Abernathy gets water loan

AUSTIN----The Water Development Board Monday approved a loan to the City of Abernathy, adopted a fee schedule for septic tanks around Mackenzie Reservoir and approved a \$252,000 consultant contract for weather modification work.

Abernathy had requested \$275,000 as part of a \$671,000 program of water system improvements including a 200,000 gallon elevated storage tank, water supply lines and modification to existing wells and land acquisition for a new well site.

In addition to the WDB loan to be secured by junior lien water works and sewer system revenue bonds maturing 1978-89, the project will be financed through a \$246,000 drought relief assistant grant from the Farmers' Home Administration and \$150,000 from sale of water works and sewer system revenue bonds in commercial channels.

The application was given unanimous approval by the six-member board.

Man charged with 2-year theft scheme

A police report said that a 24-year-old man has been charged in theft of \$700,000 in merchandise from a Lubbock department store over a two-year period.

A justice of the peace set bond of \$15,000 Wednesday for Jose Reyna, who was arrested in Abernathy, Hale County, late Tuesday.

Police said the \$700,000 worth of merchandise was taken in the intricate scheme from three local warehouses of Sears Roebuck and Co. The merchandise consisted of furniture, television, stereos and appliances.

Detectives said approximately \$2,000 worth of merchandise has been recovered. A second man has been charged but not arrested, they said.

Farabee gives farmer support on price hike

State Senator Ray Farabee expressed support for higher market prices for farmers and ranchers in a letter written to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture this week.

"Recent protests have brought public attention to what many of us have known for more than a decade. American farmers have been feeding this country and the world, and it is time for people in agriculture to get a fair share of the dollars spent for food and fiber," Farabee stated to Secretary Robert Bergland.

Hale County has an average annual income of \$117 million dollars from agriculture. He continued, "When costs of production exceed that income, it not only hurts the people of Hale County, but it hurts Texas and America, and destroys the family farm which has been responsible for making this country the most productive in the world."

Although parity and higher target prices must come from an improved farm bill by our federal Congress, Farabee outlined three things which the Texas Legislature can and should do:

- (1) Provide for taxation of agricultural land on the basis of productivity.
- (2) Increase the State inheritance tax exemption.
- (3) Increase State funding for agricultural research and rural development.

AMERICAN AGRICULTURE MOVEMENT HOLDS MEETING HERE THURSDAY, JANUARY 26

Abernathy and New Deal area farmers held an American Agriculture Movement meeting at Abernathy school cafeteria on Thursday, Jan. 26 at 7:30 p.m. In attendance were approximately 200 people representing Abernathy and New Deal farming interests, as well as wives and many local business people. Local leader Srya Shadden brought the meeting to order with prayer and Pledge of Allegiance. Shadden explained the words "strike" and "parity" so that some misunderstandings could be removed. The word strike is used by the American Agriculture Movement only for legal reasons. It appears that the labor unions have pushed laws and regulations through Congress which made demonstrations for higher wages or prices to be illegal unless it is designated a "strike." Reasons for these regulations are unknown, but most farmers resent having to use the term.

"Parity" as explained by Shadden is a measure of purchasing power based on a given period of time compared to another period. 100% parity as advocated by the farm group would give the farmer the same purchasing power for the sale of his crops as the farmer received in the base period of 1910-14, with factors included for increased production and costs. In other words a farmer could sell 100 bushels of wheat in the 1910-14 base period and, after paying his production expense, taking the profit he could purchase a haircut, 100% parity would mean that the farmer could take the same 100 bushels of wheat today and buy his haircut with the profit. Shadden emphasized that 100% parity in no way guarantees a profit as the farmer still has to face the risks of management and weather. The farmers in the American Agriculture Movement (AAM) are asking the government to remove themselves from the market to allow prices to reach parity in the free market.

Shadden also explained the reasons for farmers engaging in practice of tractorcades, stopping of trains, blockades of business, etc. He advised that they were done to: 1. show in a graphic manner the other businesses and people that their problem exists and is very real; and 2. show other farmers that they are working together and to inspire them to action.

On Jan. 17, 1978, Shadden stated 34 Abernathy and New Deal farmers went to Washington, D. C., to work with Congress and other people to push for legislation to help relieve the farmers in their current cost-price squeeze. Plans are to send more people, and these were given to all local businesses who helped financially and other wise.

Next on the program were many of the local farmers who gave reports to the group on their trip to Washington. These people spent many days visiting with congressmen, agriculture department people, advisors, aides, secretaries, and anyone else who would listen. All of these people expressed optimism in their work but emphasized that this work is only just beginning and many more hours and days will be needed to accomplish their goals. All citizens were urged to write, telegraph, or call their representatives in Washington. The AAM office at Thompson Implement has names and addresses of these people or contact any of the farmers involved and they will see that you get the information you need. All of the people in this movement expressed concern for the future of the family farm as it is now known. Mr. Loren West had a quote which struck home to all in attendance: "If you think the price of Food & Fiber is high now, wait until you have to buy it from a Corporation."

