WESLEY AND EDITH HARRIS HONORED WITH RECEPTION HERE SUNDAY NIGHT

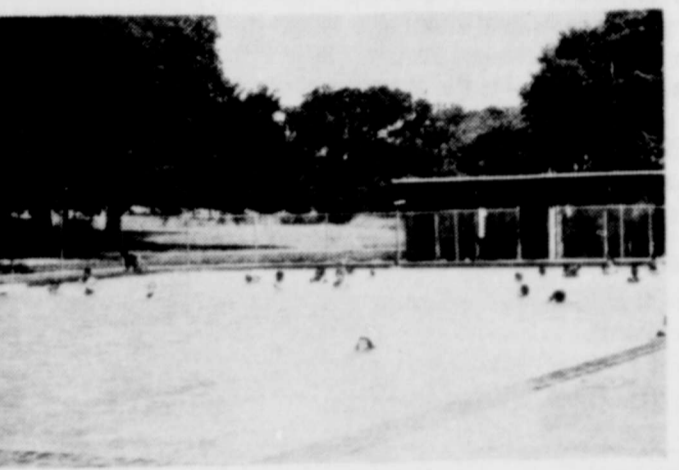
Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Harris, long-time Abernathy area residents, were honored with a "going away" reception following the evening worship service Sunday at the First United Methodist Church. Mr. and Mrs. Harris, who have sold their home here, and were scheduled to move to the John Knox Village in Lubbock Monday, were presented a money tree in appreciation for their many years of devoted service to the church and to the community. In comments by long-time friend Arno Struve, it was emphasized that when Mr. Harris moved here from Mississippi in the early 1920's that "he was a man who recognized individuals...he did not have a hard time accepting people regardless of color. The Harrises later moved to Muleshoe, where he was in the oil business, and then later moved to Seminole where they operated a dry goods store. Then the depression hit, and they moved back to Abernathy. "I remember Wesley as a neighbor and friend...and a milk customer," Struve stated. He also recalled that on one particularly stormy day-Feb. 17, 1940--the weather and road conditions were so bad that "Wesley was the only one who got to the cheese factory."

MEETING SCHEDULED HERE FEB. 3 TO DISCUSS "HAIL" SUPPRESSION OPERATIONS IN COUNTY

A meeting is scheduled in Abernathy School cafeteria Thursday, Feb. 3, at 7 p.m. to formulate plans to present to the Texas Water Development Board session in Lubbock Feb. 16. Everyone interested in stopping Hail Suppression operations is urged to be present. The Texas Water Development Board will conduct a hearing in Lubbock's 99th District Courtroom Feb. 16 to consider license renewals for Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview and Atmospheric, Inc., of Littlefield. (Editor's Note: Following is a reprint of a news story published about a meeting held on this subject recently in Tullia.) TULLIA (Special)--More than 2,000 area residents have organized to oppose license renewals for two area weather modification companies in upcoming hearings before the Texas Water Development Board's general council. Nolan Henson, co-president of Citizens for Natural Weather, said members of the group are residents of more than 13 counties, including each county affected by the efforts of the two companies to suppress hail by cloud seeding. At the Feb. 16 hearings in Lubbock's 99th District Courtroom, license renewals for Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview and Atmospheric, Inc., of Littlefield will be considered. Meeting in the Swisher County District Courtroom late Monday, more than 250 of the 2,000 members staged an organizational meeting to set strategies for the upcoming hearings. Henson, a Hart area farmer, said the group will oppose license renewals for Plains Weather to fly seeding operations over portions of Hale, Lamb, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, and Floyd Counties through December, 1980, and for Atmospheric to conduct operations over portions of Deaf Smith, Randall, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Cochran, Hockley and Lubbock Counties through Oct. 1, 1980. Henson said attending persons were urged to sign petitions which would be sent to the board and to the state legislature asking for a "right-to-vote" law which would give individual counties the right to decide by ballot whether residents want weather modification occurring in their county. Members claim the companies' efforts have caused a drastic reduction in rainfall as well as little decrease in damaging hail-fall. Spokesmen for both companies have repeatedly denied the charges, and have won their case in earlier renewal hearings and in a legal battle in 1974. Henson said the members will ask that the board withhold any decision or postpone an effective date until after the legislature has time to consider a "right-to-vote" bill, now in the drafting stages. The companies' efforts are supported predominantly by farmers who rely on irrigation rather than natural rainfall for their crops' production. The hearings on the renewals will begin at 1 p.m. continuing as long as necessary for all interested parties to present their cases, according to Bruce Bigelow, general counsel for the board and hearing examiner. Following the hearings, the board will have 60 days in which to issue a ruling, unless Bigelow uses another 60 days allowed for an examiner to issue his findings to both parties.

