## 'LOPES LOSE 29-6 IN HARD-FOUGHT GAME AGAINST LOCKNEY LONGHORNS

Have you heard about the guy "who finally got it all together... and then couldn't remember what he did with it!" That's almost the story of the Abernathy Antelopes' hard-fought game against the Lockney Longhorns here last Friday evening. The "Lopes" looked good, especially during the first half, and even into the final stanza before Lockney "broke the game wide open", with the final score reading: Abernathy 6, Lockney 29.

The 'Lopes' were tremendously improved in the passing department, both offensively and defensively, hitting on 6 of 14 passes for 128 yards, and holding Lockney to one completion for only 6 yards. The 'Lopes' picked up an additional 183 yards on the ground for 111 total yards, while making 14 first downs.

Quarterback Tony Heath, who connected on 4 of 12 passes for 70 yards, hit tight end David Hunt with 3 aeriels for 27, 23 and 12 yards, and got credit for an 8 yard completion to split end Randy Gregory on a pass interference call. Quarterback Gilbert Cuevas threw only twice and completed both times, one a 53-yarder to split end Joe Samera and the other to tight end Chad Major for 5 yards.

Heath was the leading ground gainer for the Antelopes, picking up 57 yards, on 13 carries. The sophomore quarterback did a fine job of reading the defense as he executed the

option play. Roger Lindsey, also a sophomore, carried 15 times for 53 yards, and senior runningback Lon Mason had 47 yards on 14 carries. Scott Cunningham and Ted Heard added 24 yards.

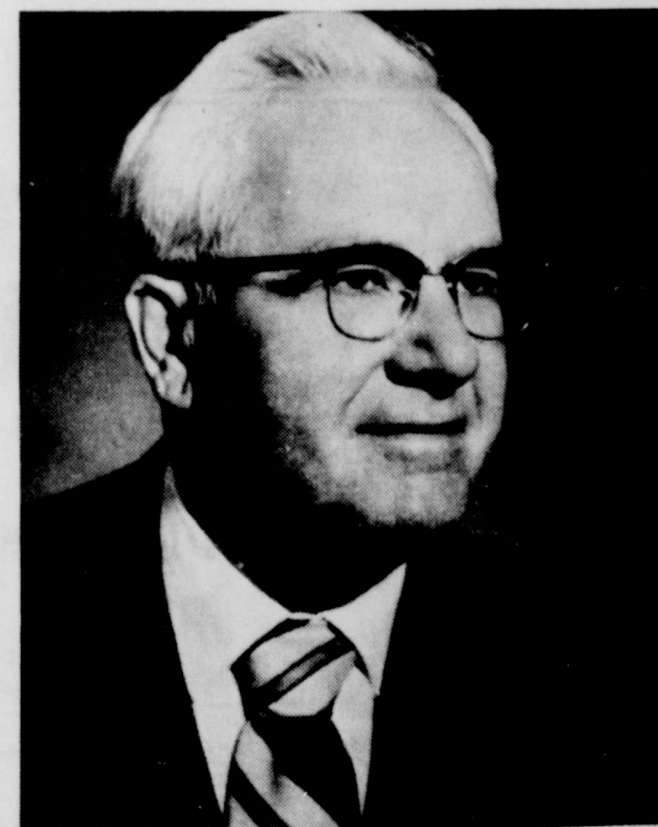
Mark Pope was the leading man in tackles with a total of 13 tackles. Mike Hill, David Kennedy and Micah Blalock followed close behind. Pope with 10 tackles each. Kelly Mills and Ruben Olguin each recovered a fumble in the game.

Coach Aldridge said, "Kenneth Sanders and Jimmy Runnels made some big defensive plays at defensive end. Eric Harkey had one of his best games of the year..."

The 'Lopes' gave up a touchdown midway in the first quarter when Lockney speedster Danny Clark took a pitchout and raced 41 yards for the game's first score, with Joe Rodriguez kicking the EP.

Eight minutes later the 'Lopes' climaxed a 74-yard sustained drive with a 4-yard TD run by Lindsey. Cuevas' extra point attempt was wide, and Abernathy trailed 6-7. The home team had taken over on its own 26 yard line on a fumble recovery by defensive back Kelly Mills. Heath, Mason, Cunningham and Lindsey had collaborated on the drive, with a 27-yard Heath-to-Hunt pass-run play thrown in, picking up four first downs on their way to

paydirt. The Antelope defense (Football continued on Page 2)

### Know Proper Way to Buy Firewood

AUSTIN--Fireplace wood is rapidly becoming one of the most expensive fuels for the household and one which the homeowner least understands how to buy by measurement, states Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

Brown advises consumers not to buy firewood by "the pickup load" or by the "rick". Instead, he says, ask for the exact dimensions of the wood when it is stacked at your home, and buy accordingly.

A legal cord of wood measures four feet high, four feet wide and eight feet long, he notes.

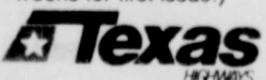

Over the years, we have attended 25 personal appearances of Guy Lombardo's Royal Canadian in the following cities: Las Vegas, 10 (2 shows a night for five consecutive nights); Lubbock, 4; Fort Worth, 3; Plainview, 2; Amarillo, 2; and one each in St. Petersburg, Florida, Hobbs, N. M., Abilene and Dallas. The Hobbs show and one of the Amarillo shows were on consecutive nights. A Plainview show and the other Amarillo show were on consecutive nights. Between some of his two night shows in Las Vegas, we watched in the Mills Brothers show at another hotel on the Strip. Also, we had the Lombardo-Mills combination in Dallas, attending the Lombardo show on the SMU campus then going to the Fairmont Hotel for the Mills Brothers' late show the same night. His smallest concert show crowds were at Abilene and at his last concert in Lubbock Municipal Auditorium. Concert crowds were good at Hobbs, Plainview, Amarillo, Will Rogers Auditorium in Fort Worth and the auditorium on SMU campus. All crowds, even the small ones, were liberal with their applause. The greatest response we observed was in the civic center auditorium at Amarillo. Only at Las Vegas did the Lombardo band members mingle, and visit with their fans during their show breaks. then stiffened and kept the visitors off balance until late in the third period, when Lockney scored again just two plays before the final quarter began.

