DAVID P. LOPER ACCEPTED BY U. S. ARMY'S EUROPEAN CHORUS

PFC David P. Loper, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mayo Loper of 505 Avenue F, has been accepted as a member of the 7th Army Soldier's Chorus. Established in August of 1964,

the 40 member chorus is regarded as one of the most outstanding vocal groups in Europe. The chorus has made over 3600 appearances throughout Europe in its 12 year history.

The chorus is composed of men and women selected by auditions from the entire European Command. Following the initial audition each member goes through a 30 day training period during which time he is required to learn the chorus' repertoire. At the end of the 30 day period each member is required to audition again before final acceptance. PFC Loper will be travelling with the chorus to Holland, Spain, England and Berlin as well as participating in numerous performances in the Federal Republic of Germany. The motto of the chorus is "Friendship Through Music."

PFC Loper will be reassigned to Headquarters and Company A, USA REUR and Seventh Army Special Troops in Heidelberg, Germany. Loper was formerly with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 15th Infantry in Kitzingen, Germany.

While attending Abernathy High School, Loper was a piano student of Mrs. Lucille McKenzie and was coached in voice by Mrs. Dovie Barron, of County Line and Miss Sue Crites of Lubbock.

Primary Elections Saturday

Area Republicans To Vote May 1 In New Deal, Plainview

Those in North Lubbock County and in the New Deal area who want to vote in the Republican Primary all will cast ballots at one poll. The voting box for the Republican Primary will be at the New Deal Elementary School building.

South Hale County persons who want to vote in the Republican Primary may do so at polls in the Edgemere School, 20th and Yonkers, in Plainview.

In the Primary Elections May 1, voters cannot split the tickets. You must vote in the Democratic Primary only or in the Republican Primary only.

Heavy Democratic Primary Voting Expected

Texasans will go to the polls Saturday, May 1, to vote in the first primary election. In Hale County, voters will mark ballots in Abernathy City Hall and at the Lakeview Methodist Church. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Lubbock County voters in this area will go to polls at Joe Thompson Implement Co. in Abernathy, and in New Deal School for residents in commissioner precinct four, and in New Deal Clubhouse for those residing in commissioner precinct three. All Lubbock County polls will open at 7 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Polls open an hour earlier, at 7, in Lubbock County due to its population figure.

The polling places above are for those who want to vote the Democrat ticket. Republicans also will have their primary election.

For the first time in Texas, ballots of both parties will include names of delegates for candidates seeking the presidential nomination. In the Democratic party, delegates will be listed for Lloyd Bentsen, Jimmy Carter and George C. Wallace. Republicans will vote for delegates for President Gerald Ford and challenger Ronald Reagan.

The ticket for Democrats will list Bentsen for reelection as U. S. Senator and the name of his opponent, Phil Gramm. Rep. George Mahon's name will be on the ballot for reelection to his 19th District post. Texas also will vote on a Railroad Commission.

Main race of local interest on a Hale County basis is the four-way battle for Commissioner of Precinct Three. Incumbent Jack Eason faces three challengers, Harvey Lutrick of Abernathy, Henry Rieff of Cotton Center, and Wayland College student T. Mark Smith of Plainview. The only other Hale County candidate with challengers is Marvin Churchwell, Precinct One commissioner (the precinct in northeast Hale County.)

Lubbock County Precinct Three voters will ballot on a commissioner from a field of several contenders. Les Derrick of Idalou, who currently holds that office, is not a candidate for reelection. Probably the most hotly contested race on a county-wide basis is for the office of Sheriff of Lubbock County. Sheriff Choc Blanchard, who is a candidate for

Irrigation Gas Use Hearing Is Slated At Plainview

An "information" meeting has been set for 8 p. m. Friday, April 30th at Hale County Agriculture Center for persons interested in requesting a special session of Texas Legislature concerning natural gas for irrigation and utility use. The special session would be this summer, probably in July.

According to Bruce Riegler of Plains Irrigation Gas Users, tentative plans for the meeting include having a farmer from the Pecos-Ft. Stockton area of West Texas, considered the hardest hit area in state by the high cost of natural gas, and a state senator, probably either Kent Hance of Lubbock or Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, address the group.

"The meeting is for everyone and not just irrigation farmers," Riegler said, "We need support from all groups of people."

It is hoped by certain groups that a constitutional amendment placing the use of irrigation or agriculture gas under the jurisdiction of the Texas Railroad Commission will ultimately be approved.

NEWS & COMMENT

NGC---Predictions: Texas' 1977 Legislature will increase the state gasoline tax by a penny a gallon, or more. In 20 years, local school boards will be little more than a figurehead governing body.

