Friends Communicate With Cindy Allen

LEVELLAND--A phone call brightens Wednesdays for Cindy Allen, a 20-year-old woman from Abernathy who currently is a patient at Bivins Rehabilitation Center in Amarillo.

However, it is no ordinary phone call. Moments before the phone rings in Cindy's hospital room, a Levelland man twists a dial on his ham radio and speaks into a transmitter. WAS TRA, this is WBS INLU. How do you copy?

A man answers in similar jargon, his voice smeared by radio static. He dials Cindy's number a private line, and plugs his telephone into a radio transmitter.

Thus begins the weekly Wednesday afternoon saga of the young patient in Amarillo, her friends--students and teachers alike at South Plains College in Levelland--and a retired Amarillo man known as Shelby.

Cindy is currently undergoing treatment at the rehabilitation center after being paralyzed from the waist down with injuries suffered in a car accident. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dorman Allen of Abernathy and sisters Katrina and Diane can only visit her on weekends so she usually spends the week without family or friends nearby.

So her friends in Levelland, where she was a student at SPC before the accident, came up with an idea to give her a morale booster each week.

I told some of Cindy's good friends whom I have in class that if everything worked out okay and the hospital in Amarillo permitted it I would contact a ham operator who had facilities for phone patching, explained J. B. Balch, professor of geology at SPC and a licensed ham radio operator. Radio facilities are located in the College's geology lab.

The main problem was finding someone who had facilities to connect a phone call and a radio transmission, or phone patch.

Ham radio operators all over Texas and Oklahoma helped us get it worked out, Balch said. An operator would know somebody who knew somebody else.

The guy whom we contacted to do the phone patch is retired and at home in the afternoons. His handle is Shelby and his name is Sam S. Gantz of 1011 Western in Amarillo, he added.

However, there was no problem in finding someone for Cindy to talk to. On hand for the first two radio contacts with the young woman were Balch, Cindy's close Abernathy friends Martha Montgomery and Becky Storch, Michelle Mitchell of Plainview, Polly Farmer and Jim Blasingame, both assistant professors of biology at SPC.

Becky's husband Johnny and Martha's fiancé Neal Stark of New Deal.

"Good afternoon, Shelby, how do you copy?" began Balch, who had not known until his second radio contact that he and the Amarillo man had met briefly last year at a Levelland hamfest. "We had a little trouble tuning you in but you copy pretty good now," Balch said.

When contact had been firmly established, Shelby plugged his home phone to his radio transmitter and dialed Cindy's number.

Cheerful banter about the weather, an upcoming wedding, bridesmaid dresses in the making, and what was going on with friends and school marked the next half-hour as Cindy chatted alternately with her friend.

There was no indication from the spunky cheer in her voice that Cindy had been hospitalized since the day 1st October when her car flipped and rolled over after a blow-out. Her friend, Becky Bramlett of Levelland, was not seriously injured, but Cindy, who was driving, suffered a broken back.

She was hospitalized first in the intensive care unit of Methodist Hospital in Lubbock and moved to a private room there before being transferred several weeks ago to the Amarillo facility.

"She's a real trooper, said her friend Martha, who reported that Cindy, progressing through daily exercise to strengthen her legs and develop her coordination is now able to move her legs about an inch, a real triumph.

"We write letters all the time and I went to see Cindy twice when she came home for the Christmas holidays," Martha added.

Cindy, who had attended SPC as a fashion-merchandising major, also came home one weekend recently for a visit and to attend a wedding in Roswell, N.M., with her fiancé Ricky Davidson, now manager of a fertilizer firm in Whiteface.

The wreck, ironically, happened three weeks before the pair were to be married.

Cindy will be released in a few weeks from the rehabilitation center to continue treatment at home, her friends report. On June 3, she will be one of the bridesmaids for friend Martha's wedding.

We'd like to extend our thanks to Mr. Balch for setting this up, and thanks to Shelby, too, Martha said. She invited anyone interested in talking to Cindy to drop by the SPC geology lab at 4 p.m. Wednesdays. That's when her friends will be gathered round the ham radio waiting for Cindy's voice.

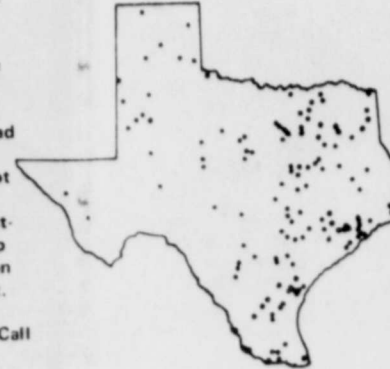

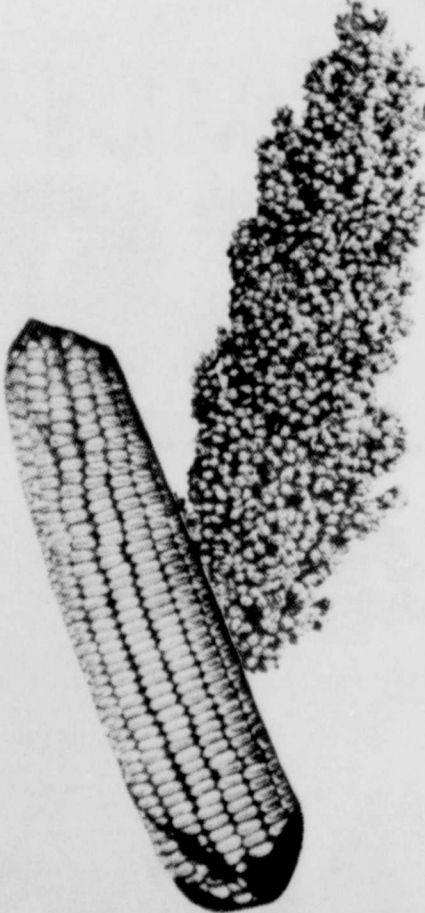

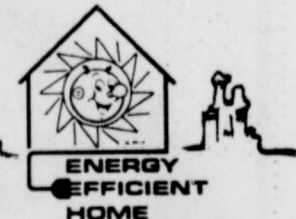
One day the mother and daughter planned a shopping trip. The little girl went to her father's study to get permission for something she wanted to do. She asked her father and he said, "No."

Attention, Lamb Feeders

Each lamb feeder should be aware of a serious problem that can occur with his or her lamb during this stage of the feeding period. The problem is urinary calculi, most commonly known as water belly or kidney stones. The lamb seems to be more susceptible to this condition during the latter stages of feeding.

The condition is caused by an excessive buildup of calcium in the urinary tract, causing a blockage of the urinary passage. Some individual lambs, like people, don't produce enough acid in their system to neutralize or dissolve the calcium, therefore the problem.

Symptoms to look for include: (1) Lamb quits eating, (2) Listless-non-responsive, (3) Frequent attempts to urinate with no success, (4) Swelling under the belly, or high between the legs.

If any of these symptoms are observed, a vet should be consulted immediately.
