



COMMITTEE TO EVALUATE TEXAS MEDICAID PROGRAM

W. Marvin Watson, former Postmaster General and Special Assistant to President Lyndon B. Johnson, will head a state-wide task force to evaluate the Medicaid program in Texas.

Watson, who lives in DeLingerfield, will be chairman of the study group that will include representatives of the medical community, business and industry, education, the clergy, and government. Governor Dolph Briscoe, a strong advocate of the study, has named his wife, Janey, as a working member of the committee. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Bill Clayton will each have a representative on the group.

The study group, officially termed the Task Force for the Evaluation of Medicaid in Texas, was created at the request of the State Board of Public Welfare.

Jamie Clements of Temple, chairman of the Welfare Board, said that a dilemma of grave proportions exists within Medicaid, in that health care costs, like other costs, have more than doubled since 1974. He said the task force will study the program and make recommendations to the Welfare Board as to whether the program can continue to operate at the present elevated cost levels and also remain within the constraints of recently lowered federal financial participation and apparent legislative intent to hold the line on state expenditures.

The Medicaid program makes the Texas State Department of Public Welfare the largest provider of health services in the state. The Department has budgeted \$734 million for medical services for the current fiscal year. The program is funded under a federal-state arrangement.

There are 680,000 Texans eligible for the Medicaid program. They represent the state's aged, blind, and disabled who are needy and low-income, and some are children who are without the support of one parent for whatever reason, and who live under a pre-determined level of income.

Watson, the chairman of the task force, was Johnson's Postmaster General in 1968-69. He is a former petroleum company executive and a graduate of Baylor University where he later taught.

He is a director of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Assn., and a member of the development councils of both Baylor University and Hardin-Simmons University. He is a member of the advisory council of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and chairman of its program to raise \$8 million in development funds by 1980.

Watson is a trustee of Scott and White Memorial Hospital and its Scott, Sherwood and Brindley Foundation. He formerly was executive assistant to the chairman and president of Lone Star Steel.

Born in San Jacinto County, Texas, and a graduate of Huntville public schools, Watson was granted the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Quacchita University at Arkadelphia, Ark. in 1968, and an honorary law degree in 1972 from Hardin-Simmons.

He is a Baptist deacon and Sunday School teacher. He served in the U. S. Marines from 1943 to 1946.

Clements said the first meeting of the task force will be held on January 13-14 in Austin.

SW/PS Improvement Investment Slated

Southwestern Public Service Company will invest more than \$500-million during the next five years in new equipment and improvements, Berl Springer, president and chief operating officer of the electric company, announced today.

Expenditures for 1977 will be about \$84.5-million, while the projected expenditures for the other four years range from \$84.5-million to \$116.5-million, the latter expenditure scheduled for 1981. The new equipment and improvements are necessary so that SPS can continue providing electric service for the 45,000-square mile area it serves.

"During the five-year period, Southwestern will be required to borrow about \$300-million to meet these construction expenditures," Springer said.

Two additional generating facilities to be installed during this period will increase the SPS system capability by more than 700,000 kilowatts, bringing the total capability to almost three and one-half million kilowatts.

Harrington Station, northeast of Amarillo, will be the site for the two new generating units. Construction has just started on Harrington #2 and it is scheduled to go on the line in 1978. Harrington #3 is scheduled for completion in 1980. Both generators will have a capability of 350,000 kilowatts and will use coal as their primary fuel.

"During the latter part of the five-year period, substantial expenditures will be made on a fourth unit, in the 550,000 kilowatt range, presently planned for completion in 1982. This unit will also use a coal-fired boiler," Springer said.

Southwestern has been using low-sulphur coal from Wyoming at its Harrington Station for about five months. Approximately 11,000 tons are delivered twice a week

by a 110-car unit train. The Harrington units each use about 1-million tons per year.

Southwestern Public Service Company, through its fuel subsidiary, TUCO INC., is continuing its aggressive program to assure adequate fuel supplies. "The Company's traditional supplies of natural gas have been successful in acquiring additional reserves and, at the present time, indicate they have adequate supplies to meet their delivery needs," Springer said.

"The introduction of coal as a fuel to this area should act as a stabilizing factor for the cost of electric service, and we do not contemplate asking the regulatory authorities in our service area for an increase in electric rates during fiscal 1977."

Transmission lines and transmission substations scheduled for completion during the five-year period represent an investment of about \$75-million with more than \$10-million being invested in 1977.

The construction of distribution lines and substations during this same period will require an expenditure of almost \$20-million.

Southwestern Public Service Company has offered \$100-million plus a plant site for the nation's first gas-cooled fast breeder reactor. Roy Tolk, SPS board chairman and chief executive officer was recently elected a director of the newly-formed Helium Breeder Associations, Inc. (HBA).

The purpose of HBA is to be the coordinating force in support of the GCFR design and development work aimed at the construction and operation in the late 1980s of a 300,000 kilowatt power plant demonstrating the gas-cooled concept.

Registration For Vehicles Feb. 1

AUSTIN--Texans will begin registering their motor vehicles for fiscal 1977 February 1. Registration renewal notices will be in the mail soon.

Some vehicle registration renewal notices will arrive a little later this year. Usually they are mailed immediately after Christmas to facilitate postal distribution. However, this year, inmates at the State Department of Corrections prison facilities at Huntsville are sorting by zip code of the approximately 10 million renewal notices.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will save approximately \$50,000 in postage discounts for performing this service, which is contracted by the prison system.

