SCHOOL BOARD APPROVES 1976-77 CALENDAR, HEARS REPORTS ON BUDGET, TAX COLLECTION

At its regular meeting on April 5, 1976, the Board of Education canvassed the returns of the April 3rd election and declared Bob Riley, Dan Fondy, and Jerry Oswald as duly elected.

Following the canvass of election returns, the Board worked on a routine agenda examining bills, studies, and correspondence. The reports presented included a budget

progress report for the first six months of the fiscal year; a tax collection report which is now 98.48% complete and shows only \$14,463 as taxes that have not been collected; a lunchroom report indicating financial stability within the program and an average daily participation of 675 students.

The board appointed Dr. Webb as official Joint Committee member to represent the schools in working with the Education Service Center. The Board is scheduled to tour the District XVII Education Service Center on May 19th. The local school board will also join the other 63 school boards of education in a workshop scheduled for April 21st at Texas Tech.

The final application for state funds was examined and approved. It was again pointed out on this application the importance of the "Save Harmless Clause" in House Bill 1126 that was passed by the last state legislature. This clause has saved the local tax payers \$600,000 this year and will do so again next year but expires with the 1976-77 school year.

In formal action, the Board approved HONDA Personnel for the 1976-77 school year. HONDA personnel are those coop employees from New Deal, Hale Center, Abernathy, and Olton.

The Board of Education examined the reports of the recent student council workshop and congratulated them on their efforts to work and

improve their organization of student government.

ABERNATHY HIGH SCHOOL TO HOST REGION 16 SOUTH ZONE BAND CONTESTS APRIL 27 - 28

For the first time, the Abernathy High School Band will host approximately 2000 area band students, instructors and boosters as Region 16 bands meet here next week for South Zone UIL band contests in sight-reading and concert performance.

Scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday, April 27 and 28, the contests will include bands representing classes B, A, and AA in the South Zone of Texas' Region 16.

The Antelope Band is slated to perform for judges in concert at 4:15 Tuesday afternoon. This portion of the competition is open to the public, and AHS band director George Riddell encouraged local citizens to attend the performance and support the Antelope Band. All concert performances will take place in the school auditorium.

During the concert competition, the local band will perform "March Onward"--Luthold; "Prelude and Fugue in B-Flat Minor"--Bach; and "Introduction and Fantasia"--Mitchell.

Following concert performances, the bands will adjourn to perform in the sight-reading competition. Each band will be given eight minutes to study a selection of which they have no previous knowledge before playing it for the judge. Unlike the concert portion, the sight-reading sessions are not open to the general public.

Judges for the contest will be Eddie Green, Lake Highlands High School, Allen, Texas; Wesley Hays, Graham High School, Graham, Texas; James McIlroy, Brady High School, Brady, Texas; and Arthur Nutt, Ranger High School, Ranger, Texas.

Class A bands will include those from New Deal, Ralls, Crosbyton, Lorenzo, Plains, Shallowater, Spur, O'Donnell and Seagraves; and Class AA bands, in addition to the Abernathy High School band, will include those representing Lubbock Cooper, Post, Tahoka, Freship, Denver City and Slaton.

The contests will begin at 1:00 p. m. Tuesday and will continue through the afternoon. Resuming at 9:00 a. m. the following morning, sessions will continue until 3:30 p. m. Wednesday.

Riddell stressed the fact that the AHS band students themselves will act as hosts for the contests, acting as guides and offering assistance to visiting band members during the two-day competition.

In last year's UIL competition in Seagraves, the Antelope Band received a division 2 rating in concert and a first division in sight-reading. In marching competition, held last November, the band received a second division rating.

First division ratings in both concert and sight-reading competitions next week would entitle the local band to a Special Award, an honor second only to the Sweepstakes award.

The men listed below, along with approximately 9000 fellow Outstanding Young Men from the United States, will be featured in this prestigious annual awards publication.

