athy welcomed those present. The purpose of the gathering was to place a time capsule into the earth for safekeeping. It contained all the programs and pertinent information about the 1976 Bicentennial events in Abernathy, showing the evolution of the idea to its fruitation. Other articles of possible historical interest were placed in the capsule: Such as; Abernathy's Golden Jubilee Book in which the early history of Abernathy was recounted by the late Beth Harp; a 1976 Abernathy High School yearbook which had as its theme the recognition of the Bicentennial; Microfilm of all the pre-1963 Abernathy Review's which could be found; a vidio tape of the "I Love America" patriotic musical that was presented on July 4th; the Special Front Page edition of the Review that spot covered the news of Abernathy since 1918; Several current Abernathy Weekly Reviews that have reported about the Bicentennial events, including the Burial of the capsule; a copy of each of this weeks supermarket grocery specials; and

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT LOWEST SINCE 1963: 1976 TAX ROLL CERTIFICATION REPORTED

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on October 4th, at 8:00 p. m. in the Board Room of the high school. After examination and approval of bills payable, a number of reports were presented. The report on certification of tax roll for 1976 revealed the 1976 assessed valuation to be \$62,657, 118. Taxes receivable for 1976 are \$1,002,513 before discounts are subtracted. Again this year, the local schools will give a 3% discount if paid in October; 2% if paid in November; and 1% if paid in December. The delinquent taxes receivable amounted to \$57, 749.
