



GENERAL ELECTION VOTING NOV. 2

Citizens of the United States will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 2, to elect a President and a Vice President. Heading up the Democratic ticket are Jimmy Carter of Georgia and Fritz Mondale, a U.S. Senator from Minnesota. President Gerald Ford of Michigan is seeking an elective term on the Republican ticket. His running mate is Robert Dole, a U.S. Senator from Kansas. Candidates from minor parties also are seeking the high offices.

Texas will vote on a U.S. Senator. Democrat Lloyd Bentsen is seeking re-election. He is challenged by Republican candidate Alan Steelman. Minor parties also have candidates in this race.

Texas will also consider state Constitutional Amendments to provide planning funds to bring much needed water to Texas from other

sections of the United States.

Of interest on the local-national level is the race between incumbent Democrat H. Mahon and former Odessa mayor Jim Reese, Republican, for the office of U.S. Representative, 19th Congressional District of Texas. Mahon has represented the District in Washington since the 1930s.

State candidates for Railroad Commissioner include John Newton, Demo., and Walter Wenlandt, Repub. In the race for Place 2 on the Texas Supreme Court, Houston attorney Don Yarborough, the Democratic nominee, will be the only name on the ballot. He is being challenged by write-in candidates Tom Loranice of Houston and Sam Houston of Denton.

James E. (Pete) Laney of Hale Center is State Representative, District 76, which includes the Abernathy, Lakeview and New Deal

areas.

The Representatives candidates running in the City of Lubbock have no bearing on the Lubbock County boxes in Abernathy and New Deal.

There is one contested Lubbock County Commissioner race of interest to those persons voting at the New Deal Clubhouse. Lubbock County Precinct Three Commissioner Les Derrick of Idalou did not run for re-election this year. Candidates in the Nov. 2 election to serve as Lubbock County Commissioner, Precinct Three, the northeast precinct of Lubbock County, are James Lancaster, Democratic candidate, and Trinidad Zepeida, Raza Unida candidate.

There are listings in county, district and state offices where candidates whose names are shown on the ballot have no other candidates opposing them.

Polls will open at 7 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. in all voting boxes in South Hale County and North Lubbock County Nov. 2.

Wendell Tooker will be in charge of polls in the Abernathy Hale County voting box at city hall club-room. Henry Scarborough will be in charge of Hale County polls at Lakeview Methodist Church. Lubbock County voting in Abernathy will be at Joe Thompson Implement Co., Ave. D at First and Second Streets. Arno Struve, who underwent eye surgery Oct. 21, usually in charge of polls at that voting place. Voting boxes at New Deal will be at New Deal School and New Deal Clubhouse. Polls at Becton usually are at the gin office.

Girls Fellowship Of Christian Athletes Meet

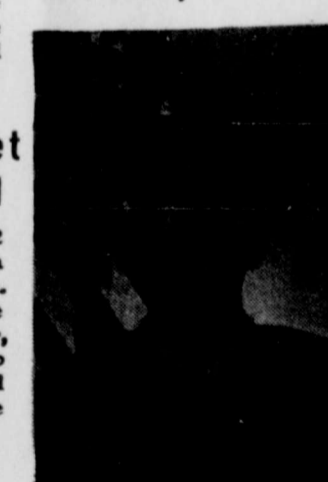

ANTELOPES LOSE TO IDALOUB 13-12 IN DISTRICT 4-AA OPENING GAME

Bad breaks, and heart-breaks seem to be the story Friday night, as the Antelopes lost their district opener 13-12 to the Idalou Wildcats. Defense was the mainstay for the Antelopes during the first half, along with the aggressive play, and good punting by Roddy Shipman the Lopes managed to keep the Wildcats in poor field position.

The offense finally got things rolling late in the 2nd quarter when Roy Sansom galloped 40 yards to the Idalou 29 yard line. After two plays the Lopes facing fourth down and inches on the 19 yard line, drew an offside penalty and lost the ball on downs, killing their only scoring threat of the first half. The half ended 0-0.

Idalou took advantage of two misques by the Lopes to score all of their points in the third quarter. Idalou's first score came after converting a controversial fourth down situation. Their second touchdown came after the Lopes fumbled on their 25 yard line.

