**TIPS GIVEN ON TORNADO**

**KNOW WARNINGS**  
Two phrases that should be part of every Texan's vocabulary are "tornado watch" and "tornado warning."

A watch--usually posted for broad areas spanning hundreds of miles--is issued anytime a squall line develops which has the potential of spawning tornadoes. It is not uncommon for a city or town to be included in a watch dozens of times without ever experiencing a tornado. For this reason, the Texas Insurance Information Center (TIIC) says there is a danger of becoming complacent. No matter how often a watch is posted for a community, residents should monitor broadcasts and be generally aware of the potentially threatening weather.

Should a twister be spotted, a "tornado warning" is signaled. Warnings are issued for much smaller areas and may mean that residents have only a few minutes to take shelter. If a warning is issued, persons in the affected area should immediately watch for danger and be ready to take cover at a second's notice.

**STAY LOW**

The key word in taking cover is "low". The lowest floor in any building is safest. Small rooms--such as the bathroom--or a closet in the central part of the structure offer the best protection. If this hideout isn't available, taking cover under heavy furniture such as a tipped-over, upholstered couch is advised. Neither a mobile home

nor buildings with wide, free-span roofs--such as auditoriums--are desirable shelters.

Most deaths associated with a tornado are caused by flying debris and most injuries are to the head or chest. For these reasons, care should be taken to protect the head and chest no matter where shelter is taken.

**AFTER STORM**  
Immediately after a storm has passed, stay put for a few minutes. Make sure there is no leaking gas in the area before striking matches. Remember, too, downed telephone and power lines are hazardous.

Whenever a community begins mopping up after a windstorm or tornado, insurance companies put into force pre-arranged catastrophe procedures to help a community recover from the disaster.

If warranted, additional claims people are called in to help expedite claims processing. As a general rule, hardship cases get first priority. The individual property owner can help by making temporary repairs to prevent further damage--the cost of which is often covered by the insurance policy--and by notifying the agent or company representative immediately upon discovery and estimation of potential loss.

Beware of unscrupulous, fly-by-night contractors who often follow the storm into town. Deal only with reputable contractors.

The message is an old one but worth repeating, especially this time of the year: proper action before and after a storm can save lives and property.

**MAYOR SEEKS EMT RECRUITS FROM SCHOOL PERSONNEL**

The Board of Trustees of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on April 10, 1978 in the board room of the high school. For the first item on the agenda, the school board canvassed the election returns of the April 1st trustee election and declared David Pinson and Richard Howard duly and officially elected.

In other formal action, the resignation of Margie Martine, elementary E. S. A. teacher, was accepted. Mr. Lynn Dudenning was employed as a vocational agriculture instructor for the 1978-79 school year. Lynn is presently a graduate assistant at Texas Tech University and will receive his Masters Degree in August.

The Board set May 18th as the date for the Board of Equalization to meet. Dr. Webb was appointed to serve as the Abernathy representative to the Joint Committee of the Education Service Center. The bills for March were approved.

The following items of the agenda were accepted without action: (1) a budget progress report for the first seven months of the school year; (2) A tax collection report; (3) An enrollment report revealing an enrollment of 476 in elementary-263 in junior high--and 368 in high school for a total of 1107; (4) A luncheon report showed an average daily participation of 591.

Two oral reports were presented on the National Association of School Boards Convention and the Texas Association of School Administrators.

Mayor Pete Thompson appeared before the board requesting consideration for teachers to become EMT members. After hearing the report, the board went on record to encourage professional staff members (especially men) to become certified members of the local EMT Unit. Staff members who become certified would be on call as any other EMT members and would be allowed to leave their place of duty to answer calls. Tuition fees will be paid by the city and if further information is desired, call the City Hall. This is an important community service that should be given serious consideration.

**CITY OUTLINES DOG CONTROL PLAN**

ANIMAL CONTROL TO BE ENFORCED

NOTICE ISSUED BY THE CITY OF ABERNATHY

1. It shall be the duty of the owner or keeper of each and every dog and cat kept in the city to have such dog or cat vaccinated against rabies by a practicing veterinarian at least once a year.

2. Each and every dog and cat must have a city tag; at all times fastened about the neck.

3. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog or cat to permit or allow such dog or cat to run or be at large upon any public street, highway, alley, court, square, park, sidewalk or other public ground or public property within the city limits.

4. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog or cat to permit or allow such dog or cat to run or be at large upon any unfenced lot, tract, or parcel of land within the city limits.

5. The term "at large" as used in this article shall mean not under the control of the owner either by leash, chain, cord, or other suitable material attached to a collar or harness, or not constrained securely within an enclosure or fence.

6. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of these provisions shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.

Beginning April 24, the City will begin a new approach on the enforcement of its animal ordinance. Rather than the animal running at large trying to be picked up, the owner of such animal will be written a citation for violation of the ordinance. First offense will be a \$5.00 fine; second offense will be a \$10.00 fine; third offense--the animal will be disposed of. The City enlists the full support and cooperation of each and every citizen in its efforts to enforce this ordinance.

**Anton's Rabbit Plant Sold To Pel-Freez, Inc.**

Rogers, Arkansas--Pel-Freez Rabbit Meat, Inc., the nation's largest packer of domestic frozen rabbit meat, has purchased Rabbit Industries, Inc. of Anton, Texas, according to an announcement made today by Paul Dubbell, president of the Rogers, Arkansas based company.

The processing plant at Anton will continue operation in Anton and will be expanded gradually, Dubbell said.

In addition to the rabbit meat company, Pel-Freez also is known nationwide for its products distributed through Pel-Freez Biologicals, Inc. and Pel-Freez fur division.

Pel-Freez has more than 67 years experience in the business of growing and selling domestic rabbit meat and by-products. The company began national distribution when it moved from California to an expanded plant in Rogers in September, 1951. The frozen rabbit meat is packed under strict U. S. Department of Agriculture inspection. In addition to national distribution, Pel-Freez rabbit meat is also shipped into many foreign countries where U. S. Armed Forces are stationed.

In order to meet the Texas growers, and others interested in establishing rabbitries, Pel-Freez representatives will hold a meeting on April 24, at 7:30 p.m. in the Anton School Cafeteria. Dubbell said, it will be open to the public. Jim Secker, field manager for Pel-Freez, will be in charge of the meeting.

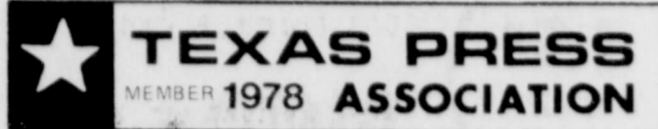

NGC---Doing some "repair work" on a news story I handled for the April 13th issue of The Review. The error was in the picture of Jay Johnson and other entertainers. I said that Jay is a son of Noel Johnson. My apologies to Wilma. It should have read: Jay is a son of MR. and MRS. Noel Johnson of Richardson, and a grandson of Mrs. Oma Toler of Abernathy.

NGC---These are some of the "Gents From Georgia" now entrenched in the Federal government: The Man; the No. 2 man in power at the White House, Hamilton Jordan; Jody Powell, presidential press secretary; Griffin Bell, Attorney General; Hugh Carter, second cousin of the president, on the White House staff (I am assuming that they have already sent one of the "good old boys" (Bert Lance) back to Georgia.

NGC---That large bouquet of flowers on Ercell Givens' desk at First State Bank Friday was from Lubbock National Bank. The two banks were observing 20 years of Corresponding Banking that day, Abernathy First State Bank has been doing Corresponding Banking with First National Bank, Lubbock, for an estimate 50 years, dating back to the days when Nash Hix headed the local bank and Walter Posey was head of First National Bank of Lubbock.

NGC---Note to Channel 28: Please stop using re-runs of Paul Harvey's news. Note to Channel 13: Please, please change the theme music you use to bring on and sign off your local newscasts. The off-beat in the theme music is driving my wife up the wall.

NGC---Twenty years ago, the average farmer produced enough food during a crop year to feed 22 people for a year. Today's highly mechanized and highly efficient farmer produces enough food to sustain 56 people for a year.

NGC---Parents who want to change their children from one school district to another must do this by April 28. See the school superintendent where you to transfer.

