Don Enger Attends Farm Bureau Confab

Don Enger of Shallowater, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Enger of Abernathy, and president of Lubbock County Farm Bureau, was among over 380 Farm Bureau Presidents and legislative chairmen attending the Texas Farm Bureau Legislative Conference in Austin Feb. 15 and 16.

The conference was highlighted by speeches from Gov. Dolph Briscoe, House Speaker Bill Clayton, Attorney-General John Hill, Lieutenant-Gov. Bill Hobby and Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Texas Farm Bureau President Carol Chaloupka of Dalhart presented the state's legislative program at a dinner attended by the state officials and most legislators. Main items in

the Farm Bureau program included recommendations on taxing agricultural land, local school financing, state inheritance taxes, underground water taxes and regulations, farm to market roads, and funding agricultural research and education.

The conference became a practical exercise in legislative action when the second day's agenda was cut short in order that the group could contact their representatives to encourage the passage of House Bill 22. The Bill, which will cause taxation of agricultural lands to be based on productive capacity instead of market value, had earlier been defeated. In the afternoon session the bill passed by a 112-34 margin.

DOOR-TO-DOOR FUND DRIVE SET

The door-to-door campaign of the Lubbock County Society for Crippled Children will be conducted Sunday afternoon, March 13. Half the money contributed provides braces, crutches, wheel chairs, other orthopedic equipment and transportation to medical centers for needy crippled children. The Lubbock County Society for Crippled Children has no geographical boundaries and has served children from throughout

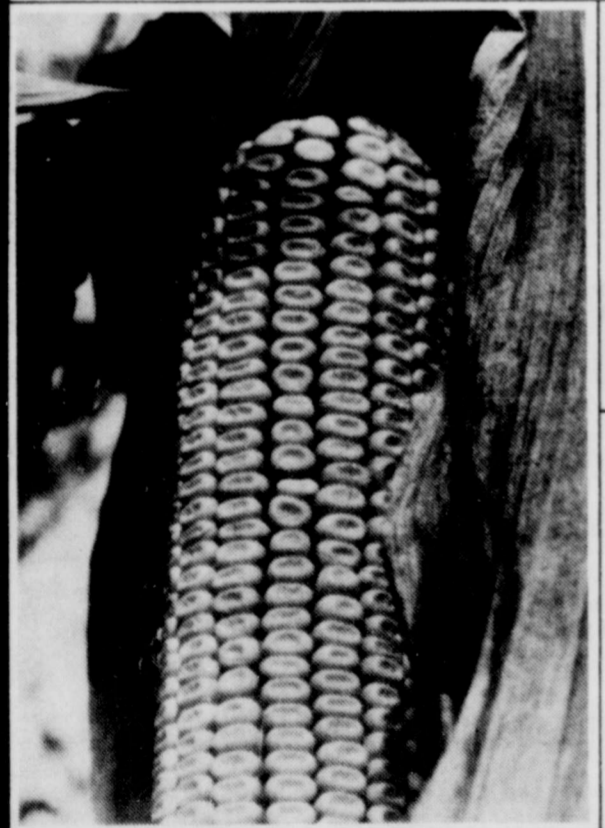
PROSPECT FOR NUCLEAR PLANT FOR SPS

(Editor's Note: The following is from the current issue of the Southwestern, company magazine for Southwestern Public Service Co. Former Abemathian Gene Bernhardt also worked at A-1 Bowling Lanes when he lived here. Gene is a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Anton Wolf of Abemathy. Bernhardt gave the following answer to "How did you happen to go to work at a power plant and how do you feel about the Company's prospects of building a nuclear plant?")
When I lived in Abemathy I became interested in going to work in the power industry. I talked to Phil Sterrett and he encouraged me to go back to school. I didn't go to school then but did go to work for the Company later as a plant operator. I started at the old Tuco Plant. At that time the reason I was interested in working at SPS was because I became acquainted with some of the people like Curtis Lebow and Harold McCune. Working at Harrington is somewhat different than the gas plants but basically the same. And since the industry as a whole will have to convert to other fuels, I think the experience of helping to start up a coal plant will be valuable when we go nuclear.