Mike Hill turned the game around for the Lopes when he recovered a fumble on the 22 yard line. Shipman two plays later found David Hunt in the end zone. A bad snap wrecked the extra point attempt, and the 3rd quarter ended 13-6 in favor of Idalou.

Ken Davenport opened things up in the last stanza with a 35 yard gallop. Roy Sansom added a couple of first downs and the Antelopes were in business.

Roddy Shipman took advantage of the situation and hit Ken Davenport for a 45 yard pass play to the Wildcats 18 yard line. Three plays later Roddy scored the Lopes second touchdown of the night with 58 seconds left. The Lopes elected to go for the 2 point conversion and the victory, but the effort failed by inches. Idalou took over, and ran the clock out. The game ended 13-12.

VOLUNTEERS FOR CYSTIC FIBROSIS FOUNDATION TO CALL FOR DONATIONS

Mrs. Ralph Davis, Chairman of the 1976 Breath of Life Campaign of Abernathy, for the Lone Star Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation requests that you be on the lookout for a "Special Spook" who will be knocking on your door Sunday evening, October 31. This spook will have a yellow envelope with some special information for you. Yes, this "Special Spook" will be a volunteer worker for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

These volunteers will participate in a Trick or Treat Event to raise funds to support care, research and education programs benefiting children who have asthma, chronic bronchitis, "childhood emphysema," recurrent pneumonia as well as cystic fibrosis.

"For these children, breathing can be a struggle," she said, and added that most people probably aren't aware that lung diseases can threaten the lives of their children.

"Of the diseases that kill children, lung disease ranks second only to cancer," she stated. "And cystic fibrosis, the most serious of these diseases, is the number one genetic killer of children."

Mrs. Davis continued: "These are grim statistics. We hope to change them for the better. But, we need help. That's why we're appealing for volunteers for our campaign to raise funds for support of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation programs benefiting these children."

These programs include support for five Cystic

Fibrosis Centers across Texas which provide diagnosis, treatment and referral to children suffering from lung-damaging diseases and gastrointestinal disorders related to cystic fibrosis.

"The Foundation also supports top-notch researchers who are trying to find a cure or control for cystic fibrosis and the other children's lung-damaging diseases," Mrs. Davis added.

Two aims of Foundation research, she pointed out, are a test to detect carriers of the gene for cystic fibrosis which is a hereditary disease and a method of diagnosis at birth. "The true goal, of course, is to find a cure or control for cystic fibrosis."

"Although there is much to accomplish, there has been terrific progress in conquering these diseases since the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation was established in 1955. And this progress was made possible because of the public's support," said Mrs. Davis.

"For instance, in 1955, most children with cystic fibrosis died in their early years. Now, more than 50 percent are living past age 18 and becoming productive adults.

"But, we want to make it possible for all children with cystic fibrosis to live past age 18. You can help by giving a cash treat to the Cystic Fibrosis "Spook" who knocks on your door Sunday evening, October 31."

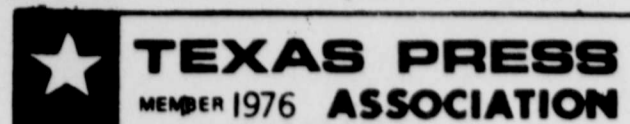

VIKING MISSION

Shriners See Mars

(Editor's Note: The following, from a Pasadena, Calif., daily newspaper dated Sept. 23, concerns a former Abernathian, Henry Clay Von Struve, Jr., who is involved in the Viking Mars Mission. He and his wife plan to return to their permanent home in Littleton, Colo., soon after spending about a year in Pasadena while he was working on the Mars Viking project.)

The Leisure World Shrine Club will meet at 7:30 p.m. Thursday Sept. 23 in Clubhouse No. 2.

The program for the evening will be presented by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory of Pasadena. The presentation will include a description of the NASA directed Viking mission to Mars, pictures of Mars taken by orbiter cameras, Lander science results to date, and pictures taken by Lander cameras. Photographic slides will be used to augment the presentation.

Henry Von Struve, who will be the speaker, is presently assigned to the Viking Flight Team. He has been involved in the program from the time of its inception in 1969.

(Editor's Note: The following is from a letter Struve wrote to his mother, Mrs. Henry C. Von Struve, Sr., of Abernathy.)

