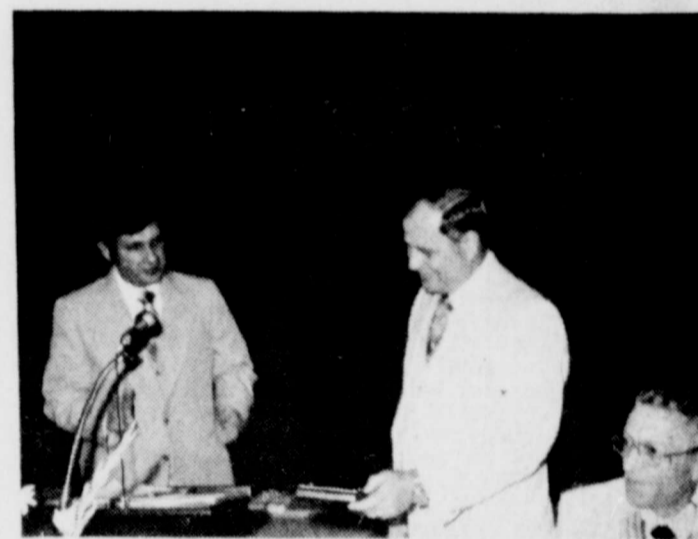

The presentation of awards to Abernathy's Outstanding Citizen, Students, Farm Family and Pioneer Citizen of the year highlighted the city's annual Chamber of Commerce banquet last Thursday evening as members, their guests and families met in the school cafeteria. The theme for the banquet was "Going and Growing in the Palm of the Plains."

Speaker for the evening was Wynon Mayes of Plainview, humorist and Hale County extension agent. Mrs. Mayes kept the group laughing and ended her speech with much wisdom, quoting, "The Lord Jesus Christ, to do good and to love one another."

Charles Bowen presented the award for Citizen of the Year to Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent of schools. Since moving to Abernathy in 1963, Dr. Webb has helped initiate programs in bilingual, adult and migrant education. He also helped start the special education program and cooperative here. Dr. Webb was instrumental in construction of the elementary library and independent learning center.

On June 1, Dr. Webb will assume duties as president of the Texas Association of School Administrators. As Dr. Webb serves in this capacity he will be spreading Abernathy all across the State as he attends many meetings as president. His first duty will be speaking for the State Education Secretary Conference in June.

There was a surprise for Dr. Webb, when Dr. John Townley, superintendent of Irving schools, who is presently president of the T. A. S. A., was announced along with his wife. Dr. Townley came forward and gave some remarks about the job Dr. Webb will have during his term as president of the T. A. S. A.

Joe Lovelace and Don McKenzie were the men that invited Dr. and Mrs. Townley to attend the banquet to be on hand for the honor bestowed on Dr. Webb. Dr. Townley said, "Dr. Webb will be asked many times during his term where is Abernathy?"

Mitch Lemonic presented the Students of the Year award to Abernathy High School honor students Missy Webb and Scott Cunningham. A committee of teachers selected a list of students who were qualified for this honor and the names were given to a committee of Chamber of Commerce people and they made the final decision.

The Lutrick family purchased land in Hale County, paying a dollar an acre for a section. The Lutricks helped establish a neighborhood telephone system in 1905 and dug one of the first irrigation wells in West Texas.

In his outgoing president's remarks, Paul Hershman thanked the chamber and the community for their support during the past year. Hershman also received a plaque from the Chamber in appreciation for his service as president during the past year.

In officially taking the responsibilities of the office of Chamber president incoming president Don Heath thanked the chamber for the support they will give to him in the upcoming year. Mayor Pete Thompson gave a report on Abernathy's Emergency Medical Technicians. This group deserves a great big thanks for their unselfish service to our community. 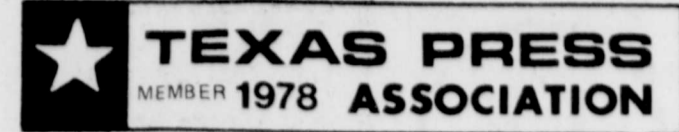