NGC---A woman was fined \$175 in Alexandria, Virginia, for driving her car without insurance. The Texas Legislature should pass a law to force vehicle owners to carry liability insurance to meet their obligations if they are at fault in an accident. Proof of insurance or ability to pay, such as a bond backing up their declaration that they are financially able to pay in case of accident, should be required before issuing vehicle license plates (tags) and before issuing driver licenses.

NGC---Bill Jack Ingram, former Abernathian, operates a nursery on his home place four miles from Whitney. He sustained considerable loss earlier this year when his greenhouse and plants were destroyed by fire. Normally heated by electricity, the greenhouse caught fire from butane heat which was substituted when the electricity went off.

NGC---Here's how some of your income tax money is being spent through the CETA federal program: \$145 per week for aspiring ballerinas so they could improve their careers; bail money and fines for CETA-connected people who run afoul of the law; funding of "activist" groups, gay organizations, militant women's groups; Los Angeles used \$640,000 in federal CETA funds earmarked to help gays to find jobs and to teach the public about gay lifestyles and problems; in Rochester, N. Y., the Gay Alliance of Genesee County got a \$35,000 grant of CETA money to improve lives and opportunities of their local gay community. Midge Constanza spoke out publicly for the gay request when she was in Rochester, N. Y., her hometown. Midge Constanza is one of President Carter's White House aides. She was one who received a delegation of gays that went to the White House for

a meeting concerning their "rights". In New York, the National Congress of Neighborhood Women got enough federal CETA money to pay the salaries of 243 staffers of their group, the National Gay Task Force, and the militant National Organization for Women...total cost \$2.5 million...of YOUR tax dollars.

NGC---One recent report claims that today there are more people receiving checks from the U. S. Government than there are people paying money into the federal government. Wonder if the report is including all Social Security recipients? Since I became a wage earner on the Review staff, starting in January, 1976, I have paid in Social Security taxes on the salary, and, at the same time have received Social Security checks...making me both a payer-inner and a takerouter.

NGC---Abernathy has a Carolyn Thompson and Dimmitt has a Carolyn Thompson. The local Carolyn is Abernathy First Lady, wife of Mayor Pete Thompson.

NGC---Federal regulations have added \$666 to the cost of the car you buy, and \$2,500 to the house you build. And, the car cost from regulations will go even higher if air bags become mandatory.

NGC---Edward Kennedy denies a report in the Christian Science Monitor newspaper that he is toying with the idea of running for president in 1980.

NGC---CROP, the community hunger appeal of Church World Service, suggests that the money usually spent for Mother's Day gifts be sent to Church World Service to buy blankets to be sent to Lebanon. It isn't likely to be a very popular idea. With most people, their Mother comes before Lebanon. Or, some may wish to give to both, Mother and Lebanon.

NGC---The City of Abernathy and property owners are doing the drivers a great favor by paving the block and one-half gap on Avenue H, starting at 10th St. and extending north to the middle of the block between 11th and 12th Streets. The project will provide an all-paved route from the south edge of town completely through town to the north end of Ave. H in the Phillips Addition.

Adams was killed when the tractor he was driving overturned as he was working on the campus of Asbury Seminary at Willmore, Kentucky. He was a ministerial student there.

A memorial service was held for Adams Tuesday, April 18, at the Seminary.

He is survived by his wife, Rebecca, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Adams of Dallas. He was the son-in-law of Rev. and Mrs. William Mayo of Afton, and the grandson-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Emerson of Abernathy.

Teddy Bolinger of Lubbock was assessed the fine by city judge Barbara Gallagher after Rusty Donley complained that Bolinger ordered his Doberman Pinscher to attack him. Rusty was later treated at a Lubbock hospital's emergency room after the dog bit him.

Witnesses said Bolinger took the dog to the Idalou tennis courts where the biting incident occurred. They reported he also ordered his Doberman to terrorize several youngsters.

Mrs. Gallagher said the fine was levied on Bolinger's plea of guilty to charges of disorderly conduct and allowing a dog to run loose in violation of a city ordinance. She assessed an additional \$25 for damages to the victim.

The Doberman was one of three dogs impounded by the city for observation after three residents were bitten by them in separate incidents. The dogs have been released to their owners after fines were paid.

**Gas storage approved for Pioneer firm**

AUSTIN — The Railroad Commission has authorized Pioneer Natural Gas Co. to begin a gas storage program in Howard County to benefit customers in the southern portion of its transmission and distribution system in the South Plains and Panhandle regions.

