Graciela Quinonez Receives Scholarship

Graciela Quinonez, valedictorian of the 1977 graduating class of Abernathy High School, has been awarded an \$800 Carl B. and Florence E. King Foundation Scholarship by Texas Interscholastic League Foundation.

The King Foundation provided funds for 12 of the \$800 scholarships to be awarded by TILF on the basis of competition in League academic and literary contests, scholastic records, achievement test scores and work in school and community activities.

Miss Quinonez earned eligibility for the scholarship through competing in League spelling contest. This year she won first in district, third in region and second in state. She also competed in the solo and ensemble music contests, earning division I and II ratings.

Ranking 105 scholastically in her class of 73, she earned a high school grade average of 96.59. She was a Girls State delegate and member of the school band. She was a National Honor Society member and participated in band for four years. She earned All-Regional Band Honors in 1975-1976 and 1977.

"Miss Quinonez is an outstanding student," said Dr. Rhea H. Williams, TILF secretary. "She earned excellent grades, scored high on the achievement tests, and had a great history of work in school and community activities. We are proud to have her as a King Scholar."

She plans to study at Texas Tech University, but has not yet decided on her major field.

Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Aurelia Quinonez of Abernathy.

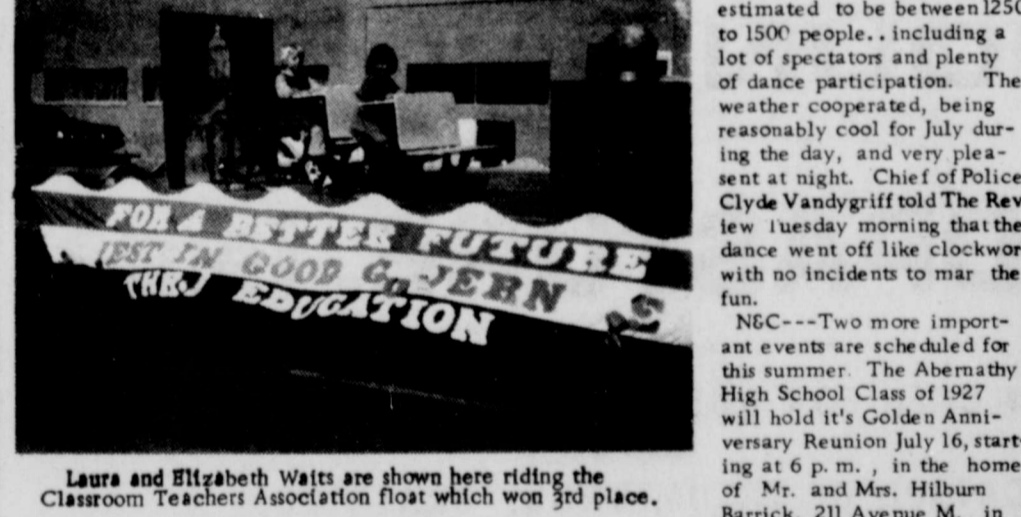
WINNING FLOAT - Shown here is the Music Club float that won 1st place in the July 4th parade.

Don E. Snodgrass Earns Doctor Degree

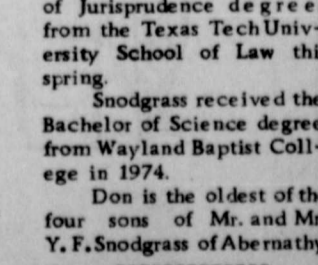

Don is the oldest of the four sons of Mr. and Mrs. Y. F. Snodgrass of Abernathy.

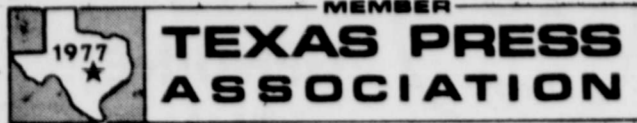

NEWS AND COMMENT

NGC---Dennis Rhodes, manager of Service Grain Co., has an energy saver that is unusual. It is a cigarette lighter that uses solar energy to fire up the "cotton nails". He declares that it works. It uses the same principle as directing sun rays on an object through a thick piece of glass.

NGC--Warning! If you plan to fly out of Lubbock Regional Air Terminal, we suggest that you have family or a friend take you then pick you up when you return. If you park your car in the short term lot at that airport, your car parking could equal, or exceed, the cost of your flight ticket, depending on where you fly and how long you stay.

A local man parked his car in the short term lot at Lubbock airport, flew to Dallas round trip for \$30, leaving his car there 7:05 a.m. one day and returning at 3:50 p.m. the next. His parking charge of \$9.00 was near one-third of the cost of his plane ticket. Use the long-term parking lot... it should be cheaper. When the old air terminal was being used, we parked a car there for five days and the charge was only \$5.00.

