Tax Forms Due From Farmers

Farmers who have not filed their 1976 declaration of estimated Federal income tax must file and pay that tax by Monday, January 17. The sole exception to this rule is if they file their income tax return and pay the total tax due by March 1, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

Farmers are defined as those persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1976 gross income from farming.

IRS Publications 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and are available free at local IRS offices.

IRS DATES TO REMEMBER

FINAL TAX PAYMENT DUE FOR SOME, IRS SAYS
Many people who do not have enough taxes withheld are required to pay their final installment of 1976 estimated Federal income tax no later than Monday, January 17. Also are the same day are amended estimates from those whose 1976 income changed substantially during the last quarter.

Many taxpayers first met the requirements for filing a declaration during the last three months of 1976, according to the Internal Revenue Service. Taxpayers are generally required to file an estimate if they owe the IRS more than \$100 not covered by withholding. The estimates in this case are due January 17.

There is one exception to this rule, the IRS said, and that's when taxpayers file their returns and pay all taxes due by January 31. In that case the final 1976 installment is not required, the amended declaration is not required nor is an original January 17 declaration required.

IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provides additional information and may be obtained free from Lubbock IRS offices.

ENROLLMENT IN LOCAL SCHOOLS ON INCREASE

On January 3, 1977, the Abernathy Board of Education met in regular session. The improvement of custodial services was discussed and several recommendations are being considered. Building principals, Curtis Davenport, Gid Adkisson, and Frank Bartlett, met with the Board to report on these services. The general consensus is that better custodial work can be accomplished in the afternoon and evening hours rather than during the traditional school hours as has been done in the past.

The board will accept bids on Fire and Extended Coverage Insurance on May 1st on the physical facilities of the Abernathy Public Schools. Present insurance covers \$2,741,000 worth of buildings. The insurance policy for the school buildings is written so that 80% of the replacement costs must be insured.

The enrollment report revealed another increase for the month of December with a total of 1174 students enrolled as compared with 1163 on the last school day of November. Elementary school has an enrollment of

Feb. 2 Meeting For Mail Users, Postal Service

The Commission on Postal Service today announced plans to hold a public hearing in Oklahoma City in order to hear comments from mail users and recipients.

The hearing will be held on February 2 and will be one of a series of hearings held by the Commission in 18 cities across the country. Site of the Oklahoma City hearing will be in the Federal Court Room, Fifth Floor, Federal Building, 200 N. W. 4.

The Commission on Postal Service was established by Congress this fall to study postal problems and report to Congress and the President with recommendations by March 15, 1977. The legislation establishing the Commission directed it to look into five specific areas: rates and rate making, Federal subsidies, current and future levels of service, future costs and revenues, and electronic mail.

Persons wishing to testify at the Oklahoma City hearing should notify the Commission as soon as possible at the following address: Commission on Postal Service, 1750 K Street, N.W., Suite 801, Washington, DC 20006

Individuals testifying for themselves are to bring three copies of their testimony with them to the hearing.

Organizations and businesses will be required to file 15 advance copies of their testimony at least 10 days before the hearing. Those copies should be mailed to the above address.

Hale ranks fourth in state production

Hale County crop and livestock income for 1975 topped \$119.3 million, ranking the county fourth in the state in farm income for the second straight year.

Yet the total for Hale represented a decline of almost \$5 million from the 1974 production year with livestock production off by \$3.1 million, government payments off by \$1.8 million and crop production showing an increase of only \$28,000.

The figures, the latest available, are from the 246-page publication, 1975 Texas County Statistics, issued jointly by the Texas Department of Agriculture and the United States Department of Agriculture statistical reporting service.

AGRICULTURAL INCOME, including government payments for counties in the immediate area compared with a year earlier are listed by the latest study:

—Hale: 1975, \$114.3 million; 1974, \$119.3 million.
—Lamb: 1975, \$102.9 million; 1974, \$86.4 million.
—Lubbock: 1975, \$91.6 million; 1974, \$96.7 million.
—Swisher: 1975, \$84 million; 1974, \$88 million.

The top ten counties in Texas on the basis of total agricultural income are (1)

Deaf Smith, \$181.9 million; (2) Hidalgo, \$176.7 million; (3) Parmer, \$149.9; (4) Hale; \$114.3; (5) Lamb, \$102.9; (6) Lubbock, \$91.6; (7) Wharton, \$88.4; (8) Swisher, \$84.0; (9) Hansford, \$78.6; and (10) Gonzales, \$78.1 million. Seven of the top ten counties are in the Texas Panhandle-Plains region.

