Two eighth grade girls, students of Mr. Walker, triggered the event a few weeks ago when they wrote to State Representative Pete Laney, who represents Hale County and rural Lubbock County and Swisher County in Austin, Text of the letter to Rep. Mr. Walker was Lori's mother's teacher when she was in Abernathy Junior High.

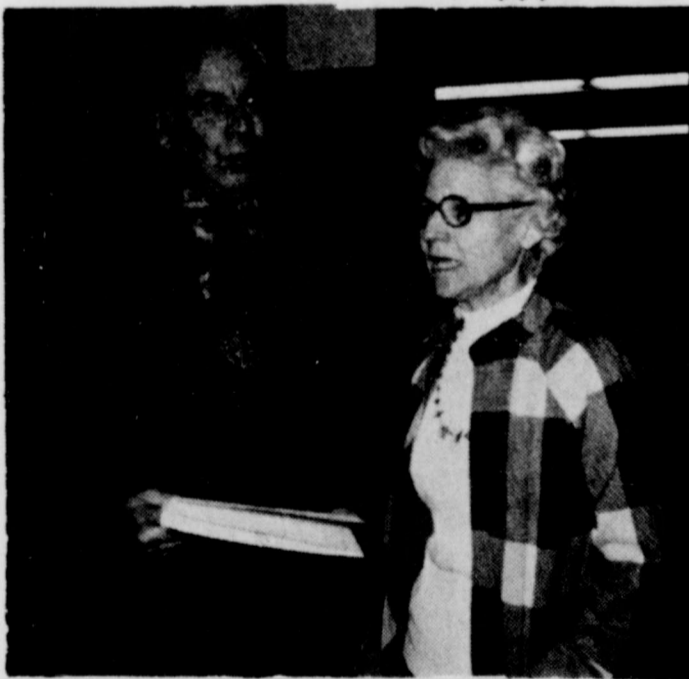
After the assembly was called, Mr. Walker discovered it was being staged for him.

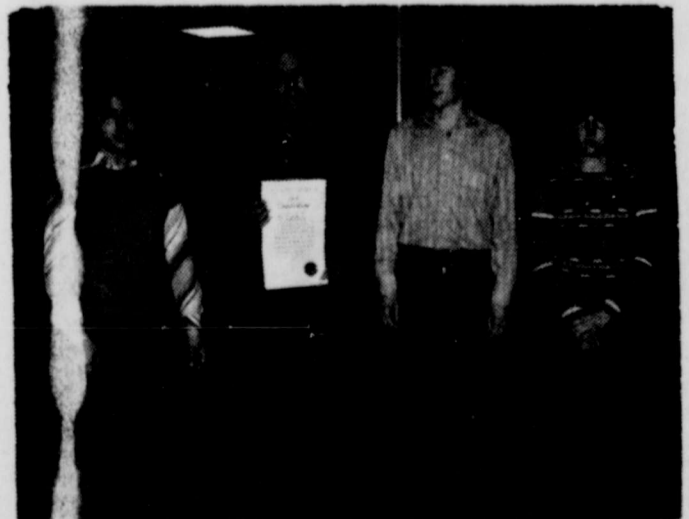
Attending the assembly were 289 students and 30 adults.

Mr. Walker joined the Abernathy School faculty in 1949. He taught one year in Oklahoma and one year in Illinois. He received his B.A. degree from Bethany Nazarene College, Bethany, Okla., and did graduate work at Texas Tech University.

Walker and Miss Irene Andrews were married in Portales in 1938. Mrs. Walker, a fourth grade teacher, has been a member of the Abernathy School faculty 18 years. They have two sons and a daughter, Dwayne of Houston, Royce of Midland and Mrs. Gayla Hughes of Levelland, and three grandsons.

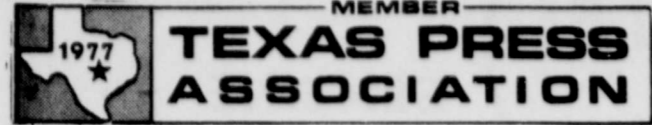
Barton Hood Post Hosts Supper

SHALLOWATER DOG PROBLEMS

This is the latest word from city hall...Patrick Seno has been hired by the local city council as animal warden and all dogs, not on a leash, and running loose, within the city limits of Shallowater will be picked up and put in the dog pound, where they will be kept for 72 hours before they are destroyed.

