THREE NAMES ON CITY BALLOT FOR ALDERMAN POSTS

The annual Abernathy City election will be conducted April 1 in city hall to name three aldermen. Terms of Jerry Civen, Larry Griffin and W. D. Sanders expire this year. Civen is seeking re-election. His name along with those of Harold Stillwell and Charles Nelson will be on the ballot for the three alderman posts. Lines will be on the ballot for write-in candidates.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Holdover members of the city council are Mayor Pete Thompson and aldermen Harold Thompson and Hoppy Toler.

Stillwell is a member of the Wolf Irrigation firm, and Charles is owner of Nelson Automotive.

VOTERS TO NAME TWO TRUSTEES IN APRIL ELECTION

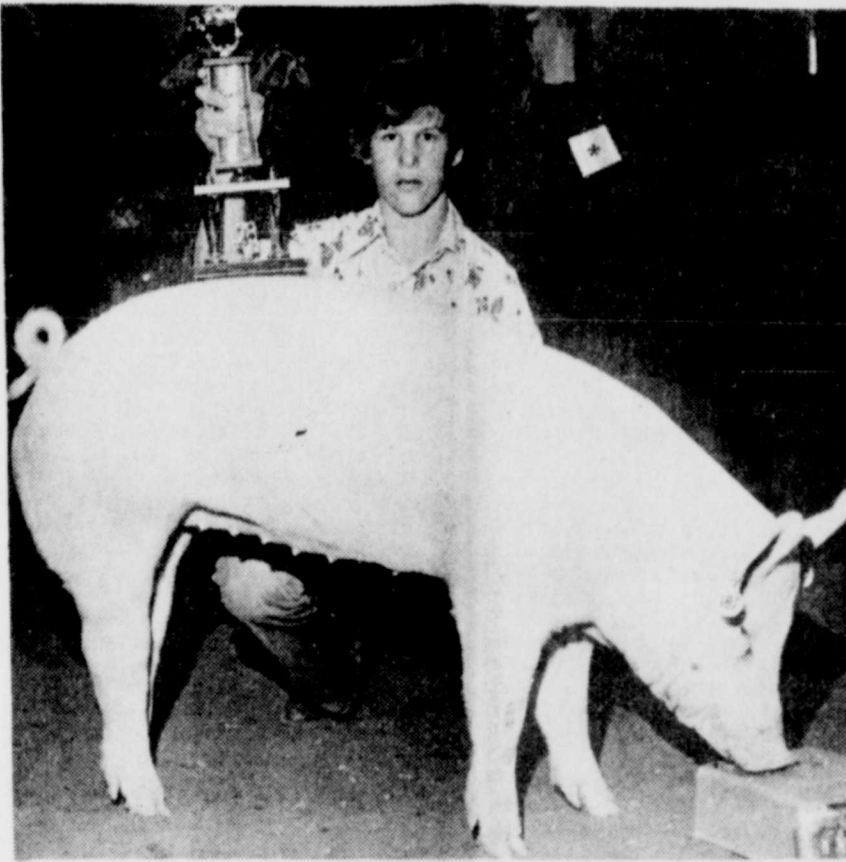
Voters in Abernathy Independent School District will go to the polls in city hall April 1st to elect two school trustees.

Abernathy youth rule Stock Show

The second day of judging at the 43rd annual Plainview Stock Show Wednesday belonged to Abernathy FFA and 4-H members. The southern Hale County students took the grand champion honors as well as five of six swine breed championships and an equal number of reserve breed titles.

Jon Mark Fulton, 14-year-old Abernathy 4-H member, took Grand Champion honors with his heavyweight Duroc. "I knew all along that it was a championship animal," Fulton said of his barrow. The animal was judged Reserve Champion three weeks ago at the Abernathy Project Show.

Although Wednesday was the first time he has received the Grand Champion trophy at the Plainview show, the eighth grader took Reserve Championship honors three and six years ago, he said. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Adams of Abernathy.

A Plainview FFA member, James Forbes, took the Reserve Champion Barrow trophy with a heavyweight crossbreed. The 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Forbes is an eighth grade student at Estacado Junior High.

"IT FEELS great to win," he said. "This is the first year for me to show pigs and it is the first time I have ever won." For the past three years, Forbes has shown lambs.

Before naming the top two barrows in the show, judge Lanny Tucker, agriculture teacher at Hart High School, said, "The Plainview show truly is an excellent county stock show. I don't know where else you could go to see the high caliber of animals that are here."