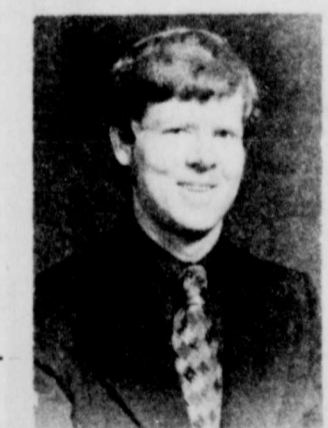

Burial followed in Jayton Cemetery under the direction of Campbell Funeral Home of Spur.

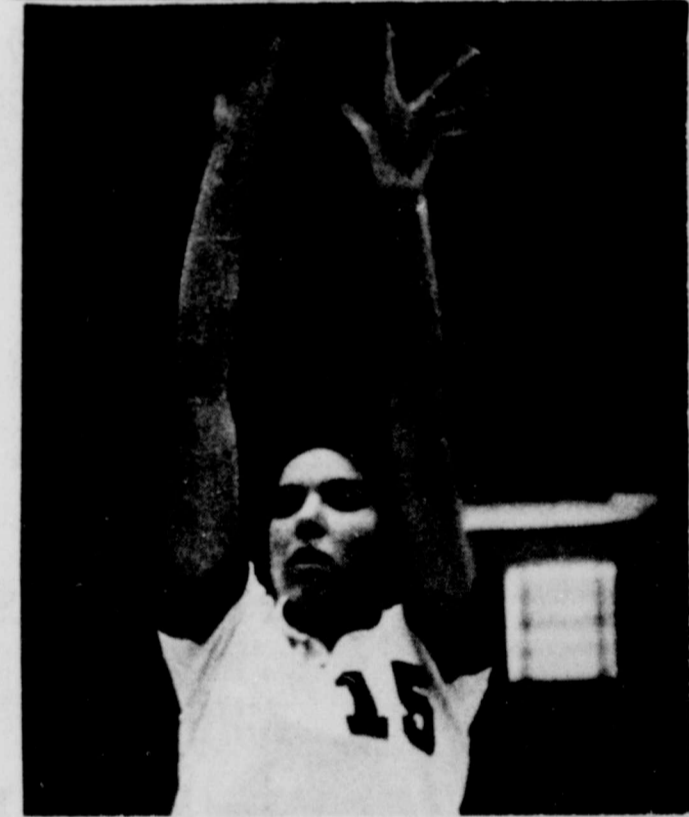

NEWS AND COMMENT

NGC---Noticed in the news that a Toledo, Ohio, woman was given a surprise 71st birthday party by four generations of her family at a hamburger stand which had made for her a hamburger every day for the past 15 years. On days she did not feel like going to the stand, the hamburger was brought in to her from that stand. We've heard mothers complain that their children were not getting proper nourishment because all they would eat at noon was a hamburger. A properly constructed hamburger is, I contend, loaded with nourishment... meat, vegetables, bread, ect. And, for taste, it's better than a lot of other food combinations. To this day, I remember the first hamburger I ever ate. About 8 years old, we rode a train to Haskell, arriving there about meal time. I thought that was the best thing I had ever eaten...and that

respect for the lowly hamburger still exists.

NGC---Candidates for the presidential nomination must, if they want to survive in the race, walk the tight-rope of rhetoric. Jimmy Carter, front-runner in the Democratic primaries held thus far, has stumbled over some poor choice of words in two instances, "ethnic purity" and indicating that that frogs are ugly. His greater blunder of the two was the "ethnic purity" comment, but the frog-lovers' complaint is hard to justify. It gets into the "nit-picking" area of criticism. No, I am not a Carter supporter.

