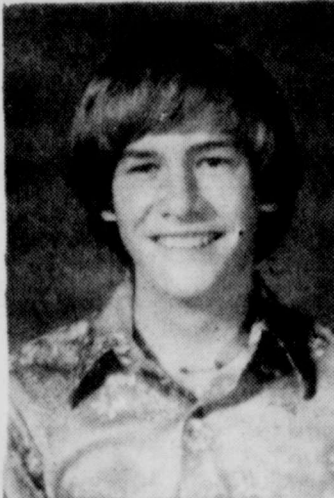

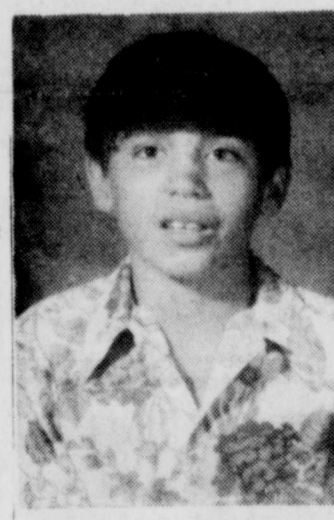

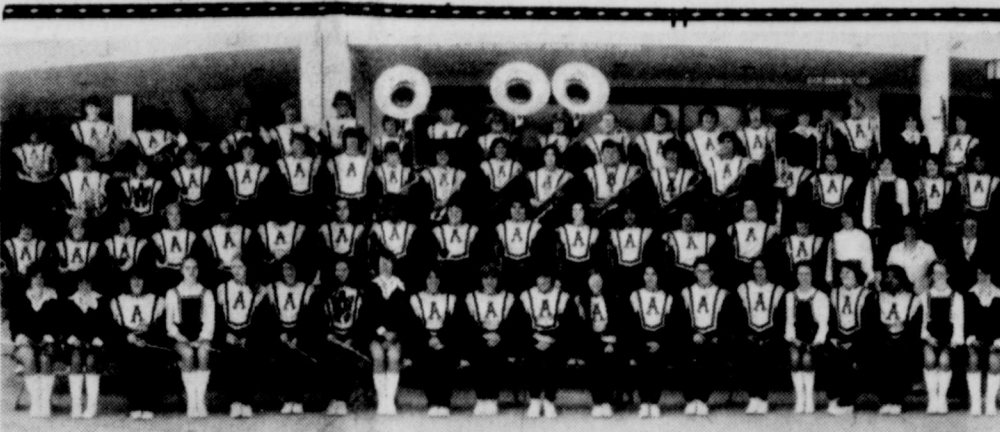
Beth Trolinder Selected Finalist In Miss Texas National Teen-Ager Pageant

Members of the faculties of Abernathy Junior High and Senior High will host a reception honoring Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Davenport who will be moving from our community this summer after having lived here since 1959. The reception will be in the Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church at nine o'clock, the night of May 22, following the baccalaureate services at Abernathy High School. MR. AND MRS. Curtis Davenport, long-time members of the Abernathy School faculty, will terminate their connections here sometime after the current school term. Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent, has not announced a successor to Davenport as AHS principal.

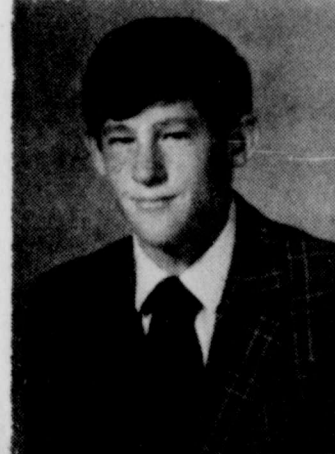

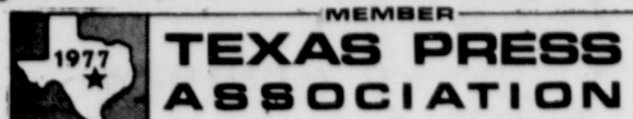

NEWS AND COMMENT

NGC--Monday, Oct. 18, was the only day in 1976 that one, or more, persons were not killed in motor vehicle traffic accidents in Texas. 1976 (leap year) had 366 days. From 1900 through 1977, 2,138,053 Americans died in U. S. highway accidents. From 1775 through 1976, 1,186,654 Americans died in all U. S. wars. The war that claimed the most American lives, 529,332, was the Civil War. World War Two claimed 407,828, for the second high in American lives lost in wars.

