STEVE JACKSON NAMED "OUTSTANDING YOUNG FARMER" BY ABERNATHY YOUNG FARMER CHAPTER

Steve Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Jackson who farm northeast of Abernathy, has been selected by the Abernathy Young Farmer Chapter as the Outstanding Young Farmer of the Abernathy Area. Jackson will compete with other winners from this area September 18, for the Outstanding Young Farmer of Area I.

Jackson farms 1081 acres in partnership with his father. He began farming in 1972 after returning from active duty training in the U.S. Army. Prior to this he graduated from Texas Tech University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Agronomy.

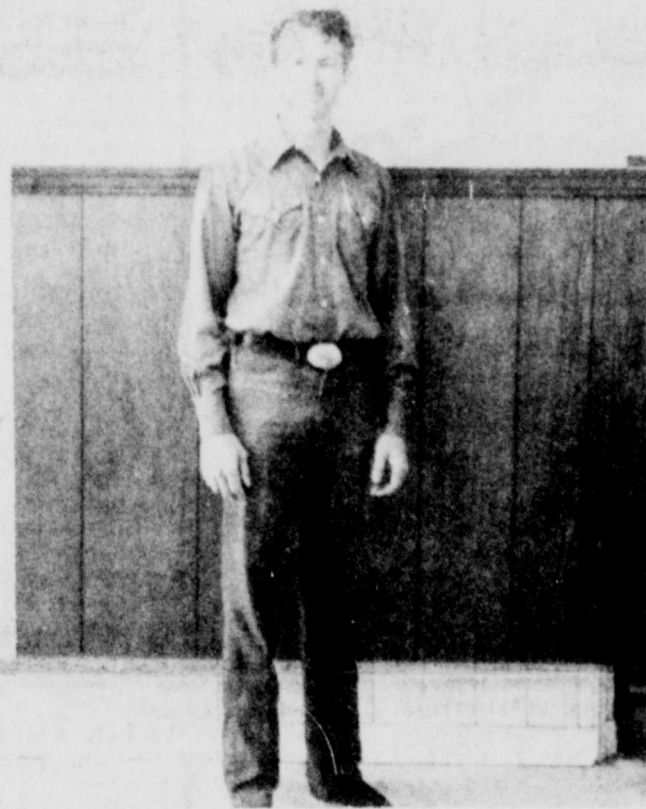
Jackson, farms north of Abernathy and east of Hale Center, is a very successful farmer and has achieved this success through the use of modern farming techniques. His crops include cotton, wheat, and grain sorghum.

Jackson employs many labor saving devices in his farming operations such as 8 row equipment. This large equipment reduces the labor needed and increases the efficiency of his larger tractors. He owns a 2 ton truck with a winch, electric welder and oxy-acetylene welder. This allows him to repair down equipment in the field and to repair and build various projects on location. Steve and his father have a well equipped shop in which they do much of their tractor maintenance and equipment repair during the winter.

He has a basket on his tractor mounted stripper to reduce labor needed during harvest. Jackson has built many pieces of equipment he uses. In 1974 he built a 8 row-duster planter from a six row his father owned. He built a 8 rolling cultivator this past year from two he purchased at farm sales. He also built a 8 row bed type knife slide this year from a 2-four row unit. Jackson is a member of The First United Methodist Church, the Abernathy Masonic Lodge, and the Young Farmer Chapter. He has assisted with local 4-H-FFA projects shows for the last

five years. He holds the State Lone Star Farmer Degree in FFA. This is the highest honor the State Association can bestow. Jackson has been active in the Young Farmer Chapter since its re-organization in

1974. He has served as president and secretary of the local chapter and has served on numerous committees. He has been voting delegate to two area conventions and one State Young Farmer convention.

FIREMEN HEAR DETAILS OF NEW FIRE-FIGHTING POLICY

Members of Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department attended a steak dinner at the fire station Tuesday night of last week. This was the first dinner the firemen have had which was prepared in part and served in the new facility. The steaks were prepared on charcoal cookers under the recently added covered patio on the south end of the new building.

Special guests were Lubbock County Judge Rod Shaw and Mayor Pete Thompson.