NGC---The basic reason for using taxpayers' money to finance presidential nominations and elections is laudable...to keep big business and industry or unions from "buying" candidates with huge blocks of campaign donations. The election financing principle should be kept...but with a number of changes. This year, taxpayers' money has gone to primary election candidates who, in the first place, were not viable candidates. In the overrun field of Democratic candidates in primaries, they wasted the taxpayers' money. Next presidential election year, it may be the Republican party with too many primary candidates. The election finance law should be changed to require candidates to make a good showing in the first 15 state primaries before being eligible to receive funds from the U. S. Treasury to help finance their campaigns up to the nominating conventions. Give them leeway to accept outside donations to finance their campaigns through the first 15 state primaries. The bulk of the financing should wait until the major political parties had nominated candidates in their formal conventions... this year in New York City for the Democrats and in Kansas City for the Republicans. Also, all states should not be allowed to change their primary election dates from those in effect in 1976. This would keep 15 states in any one section of the country, eastern, southern, northern, southwest and

western, from changing presidential primaries to Jan. 2 of election years in order to give a mutually agreed-upon candidate from that region of the country the advantage of receiving federal money for campaign financing. Thinking that 15 states in any region could mutually agree upon one primary candidate may be a little far-fetched.

NGC---Reports from Plainview say that work on the Llano Estacado Museum on Wayland Baptist College campus is nearing completion.

NGC---The Texas State Board of Insurance, named by appointees, has allowed insurance companies a total of 10.9 per cent average increase in building insurance rates during the past six months. A 6.9 per cent average increase went into effect Feb. 16. The Insurance Board has approved another 4 per cent average increase in building insurance rates to go into effect in July or August. Members of the State Board of Insurance should be elected by the people instead of gaining the position by appointment. It's time for the Texas Legislature to take steps to protect the people from such double whammies of rate increases allowed by the Board in a six-month period.

NGC---Recently in this column was a comment about the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal person editing reports from Austin thinking that Abernathy is 17 miles north of Beaumont. I could have been wrong. The person may think Abernathy is 17 miles east of El Paso. Prompting the original comment was the leaving out of Abernathy in a report of city sales tax money received by towns in the Lubbock area. It happened again. A current report on city sales tax in the A/J April 20 also left Abernathy out. "Amount of the (city tax) rebate is said to be a reliable indicator of a city's economic well-being, members of the taxing authority said," the A/J stated in the story April 20. Comparing with other towns of similar size, Abernathy did very well with its sales tax rebate of \$1,068.98. Crosbyton received \$501.10; Ralls \$598.23; Slaton, a larger town than Abernathy, \$1,965.73; Olton had \$441.55 in period allocation, but state fees and retained amount left the town with a zero receipt this rebate report. Hale Center had a zero receipt for the same reason.

NGC---Thanksgiving should come in April this year...to express thanks for rain, breaking the longest dry spell experienced here in many years. To this date (April 16) we have not had all of the moisture we need for row crop planting, but we sincerely appreciate every drop of rain we get.

NGC---Little Drubblers basketball programs will help build better varsity boys and girls teams in the future. Our thanks to the parents and others who put in a lot of hard work and planning on the project. Some booing from the stands cropped up in the recent tournament here for boys. It's a sorry example to set for the youngsters. They need to learn sportsmanship as well as how to play basketball.

GUIDELINES, RULES SET FOR LOCAL CIVIL DEFENSE EFFORT

The City of Abernathy's Civil Defense Plan is to provide, in cooperation with the State and Federal Governments, a workable plan designed to save the most lives, minimize damage, and restore and rehabilitate society and property in a civil defense emergency caused by a natural disaster.

In the event of a natural disaster, the city will establish controls to minimize the damage and provide for the welfare of its residents. In case of emergency the following actions will be taken:

1. Receive and disseminate warnings
2. Mobilize civil defense forces
3. Recommend evacuation or take cover
4. Police damaged areas
5. Protect lives, prevent fires, extinguish fires if burning
6. Receive, care for and forward casualties and refugees
7. Provide direct support to damaged areas if feasible
8. Determine and warn of hazards
9. Control and manage resources

Abernathy Civil Defense Weather Watch

The Abernathy Civil Defense will follow the following procedure for weather watches in order to insure the safety of its residents against tornadoes and severe weather.