IN TUESDAY'S competition, Abernathy 4-H member Lonnie Howard took Grand Champion steer honors with his heavyweight Simmental-Angus Cross.

Tracy Blount, son of Mr. and Mrs. J.

Weldon Blount of Hale Center, showed the Reserve Champion steer. The FFA member took the trophy with his heavyweight Simmental Cross.

"It's a surprise, but it feels real good," 13-year-old Lonnie Howard explained shortly after his heavyweight Simmental-Angus Cross took top honors at the 43rd annual Plainview Stock Show. An Abernathy 4-H member, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Howard.

Although the seventh grade Abernathy Junior High student has been showing livestock for three years, this is the first champion Lonnie has had. "I think I'll save the prize money for next year for another calf," he explained. Although his heavyweight steer was judged Grand Champion, Lonnie also had the medium heavyweight class champion steer.

Steer judge Ronnie Vineyard of Lampasas, before selecting the Grand Champion animal, said, "The Plainview Stock Show is one of the biggest and best shows I have ever judged. Selecting the champion is hard because there are so many strong entries."

A native of Swisher County and graduate of Kress High School, Vineyard explained, "About 15 years ago, I was a contestant at this show, when it was held in the old Dairy Barn at the Fair Grounds. It was the best county stock show back then and it is even better now." Vineyard is a vocational agriculture teacher at Lampasas High School.

The Steer Showmanship Award went to Debby Oswalt, Abernathy FFA. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Oswalt.

Winners in the lamb competition, held Tuesday, were Dan Henley, Abernathy FFA, fine wool; Kirk Wilson, Plainview FFA, fine wool cross; Gregg Forbes, Plainview FFA, Southdown-Shropshire; and Kendra Burnett, Cotton Center 4-H, medium wool.

Dan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Louie Henley of Abernathy; with the Lamb Showmanship trophy going to Brett Cypert, Plainview 4-H.

STOCK SHOW SALE SETS RECORD

A record-setting premium sale that raised \$97,547 for 188 steers, hogs and lambs climaxed the 43rd annual Plainview Stock Show Thursday.

This year's bidding topped the old mark of \$96,616.26, set for the 1976 sale. The 1977 sale brought the next highest mark on record, \$88,546.67, with a figure of \$81,660.71 being set in 1975.

The auction began with the sale of Lonnie Howard's Grand Champion Simmental-Angus Cross. The 1,135 lb. Abernathy 4-H steer sold to Jack Morris Ford, Hale County Farm Bureau and City National Bank for \$1,500 per pound or \$1,702.50. In 1977, the Grand Champion steer, shown by Pat Terrell, brought the same price per pound, selling for a total of \$1,658.

