SCHOOL PLANT IMPROVEMENTS ARE DISCUSSED

The 1977 Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet, held Thursday night, April 7, in the school cafeteria, was highlighted by the presentation of awards to Abernathy's Citizen of the Year, Students of the Year, and Farm Family of the Year. Approximately 275 persons, chamber members, their families, and guests attended this year's banquet to honor the selected outstanding citizens and to hear the speaker for the evening, Dr. Kenneth McFarland, of Topeka, Kansas.

Nannie Belle Ritchey was named Citizen of the Year and presented with an award by Leland Phillips. Miss Ritchey is a native of Utica, Miss., and moved to Texas in 1912 where she taught Sunday School in Plano for 20 years. After moving to Abernathy on October 21, 1956 she was employed by the City of Abernathy as Librarian for 20 years. She has also logged about 83,000 hours of service during her 13-year tenure as City Dispatcher.

Student of the Year awards were presented by Laurin Prather to Barbara Barton and Greg Gist, both Senior students at Abernathy High School. These students were chosen for their outstanding work, leadership, and participation in numerous academic and extra-curricular programs throughout their high school years.

Emcee Steve Hill introduced the speaker for the event, Dr. Kenneth McFarland of Topeka, Kansas. Dr. McFarland, who holds the only speaking award presented by the American Academy of Achievement in Dallas, is the Author of "Eloquence in Public Speaking". He is the recipient of the National Leadership Award as an Outstanding American and numerous other awards.

Mayor Pete Thompson presented to Dr. McFarland a certificate proclaiming him to be an Honorary Citizen of the City of Abernathy.

Dr. McFarland stated local organizations, such as our Chamber of Commerce,

have greater opportunities now than ever before to work together in pinpointing problems in the community and solving them; of deciding "what kind of city" we will be and striving toward that ideal, in refusing to accept the negative and assuming a positive attitude toward our community, citizens, youth, etc. He pointed out that the problems of our Nation are National in Scope—but Local in solution. Most of our problems can be broken down, and solved on a local basis with organizations like our Chamber playing a vital role in establishing the "character" of our town.

In his remarks, he stressed we as citizens should have indignation concerning anything which is a threat to the preservation of our freedom; our main concern should be to preserve our system, and to be grateful for our system, our freedom, our heritage, and to show our gratefulness by honor to the symbol of all good things—the American flag.

Out-going president of the Chamber, Milt Pope, accepted a plaque in recognition of the splendid job he has done as president for the 1976-77 year. He expressed appreciation for the cooperation he received from all the Chamber members in their endeavors during the year. Allen and Lindsey Neis on behalf of the local Scouts, presented to Milt Pope a plaque in appreciation for all the support and encouragement they have received from the Chamber.

Paul Herchman, who was selected to be Chamber president for the 1977-78 year, accepted the post and stated that he, as a fairly new resident of the city of Abernathy, felt pleased and honored to be chosen and would strive to continue the fine job done by Milt Pope, and asked the help of Pope,

Tommy Lane was presented with a gift by Milt Pope from the Chamber members in appreciation of the fine job he has done as Secretary-Treasurer of the Chamber.

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on April 4, 1977. In accordance with the law, the first item on the agenda was canvassing the results, accepting the judges report, and declared Billie Harrison and Don McKenzie duly elected. The official results of the voting included: Max Garza—186 votes; Don McKenzie—253 votes; Billie Harrison—316 votes; Bobbie Cunningham (write-in)—195 votes; Fifteen additional write-in names had a total of 27 votes.

Other action items highlighted the remainder of the meeting. The band was given approval for a trip to the Contraband Band Festival in Lake Charles, Louisiana providing the band garners another first place in either sight reading or concert to go with the first rating for marching awarded in November. The Board also approved one additional fund raising project to aid in the expenses for making this trip.

Resignations were accepted and approved from Curtis Davenport, Sue Davenport, Barbara Garrett, and Billie McKinney.

Approval was granted to the student body to conduct official elections and to change the number of cheerleaders from the present three freshman, 800 sophomores, two juniors, and two seniors to three from each class.

The Board set May 25th as the date for the Board of Equalization to review industrial property and June 8th for the Board of Equalization to review the local property.