1. When the National Weather Bureau places Abernathy under a tornado watch, (conditions exist that could produce tornadoes, the weather watch team members are notified to stand by for duty.

2. If conditions worsen, or Abernathy is placed under a tornado alert (tornado has been confirmed in the area) the E. O. C. (Emergency Operation Center) is called into action and weather watches assume their positions.

3. If a tornado is sighted or if conditions warrant, residents will be alerted by the Civil Defense siren.

4. Upon a tornado sighting, and if time permits, the patrol car will also travel every other EAST-WEST street with siren on.

5. Residents should seek immediate shelter upon sounding of warnings.

*** If Abernathy or the general area is hit the following procedures will be followed.

1. Injuries-Abernathy E.M.S. will utilize the bay area of the Fire Dept. as the first-aid center. People needing medical attention should come or be brought to the Fire Department.

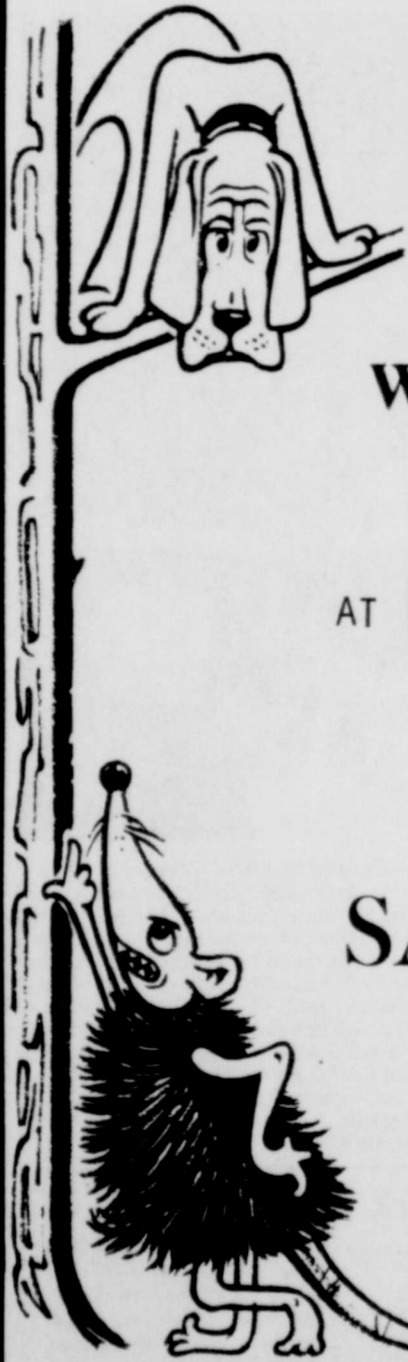

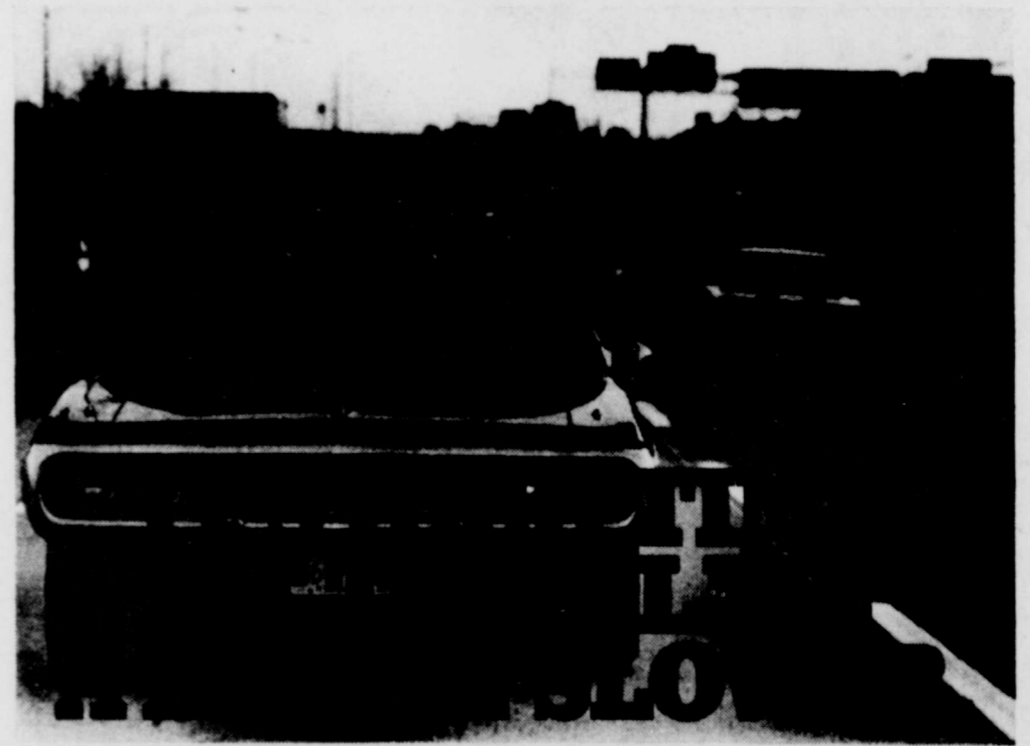

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"THOUGHTS FROM WITHIN"--By Vicki Havens
I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never be hungry; he who believes in me will never be thirsty. (John 6:35)