The Viking program is coming to a close for me in a couple of weeks. It has been a long hard road, but it has been enjoyable. The information we have obtained from Mars represents a significant step in knowledge for mankind. It will be many years before all the data are analyzed in detail. Surely the development work I did on the program is among the most important things I have done.

CORN IS BRIGHT SPOT IN CROP PRODUCTION

AUSTIN — Corn production for Texas was not severely affected by the adverse weather in the past months and remains the bright spot in crop yields, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has reported.

According to the most recent estimates by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, corn yields per acre should be 115 bushels. Total state production is expected to be 161 million bushels.

The High Plains areas will produce most of the state's corn crop with 146 million bushels indicated, resulting in a hefty 50 million bushel increase over 1975, White stated.

Peanuts in most areas of Texas were adversely affected by the hot-dry weather during August, and now wet conditions have been delaying harvesting. Production is expected to be 175,850,000 pounds, 3 per cent above 1975.

Rice production estimates were boosted 6 per cent from those made in September. First-cutting harvest is complete with second crop harvesting beginning soon. "The abundant production this year, around 25,900,000 cwt., is not totally good news to rice farmers, because the carry-over stocks from last year are at record highs, lowering prices at the production level," White said. Alfalfa hay is estimated to be 2 per cent below last year with totals set around 924,000 tons.

From 8:00 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. the vaccine will be given to High School students, 18 years of age or older, and to the High School faculty. After 10:00 a.m. the clinic will be open to the general public, 18 years of age and older and to children, 3 to 17 years of age, with chronic illnesses.

These persons who are chronically ill will need to have a statement from their doctor to the effect that they need to have the bivalent vaccine.

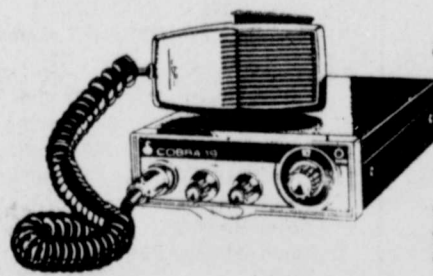

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Homemaking Tips

FROM THE OFFICE OF COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

Overweight or obesity is one of the most pressing health problems today. A person who is 20 per cent over his desirable weight is obese, the authorities tell us. That means that between 15 and 40 per cent of the adult population is obese. And it is terrible to realize that I am in that category as I write this. Many people accept a gradual weight gain, thus ignoring the health risks associated with overweight. This is especially true of those over 40 years of age. About 40 per cent of the aging population is overweight.

Obesity causes complications such as increased risks of illness and death. The condition may contribute to high blood pressure, stroke, heart disease, kidney disease, gall stones, cirrhosis of the liver, and diabetes. An excessive weight gain can also lead to difficulties with the feet and skeleton, shortness of breath after exercise, and increased surgical risk.

There are many reasons why people are overweight. People may not realize that they are overeating. They form an eating pattern when they are young and active. Out of habit, food intake remains the same and the energy used decreases, thus resulting in weight gain. Eating one ounce of chocolate or a cola each day for three weeks provides enough calories or energy to form one pound of fat.

SOCIAL EATING in the United States is one downfall. Many social functions are planned around food.

Inactivity or incorrect balance of calories consumed and energy expended can cause overweight. Some Americans watch spectator sports on television, instead of actively engaging in sports such as golf or jogging. Sedentary activities done while sitting require little or no arm movements resulting in only burning 80 to 100 calories per hour; light activities while standing require arm movement burn 110 to 160 calories per hour; moderate activities while standing with vigorous arm movement burn 170 to 240 calories; and strenuous activities such as active sports burn 350 or more calories.

Boredom causes people to overeat. Many people eat when they are lonely so that they will feel better. Taking an interest in activities, gardening, career, or hobbies can prevent boredom. Heredity may make some people overweight. However, research on identical twins reared in different environments show that life styles have more effect on weight gain than do inherited tendencies. Few people are overweight due to glandular trouble.

Texas Pork: Storage Tips

AUSTIN--Consumers can expect to find increased supplies of Texas pork this fall.

According to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, the state's farmers have stepped up production of hogs.

Texas pork is available fresh, cured, smoked and cured, and canned.

With such a variety of ways to enjoy pork, consumers will want to buy it often.

The Texas Department of Agriculture home economist offers the following tips on short-term storage of various pork cuts.