The owner may retrieve their pet, by paying an impounding fee of \$15.00. If their animal wears a tag, showing a current rabies vaccination. Otherwise, the impounding fee will be \$25 until the owner can show proof the dog has been vaccinated for rabies. Then the city will reimburse the owner up to \$10 of the rabies shot cost.

The warden will be allowed to pick up any dog running loose, on city streets, or on anyone else's property, at the request of the property owner. Or if the warden chases the dog from the street, or other property. He will warn the owner of the dog that the animal would not be picked up this time, but if it is seen running loose the second time, it would be picked up and impounded and the owner would be in violation of City Ordinance #196 and would be responsible and subject to fine.

(Editor's Note: This clipping from the Shallowater newspaper dated Feb. 3 explains how the city handles its dog problem.)

PEANUT-STUFFED PORK CHOPS

- 6 pork rib chops, cut 1 1/2 inches thick
- 2/3 cup coarsely crushed shredded wheat wafers
- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup chopped peanuts
- 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
- 2 Tbsp. lard or drippings
- Salt

Make a pocket in each chop by cutting into the chop along the bone. Mix together shredded wafers, cheese, peanuts, and garlic salt. Fill pocket in each chop with 3 to 4 Tbsp. stuffing. Brown chops in lard or drippings and place in baking dish. Season lightly with salt. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 30 minutes. Remove cover and bake 30 minutes longer or until done. Yield: 6 servings. (Note: Bite-sized cereal plus 3 Tbsp. melted butter can be substituted for shredded wheat wafers in the stuffing.)

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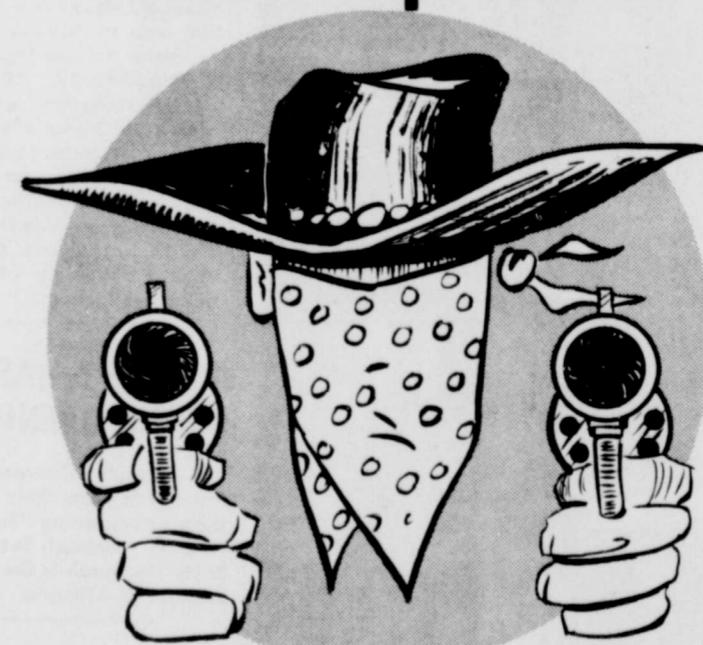

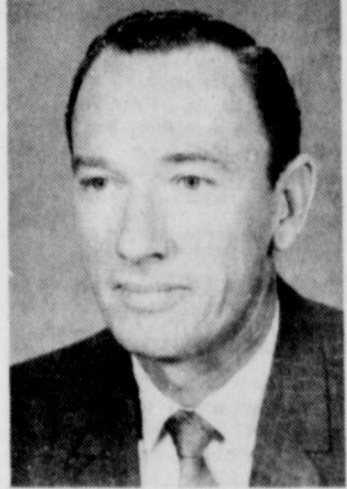

AHS GRADUATE DIES IN MIDLAND

Manufacturing Project Engineer for Sii Drilco Industrial Division of Smith International, Inc., died at 3:45 p.m. Wednesday in Midland Memorial Hospital.