In these days and times it seems that one of the worse enemies is fear! But to the Christian there is hope and a deliverance from fear, because in 2 Tim. the scripture tells us that, (For God did not give us a spirit of timidity--cowardice, of craven and cowering and fawning fear--but (He has given us a spirit) of power and of love and of calm and well-balanced mind and discipline and self-control. When we are born again believers and the Holy Spirit dwells in us we have the power of God living in us. John 10:10 says, "The thief comes only in order that he may steal and may kill and may destroy. I came that they may have and enjoy life, and have it in abundance--to the full, till it overflows. The thief is the devil and he will do anything to bring fear into the lives of people. Fear is the opposite of faith. Just stop and think just during one day the fears that come against you. That is why we all need to know the word of God because we are in a spiritual warfare but, if we know the promises of God and stand on them fear can't stand against the Word. With God we have the victory over the devil. 1 John 4:4 says, Little children, you are of God--you belong to Him--and have (already) defeated and overcome them (the agents of antichrist), because He Who lives in you is greater (mightier) than he who is in the world. James 4:7 says, So be subject to God.--Stand firm against the devil; resist him and he will flee from you. You see when we stand up against the devil with the Word he will flee he hates the name of Jesus and hates the living Word. 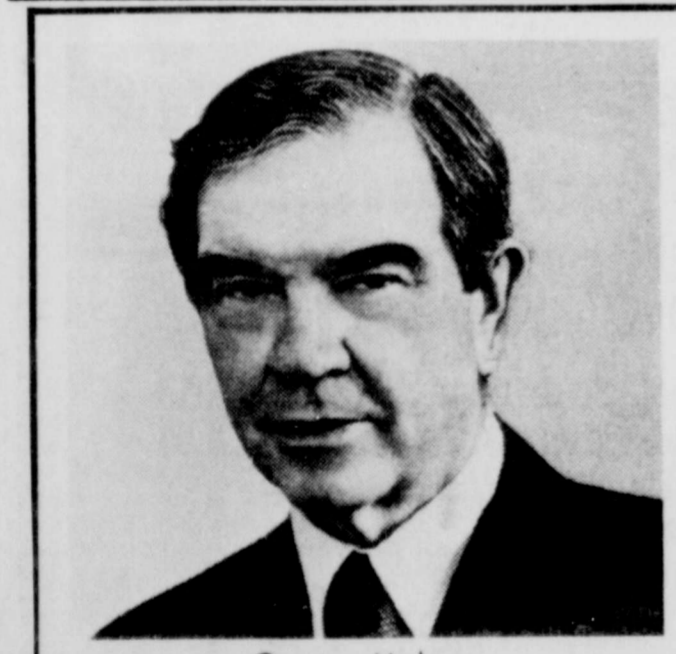

