Elbert Harp, director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, will be present to review the proposals for legislation being considered now by Congress, and the general grain outlook.

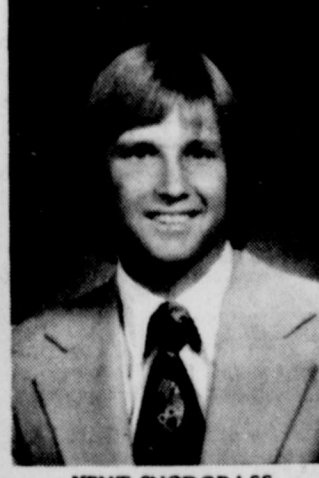

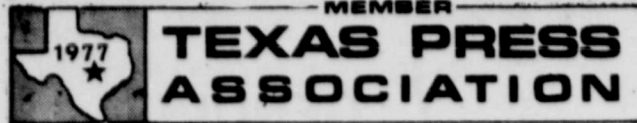

**NEWS AND COMMENT

NGC--The amassing of millions of dollars in wealth by the Billy Graham organization comes as a disillusioning surprise to some. For others, however, it left them with an "I told you so" smirk on their faces.

NGC--Warning to those who plan to have commercial printing done: After April 15, 1978, business reply cards, and possibly other type mailings, will not be accepted for mailing if they are less than 3 1/2 by 5 inches in size and less than 7/1000-inch thick, and that's not very thick. And, other bad news from the U. S. Postal Service: on July 6th, this year, postal rates will increase for second class publications, which includes newspapers. Postal increases effective July 6 will average 21 per cent, and also will apply to third and fourth class mail.

NGC---I'm getting a little weary of the complaints and "soul searching" coming down from Capitol Hill in Washington. The Representatives and Senators are reluctant to shore-up Social Security with money from the general fund of the treasury. They're attempting to make Social Security recipients the villain in the existing dilemma. I receive Social Security checks. I am not one of the villains. I have earned every penny in every monthly SS check I receive. I have no apologies to government, the media, to the Congress or to any individual for drawing Social Security. There was no moaning and groaning from Capitol Hill when Representatives and Senators quietly sat by and let their individual salaries be raised by some \$12,000 per year. Much of the trouble in which Social Security finds itself was created by Congress and administrations, present and past. Congress passed laws and presidents signed bills siphoning off money paid into Social Security trust fund by employees, employers and the self-employed. Congress, through laws, has doled out \$5 million to millions of persons who had never paid a penny into Social Security. In effect, Congress has met foreigners coming to the United States at the shores and/or at the airports when they land here and right away handed them a Social Security card, and some immediately were put on the rolls to receive checks from Social Security. Social Security now includes welfare categories not originally intended to be paid out of the SS trust fund. I don't question the help that persons in some of

these categories receive. Much of it is justified. But, this money should come out of the general fund of the treasury...not out of the Social Security trust fund that workers, farmers, business, industry and other self-employed persons built up for their retirement years. Also, how much has been borrowed from the SS trust fund by other departments of the federal government? Are these departments making principal and interest payments on money borrowed from the Social Security trust fund? Also, the Social Security trust fund should have billions of dollars that have been paid in by people who died and never collected a SS check on the money paid into Social Security. All Social Security pays out in some of these cases is about \$250 in burial expenses per person. In some cases, money goes to survivors, but I have first hand knowledge of some instances where the burial allowance was all that \$5 was out on worker's adult lifetime of paying money into the trust fund. If the U. S. government would cut out the billions paid for foreign aid for ten years, or more, that money could help restore the funds illegally taken out of the SS trust fund.

NGC--The persons who make up the two branches of Congress now hope to have much of their campaign expenses come out of money U. S. taxpayers have paid in. This should never be allowed to happen. And, the law allowing U. S. tax dollars to be used in presidential elections should be repealed. Look how many millions were wasted in 1976, when the list of non-viable presidential hopefuls received money for campaigns.

LIBRARY NEWS

The Abernathy Public Library announces today the receipt of Texas Folk Songs by William A. Owens, a gift of Southern Methodist University Press and the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities.

Texas Folk Songs includes 135 songs, a number of them in versions by more than one singer. The book is divided into nine chapters containing British popular ballads, Anglo-American ballads, Anglo-American love songs, Anglo-American comic songs, songs and games for children, play-party songs and games, Anglo-American spirituals, and Afro-American secular songs.

The British ballads were brought to America in the seventeenth century and later carried westward to Texas by the adventurous pioneers who settled the state. The later American love ballads are mournful and plaintive songs, while the Anglo-American comic songs are full of raw, rugged and raucous humor exemplifying the pioneer West.

New music transcriptions of the melodies have been provided by musicologist Jessie Ann Owens from the original recordings. Although bibliographical source notes are included, Texas Folk Songs is not a book just for scholars. These songs have been collected, as Owens has written, "for those who love to sing them as well as for those who have an interest in the past."