Jack Beavers of Channel 28 apologized to local people for their reporting of the break-in of Secretary of Agriculture Berglund's office. KMCC had erroneously reported that some local people were involved in this incident, but they were not.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ISSUE REVENUE BONDS

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, will convene at its regular meeting place in the City Hall of Abernathy, Texas, at 1:00 o'clock, P. M., on the 17th day of February, 1978, to pass such ordinance and take such action as may be deemed necessary to authorize the issuance of revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$275,000, for the purpose of providing funds for making improvements and extensions to the City's Waterworks System. Said bonds shall mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FIFTEEN (15) years from their date, shall bear interest at such rate or rates (not to exceed 10% per annum) as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council, and shall be payable from and secured by a lien on and pledge of the net revenues derived from the operation of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System, such lien and pledge, however, being junior and subordinate to the lien and pledge securing the payment of certain outstanding revenue bonds of the City payable from the same source.

The holder of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation and said bonds shall not be a debt of the City of Abernathy, Texas.

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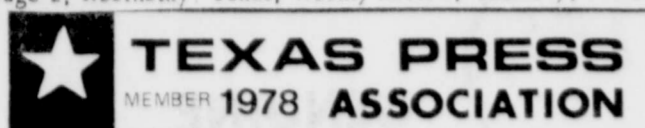

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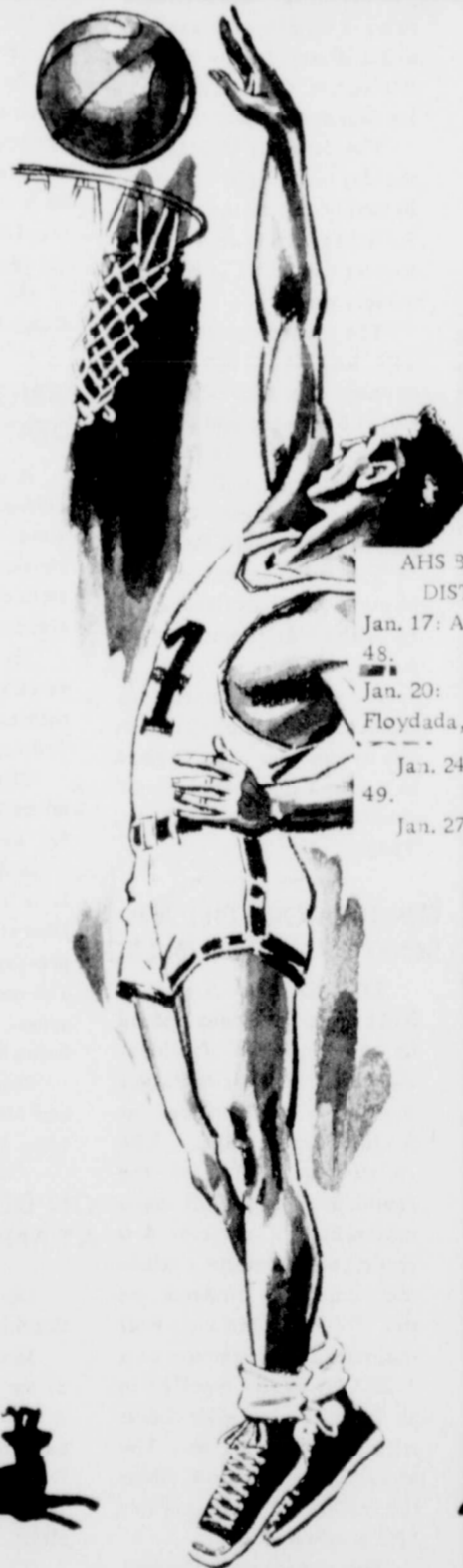

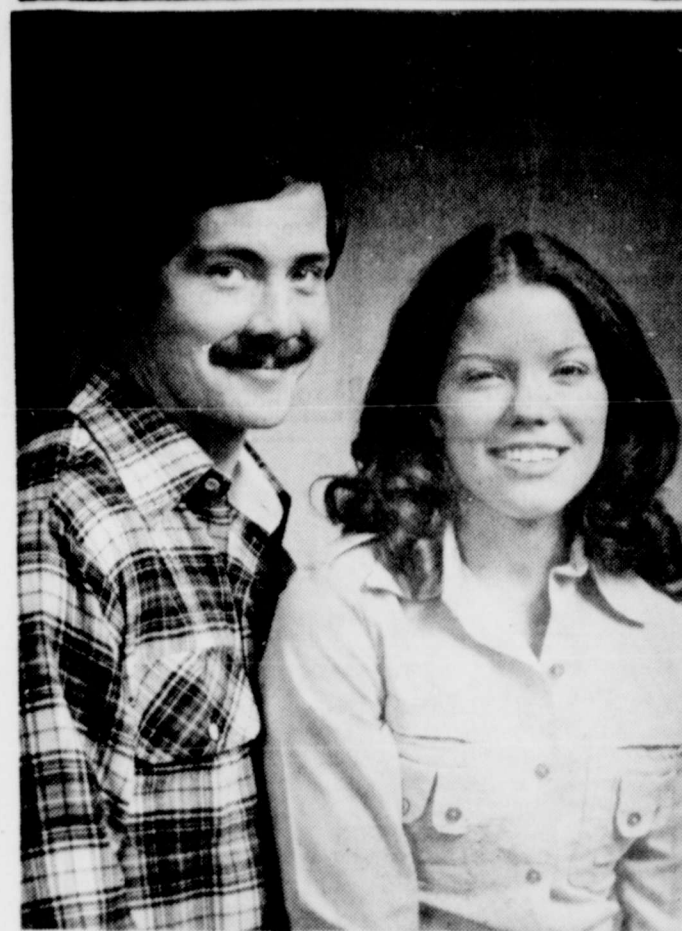