NGC--Joe Reeves has been cited for 25 years of service to Diamond Shamrock. His photo (see below) appeared in the current issue of the company magazine. Reeves has been employed at the Shamrock storage facility northwest of Abernathy for those 25 years, making him the oldest employee there in number of years of service.

NGC--Mrs. Jack Lane, secretary of Abernathy Chamber of Commerce, reports that President Carter has proclaimed the week of May 22 through May 28 as "Small Business Week" which covers most of the businesses in Abernathy.

NGC--South Plains College, Levelland, will put a Country Music Traveling Show on the road this summer to perform throughout the South Plains and Panhandle. Called "Texas--Cradle of Giants," the musical group is made up of SPC students. Playing saxophone and harp with the group will be Buddy Faulks of New Deal.

NGC--President Carter's push for amnesty and/or pardon for Vietnam war draft dodgers and/or deserters generally is unpopular with the citizens of the U. S. and with organizations for veterans. The American Legion has come out with a bumper sticker that includes the Legion's emblem and this text: "No Pardon Needed I Proudly Served". Anyone wishing to order such a

sticker may contact Herb Hardin or come by The Review office. We have the current copy of TEXAS LEGION NEWS giving the address where the stickers can be obtained by order. Another Carter-favored move to change the status of servicemen who received less than an honorable discharge. He wants to change this so the less-than-honorables can take advantage of the programs offered in the GI Bill. That, too, is unpopular with the majority of those who received full honorable discharge from the service.

NGC--Nearby Abilene is staging its Annual International Cowboy Campfire Cook-Off June 11 and 12. It will be held at the Old Abilene Town amusement park located on I-20 on the east side of Abilene city. Visitors at the cook-off will have an opportunity to sample some of the cowboy campfire grub. Of interest to riding club members will be the Open Horse Show, jackpot barrel racing, jackpot calf & steer roping, and any other trouble a person can get into with a horse," the publicity stated. NGC--Having seen both the muddy Mississippi River and the beautiful lakes of Arkansas, it seems to me the water from Arkansas flowing to West Texas would be more desirable. Besides, the Mississippi River people were not very happy over the suggestion of pointing their surplus water, now going to the Gulf, toward West Texas. According to reports, Arkansas is favorable to channeling its surplus water, now flowing to the Gulf, into West Texas. Thanks, Neighbor. Even before this offer, I liked Arkansas, and found it a very interesting State in which to vacation.

NGC--In a report from Billings D. Barnard, economist with the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, he paints a rosy picture for the future of cotton. He says cotton exports in February, 1977, were up 70 percent over the same month in 1976, reaching the highest level in three years. He also reports that Texas farmers are increasing acreage planted to cotton for this crop year, to 13.6 million acres, representing a 17 percent boost over last year. If cotton people can keep OSHA and the United Nations off their back, the 1977 crop may bring a lot of money to the South Plains. I don't completely understand the proposed UN action threatening to world stockpile and market cotton, but you can bet your bottom dollar that the United States and its cotton farmers will be the losers in any plan cooked up by the UN. President Carter should face up to his appointment mistake and recall Andrew Young from his post as ambassador to the UN. Better yet, why not pull the United States out of the UN?

NGC--Friday, May 13, didn't treat the Rev. HB Coggin very well. Driving to Plainview, a truck passed him, and as it was passing his car a bracket broke somewhere in the truck motor area. The broken

piece hit, and went inside, a \$50 tire on the minister's car.

NGC--Abernathy School Director of Bands, George Riddell, can file the 1976-1977 school year away and stamp it in big letters: "A SUCCESS." His AHS Antelope Band garnered a Sweepstakes rating in UIL contests earlier. For topping on the cake, Riddell's Junior High School band received the "Outstanding Band" trophy, in addition to making a No. 1 rating in both sight reading and concert playing at the UIL meet in Floydada Saturday. Also in Floydada that day, Riddell's Sixth Grade Band chalked-up top honors offered in that division... a first in sight reading and a first in concert playing.

Riddell will present these bands along with other school musical groups in concert tonight (Thursday). See story in this paper.