Texas Highway Department had to change its name to The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. With that change came less federal money to build and maintain highways. Part of the money allotted to states by federal government... money going to Washington from federal gasoline tax... now goes to buy city buses and for rapid transit systems in the big cities of the nation, and less is going to states for building and maintaining highways. This, along with increased cost of operations due to inflation, has the Texas Department in a real financial bind. The Highway Department in Texas has been forced to cut its number of employees about 5,400 since Sept. 1, 1972. Remember this when you hit a chughole in the highway pavement, when you notice litter on the right-of-way and when tall weeds line the state's highways.

Concerning the school board prediction, this is based on the rate of erosion of the governing power of local boards during the past 20 years. We'd like to sit in on a discussion of this subject between members of the current school board of trustees and Ted Watts, Virgil Halford and Frank B. Lovelace, who were on the Abernathy school board many years ago. That was before federal and state governments began substituting their powers for those that belong to local school boards.

NGC---Should Senator Hubert Humphrey be nominated for president on the Democratic ticket at the New York City Convention in July, will it damage popularity of presidential primaries, proving that they are much ado about nothing?

NGC---Among those members of the AHS Class of 1962 planning to be in Abernathy July 3 for the Ex-Students' and Ex-Teachers' reunion is Johnny Bridges, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Bridges. His address is 11803 Pleasant Tree Drive, Little Rock, Ark. 72205. He is in charge of an office with some 30 employees where the computerized payroll for all Bell Telephone Company workers in the state is prepared.

NGC---Saturday is primary election day. Vote as you please, but please vote.

NGC---Regardless of how interesting the trip has been, the best part about it is getting home.

NGC---Eventually, the weather will catch up with what the calendar says and Spring actually will be here.

And, more children will spend more time out-of-doors, playing ball, riding bikes and running in the neighborhood streets. Motorists are urged to watch for the little guys. The saying that a "rolling ball" should be remembered when you see a ball rolling in the street... anticipate a running child. Also, this is a good time to remind those who abandon refrigerators and freezers to first rip-off the doors. Many children have suffocated in these appliances.

NGC---Hang-ups. One of mine is getting a road map folded back as it was before I opened it. Another is: Why did the Social Security man congratulate me when I went to the office to apply? Was he congratulating me for living so long, or for getting on the rolls before HEW ran out of money? I know it was not for the big checks I'd be receiving. However, every little helps.

NGC---U. S. Senator Frank Church is a late-comer to the once over crowded field of candidates seeking the Democratic nomination for president. Although I've never been a fan of the Senator, I like what he says on TV about harm done by the United States by this country's big manufacturers building factories in foreign countries. He points out that the manufacturers get a tax break on U. S. taxes; that money from the U. S. Treasury insures the firms against total loss of their holdings in the foreign countries. And, last, but the most important, the air overseas operations deprive hundreds of thousands of Americans of jobs they so badly need.

NGC---I don't want the off-hand remark made in this column about the "HEW running out of money" to add fuel to the anxiety of Social Security recipients. In recent weeks, the national news media had a lot to say about such a possibility. I don't know, and I doubt that national newspeople know, that this will ever happen. If one starts worrying about something that "could happen" you'll ruin today by the fear of what might happen tomorrow.

NGC---Here's a new kind of a rodeo you may want to see. "The largest All Girl Rodeo in History" will be held Friday, Saturday & Sunday, May 14, 15 & 16, in Hereford. The event begins at 7:30 p.m. May 14. Activities will end the afternoon of May 16 with induction of four honorees into the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame. Also, the names of two

deceased persons will be added to the Hall of Fame that day. In addition to the rodeo, there are a lot of other entertainment events lined up for the three-day program. Come by The Review office and check the Schedule of Events.

CO-OP GIN HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING FOR STOCKHOLDERS



Pesticides Require Safe Use, Disposal

AUSTIN--To many people, the best thing about spring is working in their yards and gardens but unfortunately, a necessary evil accompanies gardening--pesticides.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White cautions gardeners to remember that pesticides are toxic poisons and are dangerous if applied or disposed of carelessly.

Commissioner White offers the following suggestions for pesticide safety:

1. Before using a pesticide, be sure that a problem exists. If in doubt, contact your local county agent, a professional entomologist or pest control expert.
2. Make certain you use the correct pesticide.
3. Use exactly the amount prescribed on the label. The recommended dosage is time-tested and certified effective.
4. Apply pesticide only in areas where needed.
5. Water used to wash and rinse the application equipment is contaminated. It should be discarded only in areas where pest control is desired.
6. Empty containers or small amounts of surplus pesticide should not be discarded in sewers, in toilet bowls or down household drains.
7. Homeowners should dispose of empty containers by wrapping them in several

thick layers of newspaper, then crushing or breaking the empty containers and placing them in a garbage can for pick-up.

