AUSTIN: Larry M. Fields, City Manager of Abernathy, Texas has completed a three-day special seminar (January 11-13) for local officials in Texas Civil Preparedness at Disaster Emergency Services in Austin, Texas. He was one of approximately thirty officials from around the state participating.

The course dealt with responsibilities and actions the attending officials must know in order to benefit local communities under emergency disaster conditions. Such conditions--it was stressed--could range from hurricanes, floods, and tornadoes to butane explosions and nuclear attacks.

The seminar--one of several each year--was conducted by members of the staff of the Governor's Division of Disaster Emergency Services. The seminars are scheduled each year in an underground fallout shelter which serves as a round-the-clock Emergency Operating Center at the Texas Department of Public Safety Headquarters.

IRS Tax Date For Employers

Employers must report Social Security and withheld income taxes for the last quarter by Monday, January 31, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks of the full amount of tax due. They are allowed until February 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

The IRS emphasized that employers who received the pre-addressed Form 941 in the mail should use it to file their report. Those persons who did not receive the pre-addressed forms can obtain forms from their local IRS office in Lubbock.

Any balance of Federal unemployment tax not over \$100 for 1976 should be paid by January 31, using Form 940. Balances of tax due over \$100 require the employer to make a deposit with FTD Form 508. As with Form 941, taxpayers who deposit the full amount of tax on time have until February 10 to file the return.

IRS Publication 15, "Circular E--Employer's Tax Guide," provides further information on these taxes and is available free from most local IRS offices.

COMMUNITY SETS BLOOD DRIVE JAN. 25

There will be an Abernathy community Blood Drive Tuesday, Jan. 25, from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. at Abernathy fire station on the north side of the city square. The project is in cooperation with Blood Systems, Inc. Those donating blood during the Jan. 25th drive may designate that it be credited to the blood used to transfuse Wayne Crabtree, area man who is in a Houston hospital. He requires numerous blood transfusions.

Blood Systems, Inc., is an organization of not-for-profit, self-supporting community blood centers. Headquarters and administrative offices are in Scottsdale, Arizona. It began as the Salt River Valley Blood Bank in Phoenix in 1943 under the sponsorship of the Maricopa County Medical Society. As the system developed and the services area grew, its name became Southwest Blood Banks, Inc. When the geographic title was outgrown, the present title of Blood Systems, Inc., was adopted.

Service Area and Responsibility. Blood Systems operates community blood centers which serve more than 800 hospitals from California to Alabama and from the Canadian to the Mexican borders. These Blood Systems facilities provide the more than 325,000 transfusion units each year. This represents the responsibility for the blood requirements for some 14 million people.

Licensing and Accreditation. Each Blood Systems facility is licensed by the U. S. Public Health Service (License No. 183), and by state or local authority where required. Participation in Federal or state inspection and licensing programs is augmented by a rigid program of self-inspection and quality control.

Economic Philosophy. Blood Systems is classified by the Internal Revenue Service as a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization (contributions are tax-deductible), and is self-supporting. Believing that those who use its services, rather than the public at large, should meet the cost of providing them, income is derived from service charges to patients. No subsidies are sought from fund-raising appeals, community funds, or taxes.

The guiding philosophy of Blood Systems has been to provide the best possible service at the most economical rate to the patient and its service fees have continuously been below the national average. The unit credit system, which puts a price tag on blood itself, has been phased out so the charge for a transfusion unit represents only the cost of collecting, processing, storing and distributing.

CROSSWALK GUARDS NOW ON DUTY AT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ENTRANCE

As of Monday morning, January 17, the elementary school will have crosswalk guards on duty morning and evening. 20 mile per hour traffic signs have been placed on all roads adjacent to school property. These safety measures have been taken in the interest of our school children, and it is hoped all citizens will abide by the traffic rules.

Any persons parked in unauthorized zones will be asked to move and if the driver refuses to move the car, their license numbers will be taken by the guards and they will be issued citations.

Vehicles are not supposed to park between the yellow lines directly in front of the entrance to elementary

school. The driver should stop his car on either side of the yellow lines and a crosswalk guard will escort your child across the street. Please cooperate with these young men in their efforts to avoid an accident at school.