Judge Shaw explained to firemen certain arrangements in connection with the new fighting plan for rural Lubbock County. The County and City of Lubbock, which formerly serviced most of the rural county fires, have terminated their agreement. The City of Lubbock had been servicing the rural fires for \$400 per run, and wanted to change to \$1275 per rural call. The Commissioners Court has made arrangements with other county towns, Abernathy, Dalou, Shallowater, Slaton and Wolforth, to handle the rural fire calls after the county-city of Lubbock current contract expires. The rural fire departments will make runs to designated territories in Lubbock County for \$275.00 per call.

Ed Crow, Chief of the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department, says the local department's area of responsibility generally, but not exactly, will follow the Lubbock County area served.

FARMERS WARNED TO BE ON LOOKOUT FOR BOLLWORM SIGNS

Cotton farmers in Hale and surrounding counties need to watch the fields for buildup of bollworm reports County Extension Entomologist, Gene Latham.

Bollworm eggs have begun to hatch in many fields, and while beneficial insects are removing most of the small worms some are getting through. These beneficial insects are our main defense against bollworms and need to be preserved if at all possible. Only if the beneficial insects are unable to keep bollworms in check should chemical control be undertaken.

Latham advises that producers inspect their cotton at least twice a week for bollworm eggs and small worms. The eggs are laid on leaves, stems and other plant parts, and upon hatching the small worms move to squares or bolls to begin feeding. Worms over three days of age, or about 1/4-inch long become very difficult to control.

Several insecticides are effective in controlling small bollworms. Extension publication L-508, "Suggestions for Controlling Cotton Insects" is available from the County Extension Office.



"I Felt His Presence There," says Pat Stanton. After Trip to the Holy Land

 For the Christian world, the most significant place in Jerusalem is the place of the skull and the garden tomb. Just outside the old city is a small hill which is believed to be the place of the crucifixion of Jesus. John 19:17 reads, "And he bearing his cross went forth into a place called the place of a skull, which is called in the Hebrew Golgotha."

Many years ago, a man named Gordon from England came to Israel and began a search for the true place of the cross. He began to look for a place close to the city where people could have easily viewed the body of Jesus on the cross. He discovered a rocky hill near the old part of the city which has the face of a skull in one area. He knew that the Hebrew word for Golgotha was "the place of a skull." He then began a search of a nearby tomb because of John 19:41 which states, "Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden; and in the garden a new sepulchre, wherein was never man yet laid."

Gordon began excavations and found a tomb in a garden area very near Golgotha. The tomb had been dug out of the side of a mountain (Mark 15:46). The garden area was that of a rich man for it contained a hugh water supply. It had a deep well and water storage area. The well and storage area is now covered but I was able to look into this area and was told by the guide that the garden must have been owned by a rich man in the day of Jesus. I was certainly reminded of Joseph of Arimathea who asked for the body of Jesus and laid it in his own new tomb that had

been cut out in the rock. (Matt. 27:60)

Today, the Garden Tomb is open all year to visitors. You can go there for private worship or have group worship services. You can also enter the tomb which has room for several people. The garden is a quite place of beautiful trees, shrubs, and flowers. The place gives forth a definite fragrance of peace and faith.

The garden area was just one of many favorite places in Israel. Our group of fifty went to the garden for worship services on Sunday morning at 9:00. We were joined by other representing countries from most of the world. I sat next to three Christian Jewish girls who were reading from Bibles written in Hebrew. It was truly a moving experience to worship with brothers and sisters that I had not met before. The Chaplin of the garden is an Anglican Priest from England. He gave a wonderful Spirit-anointed message for the morning service. I did not know any of the songs, but felt God's presence in them. I had spent two hours in the garden alone on Saturday morning. This was our free day, and I chose to come to this place and pray and just be quiet for awhile.

Israel is a place of peace and yet at the same time, it seems it is always so near to war. We saw many monuments to those who had died in previous wars. We saw old tanks and trucks that have been left by the roadside as a memorial to the war of 1967. In several places we saw the Israeli Army on patrol and our bus was stopped at different points. We were allowed to travel in the Golan Heights near the Syrian border. There are many army troops stationed in this area and the tanks are all manned. Many people have asked, "Weren't you afraid while you were in Israel?" And I always answer with, "No, I never had one moment of fear, nor did I really think about the conflict in Lebanon. I just knew that I was supposed to be in Israel and that God would take care of me while I was there."