The second ten includes: (11) Sherman, \$71.2 million; (12) Floyd, \$65.1; (13) Hopkins, \$65.0; (14) Gaines, \$56.6; (15) Nacogdoches, \$56.1; (16) Hartley, \$55.9; (17) Randall, \$52.7; (18) Shelby, \$52.1; (19) Moore, \$52.0 and (20) Bailey, \$50.5 million. Five are in the Panhandle-Plains area.

THE STATISTICAL breakdown for Hale County in cash receipts for 1975 from marketing include: all crops, \$82.0 million, up \$28,000 from 1974; all livestock, \$29.9 million, down from \$33.0 million in 1974; total crops and livestock, \$112.0 million, down from \$115.1 million in 1974; and government payments, \$2.3 million, down from \$4.2 million in 1974.

There were 80,100 bales of cotton produced from 139,000 harvested acres in the county; 2.5 million bushels of wheat from 74,000 harvested acres; 12,600 bushels of barley from 250 harvested acres and 13,900 bushels of rye on 500 harvested acres.

Grain sorghums produced 17 million bushels on 187,900 harvested acres with 3.8 million bushels of corn produced on 29,900 harvested acres. Soybeans were harvested on 43,000 acres, producing 1.3 million bushels. Over 60 million pounds of sunflowers were harvested from 53,500 acres.

AUSTIN—The Texas constitution requires that the Legislature shall convene every other year at the Capitol in Austin. That date is the second Tuesday in January.

4,000 measures will be introduced.

Some of these proposals will fall by the wayside before reaching the voting stage. However, many others will wind through the legislative process and the elected lawmakers must then make the decisions as to the benefit of a particular item for the state and for his or her individual district.

The House will begin the 65th session with 112 of the same members as the 64th session. There are 36 members who will be with us for the first time and two former members who are returning after being re-elected.

I know there is going to be a heavy workload, but it is evident that the caliber of representatives coming to Austin is very high and I expect a hard-working session.

These men and women are coming to the Legislature to carry out the instructions of the people who elected them. I firmly believe that if the will of the people is carried out in our deliberations that the resulting laws will be the laws of the people.

Also, those attending conventions and paying their own expenses must, if they deduct them, include along with their income tax returns report of the total number of days of the trip, number of hours each day devoted to business-related activities, in a program of the activities and a statement signed by an officer of the sponsoring organization attesting to the attendance at the business sessions. These same rules apply to the employer or corporation who reimburses the employee and wants to claim a tax deduction. For authoritative information, we suggest that you check with your tax consultant.

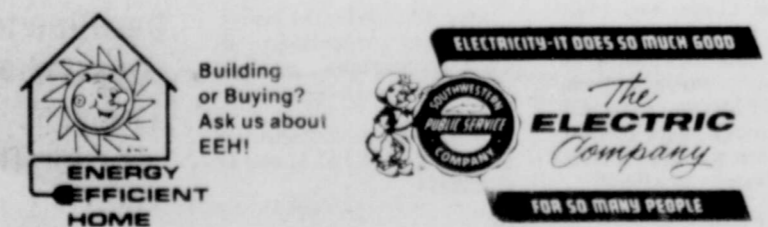

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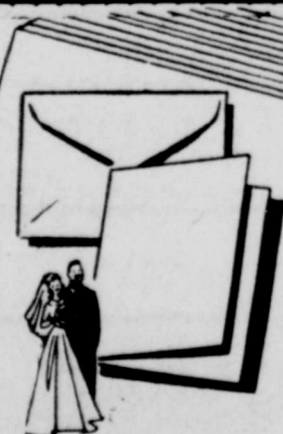