NGC--Snide remarks about Anita Bryant on NBC's TONIGHT SHOWS last week lend credence to the following quote from the News & Comment column in The Review dated March 24, 1977: "Judging from what comes on the screen, homos are rapidly taking over in television." Anita Bryant, the "orange juice from Florida" lady, is receiving nationwide publicity in her battle against a law favorable to the Miami area homosexuals. A proposed repeal of the homo-favoring law is to be considered by a vote of the people. This publicity caused a network to cancel the TV series she was to have done, sponsored by a sewing machine manufacturer. A number of TONIGHT SHOWS last week had poking-fun remarks about Anita Bryant. This is a format the show uses to put down people. By that action, the TONIGHT SHOW indicates that it is favorable to the gay liberation movement, and that it will attempt to intimidate anyone who speaks out against the disgusting practice of homosexuality. This subject is repugnant to me, and to those who may read this column. The homos are coming out of the closet like worms out of the woodwork. There will be more about this subject on television, radio and in the print media. The nation waited too late to rise up against the violence pouring from the TV screen... the practice had too much of a head start before the nation woke up to what was happening. Taking A Vacation?

Taking a vacation this summer? Are you going to visit relatives, maybe go to Disney World or Astro-world, visit Dallas or San Antonio. Maybe you are going on a long fishing trip, or camping to get away from it all. You will use the time well and it is very likely someone else will enjoy your vacation and use the time you have given him well. He is called a Criminal and he specializes in burglary, theft, fraud, robbery or whatever strikes his fancy. Your regional law enforcement agencies would like to share with you some

suggestions to keep the criminal away and help you protect your property.

There are a number of things you need to do, but starting now if you haven't already, you need to participate in Operation Identification and mark your property. You can obtain an engraver on loan from your police or sheriffs department and they have a Crime Prevention Officer to advise you of the type of property you should mark. For jewelry and other items like paintings, antiques and guns that you do not want to mark you should take a

colored photograph of the property and on the back of the picture write a full description and price. If the property should be stolen you can then give this to the police or sheriffs department and they will be able to conduct a better investigation.

Also if you are going on vacation utilize your neighbors, close relatives and the police or sheriffs office. Your neighbor or relative can help keep an eye on your place, collect mail, ensure grass is kept mowed and yard neat. They can also enter your house from time to time and switch on different lights, put their car

in your driveway while and most importantly notify the police or sheriff of suspicious persons and activities around your home. The police or sheriff should be notified of the times you will be away, who has a key and will be around the home, information on cars and lights. They will check your home and be able to respond better to a burglary if they know what is going on.

These are some of the things you need to prepare for now, but there are many things you can do. This is the first in a series of articles to help you protect your property and ensure your vacation is pleasant.

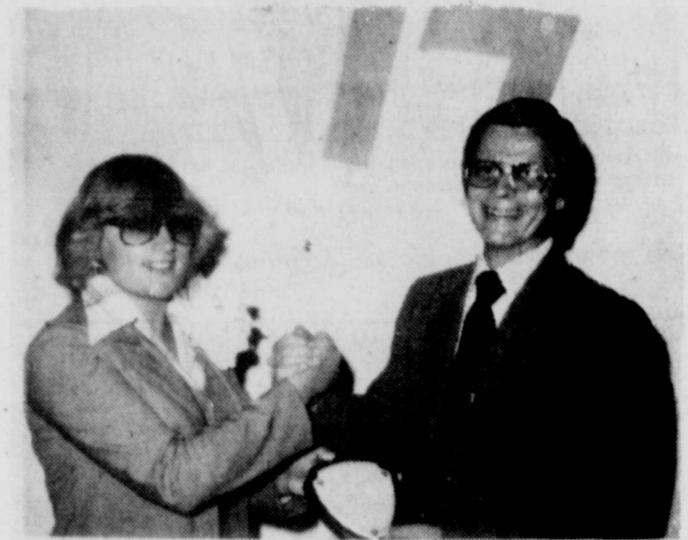

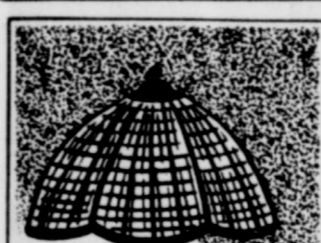

In-Home Help For The Elderly

LUBBOCK-Homemaker service aides who will provide in-home help for elderly persons in 15 West Texas counties have become more professionally trained to serve the aging through a Texas Tech University-directed program.