**NEWS AND COMMENTS**

NGC---This about dogs: Reports said that a South Plains town council voted to get rid of roaming dogs, and, after a reasonable length of time, a city employee drove around town and shot the loose hounds as he came to them. Local incidents recently reported: Mrs. H. E. Richter, in her early 90's, at times virtually a prisoner in her own home. Over a period of time she has shoed dogs away so many times that now they growl at her when she tries to run them off so she can get out in her yard to do spring flower and garden work. She now is afraid of the dog packs that hang around that area. A little, but a biting, dog is going to meet his match. A man, who has had the dog run out at him several times as he walked in the street, last week advised the owner that the next time the dog came out into the street after him he would kill the mean-tempered little critter. A lady told me this story last week: She called city hall to come and pick up a stray dog at her place. She was told that no one was available to get the dog at that time. The lady waited about an hour then called city hall a second time. This time, she told the city either to get the dog or she, personally, would bring it to the city hall office. NGC--NBC should be third place in network ratings. Its over-rated, over-paid and under-worked talkshow host Johnny Carson must be taking more nights off per week than usual. Recently, two of the Tonight Shows have been re-runs from as far back as a year or more. One had a quip about the late Senator Hubert Humphrey. If NBC wants to do the Tonight reruns, the tape should be edited to take out items such as the quip about Humphrey, which was very poor judgement. Also, the late Bing Crosby was on that re-run show. Re-running shows that include deceased performers is an accepted television practice, and we are not faulting NBC for the Crosby portion of that particular re-run. Carson's so-called humorous monologues drift into the news of the day. It sounds silly and terribly out-dated on the re-runs.

NGC--Speaking of over paid... is O. J. Simpson worth \$700,000 annually? That's a half-million dollars more than the base pay of the President of the United States. Something is very wrong with a system like that. If you buy products advertised on pro sports telecasts YOU are paying part of the outlandish salaries the pros receive. There's no "free lunch" and there's no free TV.

NGC--I was rocked back on my heels at the start of a recent telephone conversation with a friend of long-standing; a lady with whom I have had contact connected with The Review for many years. She called and opened the telephone talk with a question: "What do you think about Carter?" She stopped me in my tracks on my first answer: "I believe he is a christian man." Her immediate reply was: "I don't. I think he is a hypocrite." I then turned to the only other qualification which I think Carter has. He has an educational background, with a number of degrees from institutions of higher learning. That, too, could be a weak recommendation. His stint in the Georgia State House did not provide the experience needed for the presidency.

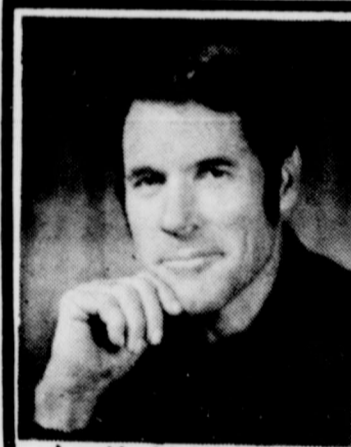

AUSTIN—The fast and furious pace at Texas livestock auctions slackened during February, but all sales remained above year-ago levels. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has said.

"There were some 446,000 head of cattle and calves marketed through auctions during February, down from the 554,000 head auctioned the preceding month," Brown said. "However, this total remains 3 percent above February, 1977 levels."

Brown noted that auction sales of hogs (50,000 head), sheep and lambs (55,000 head) and goats (11,000 head) followed the same pattern.

## ROTARY TO FUND CAMP FOR CHILDREN WITH DIABETES

LUBBOCK---West Texas and Eastern New Mexico children with diabetes will have the opportunity to attend a local summer camp June 5 through 9. The camp will offer all the fun and activities of traditional summer camps plus special preparations designed for children with diabetes.

The camp will be free for all children thanks to the Southwest Rotary Club of Lubbock. With the help of other Rotary Clubs, Southwest Rotary will underwrite the expenses of every child attending, regardless of ability to pay.

Children ages 6-15 may be recommended for the camp by physicians, school nurses, Rotarians, members of the American Diabetes

Association and other interested adults. Reservations for the camp must be made by May 1. Reservations may be made through the Department of Pediatrics, Texas Tech University School of Medicine (806) 743-2310.

The camp will be held at the Plains Baptist Encampment near Floydada.

The camp is being designed and will be directed by the Texas Tech University School of Medicine department of pediatrics in cooperation with its division of nutrition and social services and the Texas Tech University department of health, physical education and recreation.

Tech physical education majors will serve as

counselors providing a variety of sports, crafts and games appropriate to the children's ages and skill levels.

TTUSM nutritionists will plan and supervise all meals and snacks. A member of the pediatrics faculty will be in residence to supervise each child's medical needs. Faculty and members of the social work staff will work with children and their parents and will provide brief sessions on diabetes management.

The Rotary camp is the first camp offered in West Texas for children with diabetes. A pilot project, it has been modeled after similar successful camps in Central and South Texas. If successful, the camp may be expanded in future years.