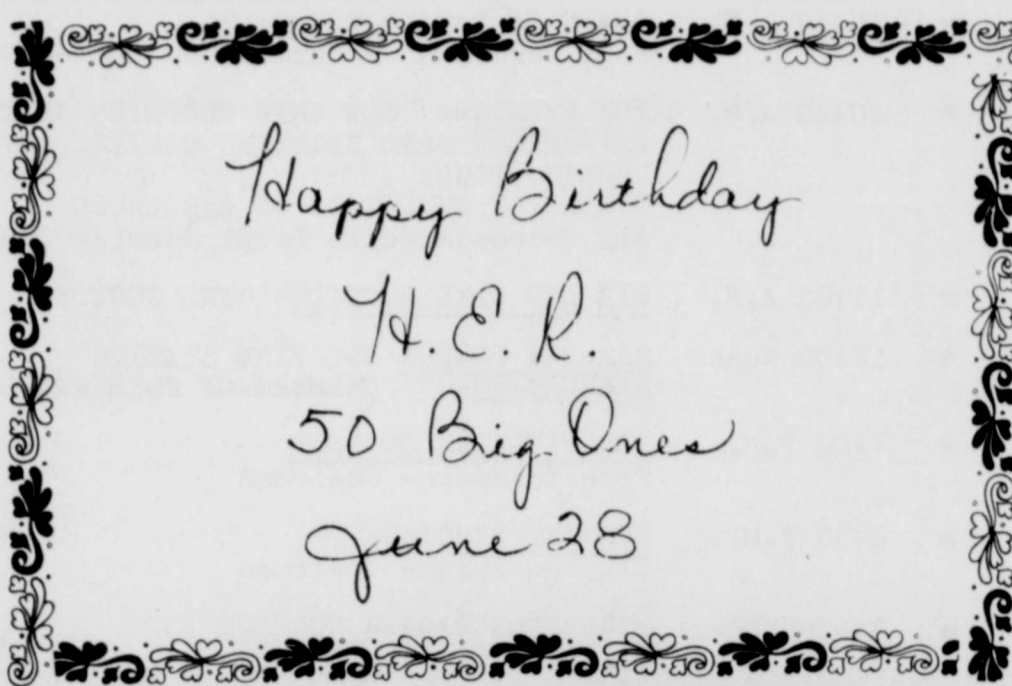
Hale County has fashioned an event that other counties may wish to incorporate in their future plans, so we are indeed grateful for all the support we were given.

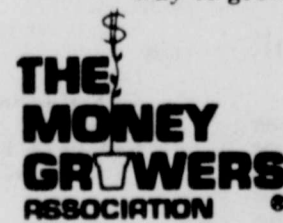

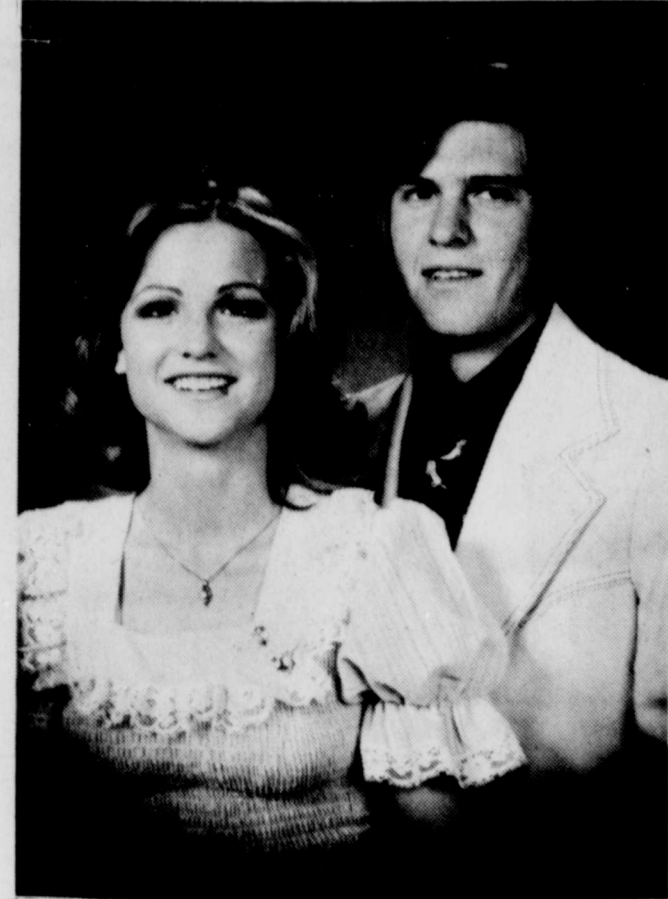

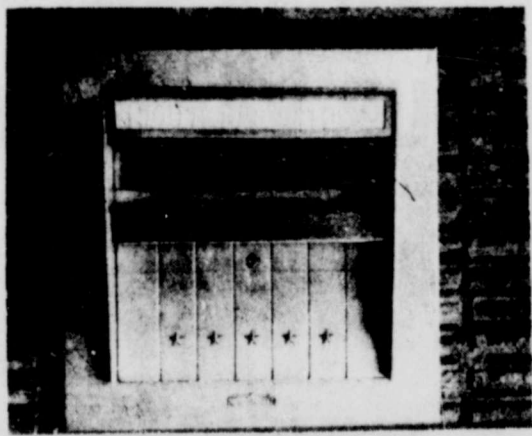

Recipe Of The Week

EVER READY REFRIGERATED BRAN MUFFINS
Recipe Submitted By Dyvena Davis

Combine 2 cups boiling water and 2 cups Nabisco 100% Bran and let set to add last.

Cream together 1 cup Crisco and 2 cups sugar in large bowl. Add 4 well beaten eggs. Stir together 5 cups flour, 5 tsp. soda, 1 1/2 tsp. salt, and add alternately with 1 qt. buttermilk, beat and add 4 cups Kellogg's All-Bran and blend into the batter. Then add the soaked bran and mix well. Pour into 4 or 5 large jars and refrigerate (do not freeze). Fill greased and floured muffin pans 1/2 full. Bake at 400 degrees for about 20 minutes.
