JUNIOR CLASS PRESENTS PLAY ABERNATHY COMMUNITY CO-OPS TO "GOOD MORNING, MISS DOVE" SPONSOR HEALTH SCREENING PROGRAM

Abernathy Consumers Fuel co-op Manager Dub Royal today announced that the 4 Abernathy community Co-op's will be sponsoring "a unique program of health screening for its members and patrons.

"We're very pleased to be able to sponsor this program and feel it will be a tremendous benefit to our membership", he said.

A team of five paramedical technicians, including a registered nurse, will be in Abernathy beginning Oct. 15 with a sophisticated mobile screening clinic. The van will be located at the Abernathy City Hall and will remain until all co-op patrons have had an opportunity to take advantage of the program.

The van is equipped with the latest in electronic biomedical equipment capable of determining over 110 medical criteria. Once the data is compiled it is interpreted in light of a past medical history by state licensed specialists. After the data has been reviewed, the entire profile including x-rays are sent to the participant's physician. A copy of the data is sent to each participant and they are advised to consult their physician concerning the findings for diagnosis and treatment where needed. The program is not intended to replace regular visits to physicians but rather to act as an adjunct to their practice, by creating valuable and needed medical data on persons who would not

normally be seeing a doctor. "Co-ops have been helping the farmer for years in meeting his needs. I think the health of the farmer and his family is just as important as the other services we

"The Co-op sponsored program eliminates virtually all of the major reasons for not having a yearly checkup. It is convenient, extensive and inexpensive, only \$69 for adults and \$45 for child-

ren," Mr. Maguire stated. Explaining why preventing medicine is so important, Maguire pointed out, "The problem is that most people don't seek medical attention when they think nothing is bothering them. But they should because the time they spend now could save them a lot more time and suffering in the future. We pick up some serious problems. Many people who come through this van have something they should be aware of. It may not be a serious problem now and, in most cases, a simple program worked out with their physician can keep it under control.

"Among the serious situscreening are heart disease, diabetes, glaucoma, and respiratory problems; things that crop up without you ever noticing. It just makes good sense to protect against the

unforeseen. ' Screening will begin Saturday. Co-op patrons wishing to schedule appointments may do so by calling 298-4207-4209-4211. By making appointments, people will have no waiting period and can complete their visit within 1 hour.

"This program has really gotten people excited. Throughout the co-ops of the Midwest, we've met with tremendous response. We have screened well over 60,000 people in the last two years. In many co-ops we have run about 35% of the patrons and in several cases well over 50%. We are very pleased with the results and it is really nice to know we are helping people," Maguire concluded.

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PWIA applies for permit

Members of Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview have begun legal steps in securing a permit to engage in weather modification activities over a portion of the High Plains.

In recent years, the permits have run into vocal opposition from throughout the area. In a series of elections in 1977, voters from Swisher, Randall, Lamb, Hockley, Bailey, Castro, Floyd and Briscoe Counties turned down the projects. PWIA officers received permission from

the Texas Department of Water Resources on Friday to advertise intent to apply for the 1978 permit, the first step in securing permission to again make the weather flights which were halted after the 1977 Legal notices stating the intent to

pearing in several target area newspapers on Thursday and will continue once a week for three weeks

ACCORDING TO a spokesman for PWIA, the 1978 target area includes all of Hale County except election precinct 9 (the Abernathy area): Swisher County election

precinct 12 (the southwest corner of the county); Lamb County election precincts 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, 12, 13, 15 and 16 (the northern and eastern portions of the county), Castro County election precincts 6, 7, 10, 11 and 16 (the southern portion of the county) and Floyd County election precincts 3, 4, 7 and 16 (Sandhill, Barwise and Providence

According to PWIA, the intended purpose of the four-year, year-round weather modification activities is "to increase rainfall and decrease hailfall in the target area . . . (with) pyrotechnics (flares) and wing-tip liquid generators for dispensing silver-iodide nuclei near cloud base.'

According to the spokesman for the weather modification firm, opponents may circulate petitions calling for an election over the entire target area to decide on whether the permit will be granted, but 10 percent of the registered voters casting ballots in the last election must sign the petitions within 30 days after the first notice is issued.

"WE DON'T EXPECT much opposition from the target area, but we don't know if an election will be called this year," the spokesman told The Herald this morning.




ahead and apply again this year." The proposed target area included a portion of the area covered in 1977 by Atmospherics, Inc., contracted agent for Better Weather of Littlefield. According to the PWIA spokesman, Atmospherics, Inc. will not be returning in 1977 to conduct modification activities in the High Plains and many of the Better Weather members have joined PWIA to conduct joint operations.

The enlarged operation will be conducted from the Plainview-Hale County Airport under the direction of Robert Swart, project meteorologist for PWIA.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK IS OCT. 9-15

COLLEGE STATION ----Fire Prevention Week is "observed" -- not celebrated -- in the United States each October. This year the date is Oct. 9-15, notes Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The Oct. 9 date is the anniversary of "The Great Chicago Fire" of 1871 which marked the real start of community effort to prevent fires instead of concentrating only on putting them out, says the engineer.

Woodrow Wilson, in 1920, was the first President to issue a national proclamation in observance of what was then Fire Prevention Day. This tradition has been officially recognized by every successive President to this day.

The toll of the Chicago fire of 1871 was monumental in terms of the young frontier city and of the economy of those days: 250 lives lost, 17,430 buildings destroyed, and an estimated \$168 million in property lost.

Today, fires continue to

kill an average of 32 persons in the U. S. each day, adding up to more than 10,000 lives lost each year, points out Nelson. About 30 per cent of the victims, or 3,500, are youngsters through age 15.

Fires cost the U.S. about \$4.4 billion in property loss annually. This means the average annual price of fire waste is \$20.40 for every man, woman and child in the nation. Estimater by the National Commission on Fire Prevention and Control place the total cost of fires -- including lost wages, sales and production as well as buildings and contents destroved -- at \$12 billion annually.

Fire tragedies will continue, says Nelson, until Americans learn how not to burn through adherence to recommended fire prevention practices and through the use of fire prevention building and equipment
