Developments March 17 and March 24 have added interest to Abernathy School District's annual school trustee election. March 17, Lon Carmickle, an incumbent, published a legal form in The Review to have his name removed from the printed ballot to be used in the election Saturday, April 2. March 24 it was announced that Bobby Cunningham, a partner in Sixty-Six Butane & Fertilizer Company, will wage a campaign as a write-in candidate for school trustee in the April 2 voting. Space is provided on the official ballot for write-in candidates.

Absentee balloting in the school trustee election will continue through Tuesday, March 29, at Abernathy city hall, with City Secretary Otella Clement in charge. Officials state that space also is provided on the absentee ballot for write-in candidates.

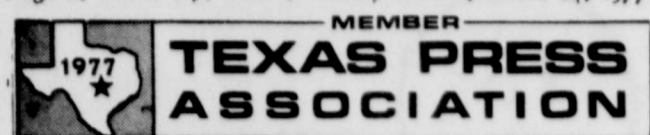

**Laney bill gets early endorsement**

AUSTIN--A bill by Rep. Pete Laney of Hale Center to clarify the use of some self-propelled farm machinery on state highways has been approved by the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee.

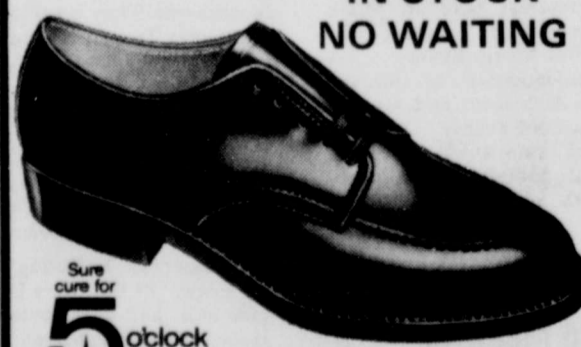
Laney told the committee that House Bill 1324 would clarify an administrative position now taken by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The bill would specifically exempt self-propelled machinery specifically designed or adapted for applying plant food materials or agricultural chemicals from the vehicle registration regulations.

Laney told the committee that the vehicles are not used for transportation purposes and that the bill would restrict them to a thirty mile per hour speed limit when they are occasionally used on public roads.

The bill now goes to the House for consideration.

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**TEXAS FHA-HERO WEEK SET**  
 MARCH 27-APRIL 2, 1977

Future Homemakers of America throughout Texas will observe Texas FHA-HERO Week March 27-April 2. Using the theme "FHA Shapes an Unfinished World," the more than 75,000 young men and women will join in demonstrating projects that have real value for youth in preparation for future responsibilities.

Future Homemakers of America is one of six vocational education youth organizations. A part of the junior and senior high school homemaking curriculum, it provides meaning and motivation for youth working toward educational goals related to consumer home-making and home economics for gainful employment and reaches beyond the classroom instruction into the home and community.

State President Phyllis Cicero explained that the overall goal of the organization is "to help youth assume their roles in society through home economics in areas of personal growth, family life, vocational preparation and community involvement."

"In other words," she said, "it helps us develop leadership, good citizenship, and prepare for the vital work of our country. In our FHA and HERO chapter meetings we analyze member concerns and then develop projects that are related to our home economics classroom studies. Many people have no idea what is taught in homemaking classes today. It isn't just cooking and sewing, it's learning about living, teaching us how to cope with the dual role of homemaker and wage earner in today's fast-paced society. During this week we want to impress on

people the importance of vocational education and of Future Homemakers of America as a part of home-making education in preparing us for future living."

Future Homemakers of America was founded June 11, 1945 as an incorporated, nonprofit organization supported by membership dues. There are two types of chapters. FHA chapters place major emphasis on consumer education, homemaking and family life education combined with exploration of jobs and careers. HERO chapters, taking the name from home economics related occupations, place major emphasis on preparation for jobs and careers with recognition that workers also fill multiple roles as homemakers and community leaders.

Nationwide in membership and effort, Future Homemakers of America is co-sponsored by the U. S. Office of Education through Division of Vocational and Technical Education and the American Home Economics Association. High school home economics teachers, members of the state home economics education staff and leading home economists serve as advisers to chapter, state and national youth officers, giving guidance and counseling to the program.

The national headquarters is located in Washington, D. C.

The Texas Association is sponsored by the Texas Education Agency, Austin, Texas. Mrs. Elizabeth F. Smith is the State Director of Homemaking Education and Mrs. Betty Romans is the State Advisor of the Texas Association.

### Discipline In Your Child's School

Discipline must be fair. It should be applied FOR the child rather than TO him.

Its purpose is to improve, not to punish. Parents should make an effort to find out about the school's rules of discipline. These are rules to be obeyed. If parents and students do not like the rules, they have the right to seek to have changes made for the better. The approach should be aimed at improvement, to make things better within the system. The wrong approach is to take an attitude of defiance or breaking the rules. The right approach is productive, whereas the other is destructive.

Parents are setting an example that the youngster is likely to follow. Striking out, disregarding, or trampling on school laws are inciting children to do the same.

Keep in mind that discipline in school begins at home. When students skip or miss school for no reason and parents cover up by saying the child was sick or some other made-up excuse, they are teaching the child that (1) breaking rules of discipline is permissible; (2) lying is allowable; and (3) it's okay to evade the consequences of a wrongful act.

One of a parent's major jobs is to make his child accountable for his own behavior. Sometimes parents may overlook misbehavior and irresponsibility, thinking it is cute and that the child will eventually outgrow his mischievous ways. He needs to learn early that there is a time and place for entertainment and fun and a time and place for responsible actions.

Trouble at home or any special problems involving your child usually leads to trouble at school. Teachers can help if they are informed. Keep the communication lines open between home and school for the sake of your child. Many times the guidance department may be helpful through counseling, and can certainly give you professional advice. Remember the aim of discipline is not punishment, but teaching... which is expected to produce moral or mental improvement.

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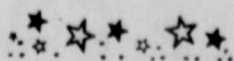

That Abernathy City Hall Building in Abernathy, Texas in said City, with Mrs. Zelma Hale, Presiding Judge; Mrs. Vaughn Hackler, Alternate Judge; Clerk to be selected by presiding judges from a list of eligible voters.

4. Mrs. Otelia Clement is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held in Abernathy City Hall within the boundaries of the above named City and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State Holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the day of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the Election Code of this State, and this City Council will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. The City Secretary of the City of Abernathy shall forthwith issue a notice of said election by posting copies of this order within the boundaries of said City, which posting shall be done not less than 20 days prior to the date for said election.

There is an excellent book that I would recommend. The author is King Solomon and the book is entitled PROVERBS. For you not familiar with the book, it is listed as a book in the writings of the Holy Bible. I believe that these instructions are from God's wisdom and they will bring desired results if ministered in love.

Listen to Solomons teachings:

1. "He that spareth his rod hateth his son: but he that loveth him chasteneth him. (King James Version) Prov. 13:24. "If you refuse to discipline your son, it proves you don't love him; for if you love him you will be prompt to punish him. (Living Bible) Prov. 13:24.

2. "Discipline your son in his early years while there is hope. If you don't you will ruin his life." (Prov. 19:18-Living Bible)

3. "Scolding and spanking a child helps him to learn. Left to himself, he brings shame to his mother." (Prov. 29:15-Living Bible)

4. "Discipline your son and he will give you happiness and peace of mind." (Prov. 29:17-Living Bible)

The anointing power of the Holy Spirit upon your life will give you daily wisdom for instruction your children.
