





Many of their constituents firmly believe that cloud seeding to prevent hail also prevents rain. The hail prevention planes have not been flying during the recent rainy season that started in mid-April. The Texas Water Development Board will not decide on

granting, or not granting, the weather modification permit until June 2, 1977, reports said. The cloud seeders are seeking a fouryear permit. As individuals, the Commissioners have a right to their own opinions on the subject, but they were out of line in giving their endorsement to cloud seeding as officials of Hale County