Pioneer plans to use a depleted air reservoir on an eight-acre site near Big Spring. The reservoir is estimated to have a storage capacity of one billion cubic feet of gas.

During a Railroad Commission hearing on the application in February, Pioneer Senior Vice president J.J. Heitz testified the company has experienced supply problems during periods of increased gas usage because of a lack of pipeline and compression facilities at the southern end of its distribution system.

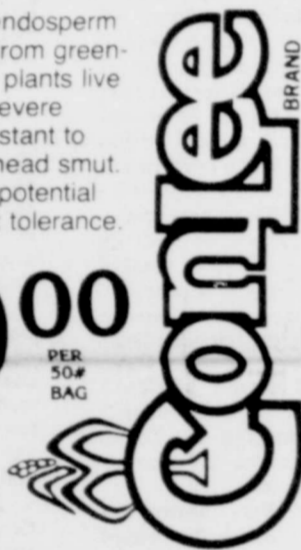
Heitz also testified Pioneer has been forced to pay for gas it was unable to take into its system when use dropped off.

### STORM SHELTER RULES LISTED

REGULATIONS ON JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL AS A STORM SHELTER

I. The weather warning and observation plan for the city of Abernathy provides three types of warnings:  
 1. Tornado Watch -- the area roped off by Kansas City to warn of the possibility that tornadoes could occur in this area for a certain time period.

2. Tornado Warning -- this warning is given by the National Weather Service when a tornado is sighted and confirmed and is a threat to an immediate area or city.  
 3. Hail Warning -- this warning is given when hail is possible for a given area or city.  
 II. Mr. Davenport and Mr. Bowen as members of the Abernathy Civil Defense Team will be stationed at the Junior High School and will open the building when a tornado

warning is issued. Other administrators will have a key and their names and phone numbers will be listed with the Civil Defense officers in case of emergency.  
 The building will be opened only for a warning -- when a tornado is sighted or confirmed by members of the Civil Defense working with the National Weather Service and is a threat to the immediate area or City.  
**Regulations:**  
 A. Only the downstairs area will be opened.

B. Classrooms will not be opened until the corridor and main area is full -- approximately 300 persons.  
 C. The administrative area will be opened for radio, communications, and for sick or injured persons and will be OFF LIMITS to the general public.  
 D. NO PETS will be allowed under any circumstances.  
 E. Smoking will be permitted only in designated areas.  
 F. Food will not be taken

 G. All occupants will be subject to rules and regulations of regular Civil Defense authorities.  
 H. The school and school authorities will not be liable for the safety or protection of an individual or his possessions.  
 I. Occupants entering the downstairs area will be expected to remain there during the warning period.  
 J. All persons are expected to park in designated areas leaving the street clear, and enter the shelter at the

K. It is advisable for occupants to bring battery operated lights. The building is equipped with minimum emergency lights in the event there is a total electric failure.  
 CITIZENS ARE URGED TO COME TO THE DESIGNATED PARKING AREA DURING ANY CONCERN OF A WATCH PERIOD; HOWEVER, THE BUILDING WILL NOT BE OPENED UNTIL THERE IS AN ACTUAL WARNING.  
 If a warning comes during school hours, adults will be admitted after all children are in areas of safety.

In only seven of the past 27 years has the jobless rate for Americans been at four percent or less. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the jobless rate right now stands above six percent. Good grillmanship begins by knowing how to build an even-burning charcoal fire. Start by stacking the briquets in a pyramid. They'll light faster this way because the air can circulate around the briquets.



Before you put the food on your charcoal grill, be sure you have a bed of evenly burning coals, point out experts at the Barbecue Industry Association. It will take about 20 to 40 minutes for the coals to burn to the right state. When they're ready, they'll be covered with a layer of grey ash during the daytime and turn a bright red at night.

Here's a good energy saving tip. Remember that charcoal briquets are an additional fuel source. When you use them for cooking you'll be saving on supplies of gas and energy. Grilling outdoors in summer months will keep the house cooler meaning less work for air conditioners.