Eagle Electric of Liberal, Kansas was awarded a contract to replace the poles at the football field and install new lights and sound system.

The Board also passed a resolution prohibiting the scheduling of basketball games on Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve, and Christmas Days. Approval was given for an Outsiders Basketball Tournament for April 14, 15, and 16th for proceeds to go to the Booster Club.

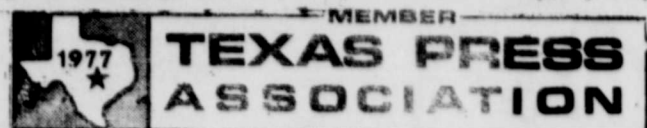
Reports and recommendations that were discussed and accepted with unofficial action included a comprehensive report on C. S. H. B. 750. Instructions were given to the administrators to prepare plans for an elementary physical education facility so that bids may be taken at an early date and to continue working with the architect on the plans for an additional Vocational Area for the Junior and Senior High School.

Plans were made for the Board to attend a Regional School Board Workshop on April 13th in Lubbock for Area Boards of Education. The emphasis of this workshop will be on Legislative Progress.

Reports presented to the Board included Tax Collection report which shows 96.63% of the total roll as having been collected. Other statistical reports revealed total enrollment dropped 23 students during the month of March from 1150 students to 1127. However, the average daily participation in the lunchroom program jumped from 630 to 633 per day.

Storm Shelter Information:

I. The weather warning and observation plan for the city of Abernathy provides three types of warnings:

1. Tornado Watch--the area roped off by Kansas City to warn of the possibility that tornadoes could occur in this area for a certain time period.

2. Tornado Warning--this warning is given by the National Weather Service when a tornado is sighted and confirmed and is a threat to an immediate area or city.

3. Hall Warning--this warning is given when hail is possible for a given area or city.

II. Mr. Curtis Davenport and Mr. Charles Bowen as members of the Abernathy Civil Defense Team will be stationed at the Junior High School and will open the building when a tornado warning is issued. Other administrators will have a key and their names and phone numbers will be listed with the Civil Defense officers in case of emergency.

The building will be opened only for a warning--when a tornado is sighted or confirmed by members of the Civil Defense working with the National Weather Service and is a threat to the immediate area or city.

REGULATIONS:
A. Only the downstairs area will be opened.

B. Classrooms will not be opened until the corridor and mall area is full--approximately 300 persons.

C. The administrative area will be opened for radio, communications, and for sick room facilities and will be OFF LIMITS to the general public.

D. NO PETS will be allowed under any circumstances.

E. Smoking will be permitted only in designated areas.

F. Food will not be taken into carpeted areas.

G. All occupants will be subject to rules and regulations of regular Civil Defense authorities.

H. The school and school authorities will not be liable for the safety or protection of an individual or his possessions.

I. Occupants entering the downstairs area will be expected to remain there during the warning period.

J. All persons are expected to park in designated areas leaving the street clear, and enter the shelter at the east entrance.

K. It is advisable for occupants to bring battery operated lights. The building is equipped with minimum emergency lights in event there is a total electric failure.

CITIZENS ARE URGED TO COME TO THE DESIGNATED PARKING AREA DURING ANY CONCERN OF A WATCH PERIOD, HOWEVER, THE BUILDING WILL NOT BE OPENED UNTIL THERE IS AN ACTUAL WARNING.

If a warning comes during school hours, adults will be admitted after all children are in areas of safety.

God should be the center point of our homes and lives, (but is he?) America let's seek the kingdom of God Matthew 6:33; Romans 8:31. Jesus is the hope of the world.

Here are some facts and biblical teachings concerning the E.R.A.

"Bible believing people of all walks of life, both male and female should be aware of the serious consequences which could result from the ratification of the Federal Equal Rights Amendment (E.R.A.) ... The force of this proposed Amendment to our Constitution, if adopted, would seriously affect the home, the foundation of society, and traditional values of womanhood and manhood, as well as the religious freedom of many churches and religious institutions ... I believe this would be a very tragic and far-reaching law which would turn our society into a mess as well as seriously hamper the Cause of Christ and the church and throw our traditional moral values out the window ... I do not oppose the idea of "equal pay for equal work" or the concept that a woman has a right to work in this society. Neither do others who are opposing the E.R.A. ... We believe in women's rights!!! The E.R.A., however, would take away many special rights and privileges already granted women in America. People better take another look at this thing!!! - (1) She is to love her husband, Titus 2:4 ...
- (2) She is to obey her husband and be in subjection to him, Titus 2:4, 5; Eph. 5:22, 24; 1 Peter 3:1ff, cf. Gen. 3:16
- (3) She is to be a keeper at home, Titus 2:4, 5
- (4) She is to guide the house, 1 Tim. 5:14
- (5) She is to bear children, 1 Tim. 5:14
- (6) She is to reverence her husband, Eph. 5:33
- (7) She was created to help man, Gen. 2:18.