MITZI SANDERS TAKES TREATMENTS AT LUBBOCK CENTER

Three mornings each week little Mitzi Sanders, age 1 year, and her mother, Mrs. J.D. Sanders, go to the Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center in Lubbock. Mitzi enjoys her visits to the Center where she is learning to use her arms and legs--she has cerebral palsy and needs help in learning such skills as sitting, standing, walking and hand use. Cerebral palsy, in most instances, is present at birth and interferes with normal use of muscles. Mitzi, an intelligent child, is making nice progress in learning to control her muscles. She is one of several hundred children from throughout the South Plains area and Eastern New Mexico who receive treatment in the Lubbock Cerebral Palsy and Neuromuscular Center. The Center is financed by the Rotary Club of Lubbock and the Lubbock County Society for Crippled Children. Finances for the Lubbock County Society for Crippled Children are obtained from a fund raising drive held each year. The drive will begin February 6 and extend through April 10. All money is collected and administered by volunteers so that contributions can be used to help needy crippled children. Half the money collected is given to the Lubbock Cerebral Palsy and Neuromuscular Center and the other half is used to buy braces, crutches, wheel chairs, other orthopedic equipment and transportation to medical centers for needy crippled children whose parents are unable to purchase these expensive items. This organization has been in operation for the past 48 years making money available to help needy crippled children and look with pride to many cases who have been helped because someone cared. Many of these, now adults, have taken their places in society. Among these are business men, laborers, teachers, bookkeepers, secretaries, ministers and many other occupations and professions. Many are enjoying the satisfaction of independence and employment rather than a lifetime of dependency on society for their support. Elements of the forthcoming Campaign include a letter of solicitation which will be mailed February 7, a door-to-door campaign March 13 and an Open House. Only one fund raising campaign is held each year and contributors have the satisfaction of knowing their contribution is used only for the purpose for which it is donated--to help needy crippled children. Contributions are tax deductible and may be sent to Drawer 1121, Lubbock. Mitzi is a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.D. Sanders and Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Hall. AREA GINS REPORT 36,151 '76 BALES

Grand total for all gins listed above is 36,151 bales ginned from the 1976 cotton crop.

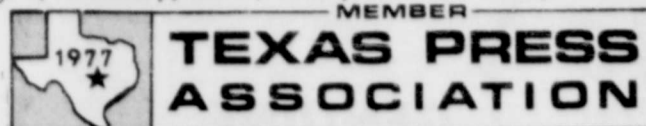

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N&C--According to a story in the Avalanche-Journal Sunday, Lubbock Chamber of Commerce may enlist the aid of surrounding towns in its quest to secure Amtrak rail passenger service through the Hub City. This project, I believe, is worthy of support from Abernathy city, chamber of commerce and Lions club officials. The Amtrak route being sought through Lubbock would extend from Savannah, Georgia, on the Atlantic coast to Los Angeles on the Pacific coast. In addition to Lubbock and the two coastal cities, the Amtrak route, from east to west, would serve Atlanta, Birmingham, Jackson, Miss., Monroe and Shreveport, La., and in Texas, Dallas to Fort Worth to Abilene to Sweetwater to Lubbock, and in New Mexico, Clovis, Belen and Gallup to Flagstaff and Kingman in Arizona, and from Barstow, Calif., to Los Angeles. Lubbock now has plans and/or bus connections to most all of these cities, but it would be an advantage to also have direct rail service to the east and west coasts. West from Lubbock, the only plane service to any of the cities named is to Los Angeles. To reach any of those cities east of Dallas, Fort Worth, travelers must

