The Abernathy F. T. A. Chapter was presented with a trophy for having one of the best projects in the state. Their project was to make available a bi-lingual tapes for the children in kindergarten and elementary school.

State Department Of Public Welfare Seeks Foster Homes

The State Department of Public Welfare is looking for foster homes for low-income aged, blind, or disabled adults whose homes are no longer safe, or who, for one reason or another, have no homes.

"When aged or disabled adults are no longer able to live in their own homes, they are faced with the choice of living with friends or relatives or moving into an institution," according to Patricia Ambrose, welfare department social service worker at 519 Broadway, Plainview. "Unfortunately, the choice is not always there. In the absence of friends or family, many are sent unnecessarily to institutions, such as mental institutions or nursing homes."

"However, the welfare department is trying to give those individuals another choice with the foster home program," Patricia Ambrose continued. "This is for ambulatory people who need shelter and some help with activities of daily living."

"We are seeking warm hearted people who have room in their homes for one to three aged or disabled persons who are not related to them. The foster family must be willing to help provide opportunities for social, recreational and religious activities as appropriate, as well as room and board. It is, really, a family-sharing program which would enrich the lives of all concerned."

Cost of the care is shared by the individual and the welfare department. Payment to the foster family is \$220 per person per month.

NGC--The full thrust of President Carter's concern for Human Rights should, at this time, be directed at protecting the people of his country rather than tinkering around with the problems of Russia's dissidents. Americans should have the Right to be rid of dope pushers... the Right to have their children walk to school or play in their yards at home without being victimized by degenerates... the Right to walk the streets day or night without fear of being killed or robbed... the Right to conduct a place of business without the underlying fear of having a punk with a pistol clean our their cash register... the Right to take the handcuffs off of the law enforcement officers and put them back on the criminals where they belong.

NGC--Through the years, Republicans have pointed up the fact that Democratic Presidents have been in office when the United States became embroiled in major wars. We sincerely hope that trend stops with Democratic President Carter.

NGC--Consumer finance companies, the ones that buy the "paper" on your purchases of home appliances and other financed items you purchase, are plugging for passage of Texas Senate Bill 615, to raise interest rates consumers pay. Here's an example of the added costs to Texas consumers if this bill passes: Now, when you borrow \$2600 for 37 months, the interest total you pay is \$641.33, passage of SB 615 would increase your interest payment to \$844.83, or 31.73% greater. Bentsen Challenges Other Sections On Energy Development

Washington, D. C. --- Senator Lloyd Bentsen Tuesday called for an Interior Department investigation to determine to what extent the withholding of natural gas from production in the East and Midwest contributed to the natural gas shortage this winter.

"We know of at least three areas in the East and Midwest where there is natural gas in the ground that was not being produced and supplied to the American people during this coldest winter in the history of our Republic. I want to know how many other cases there are," Bentsen said in a Senate speech.

The Senator said he has sent a telegram to Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus seeking the probe.

"Until the crisis this year the State of Pennsylvania had blocked efforts to drill for gas on the U. S. side of Lake Erie even though Canada had been drilling on her side for years," Senator Bentsen said.

"There is an estimated 600 billion cubic feet of natural gas under Lake Erie but until the shortages this year the Governor of Pennsylvania refused to allow drilling in the lake."

Bentsen also pointed out that politicians and other East Coast residents went to court in a successful effort to prevent development of an estimated 1 trillion cubic feet of natural gas and 1.4 billion barrels of oil in the Atlantic Ocean's Baltimore Canyon.

"It is neither fair nor rational for them to come in and drill off the Texas coast and the Louisiana coast and then block efforts to drill off their coast," the Senator said.

"It is neither fair nor rational for them to get the rigs at a low, subsidized price while the people of Texas and other producing states pay for virtually all of the natural gas exploration that's being done in this country," he said.

Senator Bentsen noted that there are 1.3 trillion cubic feet of natural gas in proven reserves in Ohio that it is not economically feasible to develop because of Federal regulation of natural gas. The reserves are held by utility companies which are subject to regulation by the Federal Power Commission.