Services were at 11 a.m. Saturday in the First United Methodist Church of Midland officiated by Dr. Charles Lutrick.

Squires has been instrumental in Drilco's technological advances since he joined the firm when it was only five years old in June, 1958.

One of his first projects was the design and manufacture of a trepanner from a long-bed lathe to bore center bores in alloy steel bars. By 1961, Drilco had three trepanners in operation. In 1962, Squires designed Drilco's first Drill Collar Straightener and built it in the Midland Shop. Machines were available at the time for straightening drill pipe, but until Squires designed Drilco's 400-ton-capacity straightener, most larger diameter drill collars that became crooked had to be discarded.

One of Squires' greatest innovations in technology is the Heli-Mill, which he designed and manufactured in 1962 especially for cutting spirals in No-Wall-Stick Drill Collars. Note as the "best machine of its kind in the industry," it was quickly adapted for cutting keyways and milling other external surfaces. He has been responsible for five other Heli-Mills, each one performing better than the last, including the Heli-Mill VI, which went into operation in the Midland Shop three days before his death.

Squires is survived by his mother, Mrs. Nancy Squires of the home; his

wife, Elchija; four sons, Stephen Anthony Squires and Donnell David Squires of the home; Stanley Neil Advent of Richmond, Va., and Troy Lee, II, of Houston; and two daughters, Mrs. Carol Squires Garland of Dallas, Tex., and Jennifer Lynn Squires of the home.

Squires was a Design Engineer until December, 1967, when he was promoted to Chief Manufacturing Engineer. In January, 1969, he was elevated to Manufacturing Engineering Manager. He has been Special Manufacturing Projects Engineer since February, 1976.

Squires and his crews over the years have adapted numerous lathes, mills and other machines into some of the best in the industry.

He attended junior high school in Monahan and was graduate of Abernathy, Tex., High in 1943. He served in the U.S. Navy from July, 1944, to September, 1945. Later, he studied Mechanical Engineering by correspondence. He was a Certified Manufacturing Engineer with the Society of Manufacturing Engineers.

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

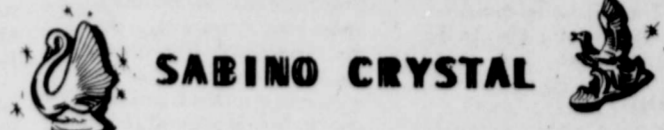

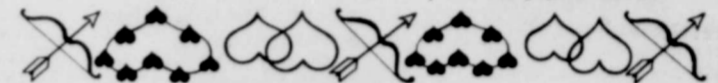

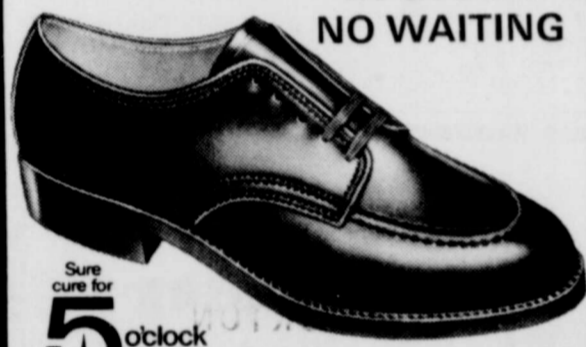

SWINE SHORT COURSE SET BY AG DEPARTMENT

A Swine Production Short Course for adult farmers will be held February 14-17 under the sponsorship of the Abernathy High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Dr. Delwin Webb Superintendent, and Mr. Jerry Adams, teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Robert S. Cohen, Swine Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science of Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Cohen received a B. S. degree in Animal Science in 1965, and a M. S. degree in Animal Nutrition in 1972 from Texas A&M University. He has also received the Ph. D. degree in Animal Nutrition from Texas A&M University, 1975.

He was raised on a swine and beef cattle ranch in Southeastern Llano County, Texas, and was very active in FFA and 4-H programs. During the early 1960's, Dr. Cohen was employed at the Texas A&M University Swine Center. Between periods of formal training, he worked for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Williamson and Eastland Counties and completed active duty with the U. S. Air Force Reserve.

The short course at Abernathy High School is scheduled to begin Feb. 14 at 7:00 p. m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held daily. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Cohen will be available to assist Swine producers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Jerry Adams and Walter Cox.

