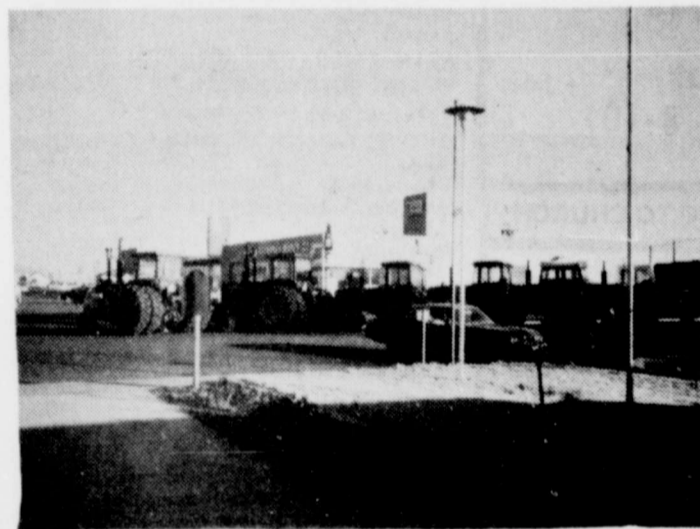

Agriculture Movement Gains Momentum

Ninety six farmers, agri-businessmen, and other concerned people met Monday night, Jan. 2, in the School Cafeteria for an informative meeting on the growing farm strike movement.

Key Crawford and Ed Hammit, representatives from the State Strike Office in Hereford, and a Lubbock agri-businessman were guest speakers for the evening. The farmer's parity platform was discussed at length with questions and answers being discussed by the speakers and from the floor.

Opposition from the floor was expressed by at least one person explaining concern with too much government intervention, and in turn the possibility of becoming a Socialistic state; and the farmer pricing himself out of the world market.

It was explained that this possibility would not arise under the proposed farm bill. This bill is to be presented by parity advocates to Secretary of Agriculture Bergland January 18, in Washington, D. C. The proposed farm bill is the product of over 7 years research by economist and top farm leaders with built in checks and balances.

Note: The term "strike" is generally disliked by farmers, but the more acceptable term "demonstration" has its complicated legal handicaps.

In order for the farmer to "demonstrate" as he has in Phase II and Phase III, he would be required to file for permission to meet, speak and move; however, by using the term "strike", the farmer has the right to act or react when and where he wishes. Therefore, for legal considerations, the term "strike" was adopted.

LOCAL FARMERS PARTICIPATE IN TRACTOR PARADE HERE

Abernathy was host for a brief period late Tuesday afternoon, Jan. 3, to the American Agriculture Strike. Local participating farmers and farmers from places north of Abernathy formed a tractor parade along Avenue D from south to north. They also visited city hall and other places in town. They were enroute to their homes from Lubbock, where earlier in the day there was a tractor parade on Loop 289 circling the city. After a lunch and meeting at MacKenzie State Park, the tractors began their trips home going in many directions from Lubbock. This was Phase Three in the strike activities which started in December. Farmers are seeking 100% parity.

The northbound tractors out of Lubbock paraded along the business route through New Deal, then gathered in south part of Abernathy for the parade through town.

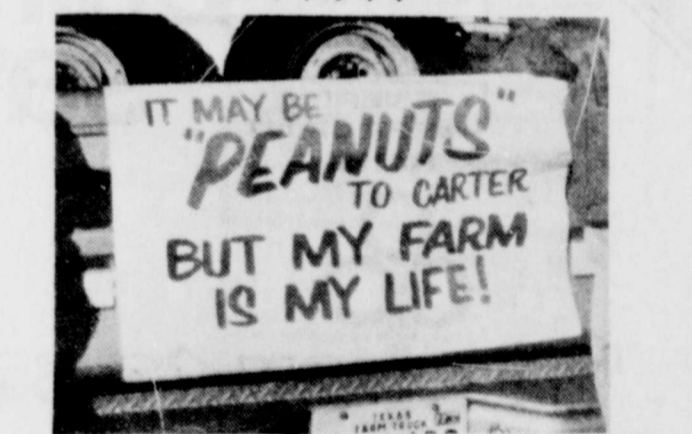

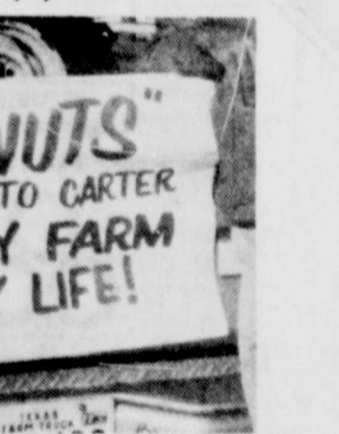

They also found a color map drawn by Troy, probably for geography class, but age had taken its toll on that paper and it fell apart in handling.

It is the house that was occupied for so many years by Maude Pearce Pettit, who sold it to Wendell Tooker when she moved to Houston a few years ago. Tooker recently sold the house to Mr. and Mrs. Harris, who plan to rearrange and redecorate and convert the big garage into a den. They found the items while cleaning out the attic, which is large enough and high enough for them to add two bedrooms and a bath on the second story level. After they reported the find, I called Hayden Pearce for a history on that house. He said that Vint Stambaugh built the house, and sometime soon after World War One, Hayden's grandfather Pearce traded a farm between Friona and Hereford to Vint Stambaugh for the house now owned by the Harris. That farm either is, or was, a part of the Troy Stambaugh estate. Troy resided at Hereford and

Lewis resided here at the times of their deaths. The two diplomas, one for Lewis and one for Troy, read as follows: "Board of Education, Hale County, Texas. This Certifies That (Troy) (Lewis) Stambaugh (has) Completed the Course of Study as Prescribed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction for the State of Texas, up to and including the Seventh Grade. DIPLOMA. Given by the Authority, and under the Seal of the County Board of Education of Hale County, This the 20th Day of April, 1914. (signed) John E. Younger, Teacher; W. B. Lewis, County Superintendent of Hale County; T. T. Stoneker, President of the Board of Education." (initials with the Lewis and Stoneker may be other than shown above. They signed their names with a flourish of the pen.) The Harris are considering giving the Lewis Stambaugh diploma to his widow, Alma Stambaugh, who now resides in Lubbock. But, they would like to keep the other diploma for their collection.