Caprock Council holds over 40 adult training events each year to ensure that Girl Scouts have competent adult leadership. The Council, sponsoring some 400 troops, is one of 355 Councils in the U. S. 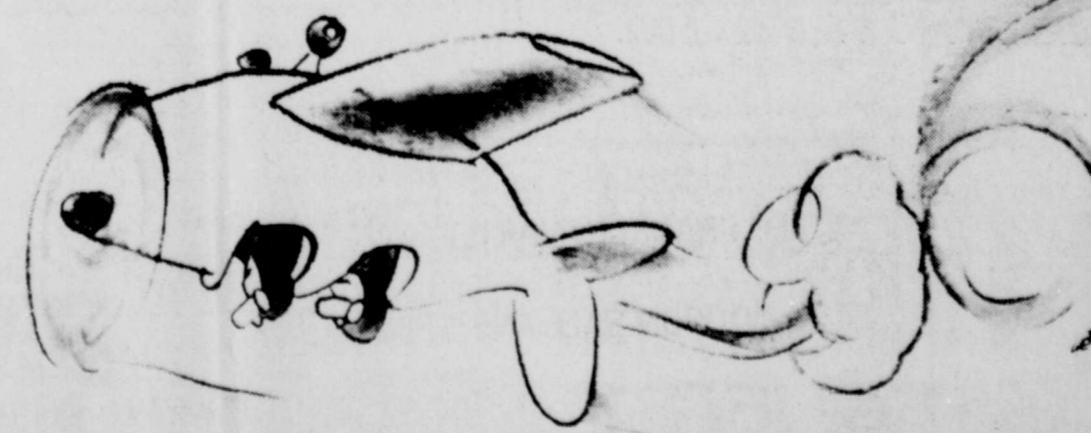

ABERNATHY — With nine defensive starters and two stellar offensive stars returning, Abernathy's just got to be looking on the bright side for 1976.

The Antelopes got off to a 4-2 start last year but collapsed when district play came around, partly due to several injuries to key performers.

The injury bug, for one, hit 6-2, 180-pound running back Roddy Shipman who moves to quarterback this year and promises to be a great one. "He can throw it 75 yards in the air and he really throws hard. We have trouble hanging onto the ball," says second year coach Larry Aldridge.

WHEN SHIPMAN isn't throwing or running, you can bet Ken Davenport, a 178-pound senior with two years of varsity experience, will be. He ran for 1,001 yards last year and has gained 2,092 yards in two seasons. He was all-district at running back and linebacker last year.

And, the Antelopes got an added boost when 150-pound senior Ray Sansom, who has 9.9 speed, transferred in from Lubbock Roosevelt. "With Davenport running inside and Sansom outside, our Veer offense should be outstanding," said Aldridge.

Rapstine and junior Micah Blalock will operate at half-back, also, with senior Jon Horne backing Shipman at the man-under slot.

A CROP of non-varsity experienced players will vie for flanker and split end slots to be on the receiving end of Ship-

man's missiles. They are senior Armando Ruiz, juniors Johnny Lara and Scott Cunningham and sophomores Joe Barrera and Lee McCune. At tight end, the battle is among seniors Frank Rodriguez and Dan Nunn and junior David Hunt.

Size in the line is good though the players are not too experienced on offense. 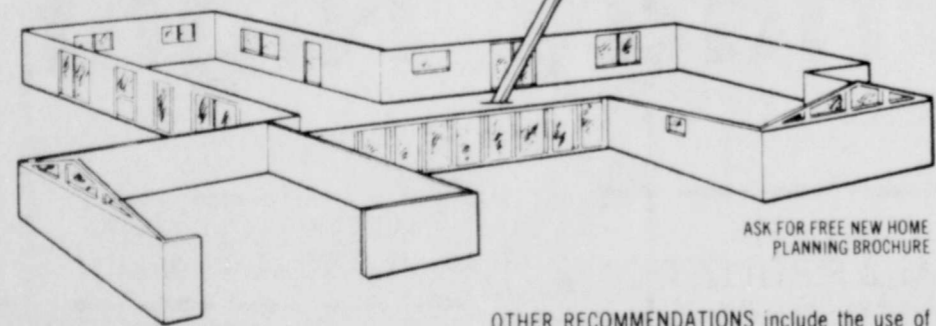

WALLS conform to one of three options: #ONE - 6" walls with R-19" insulation. #TWO - tongue and grooved styrofoam sheathing, 4" walls and R-11" insulation. or #THREE - R-15" minimum insulation.
