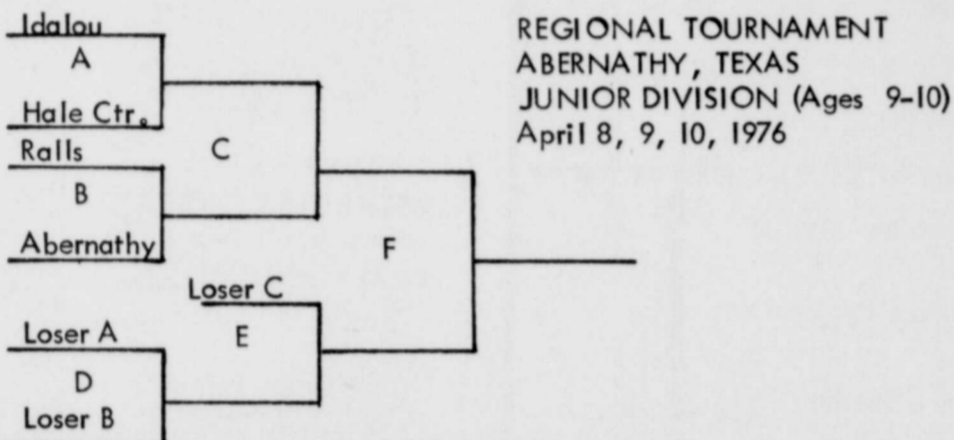

1 John 2:4-6: "Someone may say, 'I am a Christian; I am on my way to heaven; I belong to Christ.' But if he doesn't do what Christ tells him to do, he is a liar. 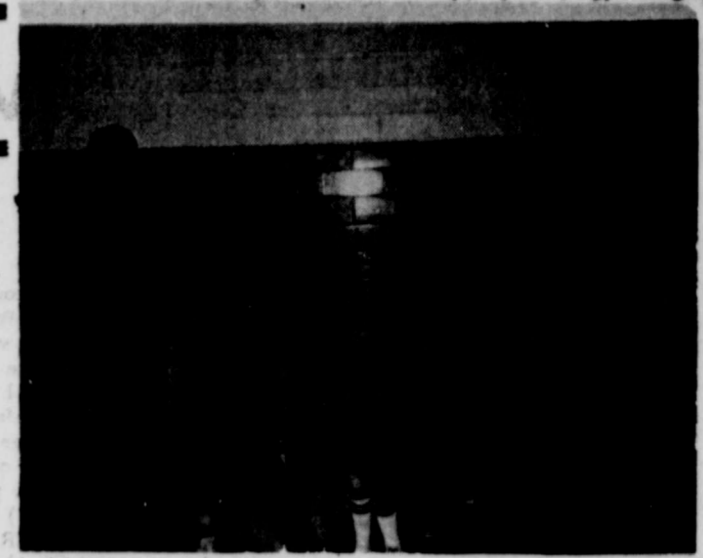

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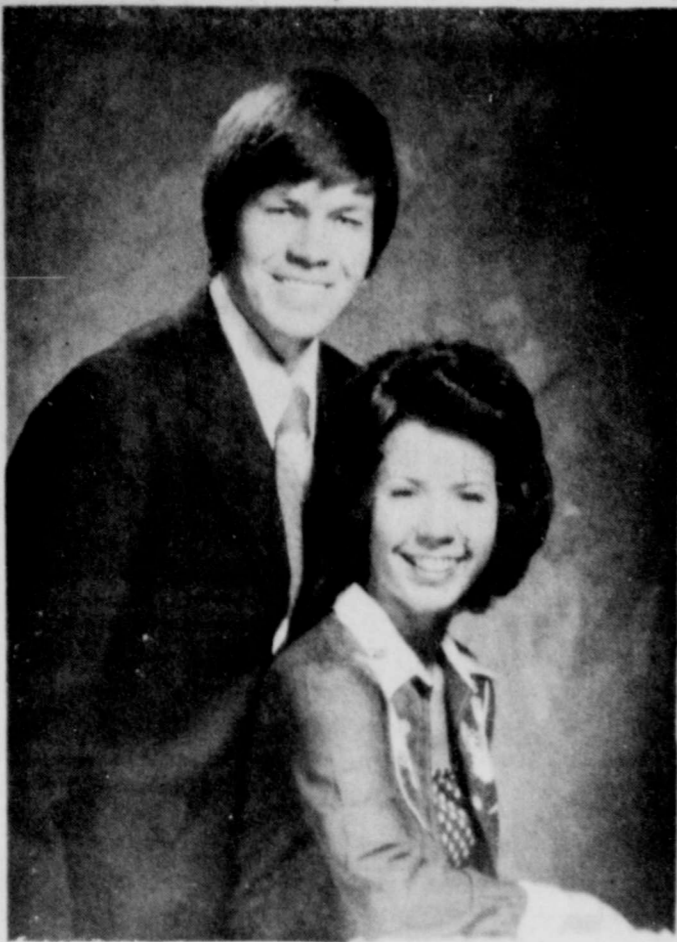

Introduced as new Chamber members were Jim Odom, of White Gold Gin, Cliff Gibbs, and Frank Bartlett.