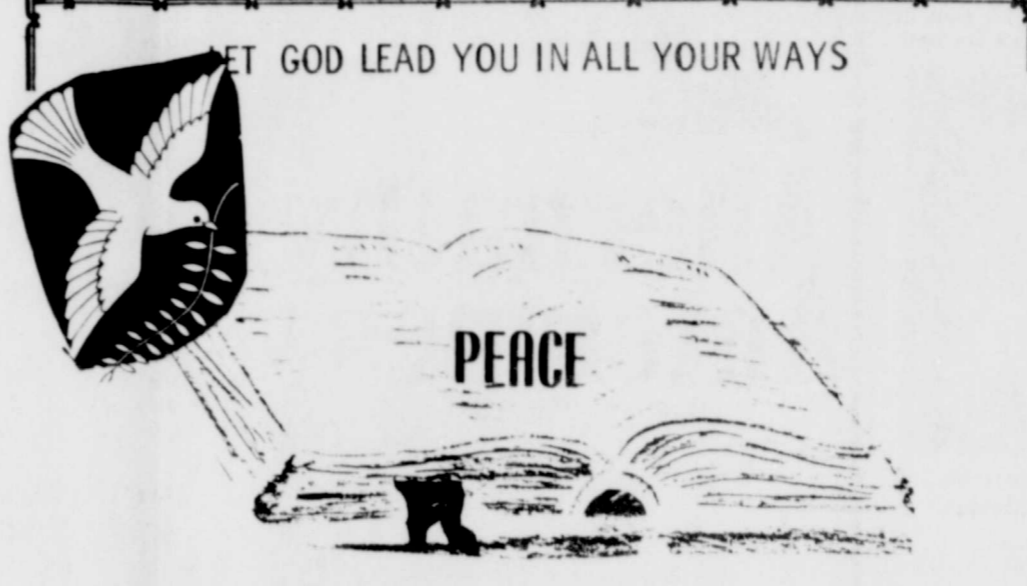

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

(Recipes Provided by Faye Ann Nelson)

Pea Salad
1 can drained peas
1 chopped green pepper
1 small can chopped pimentos
1/4 lb. shredded cheese long horn (as much as desired)
2 shredded carrots
Mix with mayonnaise, seasoned salt, pepper, dash garlic powder.

Crescents
4 c. flour
1 t. salt
1 cake of yeast dry crumbled into flour
1 1/2 c. butter or oleo chopped into flour
4 egg yolks beaten and combined with 1 c. sour cream and 1 t. vanilla and mixed into flour mixture mix well and divide into five parts put five balls of dough into refrigerator for one hour
Fillings
3 egg whites
1 c. sugar
1 c. ground nut meats
Roll dough using powdered sugar instead of flour about 1/4 in. thick or a bit thicker. Cut into long 12" shaped wedges spread filling on and roll up. Bake at 375 degrees until brown then frost while still warm with powdered sugar frosting, flavor desired.

Tell Your Neighbor Cake
1 pkg. Swans Down cake mix any flavor desired
1 pkg. Jello instant pudding
1 c. cold water
4 eggs
Combine ingredients in large bowl blend at low speed in electric beater just to moisten then beat 8 minutes at medium speed.
Line tube pan (spray) pour in batter, bake at 350 degrees 50 to 60 minutes.

SWEET AND SOUR MEATBALLS
2 pounds ground veal
2 tbs. dried onion flakes, reconstituted in 1/4 cup water and drained
1 tbs. parsley, chopped
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. salt
Sauce
Combine all ingredients and mix well. Form into 1-ounce meatballs. In a heated non-stick skillet, evenly brown meatballs on all sides. Continue cooking 5 to 7 minutes, until meat is cooked. Add to sauce; simmer 5 minutes. Serve immediately. Serves 4.
SAUCE: 1 cup vegetable juice, 1/2 cup tomato puree, 1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce, 1/4 cup red wine vinegar, 2 tsp. brown sugar replacement, 5 cloves, 1 bay leaf. In medium-size saucepan, combine all ingredients. Simmer 10 minutes and add meatballs. Remove cloves and bay leaf.

Jello Cake
1 box yellow cake mix
2/3 c. oil (Wesson)
4 eggs unbeaten
1 t. lemon extract
1 pkg. lemon jello
1 c. hot water
Prepare jello in 1 cup hot water stir well and cool put cake mix in large bowl and add oil and 4 eggs one at a time then the lemon extract then the jello beat just enough to blend ingredients. Grease 2 9" cake pans. Bake 375 degrees for 40 minutes. Frost with Lemon Cream Cheese Frosting.
Lemon Cream Cheese Frosting
2-3 ounce pkgs. cream cheese or 6 oz. pkg.
6 T. milk
4 3/4--5 cups sifted confectioners sugar
1 t. lemon extract
Blend cheese and milk add sugar slowly then extract and blend until smooth with electric beater spread on top and sides of two 9" pans.

The Mae Murfee School Faculty of Lubbock hosted a "Pounding" for the couple at which pounds of food and canned goods were received.

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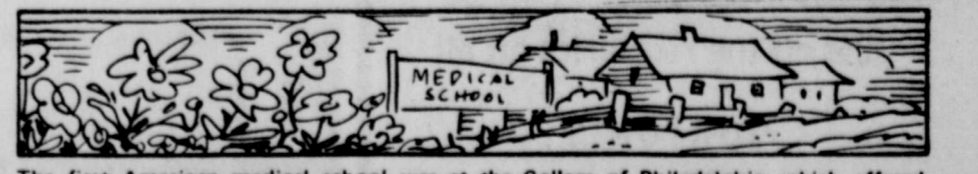