Age--Between 18 and 65 years, 17 with written parental permission (Minor Donor Permits are available from South Plains Blood Service).

Weight--At least 110 pounds.

No current health problems.

Cannot have had major surgery within past six months.

Cannot have had tooth extraction within past 72 hours.

Cannot be pregnant now or in past six months.

Cannot have had Malaria in past three years.

Cannot have received blood in past six months.

Cannot have had allergy injections within past 72 hours.

Cannot have had tattoo, skin graft, ear pierced or acupuncture in past six months.

Cannot currently be taking antibiotics or blood pressure medication.

Cannot have had Viral hepatitis or "yellow jaundice," Diabetes (requiring insulin or oral drug therapy), Surgery for cancer, other than skin cancer, Heart Disease.

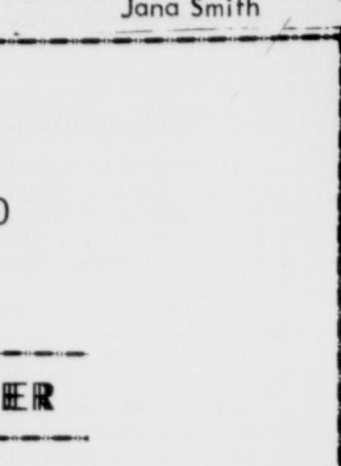


Eleven AHS Band Students Receive

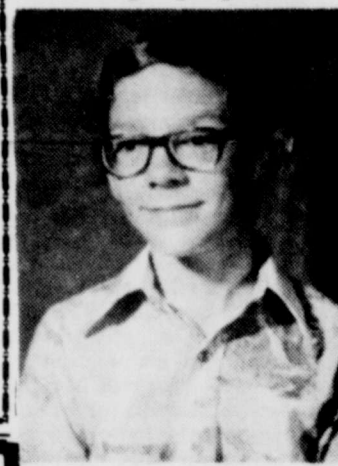

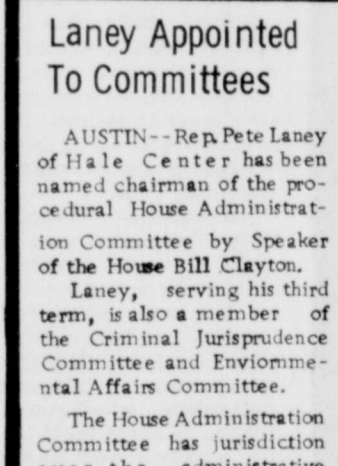

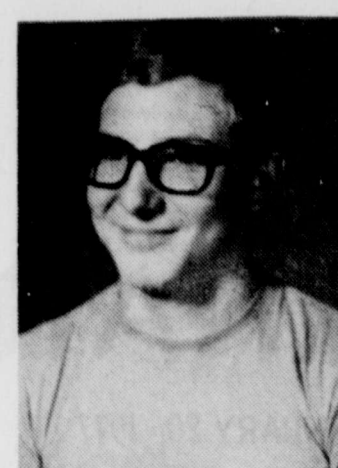

Wheat Acreage Reduction Due to Sluggish Markets

AUSTIN--After experiencing slow markets and lowered prices in 1976, wheat farmers in Texas have planted five per cent fewer acres for the 1977 harvest, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has reported. Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service estimates that 6,150,000 acres have been seeded for the winter crop. Based on December 1 conditions, statewide production is expected to total 98,400,000 bushels, down from the 102,400,000

bushels of 1976. Reductions in acreage are virtually statewide with some 50 per cent reductions reported in both South Texas and the Coastal Bend. One exception is the Edwards Plateau where 10,000 more acres have been seeded than last year. Nationally, winter wheat seeding has also decreased by three per cent from a year ago. Total U.S. production is being forecast at 1,328 million bushels, eight per cent below the 1976 crop.

Historic Data Printed

AUSTIN--A picture of the growth and development of the crops industry in Texas is presented in the recently issued publication, Texas Historic Crops Statistics 1866-1975. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

"The publication provides data back to the earliest year for which estimates were made, with many statistics going back more than 100 years for a multitude of Texas crops," White explained.