The aides have participated in a 15-session training program conducted by the College of Home Economics and financed by a grant from the Administration on Aging (AOA) of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Many of those who enrolled in the training course completed it satisfactorily, others began late and will require further training, according to Gail House, director of the Homemaker Service Aide Program (HSAP) and member of the Texas Tech Home Management faculty. Approximately 50 homemaker service aides were enrolled. Fifteen family care providers employed by the Texas Department of Public Welfare also participated in the training. The Department made special arrangements with Texas Tech's College of Home Economics for its employees' participation. The course covered first aid, personal care,

psychology and physiology of aging, care of the terminally ill, food and nutrition, home management, clothing needs, consumer education, rehabilitation and sources of assistance for the elderly.

HSAP provides quality, in-home care services of meal preparation, personal care, home management, escort service, visitation and companionship for the elderly, House said.

The aides work with elderly in Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum counties.

The program is designed to provide services to elderly persons in the community where they and the aides both live. These services enable persons over 60 years of age to function in their own homes with limited assistance. The program also provides employment and paraprofessional training opportunities for mature, underemployed homemakers.

Those with a number of years' experience in managing a household are given preference in employment. Persons over 60 are eligible to receive homemaker services, based on their ability to pay.

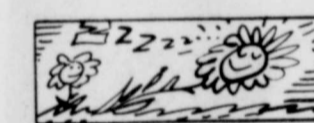
I remember your first banquet--You were a Freshman and you had a date with Mark, a real nice boy down the street. You were walking on "cloud 9".

USDA Announces Dates And Rules For Beef Research

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced June 6 as the beginning of a two-week registration period for the Beef Research and Information Order referendum and issued rules for the referendum.

Anyone who was a cattle producer during 1976 can register to vote, either in person or by mail, at local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices between June 6 and June 17.

A list of those who register will be posted daily at ASCS offices and a final listing will be posted five days after registration closes.

Those registered can vote between July 5 and July 15 at their ASCS office. For approval of the Beef Research and Information Order, at least 50 percent of those registered must vote, and two-thirds of them must favor it.

The Order that producers will consider in the upcoming referendum would authorize a research and information program administered by a Beef Board of up to 68 producers. Board members would be appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture from nominations submitted by producer organizations. Each state or geographic area would be represented in proportion to its cattle production.

The Beef Board could initiate a broad spectrum of projects to improve beef production, distribution, and marketing. Such a program could include consumer education and information, and research.

During the first three years of operation, the Board could collect assessments of up to three-tenths of one percent of the value of all cattle sold. After that, the rate of assessment could be changed but could not exceed five-tenths of one percent--the maximum amount permitted under the Beef Research and Information Act. Producers not wishing to participate in the program could have their assessment refunded.

The rules for conducting the referendum are scheduled to be published in the May 17 Federal Register. Copies will be available from Program Operation Division, ASCS, U. S. Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013.

Storm Shelter Information:

The weather warning and observation plan for the city of Abernathy provides three types of warnings:

1. Tornado Watch---the area roped off by Kansas City to warn of the possibility that tornadoes could occur in this area for a certain time period.

2. Tornado Warning---this warning is given by the National Weather Service when a tornado is sighted and confirmed and is a threat to an immediate area or city.

3. Hail Warning---this warning is given when hail is possible for a given area or city.

Mr. Curtis Daveport and Mr. Charles Bowen as members of the Abernathy Civil Defense Team will be stationed at the Junior High School and will open the building when a tornado warning is issued. Other administrators will have a key and their names and phone numbers will be listed with the Civil Defense officers in case of emergency.

The building will be opened only for a warning--when a tornado is sighted or confirmed by members of the Civil Defense working with the National Weather Service and is a threat to the immediate area or city.

REGULATIONS:

A. Only the downstairs area will be opened.

B. Classrooms will not be opened until the corridor and mall area is full--approximately 300 persons.

C. The administrative area will be opened for radio, communications, and for sick room facilities and will be OFF LIMITS to the general public.

D. NO PETS will be allowed under any circumstances.

E. Smoking will be permitted only in designated areas.

F. Food will not be taken into carpeted areas.

Negotiations Underway With General Telephone

Talks between Communications Workers of America Local 12171 and General Telephone of the Southwest are continuing in San Angelo, according to a joint statement issued Friday (April 15).

Negotiations center around presentation of full details of each proposal submitted by the union and company.

The spokesmen said tentative agreement has been reached on some items. All agreements on individual proposals are tentative until agreement is reached on a total package.

The union presented 35 proposals March 15. Included were wage increases with cost of living adjustments; improvements in the pension program; health and life insurance and vacation plan; addition of dental and prescription drug insurance and two new holidays, as well as various contract language clarification and modification.