Fresh pork should be stored in the coldest part of the refrigerator. Prepackaged pork from the store should be either used the same day or the wrapping should be loosened before being placed in the refrigerator.

Cured and smoked pork may be stored in the refrigerator not more than 7 to 14 days in the original wrapper that has been loosened. However, canned hams, unless otherwise stated on the label, can be refrigerated unopened until ready to serve.

Cooked pork should not be cooled before storage. Simply cover tightly to prevent drying, then place in refrigerator.

It was a most informative meeting to help the women to be more knowledgeable on services available to insure good health.

First our Anthem, then "Just Over In Glory Land", and "At The Cross." We had 4 birthdays--one real good one--91 years young. When we speak of years, it sometimes brings up getting forgetful. Floyd said he just knew two things--one was he was getting older and --well, he never could think of what the other one was! Lillie Mae announced that the Swine Flu shot would be

given on Nov. 19 at our City Hall Club Room. Mrs. Cal Tucker visited with us and told us all kinds of goodies, such as the wisdom of us (and all senior citizens) was what made Abernathy the good town it is today. She thanked us for the part we had in the Bicentennial Program, our Bicentennial Program. This is our thanks to the committee that furnished us with chairs and a good view of the Parade on the 5th of July. Most of us went to the presentation of the Bicentennial Flag. Mrs. Tucker visited us once before and brought a piece of egg

paper and we signed all our names and the different ones in the Nursing Homes with a certain kind of pencil and that was put into the Historical Time Capsule. We were asked to sing "America" at the burial of the capsule and a good group of us turned out for that. All of these things and all the clippings from the paper and all the correspondence were saved and put into a scrapbook by Mr. and Mrs. Cal Tucker. She came by to show it to us and said that it would be placed in the City Library, and when that time comes be sure to go by and look it over as a lot of work went into the making of it. Then too, we forgot these things if we don't review them once in a while. Mrs. Toler had the program. She and Mrs. Northcutt sang "The Wonder Of It All" and "Hold To God's Own Hand." We enjoyed it very much.

Mr. Robert Lutrick was the speaker. He told us about the early-early days on the Plains. His folks moved here from Henderson, County in 1892. They came in covered wagons, had one team of oxen and one horse and one mule for teams. They brought with them their cattle, and some saddle horses. They had two extra hands to help. He was six years old. It was hard to get used to not seeing any trees, just plains as far as you could see. At that time there were all these big ranches that later were sold as farmland. The railroad opened a lot of land and people could file on the State land. His father filed on some and later bought more. His first school was in a dugout. His first school house days were when they moved a house--to what we know as the Strip. Petersburg was organized. When the railroad came to Abernathy the Strip deteriorated. People didn't have money but they didn't have any place to spend it anyway. The biggest hazards were the prairie fires. Everyone watched the west for smoke and if they saw any, away they would go. Sometime they would kill a cow and drag it along the fire to help put it out. Some fires burned clear off the cap before they were put out. Things like this will build character! "They made a coward out of me, but others