8. Where there is no garbage collection, the containers should be wrapped and crushed, then buried between 18 and 24 inches deep in clay or loam soil. Caution should be exercised to keep the containers at least 500 feet from livestock or water sources.

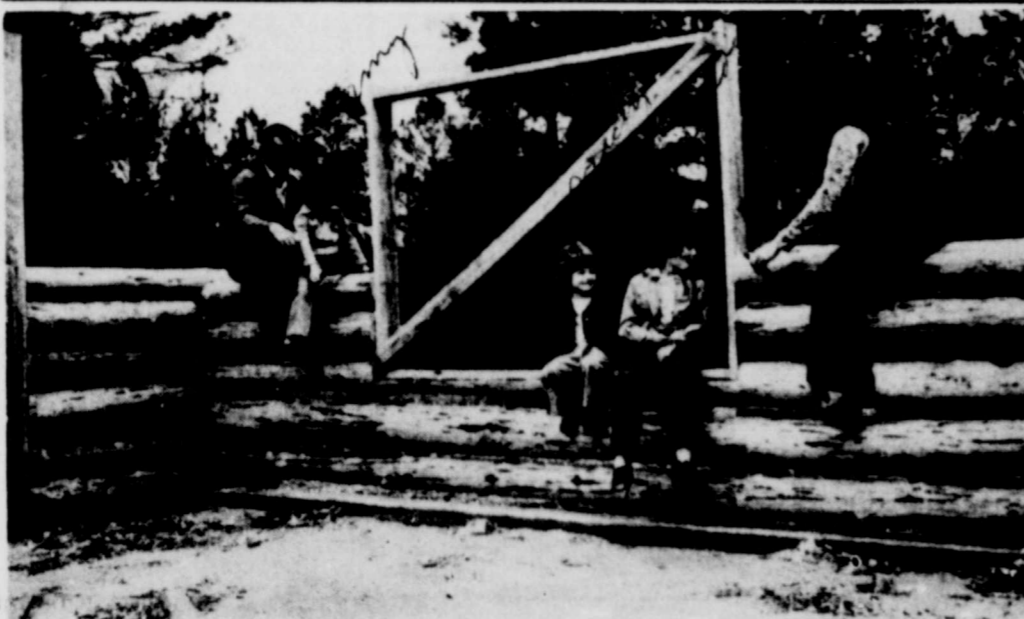

Tyler Family Building Log Home From Scratch

(The following story was first published in a Tyler, Texas newspaper.)

If it's impossible for a novice carpenter to cut the trees, notch

the logs and build his own two-story, 2,100-square-foot log home (not cabin) from scratch, please keep it to yourself until about a year from now.

By then Lewis J. Ripley, 29 and his wife Nanda, 28, and their three daughters should have their's completed about 10 miles east of Tyler in the Chapel Hill area.

Almost two years ago, the Ripleys went to the New Mexico mountains on vacation and spent their time in a log cabin. Back home in Tyler, they were unable to duplicate that indefinable feeling generated by living in that rustic, mountain-air cabin. So why not build their own? they reasoned.

"A lot of people--I bet there were 150 of them--told us we couldn't do it," Ripley, a native of Lubbock but John Tyler High School graduate, said. The Tyler fireman added, "That's one of the reasons we want to do it ourselves. We know what we want. It's just something we want to do ourselves."

The Ripleys, 2451 Sunnyside, Tyler, searched a long time before finding just what they wanted--5.2 acres covered with pine trees.

In September he began cutting the trees. "It was Friday, the 13th, in February, when we put up the first log," he said.

After cutting and trimming the trees, they are racked off

the ground about six months for drying and curing. Then the family uses draw knives to peel the bark off the logs.

Following the six-month drying and curing period, the logs are dragged to the cabin site, cut to length and drawn a second time for smoothness and to remove a film that has collected by this time.

Then the logs are notched, brushed with regular washday bleach to preserve the coloration and treated with a chemical that makes them rot-resistant.

Then the logs are placed one above the other and the walls are erected. To fill the gaps created between the logs, Ripley will use mason's mortar. To retain the rustic effect, the outside of the building will not be painted.

Neither will the inside, said Mrs. Ripley, also a John Tyler graduate. The logs will be left exposed, she said.

The area where they are building is served by a water line, but not a natural gas line. Ripley said he will have an all-electric home. Mrs. Ripley said she is going to use a kitchen range built to resemble an old-fashioned wood burning stove.

Ripley, who has never done any carpentry, drew the plans for the building himself. The downstairs portion of the home will feature one bedroom, bath, kitchen and dining room.

