DARYL HARP ENTERS U.T. MEDICAL BRANCH AT GALVESTON

GALVESTON--Two hundred and six prospective physicians comprise the freshmen medical school class this fall at The University of Texas Medical Branch. These future doctors will work through four information-packed years and rotate through every medical department before selecting their specialty and receiving M.D. degrees. Depending upon the students' wishes and medical faculty evaluation, a choice of graduating in three years or of entering a fourth year track program is now available at the Medical Branch.

The new freshmen know from the first day of class that they are studying to become competent physicians. They pursue four 15-week periods of basic science material and 48 weeks of clinical science material. During the clinical science training, they learn the various skills of dealing with patients. Also, they learn about the operation of hospitals by rotating through such service areas as internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics, pediatrics and psychiatry.

Due to the high competitiveness for medical school, UTMB students are selected according to their qualifications, motivations, scholarship abilities and probability of professional success.

The primary purpose of the Medical Branch is to teach health care professionals. Since 1892, with its first class of 23 students and 13 faculty members, UTMB has graduated over 6,700 physicians. The Medical Branch is the oldest and largest medical school in the State. It is also the only multicategorical health referral center in Texas.

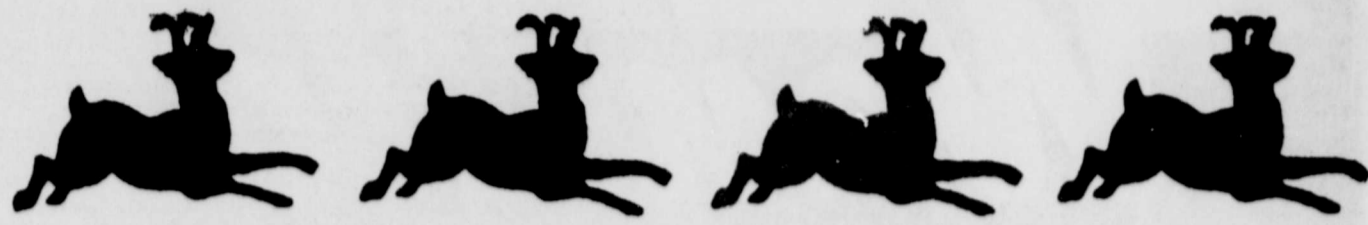

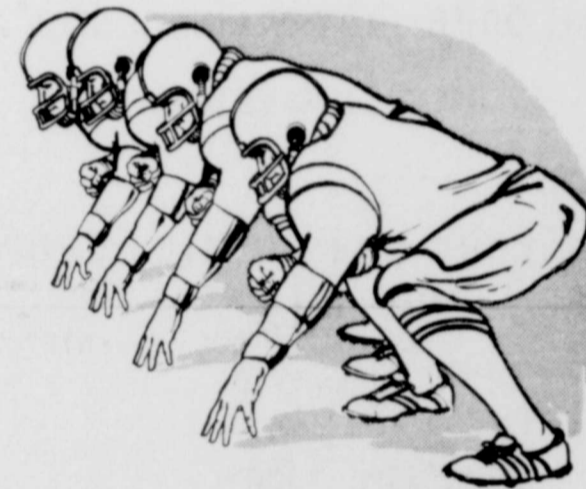