Oil dwindles

AUSTIN, Texas (Sp.) — Americans are using more than twice as much oil daily as the nation is able to produce in a day, says a University of Texas geologist. Such consumption, says Dr. Samuel P. Ellison, Jr., causes the U.S. to be more than 50 per cent dependent on foreign oil and, in its quest to find more oil underground, more "drilled out" than any other country.
If the present rate of usage continues, the nation's proven oil reserves of about 31 billion barrels will be used up in about 10 years, he notes, adding also that the U.S. gas supply is declining so rapidly it will be gone after eight years.

Commissioners vote to install telephones

Three out of the four Hale County Commissioners Friday voted to have mobile telephones put in their vehicles, while the fourth, Henry Rieff, said "no" at least for the time being.

Reasons given for approving the phones were "It will make the commissioners more accessible to their constituents and it will cut down on long distance phone calls within the county."

"I like the idea of anyone being able to get in touch with me at anytime," remarked Commissioner Tom "Jigger" Wheeler, who made the motion to approve the phones.

Rieff did not vote for the phones, "Because I haven't seen the justification, yet." He abstained in the voting, which carried 3-0.

COST WILL BE \$66 per month

for one phone and \$82.50 a month for the other two. Judge Henry Heck will not have a phone in his vehicle since he is in his courthouse office most of the day. Commissioners, on the other hand, are seldom at telephones during the day.

In other action, commissioners voted to remain in SPAG (South Plains Association of Governments) for at least one more year and authorized the payment of \$7,500 for their role in helping finance the MH-MR Center. The \$7,500 was their (commissioners) 1976 payment and was already included in this year's budget.

On Monday, commissioners will take up the remainder of their agenda which includes: receiving depository bids from county financial institutions, requests from the City-County

Health District, and a report from the Hale County Weed Control department.

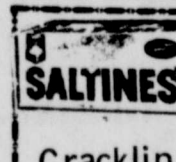

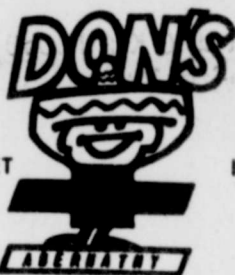

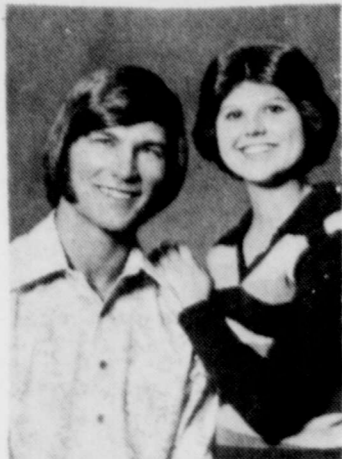

ABERNATHY BODY WORKS

Parents' Role In The Education Of Children

(First in a series of articles provided by the Parental Involvement Program of the Abernathy Public School; Amy Garcia and Janis Myatt, Community Aides. These articles will be taken from a number of pamphlets written by Dr. Steve Moreno, School Psychologist.)

Parents can help develop the intelligence of their children. They do not need to be college educated to do this. Most of what every parent can do for their children can be done right in the home. It is inexpensive and can be fun for the parents. Parents who play an important role in their child's education will develop more interest in the school, and their children will get a better education.

Intelligence simply means the ability to learn. The NEW idea of intelligi-

ence is that the brain, or intelligence, can be trained and developed. It has been found that the I. Q. scores of children can be raised by as much as fifty points when they have had the opportunities to learn, to think, and to use their minds. These scores will drop for children that are not in a stimulating environment.

There have been many geniuses in our world, but most of them had training in the development of their intelligence from the time they were born. They had many opportunities for stimulating the brain and developing basic concepts. They received training at home from their parents and learned a great deal BEFORE they entered school.

Parents should provide a home where the child has a chance to learn different skills and concepts. Studies have shown that the child who spends a lot of time with his parents is more likely to succeed in the educational system. He learns by watching his mother do many different things, listening to his parents use a lot of language, and also by seeing the many different places where his mother shops or visits friends.

It is very important that mothers talk a lot TO, and WITH, their children. Infants learn by HEARING their mother's voice long before they are able to talk themselves.

Children differ in their ability to perform at different age levels. Parents should realize that the younger the child is, the more time and patience will be required for the child to learn new concepts. Concentrated activities should be planned to fit a child's attention span. Three year old children have attention spans of five to ten minutes, and four year old and five year old children have attention spans of seven to twelve minutes.