"These politicians from the East and the Midwest and the West who are now charging that natural gas is being deliberately held off the market remind me of the youth who killed his parents then demanded mercy because he was an orphan," Bentsen said.

"The fact is that some of these same politicians are withholding natural gas either through court suits or executive actions or through their continued support of a misguided system of government regulation which promotes waste of natural gas and hampers development of this clean burning resource," Senator Bentsen said.

DISPLAY SLATED AT PLAINVIEW MUSEUM

PLAINVIEW--The March Exhibit of the Month at the Llano Estacado Museum is a collection of Civil War commemorative plates. These two plates, owned by Mrs. A. L. Holland, are a limited edition set put out by the Museum of the Confederacy in Richmond, Virginia. Each plate carries a pictorial history of one facet of the Confederacy, from the Merrimac and a Confederate army camp to Jeb Stuart and a company drummer boy. A written explanation accompanies each plate so that museum visitors can identify the scene on the plate. This exhibit will be on display through March so that visitors to the Llano Estacado Museum can enjoy a brief history of the Civil War in this unique manner.

PARENT'S ROLE IN CHILD'S EDUCATION

PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT IN FREE PUBLIC EDUCATION DOES MAKE A DIFFERENCE

(Provided by Parental Involvement Program Information from pamphlets by Dr. Steve Moreno.)

Parents need to be actively involved in their children's educational activities. Visit your child's school and get to know the school principal and your child's teachers. This will let the school know that you are interested and concerned about your child's education. It will also let your child know that you are interested in what he is doing. Often parents do not visit the school until some problem arises because of behavior or because the child is not making satisfactory grades.

A friendly, social visit to the school can serve many purposes. It not only shows a concern for the education of your child, but gives the opportunity for you to see the different methods of teaching that are being used. When your child talks about various activities and programs, you will understand the things he is discussing. You will know more about the school's schedule, about the policies for homework, absences, tardies, etc.

While your child is in school, his teacher is one of the most important people in his life. Parents need to be acquainted with this person of persons. The teacher is much better able to do his job if he knows he can call parents whenever needed.

Knowing and working with your child's teacher will help your child realize that you are really interested in his education and that you want very much for him to do well in school. Help your child to realize that education is important to everyone in his family.

It is important that parents have a specific time set aside every day (if needed) for the child to do homework. Wise scheduling for TV programs can do much to improve your child's school work. Time for discussion of school work and school activities will show your interest and encourage your child in his school work.

Expect your child to do well in school. Teachers will expect more from children when they realize that parents are interested in their children's success and that they expect the child to perform well in school.

Parents should be careful to act positively toward schools and education. Make FAVORABLE comments about school-teachers-principals-homework-school programs-parent involvement meetings-school attendance-and school work.

If parents are positive about school-their children will probably be positive about school.

I tried this recipe for the first time last week and was very pleased with the results. If you wish, you may publish it in the newspaper.

Velvety Chocolate Cake
 1/2 cup buttermilk
 2 cups all-purpose flour
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 cup water
 2 eggs, beaten
 1 teaspoon soda
 2 cups sugar
 1/2 cup butter or margarine
 4 tablespoons cocoa

Combine buttermilk and soda; set aside. Combine flour, sugar, and salt in a mixing bowl.

Combine butter, water, and cocoa in a saucepan; bring to a boil. Pour over flour mixture, and mix well; cool. Add eggs and buttermilk mixture, stirring well. Pour into 2 greased and floured 8-inch cakepans. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool on wire racks, and frost with Velvety Chocolate Frosting. Yield: one 8-inch layer cake.

Velvety Chocolate Frosting
 1/2 cup butter or margarine
 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons milk

4 tablespoons cocoa
 1 (16 ounce) package powdered sugar
 Combine butter, milk, and cocoa in a saucepan; bring to a boil. Remove from heat; add powdered sugar, stirring well. Spread warm frosting on cake.

Yield: enough for one 8-inch layer cake.