Producers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Dr. Delwin Webb, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Jerry Adams or Walter Cox. An enrollment fee of \$5 will be charged. Swine Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each Swine producer who attends all the training sessions.

Dr. Cohen states that pork producers must make a serious effort to increase efficiency of production in the future. Increasing costs of equipment and services purchased, accompanied by fluctuating prices received at the market are contributing factors. The number of pigs produced per sow per year and the amount of weight gain from a pound of feed are two important measures of productivity to be evaluated. Dr. Cohen indicates the swine production short course will deal with methods to increase efficiency of production. He also states the course will include such important topics as swine selection and breeding programs, feed and feeding, housing and equipment, herd health

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The Speaker Reports

AUSTIN--Not too many months ago, the gas consuming states were humored by our predictions that our natural gas wells were being depleted. People laughed when we said natural gas is a depletable resource whose end has been hastened by government-enforced, artificially low prices.

It was hard for many to believe that federal price controls were actually anti-consumer actions. When the federal government put these controls on natural gas prices, they made a promise that they could not keep--that is, a continuous supply of natural gas at a price that everyone could afford to use... and waste. Once the demand for natural gas swelled, the supply was gone.

Today there are one and a half million workers out of work, 8,500 factories closed and 75 deaths related to the severe weather.

For most Texans, however, the energy crisis is nothing new. We have seen first hand the rapid depletion and waste of our natural gas supply. While we have often questioned why other states consumed our dwindling natural gas supply at artificially low prices, Texas homes, businesses and industries have had a supply

at fair market price.

Most natural gas--produced in Texas--more than 60 percent--is now used in Texas.

Most Texans will tell you that the market price has guaranteed them a supply of natural gas and has encouraged them to look at alternate energy supplies.

Today, there are those who want to place the same government price controls on gas produced and sold in Texas. I think we need only look north or east to see the consequences of such action. Price regulation is not the solution, it is the problem.

The President has signed short-term legislation to redistribute gas to those states declared national disaster areas. The plan allows natural gas producers to sell intrastate gas at market prices where it is needed.

Some congressmen would like to see our shopping centers, movie theaters and other non-essential services close so that more natural gas can be shipped out-of-state.

Texas has long done its part in providing energy to other states, but by 1985, Texas will be a net importer of energy. By 1980, there may be a natural gas shortage in Texas equivalent to 32 percent of anticipated

needs, with curtailments of 1 trillion cubic feet or more by 1985.

Oil and natural gas cannot be the predominant fuel of the future. The Texas Legislature is looking to the future, and will not be satisfied with short-term laws, when what we need are long-term solutions to assure Texas of future energy supplies.

President Carter and members of Congress could improve our economy, reduce unemployment and related hardships if they took the leadership in developing a national energy policy based on the true costs of finding, developing and commercializing all forms of energy.

Total deregulation of natural gas price controls would allow the price to rise until it became comparable to the price of alternate fuels. If out-of-state consumers want to be assured of power, they, too, must be willing to pay the price.

Gas Processing Plant Planned

The Randall Corporation of Houston, Texas has been awarded a contract for the engineering and construction of a natural gas processing plant near Hobbs, New Mexico for TUCO INC. The announcement was made by C. D. Beaman, president and principal operating officer of the Amarillo, Texas based firm.

The new plant will have a capability of 75 million cubic feet per day and is scheduled to be in operation by August 1, 1977. "In addition to liquid extraction, the plant will be designed to remove nitrogen from low BTU gas thereby up-grading and producing pipeline quality gas," Beaman said. "The design of the plant will also permit adding the capability of producing liquefied natural gas (LNG)."

Construction has been completed, and testing is in the final stages on a 47 mile, 12" pipeline which is to transport low BTU, as well as other pipeline quality gas, from the Chaves, Eddy, and Lea County areas of New Mexico to the plant located near Hobbs. The pipeline should be operational within thirty days.

TUCO INC. is a wholly owned subsidiary of Southwestern Public Service Company and presently provides a large portion of the electric company's fuel requirements including natural gas, coal and fuel oil. TUCO also produces other liquid hydrocarbon by-products for sale to non-related wholesalers.