III. The Bible teaches that God has decreed a system of love, respect, authority and subjection. Male and female were created to fulfill differing purposes and these are specified by the Creator!!!

- (1) God views men and women as "one" or "equal" in Christ, Gal. 3:28
- (2) However, we still have different roles and responsibilities given by God. In 1 Cor. 11:3, we are told that God is the Head of Christ and Christ is the head of man and man is the head of woman. Thus we have GOD/Christ/man/woman ...
- (3) A woman is not to teach or usurp authority over a man, 1 Tim. 2:11, 12
- (4) Women are to remain silent in the church assembly, 1 Cor. 14:34, 35
- (5) This is not to imply that women have no place in the work of the church ... Timothy (a preacher) was taught by his mother and grandmother, 2 Tim. 1:5 ... Phoebe was a great servant of the church, Rom. 16:1 ... Jesus Christ was assisted by women in His work, Matt. 15:22ff, Luke 10:38ff ... the apostle Paul was thankful for the help of many women in his work, Phil. 4:3 ... There is much instruction in the Bible to insure that widows in the church are properly cared for, Acts 6:1ff and 1 Tim. 5.
- (6) We do not mean to imply that women have no place in the business world ... Lydia was a business woman (a seller of purple), Acts 16:14 Dorcas used her talents in the church, Acts 9:36ff ... One of the ideal descriptions of a woman in the Bible is found in Proverbs 31:10ff ... here a woman is commended for her great faith and industry.

IV. The Bible teaches that men have the responsibility of leadership in the church and men are to take the lead in public worship ... Christ chose men as apostles and yet he greatly honored women ... LOVE VERSUS HATE--

Had you ever thought how easy it is to HATE and so hard to LOVE? Love--a complex emotion hard to maintain.

We think of our emotions as being either positive or negative--Love, on the one hand, or hate on the other. But there is another important way in which emotions divide. They are also simple or complex. And this is what creates much of the trouble in the world.

Love, for example, is not difficult to sustain because it is a positive emotion, but because it is a complex one. Hate is easy to maintain for a lifetime, because it is a simple one.

That is, love requires the addition of other elements in order to play its proper role--it needs understanding, patience, tact, the willingness to be hurt or disappointed from time to time. Love alone, in its simplicity, is not enough to carry the burden of relationship.

Hate is a totally different matter; it is not the opposite of love. (As St. Augustine pointed out long ago, indifference is the opposite of love.) Hate is a supremely simple emotion that makes it enormously attractive to a certain kind of mind and personality.

First, hate makes no demand on our mental processes, and doesn't call on us to expand or change our views. In fact, it tends to remove doubt, and gives us sense of decision and a feeling of righteous well-being.

It doesn't call on any of the other emotions for support; indeed, it puts them quite out of court. It rejects understanding, despises tact, condemns patience, and will endure no hurt or disappointment without quick revenge.

Besides being the most simple of emotions, hate can also be the most fulfilling for a certain kind of people--because it provides him or her with a meaning to life, something to oppose, to blame, to relieve the sense of frustration or failure.

Most of all, because of its seductive simplicity, hate seems to remove the need for reasoning (an intolerable burden to many people), and for any of its auxiliary efforts, such as reading, analyzing, estimating and judging. Hate has only one object.

Love might be compared to the building of a tall and elaborate sandcastle, taking many hours of painstaking effort, cooperation, balance, and persistence; and hate to the foot that comes along with one

vicious or thoughtless kick

destroy in a moment what has been built up.