PRALINE COOKIES

2 cups sugar
 1 small can milk
 1 stick butter or oleo

Bring to boil and boil 10 minutes.

Stir in:
 20 large marshmallows
 2 cups finely crushed Graham Cracker Crumbs
 1 or 2 cups pecans

Drop FAST on wax paper.

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Patterson Writes About Haiti Trip

(Editor's Note) The following is from Abernathy First Church of the Nazarene news letter dated March 2, 1977.)

REVIVAL
The spring revival will be March 29 to April 3. Rev. "Kris" Kristoffersen and his wife will be our workers. Bro. "Kris" pastors the Southwood Church of the Nazarene in Kansas City, Mo. You will enjoy his Bible preaching. Sis. Kristoffersen is also a preacher. She will teach on Holiness. We are looking forward to this meeting and are praying for it.

From the Pastor's Desk
This week we have asked R. C. Patterson, Jr., who went to Haiti in January with a group of men and women from our district to help build a church there, to write about his trip.

"We read in I Cor. 2:19, 'Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him.' These are the words which were going over and over in our minds as we prepared for our trip to Haiti in January. We weren't prepared for the things which we would experience while there. As we worked with the people, it was soon evident that they were a proud and aggressive people. They wanted to do things for themselves, but because of their poverty, they were hindered.

In this area our church is working, we are making available to our people portable sewing machines and training them to sew. In this way, they will be able to improve their way of living. We are also working in the agricultural area and the construction industry. These people have a brilliant mind and are very quick in picking up new methods once they are shown.

The church is growing quite rapidly. The national people are carrying this responsibility by themselves. As new people are saved they in turn get others

and soon they call and say, 'missionary, we need a pastor, we have a church started. They plan to be a regular self-supporting district by 1980.

The country of Haiti is very mountainous. The climate is conducive to growing most any kind of crops. We experienced for the mid 60's to the mid 80's weather. It was their winter. It was very pleasant with some rain several nights, the first week. We spent a very enjoyable time working, with some sight-seeing on the side. The Lord willing we will make plans to make another missionary trip.

The contrast is great between the Haitian people and our christian people here at home. We have so much and they for the most part have so little of this earthly goods. We have had so many opportunities and they have had so few. We have such a christian heritage and so few of them know anything of christian principles. In Luke 12:48b we read: 'For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required: and to whom men have committed much, of him they will ask more.' We need to do what we can now for Christ."

Sorghum Feeding Trials Continue

The Soviet Union's sorghum feeding project encouraged by Grain Sorghum Producers Association through the U. S. Feed Grains Council was resumed December 4, according to Elbert Harp, GSPA executive director.

The initial project was begun last year after 6,000 pounds of grain were shipped from Lubbock, Texas to Russia, but it was cancelled for "veterinary reasons" two weeks after it was started.

Ground work for the experiment was prepared by a grain sorghum promotion team headed by Harp, which presented a series of seminars in Eastern Europe and Russia in the fall of 1975. After hearing the team's presentations, the Soviet officials asked the team to prepare a tentative plan for a poultry feeding project in the Soviet Union.

The USFCC was informed that the trial had resumed when the Russians wired asking Dr. J. H. Quisenberry, a retired poultry specialist at Texas A&M University, and Dr. Halvor J. Kolshus, the council's European director of Rotterdam, to return to supervise the weighing of the chicks.

"The feeding trials are being used to illustrate to the Russians the feeding efficiency and nutritional value of U. S. grain sorghum to that of corn and to traditional Russian poultry feeds," Harp said. "To us it's a demonstration since we know the comparable value, but to the Russians it's research since they are unfamiliar with grain sorghum."

"When shown sorghum is comparable to corn and the price is right, we feel they will begin buying sorghum. But it may take another test or two before they are really convinced," he said.

"The Russians were quite pleased with the way things were progressing, and this is based on the first four weeks of feeding."

"They have a lot of data to collect and to analyze before they have any significant results."

"The details of the experiment's progress are still sketchy, but we're optimistic it will lead to sales of grain sorghum to Russia," said Harp.