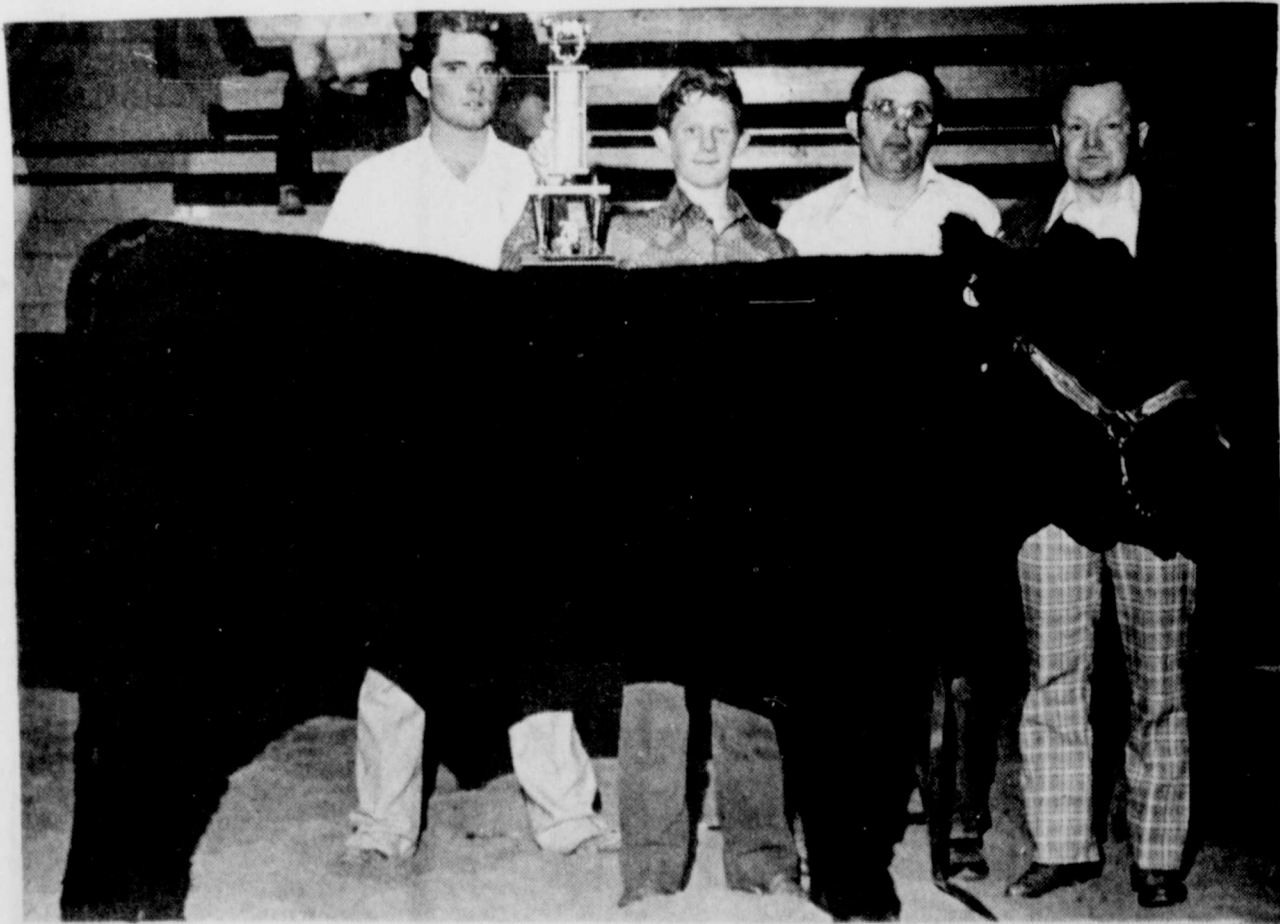

NEWS AND COMMENTS

N&C---My dictionary gives this definition of the word COURAGE: "1, the quality of mind that enables one to encounter difficulties and dangers with firmness or without fear; bravery; 2) the courage of one's convictions; 3) to act consistently with one's own opinions." Therefore, in the following comment, the words "Courage" and "Bravery" could be used interchangeably in reference to emergency acts recently performed by Mike Valdez, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Valdez of County Line, and Jerry Dees, 19-year-old son of Mrs. I.L. Johnson of Abernathy. I have not been in contact with either of them.... face-to-face or by telephone.... since their involvements in the separate incidents. The following information is provided by others. I am writing this without the knowledge or consent of Valdez and Dees. Had I sought their consent, they would have asked that this not be written about them.

In my opinion, both young men performed heroic acts that should be recorded in print. The Valdez incident happened during the February snow storm. I was in Florida for two weeks during which time the storm was on here. I was out of touch with local and South Plains news during that period. The Valdez incident first came to my attention March 25, last Saturday when The Review received through the mail news stories prepared by Faye Ann Nelson of County Line. Read her report of the

Valdez incident in the County Line News in this issue of The Review. Young Valdez went into a burning house south of County Line for the third time before finding a Mr. Potter on the floor. Amoco Oil Company has cited Valdez for bravery for his actions. See Mrs. Nelson's report for further information. The incident in which Dees was involved happened shortly after 3 p.m. Thursday, March 23, four miles north of Abernathy on U.S. Highway 87. A pickup truck in which two Mexican-American men, a man, and a number of children, of Hale Center were riding lost a rear wheel and turned over one and one-fourth times in the northbound lanes. Milton Pope was the first to mention to me about Dees' action at the scene. Pope suggested that I contact Joe Gordon of Gordon Automotive for more details. Gordon said that Dees exhibited unusual bravery in going back to the flame-engulfed pickup cab and extricating 6-year-old Rachel Salazar. Although still burning, most of her clothing had been destroyed by flames. Dees placed the girl on the ground and attempted to extinguish the flames. He was assisted by Gordon and an unidentified motorist who took off his coat or sweater and provided it so the fire could be smothered out. The motorist left the scene soon thereafter. Dees sustained burns on his hands and had a blistered face as results of his efforts in removing the little girl from the burning pickup cab and putting out the fire on what remained of her clothing. Valdez and Dees have the gratitude and respect of the County Line Abernathy Community for risking their lives in attempts to save the lives of others. Two Accidents Occur On U.S. 87 Hiway, North Reports late Monday said that Rachel Salazar, 6, of Hale Center remained in critical condition at Brook Army Medical Center in San Antonio. She sustained burns over 90% of her body shortly after 3 p.m. Thursday, March 23, when the pickup in which she was riding lost a wheel while traveling in the north-bound lanes of U.S. Highway 87 four miles north of Abernathy. The pickup turned over one and one-fourth times and burst into flames that engulfed the vehicle. She was taken to Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, by Abernathy EMS ambulance and later flown to the San Antonio hospital. Jerry Dees, 19-year-old son of Mrs. I.L. Johnson of Abernathy, was a short distance behind the vehicle and he witnessed the accident. He began helping