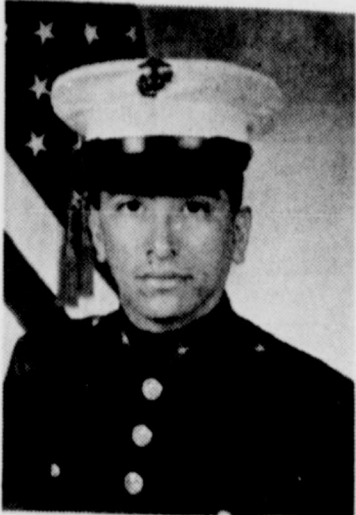

**Dallas Food Show Attracts Eager Buyers from Japan**

AUSTIN--Japanese consumer industry representatives flocked to Dallas recently to see, and buy, a tantalizing array of Texas agricultural products. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has said.

The food show, held at the Dallas Garden Center, featured raw and processed agricultural goods ranging from pork sausage to hot sauce, Brown noted.

The exhibition was coordinated by the U.S. Department of Commerce and the Texas Department of Agriculture. Agreements to increase Japanese purchases of American goods were reached during negotiations

between Ambassador Robert Strauss, U.S. Special Trade Representative, and officials of the Japanese trade ministry.

Dallas was the first of six cities which will host trade events in the U.S.

Brown said that the Japanese buyers were mainly interested in processed foods. Commodities being displayed in various forms were beef, pork, citrus juice, canned vegetables, peanut butter, pecans, flour mixes, turkeys, broilers, powdered milk, and specialty items.

"These businessmen were here to make orders," Brown said. Fifteen attended the food exhibits while thirty others traded in apparel and housewares.

Japan is the largest export market for U.S. farm products, spending a record \$3.9 billion for U.S. agriculture imports in calendar 1977. The U.S. provides about one-third of Japan's food imports.

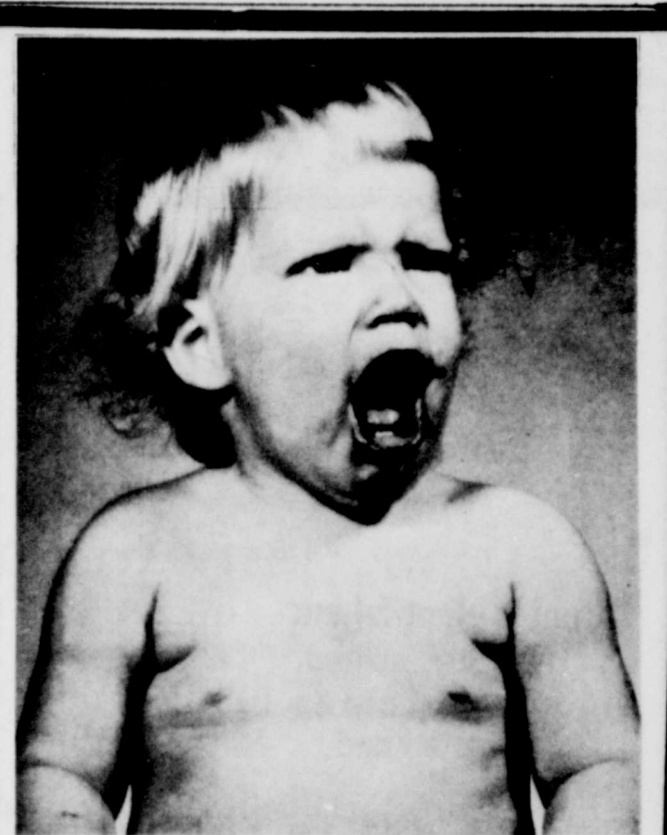

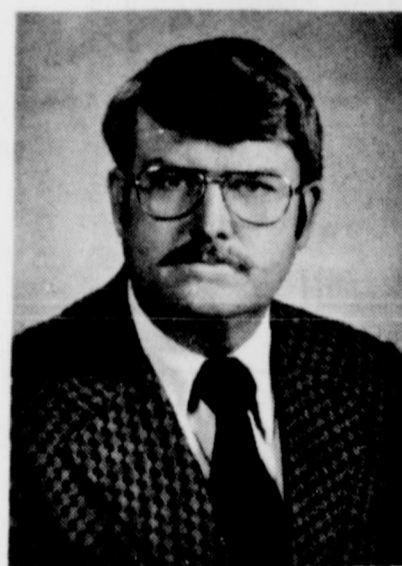

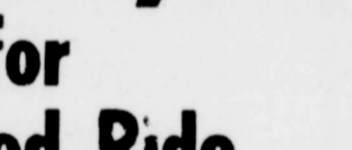