There is so little love in the world compared with the amount of hate--both expressed and latent--not because it is harder for us to be "positive" than "negative," but because it is harder to combine and coordinate a complex emotion in a creative act than to live blindly by blaming and attacking some "enemy" for dissatisfactions and disappointments. It takes a dedicated genius years to build a great cathedral; any desperado can bomb it to obliteration in a second. Why shouldn't hate, being so much easier, be so much popular?

A square dance will conclude the day's activities. All local and area people are invited to this Pioneer Round-Up to honor those pioneers who came to this country many, many years ago.

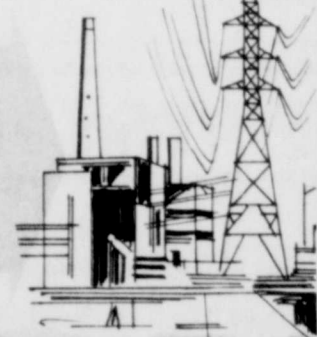

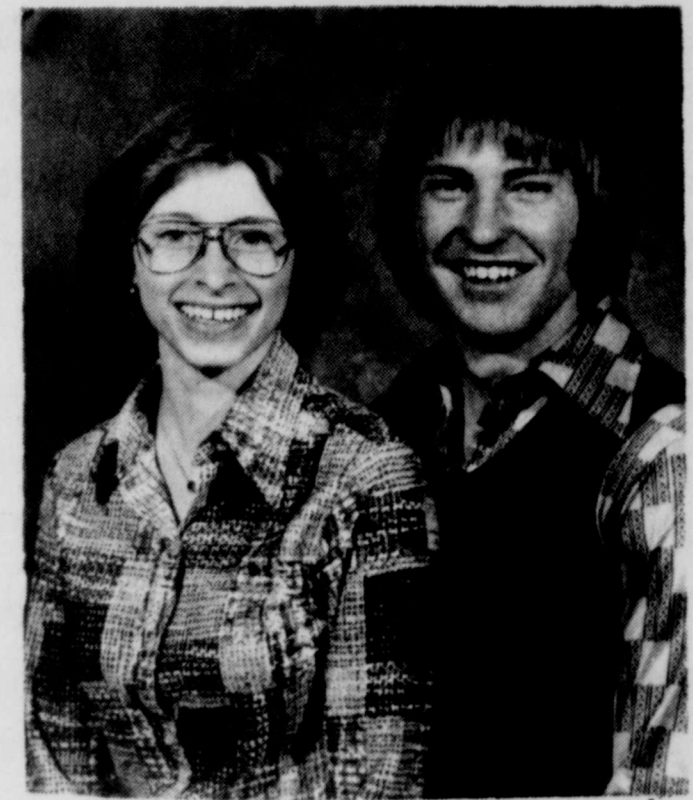

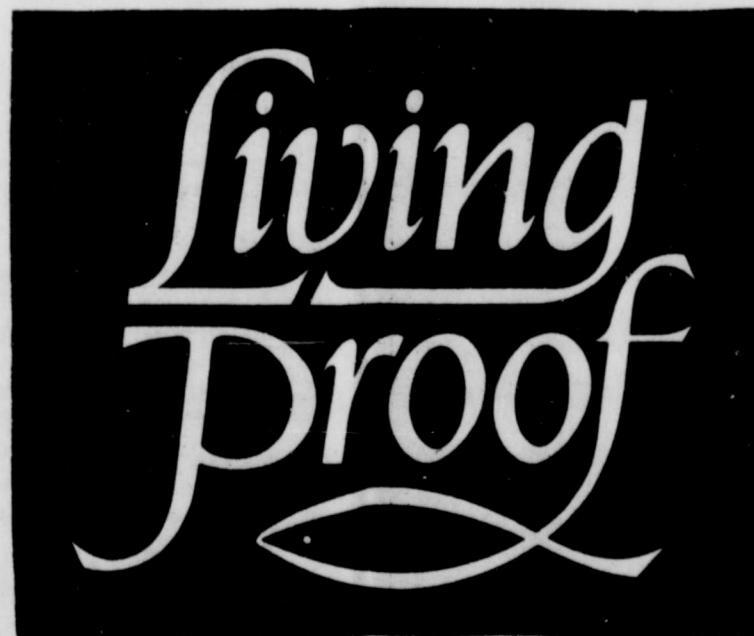