the women and children to get out, and was assisted by Joe Gordon, owner of Gordon Automotive, who also saw the accident while he was driving south in the other lanes of US 87. Gordon began trying to get the women to tell them if anyone else was in the burning cab, and when they so indicated, Dees rushed to the vehicle and extricated Rachel from the inferno. He placed her on the ground and they began trying to put out the fire on what clothing that had not already burned away. (See News & Comments Column). Apparently, no others who were in the pickup were critically injured. Milton Pope, driving south in the other lanes of US 87, arrived on the scene moments after the accident. He used the CB radio in his vehicle to summon the EMS ambulance and the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department, then began assisting Dees and Gordon.

A two-vehicle accident at the intersection of US 87 & FM 54, three miles north of Abernathy Friday morning, March 24, brought out the EMS ambulance again. (See Ambulance Runs).

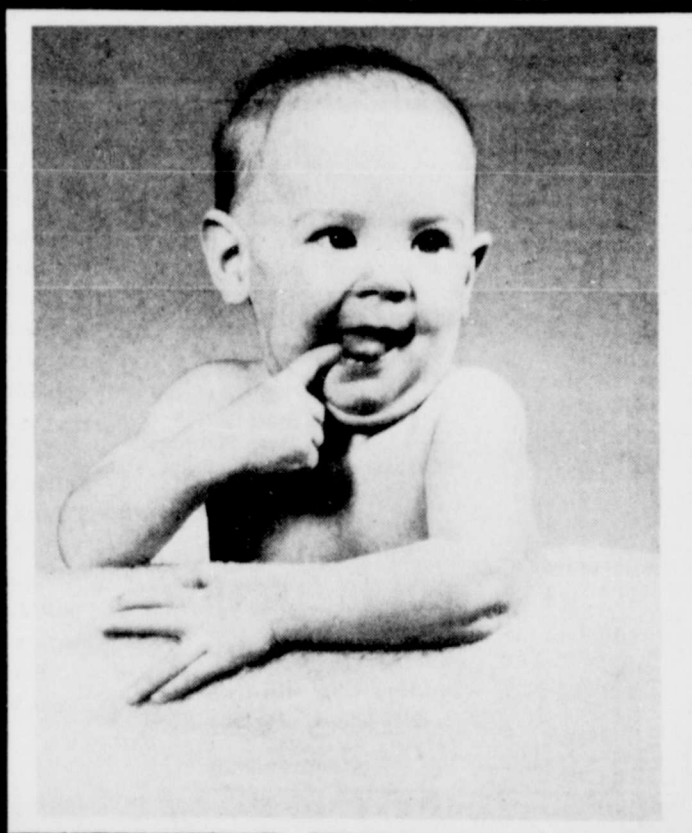
Former Resident Dies Last Year

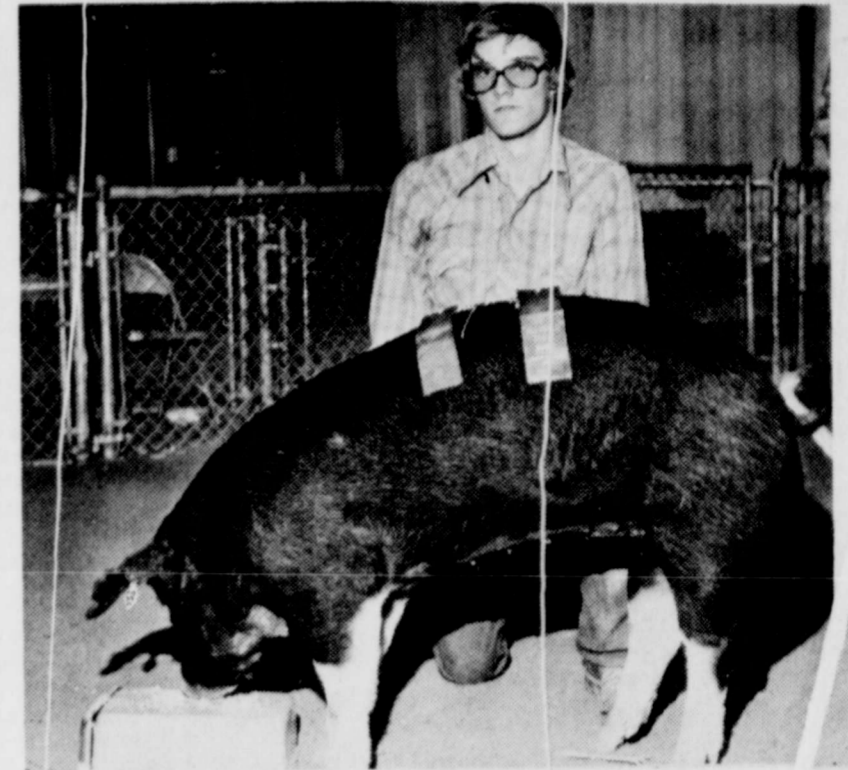

Brother McKnight has an unusual ability to motivate and to inspire commitment in those who hear his presentation of the challenges of Jesus Christ. Thousands have responded to the gospel of Christ in the campaigns - meetings - workshops he has conducted.

Below is a brief history of the church in Kaufman, Texas where Brother McKnight has served as the local preacher since 1974. Kaufman, Texas is located on Highway 175 some 32 miles southeast of Dallas. It has a population of 4,012. May 6, 1973 approximately 150 members began worshipping in a new plant located on Highway 175. Mid McKnight began preaching for the congregation in July of 1974. A Bible school attendance goal of 1,000 was set for April 27, 1975. Billboards were rented on every major road into town, ads were placed in all newspapers of the area, every door in town was knocked, Way of Salvation New Testaments were given out, and