Parents should establish a regular time for reading to the child. This will help the child learn the idea of a schedule and he can begin developing basic ideas about time and schedule.

At about age four parents can begin to develop the reading skills of their children. Reading stories to children should be done at a time when the youngster is fresh and not tired. The names of the letters can be taught and gradually he can learn that letters are something he can make and something that makes words. Toys that teach shapes and sizes of different objects provide excellent opportunities for teaching. Always keep in mind that learning can be fun. Make the child feel good about what he is doing. This helps him to develop a good self-concept and gain confidence in himself and in his ability to learn and try new things. A child should NEVER be scolded for TRYING something and not succeeding... he should be REWARDED for trying.

Sales tax receipts are up

AUSTIN — Comptroller Bob Bullock announced last week that Texas cities received a total of \$302.9 million in city sales tax rebates last year, a 14 per cent increase over the 1975 calendar year.

The cities received \$264.5 million in 1975, Bullock said. Plainview's 1976 total was \$546,965.64 compared to \$620,324.04 received in 1975. The '76 total represented a 13 per cent increase, according to Bullock's figures.

The totals are included in an

analysis prepared by Bullock's office showing the total rebates received by Texas cities for the calendar years 1975 and 1976.

The City of Houston led the state in total rebates with a total of \$62.6 million in 1976. Dallas collected \$35.3 million, San Antonio \$18.9 million, Fort Worth \$12.3 million and Austin \$9.1 million.

The City of Sachse topped the list with collections up 444 per cent last year. The cities of Krugerville, Roanoke and Windom all received increases

in excess of 100 per cent. Other cities showing such large increases did not collect the tax.

The one per cent city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the four per cent state sales tax and is returned to the cities by the Comptroller's Office on a monthly basis.

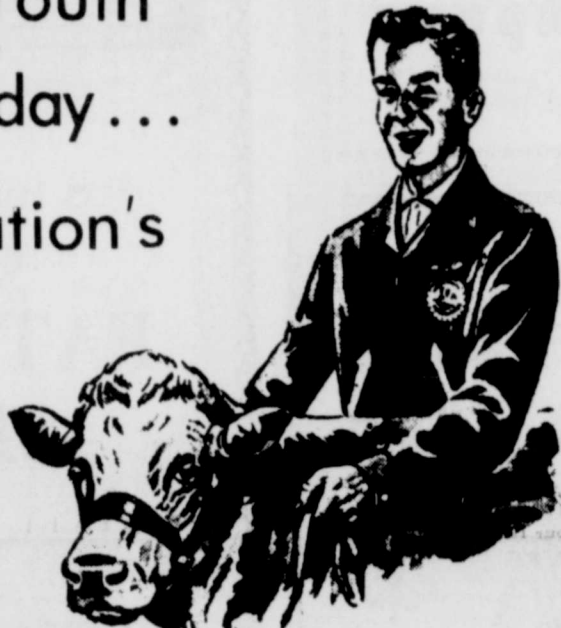

Notice, Veterans:

Veterans are entitled to have their military discharges recorded at no charge at the County Courthouse, according to Herbert Hardin, Service Officer for Barton-Hood Post, 500. This service may be very important to a veteran, as it is a ready source from which a certified copy can be obtained at no expense whenever it is needed. In many instances, original discharge papers are lost or destroyed and a veteran, his dependent, or survivor must obtain proof of military service to apply for VA benefits, such as pension or hospitalization. If the discharge is recorded at the county courthouse, it is a simple procedure to obtain a certified copy.

Registration of these discharges has become extremely important to veterans because of the fire at the Military Personnel Records Center at St. Louis, Missouri in July 1973. Contrary to popular belief, duplicate copies of discharges were not kept on microfilm. Veterans who were discharged prior to the fire should be aware that the personal copies of their discharge, which they have in their possession, may be the only proof of service in existence. Likewise, the fire should point out to all veterans, regardless of the present status of their military records, the importance of having an alternate source from which to obtain proof of service.

To avoid a situation in which a veteran may be unable to provide proof of his military service, all veterans, regardless of when they were discharged, are urged to record them at their county courthouse.

Marshall Joins Carter Cabinet