The 1977 stickers will have a solid red background with white year figures and state name. The sticker serial number will be printed in blue in the upper right-hand corner. Fiscal 1976 stickers had a blue background, white figures and red serial numbers in furtherance of the Bicentennial theme which will be continued in 1977.

Robert W. (Bob) Townsley, director of DHT's Motor Vehicle Division, said he anticipates less motorist confusion in affixing 1977. Beginning in 1978 the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will initiate a year-round licensing system with some registration expiring each month thereafter. This will mark demise of the half-century-old, 60-day registration periods and one-date deadlines for acquiring and affixing new stickers without penalty.

WINTER VACATION? REMEMBER 16 RULES

We hope all of you get a chance to get away for a winter vacation and relax a little. Unfortunately, if we come home and find our house burglarized, our vacation can be quickly ruined. How about a few tips to prevent this from happening? You probably have thought of most of them, but maybe something new will appear. Keep this as a checklist of things to do before you leave home.

1. Insure all windows and doors are locked. Have someone else in the family doublecheck.
2. Cancel all newspapers and deliveries.
3. Have a close friend, neighbor or relative collect mail, cut grass and keep the yard neat.
4. Leave some drapes and curtains partially open or open to make the house looked lived in. These can be changed frequently by a relative or friend.
5. Notify the police that you will be gone, when you are leaving and when you expect to return. What lights will be on, what cars around, and if anyone will be mowing grass, going inside, and about how often.
6. Keep some lights on, electric timers that turn lights on and off are of great value.
7. Have a neighbor park their car in your drive occasionally, to make it appear someone is home.
8. Have a neighbor report

any strange people or events around your home.

9. You may have a friend or relative turn on a radio or television for a couple of hours every once in a while.

10. Don't do things that aren't normal, for instance a television on at four in the morning or a bedroom light that comes on at three in the morning, unless this is normal.

11. Don't advertise your absence by newspaper or radio or talk about your planned absence in public.

12. You may want to secure valuables in a safety deposit box, with a friend or relative or other secure place.

13. Caution your children about telling their friends and others of your absence.

14. Participate in operation identification.

15. Leave if possible an emergency number or place where you can be contacted in case of fire or a break in occurs, time will not be lost.

16. Never leave keys to the house hidden under mats, flowerpots, in mailboxes or other places. A professional burglar will find it.

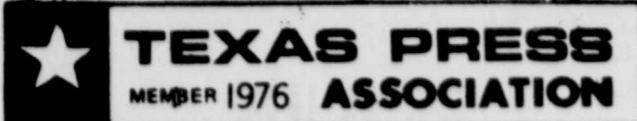

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

COCONUT CAKE

1 cup butter
5 egg yolks, beaten
1 1/2 cups flour
3 egg whites, beaten
2 cups sugar
1 cup milk
2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon lemon extract

FILLING
Place 1 1/2 cups milk and 3/4 box coconut on stove and heat slowly. When it boils, stir into 1/2 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons corn starch. Stir until thick, remove from heat and stir in beaten egg whites and a few drops lemon extract. Stack while hot. Sprinkle the rest of the box of coconut on the cake.

LEMON CHESS PIE

2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon flour
1 tablespoon corn meal
4 eggs, beaten
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup milk
4 tablespoons grated lemon rind
1/4 cup lemon juice

Mix together sugar, flour, and meal add other ingredients. Beat until smooth. Bake in a raw crust at 350 degrees until bubbles.

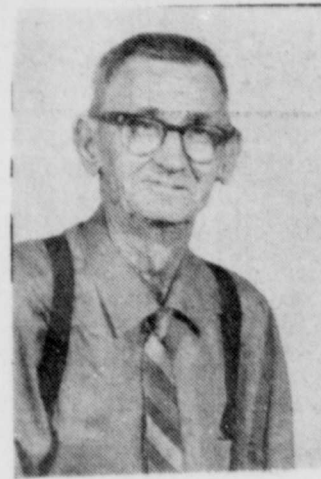

Mahon warns cotton industry of OSHA

WASHINGTON, D.C. — U.S. Rep. George Mahon of Lubbock warned cotton officials Monday that the industry is threatened with the promulgation of cotton dust standards by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) which could drastically affect the ginning and processing of cotton.

The proposed standards, covering cotton gins, cottonseed oil mills and textile plants, will be published today in the Federal Register.

Mahon met with OSHA and industry officials last week in an effort to convince government officials that the submission of the proposed standards should be delayed.

Representatives of cotton ginning, cottonseed oil and textile industries joined Mahon in the plea for a delay, but agency officials refused to postpone publication of the cotton dust standards proposals, which would limit the amount of dust which would

be acceptable in cotton gins, oil mills and textile plants.

Hearings on the proposed standards will be held by OSHA beginning on April 4, 1977, and Mahon urged cotton industry officials to make sure that all pertinent information is submitted.

He pointed out that, while the health of employees in the cotton industry is of vital concern, excessive regulation by OSHA could tend to destroy the cotton ginning, processing and textile industries, by requiring the expenditure of vast additional sums of money to comply with the standards.

SOCIAL SECURITY Questions and Answers

Q. What immediate changes are forthcoming in social security?

A. Some changes affecting those already entitled have recently been announced. These changes which will be effective on January 1, 1977 are: the yearly total amount a beneficiary can earn without losing any benefits will be \$3,000; the monthly earnings limit will then be \$250; and the Medicare hospital deductible increases to \$124. One change affects those still working. The maximum earnings on which a worker pays the social security contribution, F.I.C.A. tax, will be \$16,500 for 1977.