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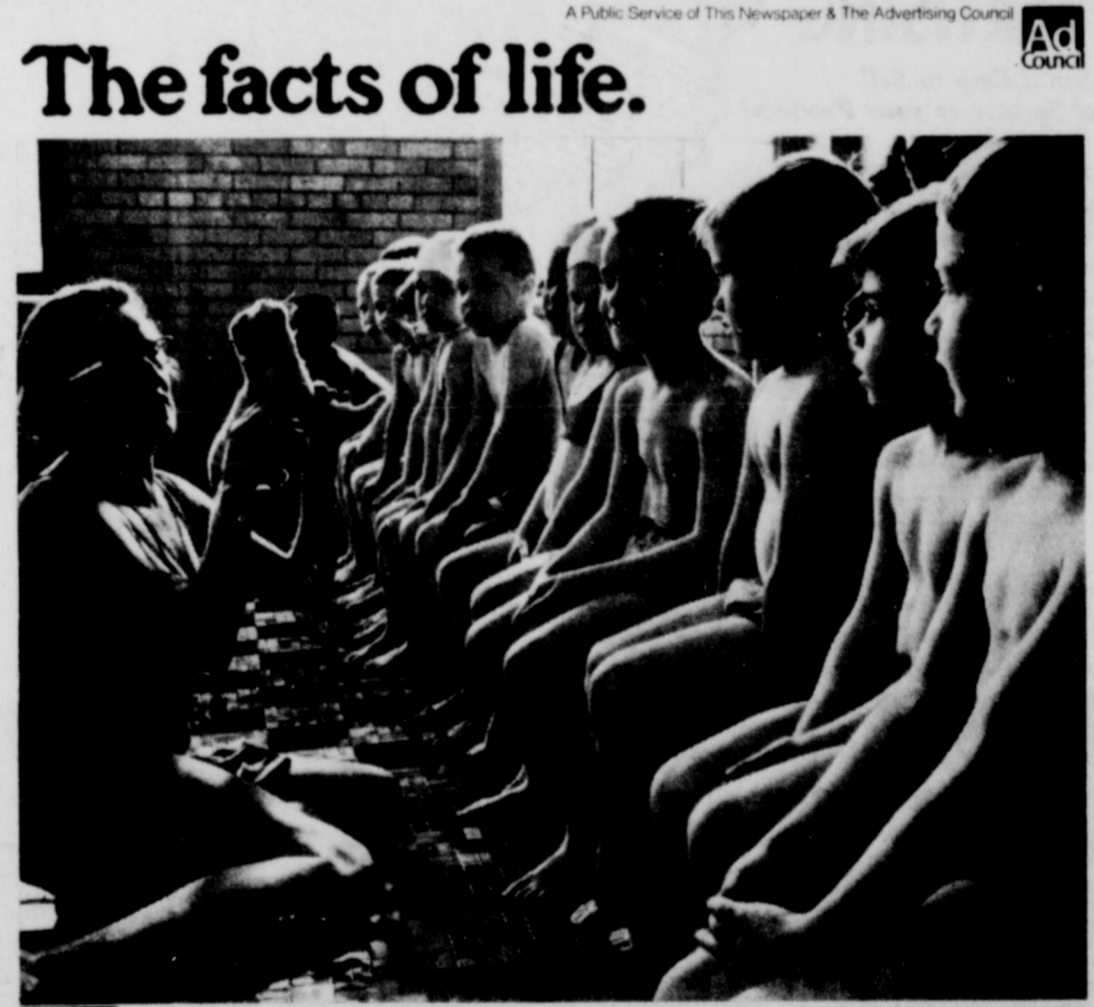

Both are simple ways of showing others how to make or do something and to share useful knowledge. You will find that it's fun showing others what you've learned. Sharing your ideas and knowledge with others can give you a great feeling of satisfaction.