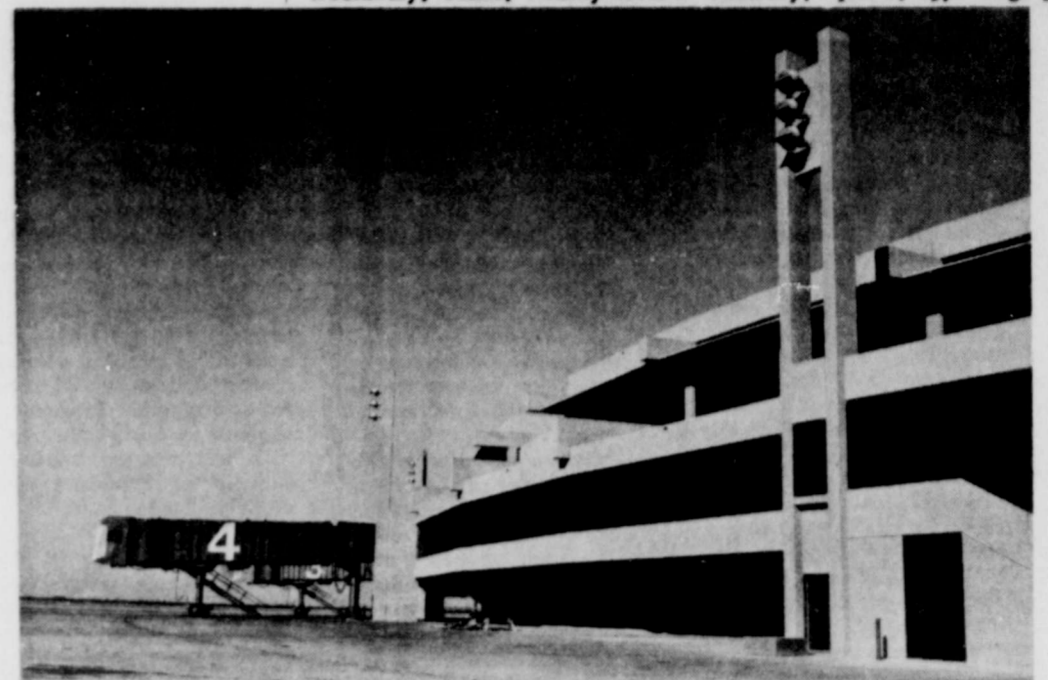

**NEW AIRPORT--Beginning Sunday, April 11, planes of the three major airlines serving Lubbock will start parking on this side of the new terminal at Lubbock Regional Airport. The object extending out from the plane-side of the new terminal with the numeral 4 on the side is one of five jetways that will maneuver up to the door of the airliners so passengers can deplane and board the aircraft without being out in the weather. They will go from the plane through the jetways directly into the spacious waiting areas. The jetway you see here cost \$90,000-plus, as did each of the other four jetways. The sixth boarding gate does not have a jetway at this time, and will probably be used by visiting VIPs, who will enter the terminal at ground level and be whisked by elevators to VIP rooms on the third floor.**

### FREIGHT, PASSENGER SERVICE TO START SUNDAY AT NEW REGIONAL AIRPORT TERMINAL

With most of the opening ceremonies and activities already held, the new terminal at Lubbock Regional Airport will open for business Sunday. The three major airlines serving Lubbock will deliver and take-on passengers and air freight that day (April 11) at the new \$9.3 million facility.

Opening of the new terminal climaxes a \$25 million airport expansion program launched in 1970. Local and federal funds have provided reconstruction of runways and taxiways, new runway lighting, a new fire and rescue station, an expanded flight service station for private aviation and security fencing in addition to the terminal.

"We're mighty proud of this new terminal and feel it will give better and more convenient service to the air-minded public in this vast region," said Lubbock Mayor Roy Bass. "This modern building was designed to meet our area's needs through 1990. As the need requires, the terminal can be expanded in stages up to 36 gates."

Lubbock Regional Airport is located five miles north of Downtown Lubbock on U. S. 87 (IH 27). Primary access to the new terminal is presently on FM 2641 east one mile from U. S. 87 to the entrance road at Quirt Avenue. Construction will begin later this year to widen Quirt Avenue from FM 2641 south to Loop 289.

The 144,000-square-foot terminal was designed by Whitaker and Hall Architects of Lubbock in association with Hellmuth, Obata and Kassabaum of St. Louis. It replaces a two-gate terminal built in 1950 and expanded to about 50,000 square feet. Plans call for leasing portions of the old terminal to private aviation businesses.

"With the rapid increase in passenger service, we were literally bursting at the seams", Bass said. "We had expanded the old terminal until it could be expanded no more."

Passenger boardings jumped from 53,000 in 1960 to 177,000 in 1970, the mayor noted. "In 1969, then-mayor W. D. Rogem and the city council started the ball rolling. There was a \$14 million bond election in April, 1970, in which the citizens authorized the expansion program, and the dirt's been flying out there ever since. "Since work started, passenger boardings increased to 234,000 last year."

The contemporary terminal is of a curved design with three activity levels. Passengers and visitors will have a short walk from the parking lot to the plane. Upon entering the main level of the terminal, passengers have access to ticket counters, baggage claim area and car rental services. They will then step to the common boarding lounge that spans the full 700-foot length of the terminal. They will board their plane through the enclosed jetways that extend from the boarding lounge.

On the upper level, airport administrative offices, a press room, space for a future lounge and a large meeting room are provided.

All airplane servicing, baggage handling, freight handling and mechanical rooms are located at the lower, or apron level.

The South Plains area is served by Continental Airlines, Braniff Airways and Texas International which provide 22 flights daily at

Lubbock Regional Airport. For those who do not fly often on business or for pleasure, Lubbock Regional Airport is their center of transportation for local manufacturing and business enterprises. Flowers from Hawaii and lobsters from Maine are flown into Lubbock. Locally made products are shipped to all parts of the world via Lubbock Regional Airport. In all, the airlines handled more than 3.7 million pounds of air freight and mail last year.