change planes at D/FW Airport, Lubbock has commuter plane service to Abilene...none to Sweetwater.
N&C--Believing that the City of Abernathy has a population greater than that listed on highway signs, 2,526, I checked with City Manager Larry Fields. He says that the Federal Government deals with Abernathy on the basis of a local population of 2,880...the Government's estimate. Another raise of thumb on population estimates, multiplying the number of water meters by three, would give Abernathy a 3,000-plus population count. If you could use the number of electric meters by three or the number of gas meters by three, starting in the mid-1960's, Abernathy experienced an exodus which was reflected in the U.S. Census count made in 1970, showing the 2500 range of population. This distressing situation began to turn around in the early 1970's growing to "boom" proportions as the mid-1970's approached. Many fine homes were built here in 1975-1976. I believe that a conservation estimate will place Abernathy's current population count at well above the 3,000 mark.

Groundhog legend debunked

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (AP) — With the blustery winter this country is having, the interest in the groundhog is rising as his day nears.
But some Texas A&M University scientists have grounded the hopes of many that the rodent won't see his shadow Feb. 2.
Folklore for decades has said if the groundhog doesn't see his shadow when he comes up from his winter hibernation, an early spring will arrive.
If he spots his shadow, he will return to his warm nest leaving the rest of the world to face six more weeks of winter.
Baloney, say the scientists. Drs. David Schmidly and William Davis say there is no factual basis for the legend, and

they even offer other reasons for the rodent's decision.
Schmidly says the groundhog starts looking for food when he wakes up, and if ice or snow prevent his access to the eats, he'll go back to sleep whether it's sunny or cloudy.
Davis says the legend exists only because people want to believe it.
Harsh debunking of all comes from author Roger Caras, who says the groundhog is simply scared of his own shadow and will head for cover if he sees it.

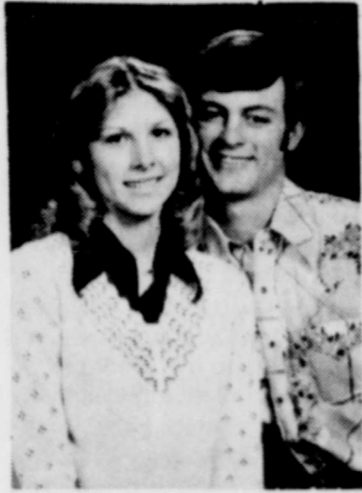

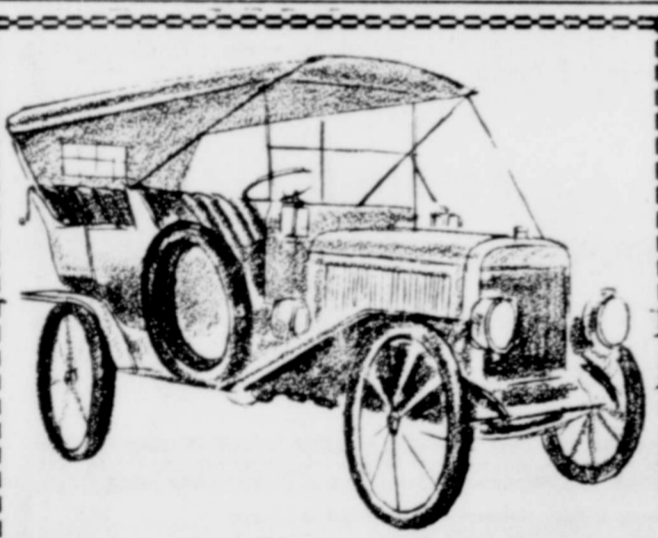