Two field goal attempts by Caszas during the contest failed, the first just before halftime from the 34 yard line, and the other with 3:15 left in the contest, this one from the 32.

Two fumbles lost by Abernathy as loose intercepted pass stopped three Antelope drives, one at the Longhorn's 3 yard line and another at the Longhorn 7. Another drive was stymied at the 27 when the Lopes were forced to give the ball up on downs.

Lockney's second TD came with 27 seconds left in the third period when quarterback Billy Sessom went 8 yards around left end on a bootleg play. The Lopes then added two points on a Steve Warren-to-Danny Wilsoa pass after faking a kick.

The Lopes still felt they had a chance and executed some fine defensive work up until 2:03 left in the game. At the point, Clark slashed off tackle, cut to the sideline and sped 30 yards for his second TD of the night, with Rodriguez adding the EP for a 22-6 advantage.

That seemed to take something out of the Lopes, and five plays later the Longhorns scored again after recovering a fumble on the Abernathy 3. Warren went the final step and a half for the score, and Rodriguez closed out the scoring with his EP kick.

The highly-regarded Clark got his sixth 200-plus yards game of the season, romping for 272 yards on 34 carries.

The Antelope will close out the 1977 football season Friday night at Tulla. Game time is set for 7:30.

### Tanya L. Goodwin At Tennessee Tech

COOKEVILLE, Tenn.----Tanya L. Goodwin from Abernathy, Texas has enrolled as a freshman at Tennessee Tech this fall.

The freshman class of 1,418 students includes representatives of 25 states, 51 Tennessee counties, and a dozen foreign countries. The university's overall enrollment of more than 7,400 is up by about 150 from last year.

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## PROGRAM ON CHILD ABUSE

On Wednesday, October 12 at 7:30 p.m., Mr. Kent Bridenstein, from the Plainview Human Resources Department, gave a presentation to the students of St. Isidore's high school CCD classes and their parents. The meeting was held in the Parish Hall of St. Isidore's Church. Approximately 50 people attended. The group was shown a film strip on child abuse, followed by a lecture and discussion, led by Mr. Bridenstein. It was emphasized that child abuse is no respecter of economic status, with cases of abuse occurring in rich, middle class and poor families alike. The stresses of daily living tend to push abusive parents "over the brink" into abusing their child.

Mr. Bridenstein pointed out that abusive parents have usually been abused, themselves, as children. The department personnel work with abusive parents to teach them a better way of being parents. Sometimes the abused child is removed from the home temporarily while counseling of the parents is taking place. The child is then placed back in the home when counseling is complete.

## CARTER ENERGY BILL TO HURT FARMERS

WASHINGTON—Congressman Jim Collins, a member of the House Conference Committee on Energy, today warned his colleagues that the already hard pressed American farmer could expect nothing but more trouble if Congress does not change the Tax section of President Carter's Energy Bill.

"By choosing to increase taxes on gasoline, diesel fuel, oil, and natural gas the Carter Administration is forcing the American farmer to bear the major burden of its energy conservation program," the Congressman from Dallas said. "Costs for fertilizer and pesticides will rise dramatically, thus greatly increasing the costs farmers will have to face. At a time when a farmer can only get \$1.23 for a bushel of corn that cost him \$2.10 to produce, these

federally mandated cost increases are inexcusable."

Collins noted that studies done by Iowa State University demonstrate that agricultural production would only decrease by 5 percent from current levels if the President's bill is enacted. He also pointed out that the impact of doubled fuel costs on food prices would be no more than a 13 percent boost, of which the farmers' share would be little or nothing.

"The President's tax bill will have an even more severe impact on the Texas farmer than farmers in other regions of the country," Collins declared. "Besides increased production costs, Texas farmers, like the rest of Texas residents, will have to pay an estimated 25 percent of the total nationwide tax burden imposed by the entire Energy Bill."

The Third District Congressman stated that he planned to ask the Energy Conference Committee to agree to a special exemption for the energy conservation taxes for oil and gas used in the manufacture of agricultural chemicals. The Senate

**PUMPKIN-NUT CAKE**

1 pkg. two-layer spice cake mix  
1/2 tsp. baking soda  
1 cup milk  
1 cup mashed cooked pumpkin  
2/3 cup chopped pecans  
1/2 cup finely snipped pitted dates  
1 Tbsp. light molasses  
1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg  
2 cups frozen whipped dessert topping (thawed)

In large mixing bowl combine cake mix and soda; add milk and pumpkin. Blend at low speed of electric mixer until moistened. Beat at medium speed for two minutes. Fold in nuts and dates. Pour into two greased and lightly floured 9 by 1 1/2-inch round pans.

Bake in 350-degree oven for 25 to 30 minutes or until cake tests done. Cool; remove from pans. Cool completely on racks. Gently stir molasses and nutmeg into whipped topping. Spread between layers and over top of cake. Chill cake several hours before serving.