transportation was made available to all who needed it. Bible school attendance was 1,109 and 1,233 were in the worship service. The bus ministry was growing and the church decided to build a larger building. April 18, 1976 there was a \$50,000 cash contribution and \$200,000 in pledges. The church erected a bus building, benevolent building, and 15,000 square feet of classrooms. The new classrooms were first used May 1, 1977. A goal of 2,000 was set for May 8th. Extensive personal work was done by local members and several students from International Bible College. Each home received two personal invitations and a copy of the Way of Salvation New Testament. Charles Coil began a meeting May 8th. A total of 2,021 people attended Bible classes and 2,747 attended worship. Membership now stands at about 600. Of the 2,021 who attended Bible study 444 rode busses.

of Plainview FFA, brought \$1.25 per pound or \$1,416.25. It was purchased by High Plains Pavers, Inc., First National Bank and Medical Center Pharmacy. The price again matched the 1977 bid for the Reserve Champion steer shown by Joan Davis. She received \$1,273.75.

The championship swine sale marked the highest price increase over the 1977 sale with the Grand Champion barrow, a 241 lb. Duroc shown by Jon Mark Fulton of Abernathy 4-H, going for \$3.50 per pound or \$843.50. High bidders were Marse and Son, Wood-Dunning Funeral Home, Rangland Western Wear and West Pharmacy.

THE RESERVE Champion barrow, a 238 lb. crossbreed, brought a near equal \$3.20 per pound or \$761.60. Shown by James Forbes of Plainview FFA, the barrow was purchased by Plainview Acid Delinting.

In 1977, Sam Billingsley's Grand Champion barrow went for \$3.10 per pound or \$734.70 and Ricky Rhodes' Reserve

Champion went for \$2.70 per pound or \$642.60.

All the championship lambs went for \$4 per pound with the exception of the champion Southdown which brought \$5 per pound. Shown by Gregg Forbes, Plainview FFA, the lamb brought \$435 from Doc Cross Carpet Co., Blair Drug and Plainview Reporter-News.