Laney Appointed To Committees

AUSTIN--Rep. Pete Laney of Hale Center has been named chairman of the procedural House Administration Committee by Speaker of the House Bill Clayton.

Laney, serving his third term, is also a member of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee and Environmental Affairs Committee.

The House Administration Committee has jurisdiction over the administrative operation of the House and the General House fund.

Clayton said, "Pete Laney was our Administration chairman during the last session. Because of his efforts in putting the House of Representatives on a business footing we have saved the taxpayers of this state more than \$500,000 each of the last two years. I expect with Pete Laney as chairman of Administration we will see even greater strides in the next two years."

He is one of 11 members of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee who will consider all matters concerning prohibitions, standards, and penalties under criminal law. The committee will also consider all matters relating to criminal procedure in the Texas courts, proposals for revision of the Penal Code of Texas and legislation pertaining to the Board of Pardons and Paroles.

He is one of 13 members of the Environmental Affairs Committee which will consider all matters pertaining to air and water pollution, state parks, preservation of wildlife, hunting, fishing and the regulation of Texas fish and oyster industries.

NGC--"Constant adherence to the same principles, course, etc." says the dictionary in giving the meaning of the word "consistency." 1 medium apple, peeled & diced
1/4 cup celery, chopped
4 radishes, sliced
1 tbs. chopped pimento
1/2 tbs. chives
2 1/2 cups orange-flavored dietetic soda
2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
Fresh parsley
Combine carrots, apple, celery, radishes, pimentos and chives. Pour mixture into a 2 quart mold. Pour 1 cup of soda into sauce pan. Sprinkle gelatin over liquid to soften. Place over low heat and stir to dissolve. Add remaining soda and stir to combine. Pour over mixture in mold. Refrigerate until firm. Unmold on serving platter and garnish with parsley. Serves 4.

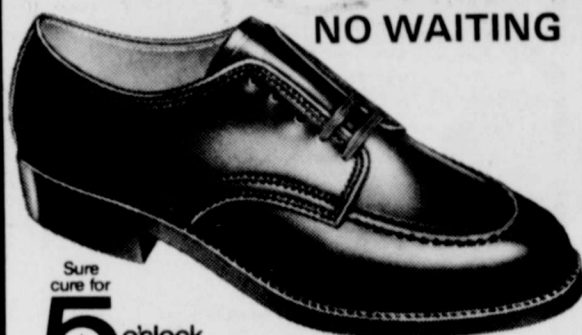

Fertility Day set for county

The Thirtieth Annual Hale County Soil Fertility Meeting will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 25 at the Hale County Agriculture Center beginning at 10:00 a.m.

Ollie Laner, county agent and general chairman of the program, said there would be nine different speakers discussing subjects that will be of interest to all farmers and businessmen.

At 10:00 a.m., Dr. Roland D. Smith, grain marketing specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, will speak on marketing outlook.

A REPORT FROM the Texas Corn Growers Association will be presented by their president, Carl King of Dimmitt.

Marvin Sartin, area economist-management, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Lubbock, will discuss corn vs. grain sorghum.

Other talks on corn will be presented by George Sides, Castro County corn farmer at Dimmitt telling how he dries corn on his farm and Billy Clark, general manager, Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc., at Dimmitt, telling how they receive corn and dry it at the elevator.

DR. ROBERT W. BERRY, area plant pathologist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Lubbock, will speak on smut on corn and grain sorghum.

Telling of the work done with tensimeters in irrigation will

be James Esty, county extension agent-agronomy.

Discussing new varieties and cultural practices in cotton (skip-row vs. solid) will be Dr. James Supak, area agronomist-cotton, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Lubbock.

The last speaker of the day will be Leon New, area agricultural engineer-irrigation, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Lubbock. He will be speaking on pivot irrigation.

The Plainview Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development will serve lunch at noon for those present.

The program is sponsored by the Hale County Extension Service with the Chamber of Commerce cooperating.

SOUTH PLAINS HEALTH SYSTEMS, INC. SCHEDULES MEETING FOR JANUARY 31

As the population of the United States has grown older, wealthier, better educated and more concerned about providing for the poor, demands for better health care have increased to an almost alarming and overwhelming extent.