Upstairs will be a large game room, two bedrooms and a second bath. The house will be topped by a gambrel roof (a roof having two slopes on each side, the lower slope being usually steeper than the upper one).

If all goes well, the Ripleys hope to move into their home by March, 1977. There is still an enormous amount of work yet to be done, however, they say.

Ripley has poured and finished the cement foundation slab and has laid the basic plumbing. A portion of the four walls has been erected after felling about 20 tall trees. He says about 20 more have yet to be felled and processed. "It's hard work," he confesses.

"But don't tell me there isn't still a good neighbor spirit alive," he said. Some of his co-workers at the fire station have helped with equipment, clearing land, etc.

ONION ROLLS

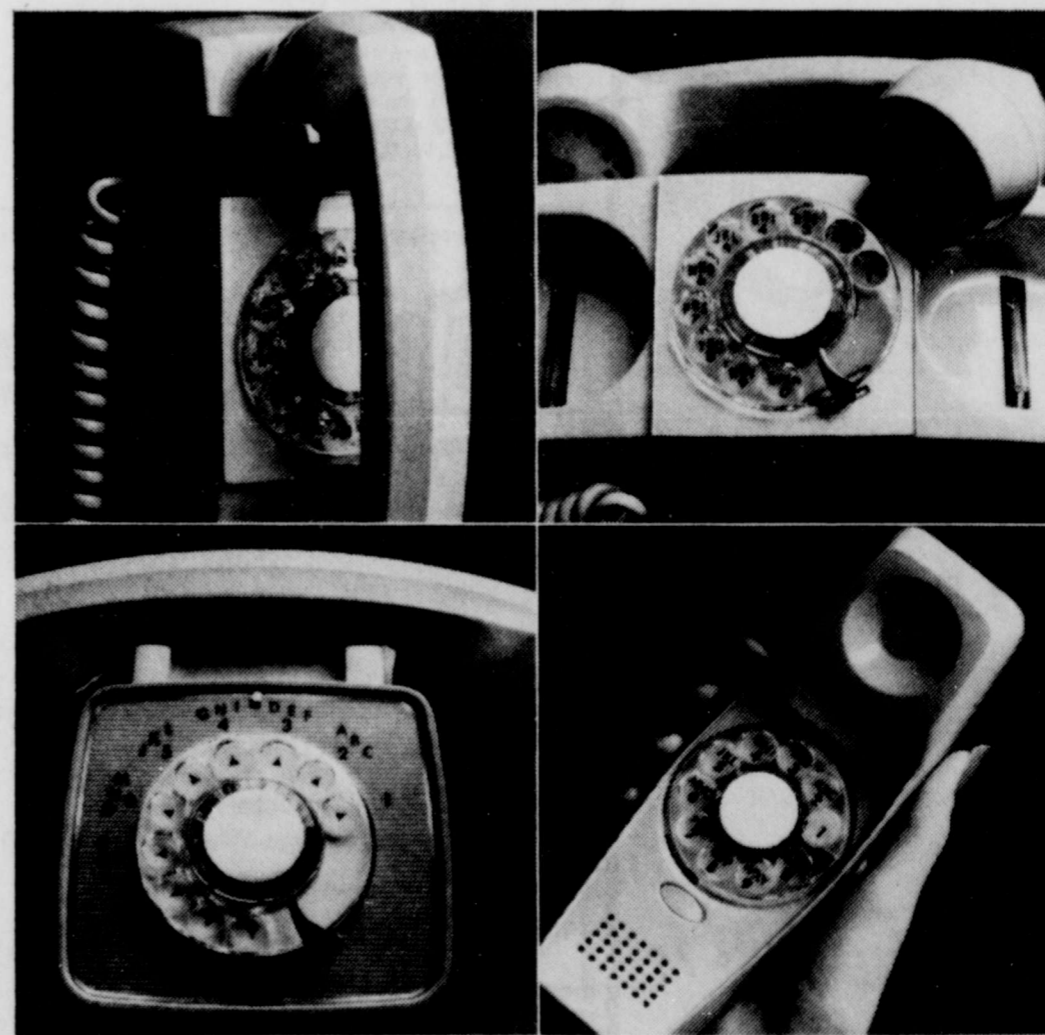
- 1 pkg. frozen cloverleaf rolls
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 cups finely chopped Texas green onions or white onions
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper

Thaw rolls. Separate each roll into 3 natural divisions. Roll out round and as thin as possible. In a 10-inch skillet, melt butter; saute onions in butter until wilted but not brown. Add salt and pepper. Allow to cool. Put 1 teaspoon onion mixture on each dough circle; moisten edges and fold over. Press edges together. Let rise until double in bulk. Bake at 375 degrees until brown. Yield: approximately 2 dozen rolls.