NGC--Clean Air, Clean Water. You can't fault that no more than you could "Mother, Home and Church." That much of the "Environmentalists" demands is agreeable. Their militancy in every progressive proposal made indicates to me that they are going much too far. They're doing to the United States what an enemy country would like to do to the United States... stop all progress in this country.

NGC--From the very first of Ralph Nader's activities that started more than a decade ago, I have been pondering the question: Is he friend or foe? Automobiles today cost from \$500 to a \$1000 more due to Nader-instigated requirements. Some of his activities over the years have eventually resulted in hamstringing progress in industries, businesses and growth of the economy. Scores of former Nader workers have found places in the higher reaches of the Carter administration and on Capitol Hill. Some of these people are said to be in positions that will give them "a crack at reorganizing the government," quoting from a Washington datelined AP news story. I do not like having people with a Nader background "reorganizing the government."

NGC--Our Representatives and Senators in Austin and Washington are not paying enough attention to the rules and regulations being put forth by appointees and aides in government.

However, here is one exception: The U. S. House of Representatives did vote to kill the regulation issued May 9 by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and which the agency admitted was drawn to accommodate homosexuals in programs of rent or mortgage subsidies. The HUD regulation would have permitted housing aid for homosexuals living together if they met the low income criteria. There is bound to be many homosexuals in the various departments of federal government. Anita Bryant won the battle in Miami, but she will lose the war in Washington.

The U. S. Supreme Court, in a decision handed down a lot of years ago, says that a person cannot be turned down for a job in federal government solely on the basis of the person being a homosexual. What the gays lost in Miami, they expect to win in Washington by taking their pleadings to the Supreme Court.

NGC--San Antonio, the city in Texas that draws the most out-of-state tourists, is staging its annual Texas Folklife Festival August 4-7. For many of the older visitors it will be a nostalgic trip into the past. You will see lye soap being made, cane mill squeezing the juice from stalks to make syrup, a rope-maker at work, a log house, corn shucking, candy pulling, milking, house raising, quilting bees, rail splitting, spike driving, skilled cowboy wood carvers, and on and on. For the gourmet who likes to sample foods from other countries, he can try Mexican food, German food, Swiss food, Chinese food, and foods from dozens of other countries. And, you can wash it down in an authentic English pub. There'll be arts, crafts, costumes, displays. And, there's one guy that specializes in kissing a crowd. That may sound silly, but it's quite a feat to do that without getting your nose painfully pinched. Site of the Festival is the place where the HemisFair was held. We have a brochure at The Review office if you're interested.

NGC--The administration and Congress, with their proposed farm programs, are killing the goose that laid the golden egg. The proposed programs will ruin the farmers, with prices depressed below the cost of production. The object of the proposed farm programs, I believe, is an effort of government to force down the cost of food. This government thinks, will make the consumers happy with the current Democratic Congress and administration. They are looking for votes in 1978 and 1980. Compared

to the Democratic-proposed farm programs, the farmer never had it so good as it was under the previous two Republican administrations. The best all around year that farmers ever had was 1973, when Nixon was president.

NGC--If, and when or ever, Congress makes a thorough investigation of the Korean "Gift-Giving" to members of that body and others in Federal Government, it will make Watergate look like a Sunday School picnic. Watergate was carried out by underlings. Korean Gift-Giving smacks of bribery, or intent to bribe, elected officials and others in government.

NGC--Here's a slogan coined by consumer activists, and going the rounds in the Northeast, that could spell doom for the farmers: "Food is For People, Not For Profit." The activists are so uninformed that they don't know that producers of food must make a profit in order to continue producing food. An instance: In the recent past when dairy farmers were dumping milk because of the non-profitable market, a tv interviewer asked a New York housewife what she thought of this action... her reply: "I don't care, I get my milk from the supermarket."

NEWS & COMMENT:

Some ingenious Abernathians should invent a magnetic carpet, or floor scanner to pick up needles and straight pins before people find them with their bare feet. There would have to be a light or buzzer activated by metal because pins and needles sometime become imbedded in the pile of the carpet and couldn't be picked up by a magnet. I know of three incidents where local people have had needles and/or pins stuck deep in their feet. E. J. Pope, Jr. had this experience several years ago. Daughter Vicki Havens' needle-in-the-foot experience resulted in surgery, a \$600 doctor and hospital bill and a lot of pain.