It is estimated that the American wage earner spends ten per cent of his annual income for health care. National expenditures have increased nine fold in the past thirty or thirty-five years to pay for the highest quality and most sophisticated care available anywhere in the world. Yes, as quality and quantity of health care has risen, so too, has the cost. Some economists contend that expenditures in this field cannot continue to grow at such an alarming rate without seriously disrupting the nation's economy.

Physicians, hospital administrators, health insurers, local, state and national governments have been working to improve health care. Because there has been

no concerted effort to coordinate the programs of health care providers, health services are not always delivered in the most efficient and economical way possible. Nor have these efforts and escalating expenditures resulted in adequate care for all segments of the population.

In enacting the National Health Planning and Resources and Development Act (Public Law 93-641) of 1974, congress expressed its recognition of the need for system-wide planning for health care delivery in the United States. Congress, at that time, also expressed the principle that planning should be done by organizations which more nearly represent and incorporate the interest of local consumers and the providers of health care.

In 1976, the secretary of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare designated a network of approximately 204 federally funded health system agencies across the nation to

carry out the intent of the 1974 legislation and to bring health care planning down to a regional and local basis. To implement the legislation, there has been established in Texas a system of twelve agencies, designated to represent a new organizational approach for regional planning and development. Most of these agencies, including the South Plains Health Systems, Inc., are non-profit private corporations.

South Plains Health Systems, Inc. covers a 15-county area including Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Dickens, King, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, and Garza. Approximately 342,500 people living in these counties are being served by the agency. The board of directors is made up of citizens from each county in the designated system. Mrs. Ruth Adams and Mr. Arno Struve of Abernathy serve as a members of that board. Mrs. Adams represents Hale County and Mr. Struve, Lubbock County.

During a recent interview, they brought The Weekly Review up to date on what

the agency is planning for Hale County. They told our reporter that on Monday Jan. 17 at the Plainview High School Cafeteria, South Plains Health Systems, Inc. will hold a public meeting so that citizens right here in Hale County can have an opportunity to identify priority health needs and from the information gathered during the meeting here and through 14 other such meetings in the region, South Plains Health Systems, Inc. will collect and analyze data to be programmed into a regionally coordinated plan to improve access to good health care of the South Plains. Citizens of Abernathy who live in Lubbock County may attend the Lubbock meeting on Jan. 31st at the George Mahon Public Library at 7:30 p.m.

Such plan will, hopefully, help the providers of health care lower costs, increase their accessibility, and coordinate services. The idea of regional planning is a good one. This publication hopes that when the "Speak Up" meetings are held by the South Plains Health Systems, Inc. that we will have a good representative turn-out by Abernathy

citizens. We here in our own area can best determine what our needs are in our health care field, and we are finally getting a chance to do so. If you can't attend the "Speak Up" meeting, get in touch with Mrs. Adams or Mr. Struve and let them know your community's problems. South Plains Health Systems, Inc. is open to your suggestions and ideas.

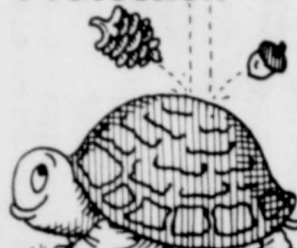

One day Jesus and Satan came face to face. For forty days and forty nights Jesus ate nothing and became very tired. Then Satan tempted Him.

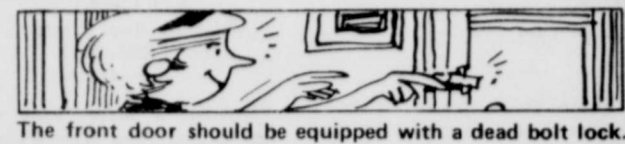
With every attack Jesus

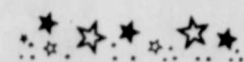

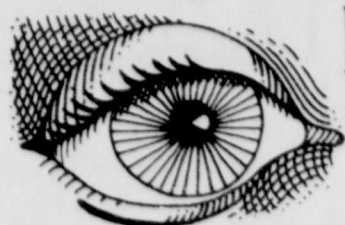

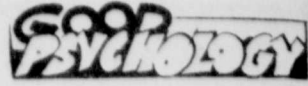
