Texas Boy's Ranch at Lubbock was started in 1975 and now has 2 cottages, a recrea-tion building, a three bedroom home, as well as various pens and sheds for the livestock. Plans are for a total of ten cottages with room for ten boys

At present three house parents couples live on the ranch which is located just a few miles from the Lubbock city limits. Boys come to the ranch by referrals from various agencies and individuals. The ranch tries to work with families rather than just boys.

The boys are taught to respect parents, accept responsibility, and what a stable christian home is. At the ranch all the boys

have responsibilities to drive tractors, work with carpentry tools, work with live-stock, FFA projects, work in the garden, or work on the rodeo arena which the boys are building themselves. Many household chores are performed by outside help in order for the house parents to have time to be with the boys. This relationship is the primary goal of Texas