The latest such incident was June 29, when Mrs. Gary Phillips spent over an hour in the emergency room of a Lubbock hospital having a needle removed from one of her feet. The needle stuck in her foot "eye" first.

Nominations open for Sorghum Board

Grain sorghum producers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on Sept. 15.

Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are C.C. Reed of Kress, Worth Jones of Happy, Lee Hill of Dalhart, and A.R. Dillard of Hereford. All incumbents are eligible for reelection to the 6-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and pays the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

QUALIFIED PERSONS wishing to have their name placed in nomination for membership on the board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and 10 others who are also eligible to vote.

Application must be filed by Aug. 15, at the TGSPB office, 1708-A 15th, Lubbock, Tex. 79401. Forms are available at that office.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPB office by Sept. 15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by Sept. 2, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

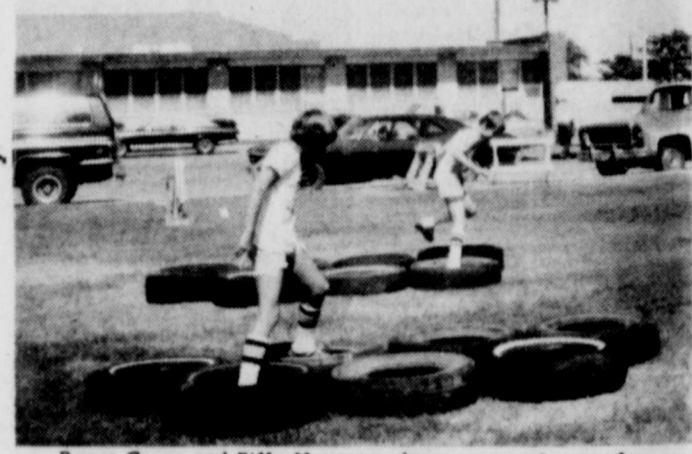

"TEXAS" SEASON UNDERWAY NOW

The rider returned to the saddle in the cliff at the Pioneer Amphitheatre in the Palo Duro Canyon and lifted his flag to open the 12th season of the musical drama, "Texas", on June 15, 1977.

Members of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, Inc., the producers of "Texas", will gather in special sections to greet the 12th version of the Paul Green script.

This year, their special guests will be representatives of the oil and gas industry in the Texas Panhandle. As is the custom, the program for the opening will carry the story of a part of the growth of the area, the story of the unexpected and spectacular development, oil.

It begins with C. N. Gould, a geologist for the U. S. Geological Survey who came here looking for windmill sites and who happened to notice significant geological structures.

M. C. Nobles hired Mr. Gould to point out these areas, and formed the Amarillo Oil Company with R. B. Masterson, C. T. Herring, Lee Bivins and others to drill on the Masterson ranch. On December 13, 1918, a gas well came in. Unfortunately, at that time, few uses for gas were known.

The following year, Eugene Blasdel, W. H. Fuqua, and P. H. Landergin leased a portion of the 6666 Ranch. The Gulf Production Company drilled here and brought in the first oil well on April 5, 1920. A son was born to Mr. Blasdel that day and he bears the name, James Gulf Blasdel.

Tex McIlroy brought in several wells for the Dixon Creek Oil Company, and the rip-roaring boom town of Borger was founded in 1926 to serve the oil development, Tex Thornton, the famed trouble shooter for the industry, worked here.

Members of the families of these oil pioneers will be special guests at this opening night of "Texas".

The developers of the oil industry will be included. Representatives of the Diamond Shamrock Oil and Gas, the Yucca Petroleum Company, Mesa Petroleum, the drillers, the suppliers, the leasers, the furnishers of tools, and the independent operators will all be represented. Presidents of the Panhandle Producers and Royalty Owners Association have been invited to represent the oilmen now in the field.

Slide Show Is Available For Programs In Area

"Prime Farmland" is the topic of a new slide show prepared by the USDA Soil Conservation Service. Bob Arheger, district conservationist for Soil Conservation Service at Lubbock, said the 11-minute presentation explores the loss of the nation's best farmland and the possible consequences of this loss.

About 3 million acres of rural land each year are shifted from agriculture to other uses—such as housing development, ponds and lakes, highways, shopping centers, and parking lots.

Many of these acres were among our most productive in terms of food and fiber. But once they are sealed over by homes and asphalt, they are lost to agriculture forever.

The "Prime Farmland" slide show reports on steps taken by several state and local governments to protect this valuable land. It also tells about Soil Conservation Service's prime farmland inventory now underway throughout the country.

In addition to its importance to farmers and ranchers, the show will be of interest to civic and service clubs, conservation and environmental groups, state and local governing bodies, and schools.
