SCHOOL TAXES TO INCREASE

The failure of the 65th Legislature to enact a school finance bill will be felt by most schools in the State. Abernathy is no exception. --At its regular meeting on June 6th, the local Board of Education learned that with the legislative failure, the local school will become budget balanced because all of the financial controls set by the 64th legislature expired this school year. Budget balanced means that no state money for maintenance and operation will be granted to the Abernathy ISD. (Last year this amounted to \$257,393). The Board of Education authorized the Board of Equalization to meet June 22nd and set new ratios of value on taxable property. It was pointed out that Abernathy will be budget balanced, it will still have the lowest taxes within a hundred mile radius-only .1%, compared to Lubbock, 66% of what Plainview pays, .64% compared to Petersburg, .78% when comparing to New Deal and 88% compared to Hale Center--and this is before adjustments are made in these communities to meet the problems imposed by the failure of Legislature.

Should a special session enact a bill-and it must for the survival of many schools--the local schools would probably not be granted as much state money as it had the previous year.

In other action, the Board reviewed bids for an elementary physical education facility and planned to let a contract after examining buildings of a similar nature. (This bid was let at a special meeting Thursday night, June 9th. Hallmark Builders of Lubbock will complete the 60x80 building within the next 120 days.)

The Board set August 1st as the date to receive bids for a Depository Contract for the next biennium.

Resignations were accepted from L.D. Monroe, Pat Corning, Janet Herrington, and Jana Cook.

The final action item on the Agenda was the appointing of the fiscal auditor. The firm of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert, Moss and Company was appointed.

In non-action items, the Board accepted as presented, reports concerning Tax Collection (96.90% collected), enrollment-1114 students finished the school year with a high enrollment of 1180 during December; Luncheon report which revealed the average participation of 608 for the school year.

The next regular meeting was set for 8:00 p.m. on June 30th. Those in attendance at this meeting were: Billie Harrison, President; Bob Riley, Vice-President; Daniel Fondy, Richard Howard; Don McKenzie; and Jerry Oswalt. Others in attendance at this meeting were Mr. Earl Carter, business manager and Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent.

Canner Clinic In Plainview

A pressure canner clinic will be held at the Hale County Agriculture Center on Saturday, June 25 between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., states Mrs. Wynon Mayes, County Extension Agent. A fee of \$3.00 will be charged for this service.

Local home gardeners will be harvesting vegetables and fruits in the next few weeks, so it is time to get your pressure canner in proper working order.

You may bring your pressure canners to the Ag Center any time during the testing hours. Mrs. Ruby Harper will check them as she has done in the past.

It is very important that pressure canners be tested each year, states Mrs. Mayes, and we urge every homemaker to take advantage of this testing clinic. This is the only date that canners will be tested this year.

Each test will take approximately 30 minutes. You may bring the canners by early and leave them to be tested states Mrs. Mayes, and picked up in the afternoon.

Many of you can remember when the city had one part-time worker and one full-time employee. The part-time employee was the late Elizabeth Goebel, whose main employment was with Reid Chevrolet. The full-time employee was the late Ocie Rutledge, who wore two hats... one as the local law enforcement officer, and the other was that of city water superintendent work during the daylight hours and being the officer, City Marshal and night watchman. He worked day and night with a minimum amount of sleep during the day if he was not doing water superintendent work. Then, the city's only "rolling stock" was a wheelbarrow that Rutledge used in the water dept. You've come a long way, Abernathy.