were braver!" After the railroad came people began to plow up the grass and planted maize, sorghum, and millet. At the time this land was selling it bought \$1.00 per acre. We heard today a farm in the same vicinity brought \$1000.00 per acre. People got their work done and had time to visit; now they are busy and don't visit. After Mr. Lutrick quit talking, people would gather in little groups and review the earlier days. The blessing was given by Evangelist Thomas. After our big dinner, we had a game of 84---pretty hot game! Those present were: Oma Toler, Minnie Northcutt, Polly Tucker, Ruby Knox, Dewey Price, Vera Hawkins, R. A. Lutrick, C. J. Camp, Cora Shuman, Martha Phillips, Lizzie Lebow, Mrs. Dewey Price, Hixie Royal, Pearl Bryant, Floyd Shipman, Ruby Hill, Dorothy Shipman, Jessie Duty, Maude Givens, Francis Howard, Bernice Smith, Mrs. Talbott, Callie Nunn, Rev. 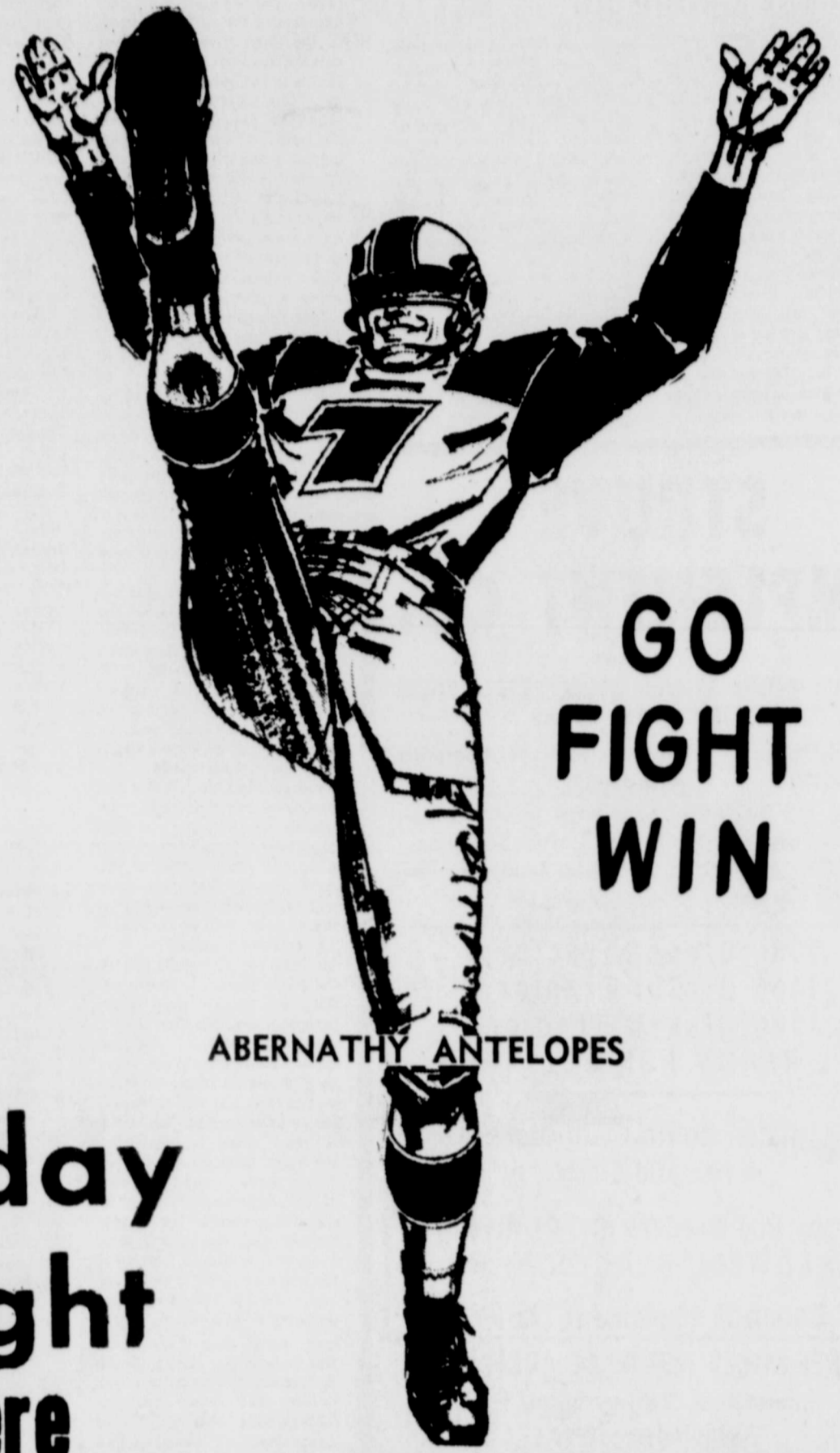