There are at least two main reasons for you to practice demonstrations and talks in 4-H. They are: (a) You can develop skills in presenting ideas more clearly to other people. These skills will help you to communicate ideas which you understand. (b) You can gain a wider range of information about the subjects on which you make presentations.

Some side benefits for you include: (a) improved public speaking skills, (b) more confidence in yourself, (c) more opportunity to do interesting things such as going places to gather information and taking part in interesting events and activities, (d) acceptance for more responsible jobs in 4-H, in your community and in later life.

In giving a demonstration or talk, your first audience will probably be the members of your own project group. However, as you become more skilled, chances are good that you'll be telling your "story" to the whole 4-H club.

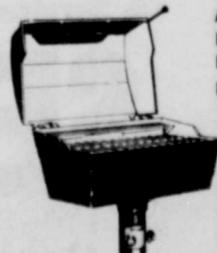

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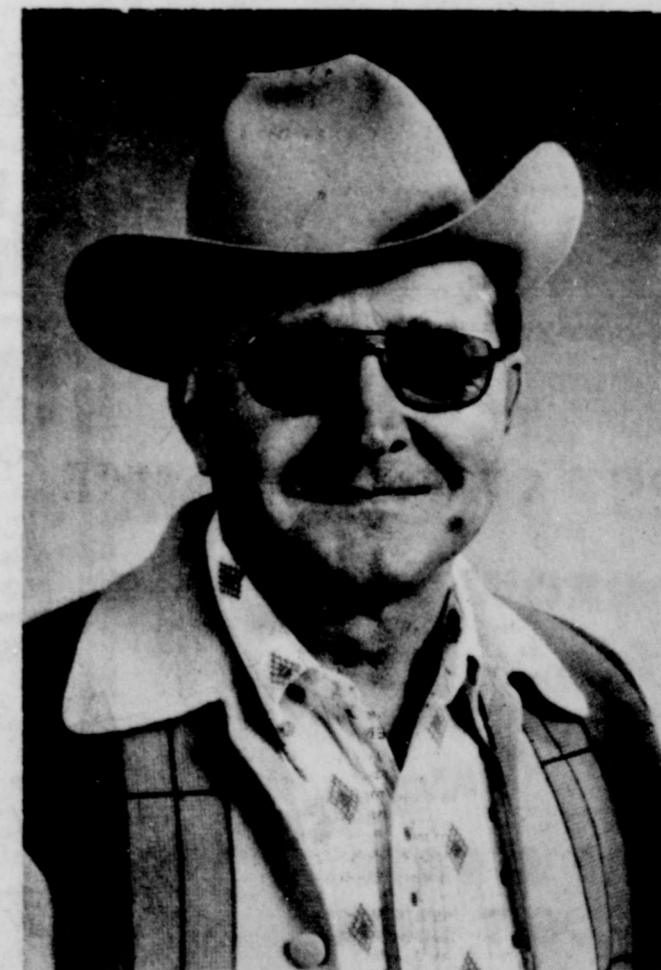

SEEDS FROM THE SOWER

The Gospel is not good advice, but good news. It does not tell what we must do for God, but what God has done for us. It does not offer us lessons from the life of Christ, but life from the death of Christ.

The Gospel is God's truth about a certain set of historical facts that are recorded in 1 Corinthians 15:1 to 5.

The first fact: "Christ died for our sins." You and I were born to live. But Jesus was born to die. Why? For sins. His sins? No, He was born without sin and He lived without sin. But God took the sinless Christ and poured into Him our sins and He died in our place.

The second fact: "He was buried." He who was born of the Virgin Mary was laid to rest in a virgin tomb which is similar to a vault. It was a cave in the side of a hill, large enough for people to walk into.

The third fact: "He arose the third day." How? Bodily. Christ is alive. He is the great "I Am," not the great "I was."

Over the main entrance of the Wealthy Street Baptist Church of Grand Rapids, Michigan, are these words: "Our God is alive! Sorry about yours."

WHAT'S NEW AT NORTHSIDE


