The Band received a First Division rating from judges: Bill Dean, Odessa High School; Jeff Doughten, Pampa High School and Richard Crain from Belton High School. Five other bands in class AA were awarded first divisions; they were, Muleshoe, Lockney, Littlefield, Frenship and Dimmitt.

The judges were impressed with the general discipline of the band and its appearance on the field. Some comments that they gave the band were: "Marching is very well done, with few flaws." "Nice group appearance." "You have a very fine band and do many things well. My best wishes to you and your director." "Band shows lots of spirit and drive. Band is well disciplined and cares about what they are doing. This is a tribute to you and your hard working director."

Eleven girls entered the twirling contest that was held in conjunction with the marching contest. Judges for

ANTELOPES OUT PLAYED THE LONGHORNS 28-14 LAST FRIDAY NIGHT AT LOCKNEY (BY SAMMY HUNLEY)

The Antelopes managed to stay out of the cellar in the 4-AA district race Friday night defeating the Lockney Longhorns, 28-14.

The Lopes' behind the efforts of Ken Davenport and Roddy Shipman put the Lopes ahead early in the opening period. Ken galloped 66 yards, after receiving a pitch out from quarterback Shipman. Roddy got the second touchdown on a 1 yard run. The Lopes ended the first quarter 14-7.

Ken Davenport added to the cause in the second quarter on a 2 yard run. The Lopes final score came in the fourth period, after recovering a Longhorn fumble inside the

5 yard line.

Roy Sansom ran the ball in from there and the Lopes had the game in the bag and 28 points on the score board. Lockney got its 14 points in the 1st and 4th quarter.

Statistically Abernathy a total of 256 yards to 281 for Lockney. The victory gave the Lopes their first win in district competition and a season record of 5-4 with one game left to play.

The Tullia Hornets travel to Abernathy Friday night to end the '76 football season. A victory would give the Lopes a third place finish in district and a winning 6-4 season.

Antelopes Meet Tullia Here Nov. 12 In Season Finale

The AHS Antelopes wind down the 1976 football season Friday, Nov. 12, when the Tullia Hornets come to Abernathy for a 7:30 p.m. District 4-AA game. Tullia was on an open date last week while the Antelopes were winning, 28-14, from the Longhorns at Lockney. A tie District game, Floydada 14, Idalou 14, was played last Friday night.

NEW DEAL LIONS SINK RALLS RABBITS 41-0

The New Deal Lions, ranked No. 5 in area Class A action, handed the Ralls Jackrabbits their seventh consecutive loss 41-0 Friday.

The Lions relied on a balanced offense and some costly Jackrabbit errors in raising their season record to 6-2-1 and their District 4-A slate to 3-1-1 and second spot in the league behind Petersburg.

New Deal opened the scoring in the first period on a 2-yard touchdown run by halfback Aaron Stark, who gained 51 yards during the evening.

Then Stark, in a defensive role, picked off a Ralls pass at midfield and ran it to the Jackrabbit 5 yard line, setting up a TD by halfback Ricky Moore with two minutes left in the initial quarter.

Early in the second quarter, New Deal quarterback scored on a sneak to give the Lions a 20-0 lead.

That held up until the third quarter, when the Lions added another pair of touchdowns--the first on a 23 yard run by halfback Randy Vines, and the second on a 54-yard pass from quarterback Mark Bush to split end Robin Dunn.

New Deal's final score was by Mounty Shrophire on a 4-yard carry late in the fourth period.

The Lions' leading rushers were Vines and Howell, each with 64 yards.

The loss drops Ralls' record to 2-7 for the season and 0-5 in district play.

HOLIDAYS SET IN NOVEMBER

Abernathy First State Bank and Frontier Savings Association will be closed for a legal holiday Thursday, Nov. 11, the traditional Veterans Day.

Another holiday in November, Thanksgiving Day, will be on the 25th. Most all businesses will be closed that day. Exceptions may be in places serving farmers, depending on the stage of the cotton harvest at that time.

Abernathy First State Bank and Frontier Savings Association will observe a legal holiday Nov. 25, Thanksgiving Day. Post offices here and at New Deal will be closed that day, and there will be no city or rural mail delivery.

PLACEMENT IS SET

An Official Texas Historical Marker for Stant Rhea Stage Stand will be erected on November 14, 1976 at 3:00 p.m., it was announced by Mrs. J.W. Walker of Plainview, chairman of the Hale County Historical Commission.

The marker will be placed eight miles north of Abernathy on US Highway 87. Dedication plans will be announced in the near future.

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 27 by 42 inches and is sponsored by Hale Co. Historical Commission.

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas Historical Commission's program of preservation activities. These include archeological investigations, history museum consultation, and administering the National Historic Preservation Act in Texas. As of 1975 the Historical Commission had erected more than 7,200 official markers.

The name and location of the present marker will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers in order to simulate tourist travel in this area, to arouse interest in historical tours, and to acquaint the people of this local with their unique heritage.

The inscription on the 27 x 42-inch marker reads: THE STANT RHEA STAGE STAND (6 MILES EAST, ON PRIVATE PROPERTY) Early settlers in this area kept in touch with the world by picking up their mail at railheads. Federal mail delivery to post offices began when W.L. Tharp took a route from the new railroad town of Amarillo to Plainview and Estacado in July and August, 1888. There were no roads; the round trip took six days. About 1889, W.H. Fuqua of Amarillo, who had a new U.S. Mail contract, used a compass and laid off a route with several stations--one at Plainview. He soon added passenger service, but then disposed of the line, which about 1890 fell into the hands of Stant Rhea and (cont' on page 3, See Marker)

Survivors include two sons, Richard of Joes, Colo., and Jerry of Tucumcari, N.M.; two daughters, Mrs. Joyce Cozen and Mrs. Jim Daniel, both of Lubbock; a brother, Les of Plainview; a sister, Mrs. George Messinger of Canyon; 10 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Hale Meetings Set on Cotton Check-Off Rates

If you are a cotton producer you have a lot at stake in the up-coming referendum on proposed hikes in the cotton check-off rates, according to County Agent Ollie Limer.