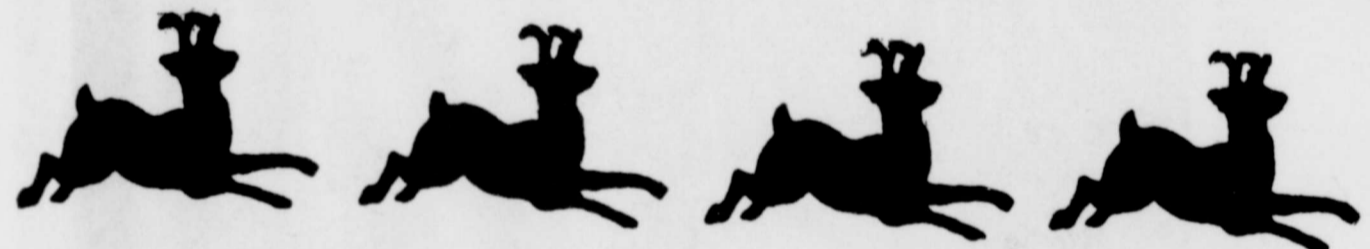

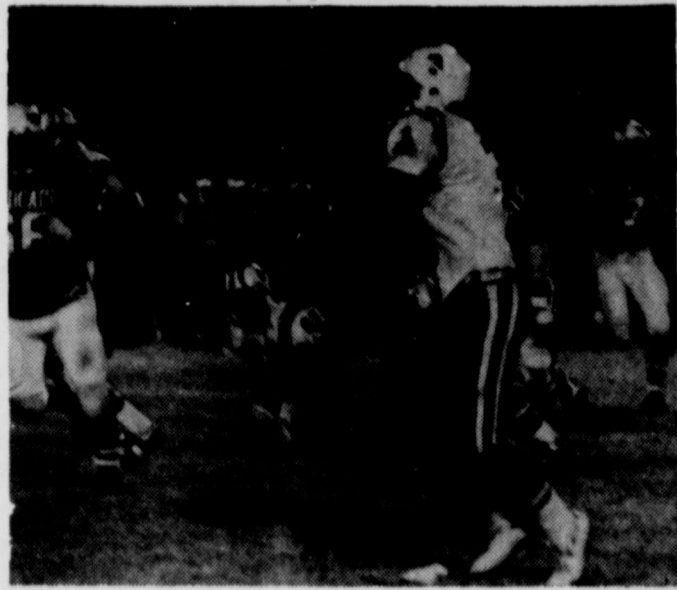

SMALL FARMERS OSHA-EXEMPTED

Something has happened in our nation's capitol which will be of interest to all agricultural producers as well as other businesses, notes Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. As of Oct. 1, farms, ranches and other enterprises defined as "agricultural operations" who have 10 or fewer employees at any time are exempt from all requirements under the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) for one year.

"Annual attempts to amend OSHA during Congressional floor debate on an appropriations bill succeeded this year," points out Nelson. "Certain amendments have been attached to the appropriations bill for the Departments of Labor and Health, Education and Welfare. All OSHA operating funds for fiscal 1977 are in that bill."

The bill stipulates that no civil penalties would be proposed on first instance.

OSHA violations (other than serious, willful or repeated violations) unless 10 or more violations are found, explains Nelson. The bill also exempts from OSHA coverage farms with 10 or fewer employees.

President Ford first vetoed the \$56.6 billion appropriations bill for the Departments of Labor and Health, Education and Welfare, including \$130.3 million for OSHA, on Sept. 29, on the grounds that it exceeded by \$4 billion the sum he requested for fiscal 1977. However, Congress overrode the veto the following day. The bill will provide \$130.3 million overall funding for OSHA, including appropriations for the preparation of inflationary impact statements, education, research and consultation activities, and an increase of

the compliance staff. "Someone has said that it is differences in opinion which make horse races, and that certainly the case here," contends Nelson. OSHA restrictions were designed to give some relief to small firms and small farms. OSHA estimates indicate 87.5 percent of all farms in the United States have 10 or fewer employees. However,

some Congressmen hold that "exemptions, regardless of the number of employees, regardless of the type of industry, create a second-class group of American workers."

"Future resolution of these differences may be found in the rational use of cost-effectiveness studies which compare the cost of proposed legislation with the benefits received," believes Nelson.

Tips From Whirlpool Home Economists



Plan ahead to use the oven efficiently. Cooking complete meals instead of one food item is more economical. Before turning on the oven, arrange the oven racks to accommodate the baking pans. It's easier and more economical. Preheating is not necessary for foods that will cook at least an hour, or when broiling. However, preheating is preferred for pastries, cakes and souffles. When you do preheat, approximately ten minutes is enough. Remember to keep the oven door closed while you are baking. Each time you open the door to take a peek, the oven temperatures can fall 25 to 75 degrees. Food takes longer to bake and the loss of heat can affect browning and baking results.