THE CHAMPION fine wool, shown by Dan Henley, Abernathy FFA, was purchased for \$448 by Frontier Savings Association. Hale County State Bank bought the champion medium wool from Kendra Burnett, Cotton Center 4-H, for \$470. The champion fine wool cross, shown by Kirk Wilson, Plainview FFA, went to G.E. Douglass Gulf and First National Bank for \$456.

In the premium sale, 48 steers sold individually for an average price per pound of 92.19 cents for a total of \$45,241.15. That topped the 1977 mark of 84.21 cents per pound with a total of \$42,945.22.

For the 82 barrows sold in the swine

auction, average price was \$1,703.75 per pound or \$30,906.35. Again, the sale topped the 1977 mark of \$1,285.75 per pound or \$22,659.80.

THE 58 LAMBS sold through the individual premium auction brought an average price per pound of \$3,704.80 or \$21,399.50. Although three fewer lambs were sold through the premium auction than in 1977, the total price was down \$1,542.15 from the record \$22,941.65, set in 1977. At that sale, the 61 animals sold at an average price per pound of \$3.98.

In the commercial sale of animals not

entered in the premium auction, resale and commercial steers were bought by Homer Hill of Hart for 50.19 cents per pound.

Resale and commercial lambs went to Don Hegi and Steve Groce of Petersburg for 65.25 cents per pound.

RESALE HOGS were bought by Olton Pork Producers of Olton for 51.50 cents per pound. Commercial hogs went to Texas Agricultural Marketing and Development Association, an affiliate of Texas Farm Bureau in Amarillo, for 47.50 cents per pound.

The Herdsman Award in the beef division went to the Abernathy 4-H Club for keeping the cleanest pens. Hale Center FFA won the award in the swine division. Plainview FFA took the honor in the sheep division.

KENT HANCE TO BE HONORED IN ABERNATHY APRIL 6

Kent R. Hance won his first election to public office on November 4, 1974, to become one of the youngest members of the Texas Senate.
Senator Hance, 35 years old, has been a practicing

attorney with his own law firm in Lubbock since his graduation in 1968 from the University of Texas School of Law. Hance graduated with a BBA degree from Texas Tech University in 1965.
Before his election to the Texas Senate, he served on the Board of Regents of West Texas State University from 1972 through 1974, the Texas Citizens Advisory Council, a study group for solving water problems of the state, and he was named one of the five outstanding professors at Texas Tech in 1973 for distinguished service. He resigned his teaching position in 1973 after five years of teaching Business Law.

At the University of Texas School of Law he was president of his class, president of the Student Bar Association and received the Counsel Award for outstanding students.
Senator Hance married the former Carol Hays, also of Dimmitt, in 1964. They have two children, 12-year-old Ron and eight year-old Susan.
Hance is a member of the Lubbock, Texas and American Bar Associations. He was one of the original incorporators of the Texas Boys' Ranch at Lubbock. His other activities include membership in the Southwest Rotary Club, Lubbock Lions, First Baptist Church, Water Inc., Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Tech Century Club. PROGRAM FOR SOUTH PLAINS HOME-MAKER SERVICES

Our Home-maker Service Aid Program to the elderly is sponsored by the Texas Tech University College of Home Economics, and is subcontracted by M. B. F. A. Foundation.

It has been designed to serve persons in a 15 county area of the South Plains, including these counties: Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lynn, Lubbock, Motley, Terry and Yoakum.

Our program provides quality in-home care services of meal preparation, personal care, home management, escort services, visitation and companionship to the elderly.

Services and various other duties provided enable persons over 60 years of age to function in their own home with limited assistance and receive home-maker service on an individual basis according to ability to pay dependent on monthly income, --- as well as providing much needed services for persons over 60 years of age.

The Home-Maker Service Aide Program provides employment and para-professional training opportunities for mature unemployed homemakers. Those with a number of years experience in managing a household are given preference in employment. Homemakers will receive pay for 12 weeks of on the job training as well as for scheduled full or part time work with elderly clients.

The training covers a variety of topics including Red Cross training, physiology of aging, consumer education time and energy management, safety in the home, and sources of assistance to the older American.

Many elderly South Plains residents want to keep their independence and seek to remain in their own homes. With limited in-home care services through the Home-maker Aide Program this is often possible as an alternative to hospital or other institutional care, and usually at a cost saving.

Homemakers are scheduled on an hourly or daily basis according to the clients needs and do provide the home care services in the community where both the homemaker and clients live. Homemakers are supervised on the job.