Ballots will soon be cast, probably sometime in December or January. When the referendum is over and the votes are tallied, growers will have chartered the course for their commodity's research and promotion efforts.

A series of meetings has been scheduled by the Hale County Extension Cotton Subcommittee to give the pros and cons of the check-off vote.

The meeting in Hale Center will be held in the City Hall at 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday night, November 16. A meeting in Plainview is scheduled at a Dutch treat breakfast at the Congress Inn at 7:00 a.m. on Thursday, November 18th.

A Dutch Treat will be held in Abernathy on Tuesday morning, November 16, at 7:00 a.m. at James Graham's Restaurant.

MS SOCIETY'S READ-A-THON PROGRAM BEGINS

During 1975, the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, which is represented in the Abernathy area by the South Plains Chapter inaugurated a new and unique program, the MS READ-a-thon. This nationwide project was designed to serve two distinctly valuable purposes: to motivate children 6 through 14 to improve their reading skills by "reading for the need of others," and to help raise urgently needed funds for multiple sclerosis research and patient service.

Although the format of MS READ-a-thon does vary slightly from chapter to chapter, the basic formula is always the same: each youngster signs up through his or her local library or school, then receives a registration card and READ-a-thon kit. He or she then signs up as many "sponsors" as possible. Sponsors may be parents, relatives, neighbors or friends, and each agrees to pledge a certain amount of money for each book read by the "Mystery Sleuth," as each young volunteer in the READ-a-thon program is called. Thus, a child who finds ten sponsors, each pledging 10 cents, and then reads ten books during the READ-a-thon period, will have raised a total of ten dollars for MS. He or she will also have an extremely enriching experience.

Would the program work? Would young children be willing and able to respond to this call to undertake the solitary act of reading, and in so doing to fulfill their obligations to their "sponsors?" Would participation lead these children to a permanent interest in reading.

As the results of READ-a-thons held by local MS chapters began to come in from across the country, any doubts among educators, teachers, and even parents were soon convinced of the

Robert Montgomery, Buying out Montgomery, Rhea carried the mail for 19 years. Sidney Stanton--"Stan"--Rhea (1862-1922) was a small, red-haired man who drove wild Spanish mules hitched to a buckboard (or carriage). He made the 240-mile round trip from Amarillo to this area three times a week. With later route changes and better roads, he came this way daily. Six miles east of his spot he

had a mule corral and a jugout. Stage passengers and mail patrons used the dugout as a waiting room. Until railroads outmoded his service, Stant Rhea's Route and Stage Stand were important in the development of the South Plains. (1976)

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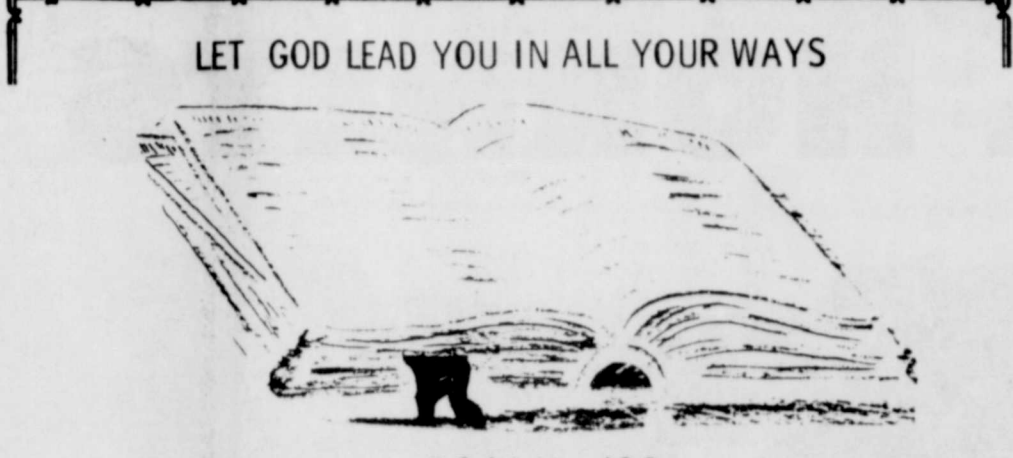

It's our prayer that her dear family will always be comforted with God's grace and precious memories.



ORDINANCE 219

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY AMENDING CHAPTER 14, ARTICLE 4, SECTION 14-60 OF THE ABERNATHY CITY CODE, 1974; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SEPARABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Abernathy Texas.

EXTENSION OF SEWER FACILITIES

The purpose of the project will be to provide approximately 350 residences with sanitary sewer service. The project will be located in the eastern portion of the City of Abernathy, Hale-Lubbock Counties, Texas at an estimated cost of \$100,000.

The City of Abernathy will undertake the project with Block Grant funds from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Abernathy is certifying to HUD that the City of Abernathy and Pete Thompson, in his official capacity as Mayor, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Abernathy may use the Block Grant funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases:

(a) That the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officers approved by HUD; or (b) that the City's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58), and may be addressed to HUD at U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Dallas Area Office, Region VI, 2001 Bryan Tower, Dallas, Texas 75201. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after December 8, 1976 will be considered by HUD.