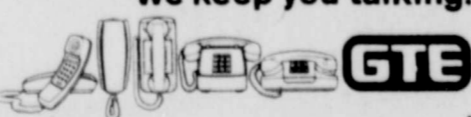

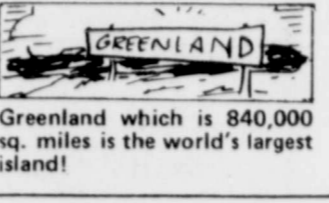


## THE ARMOUR OF LIGHT

### questions and answers

**Q. My father is severely disabled and thinks he might be eligible for SSI payments. I've heard it takes time for an SSI claim to be processed. Is there any way he can get some financial help while he's waiting for his claim to go through? He has no income of his own.**  
 A. A claimant who is otherwise eligible and is found presumptively disabled (or blind) can get SSI payments for up to 3 months while it is being decided if he or she is disabled (or blind). When your father applies for SSI, the people in the social security office will tell him if he can get these payments.  
**Q. I'm going to retire later this year. What documents should I take with me when I apply for my social security retirement benefits?**  
 A. You should take your social security card (or a record

of your social security number); proof of your age, such as a birth or baptismal certificate made at or shortly after birth; and your W-2 form for the previous year or, if you're self-employed, a copy of your last Federal income tax return. You also will need your marriage certificate if your spouse is applying for benefits on your record, and your children's birth certificates if you're applying for them.  
**Q. My wife just learned that she has permanent kidney failure. If she is eligible for Medicare, when would her coverage start?**  
 A. When a person is eligible for Medicare because of permanent kidney failure, the time his or her coverage starts depends on the kind of medical treatment the condition requires. If a person is receiving maintenance dialysis treatments,

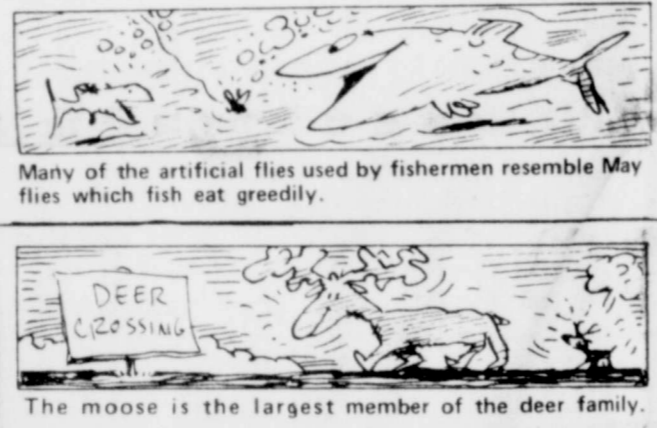
Medicare protection starts on the first day of the third month after the month the treatments begin. Coverage can start earlier, though, if a person goes into a hospital for a kidney transplant. For more information, contact any social security office.  
**Q. My doctor is going to send me to a physical therapist for treatment of an injury. Will my Medicare medical insurance pay for this?**  
 A. Medicare medical insurance can help pay for medically necessary services from an independently practicing, Medicare-certified physical therapist in his or her office or in your home if such treatment is prescribed by a doctor. The maximum amount medical insurance can pay for these services is \$80 in each calendar year.

# Many People Confused On Medicare, Medicaid

Even though Medicare and Medicaid have been operating more than 10 years, many people are confused and think the programs are the same, a social security spokesperson said today. Although both programs pay for health care, they are different, the representative went on. Medicare, entirely a Federal program, helps pay for hospital care, doctors' services and many other health services for almost everyone 65 and over and for certain disabled people under 65. Medicaid, a Federal-State partnership, pays for health care for certain kinds of needy and low-income people. Some people can have both Medicare and Medicaid. Medicare is the same in all States, while Medicaid varies from State to State since the States design their own program within Federal guidelines. The only State not having a Medicaid program is Arizona. Medicare has two parts—hospital insurance and medical insurance. Hospital insurance helps pay for inpatient hospital care and post-hospital care in a skilled nursing facility or at home from a home health agency. Medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other services not covered by hospital insurance. Medicaid pays the full costs of these and other health care services for those eligible. Since Medicare pays only part

of health care costs, Medicaid can pay the difference for those eligible for both programs. Medicare hospital insurance is financed by payroll contributions from employers and employees. Medical insurance is financed with premiums, with those enrolled paying about one-fourth of the cost and the Federal Government paying the remainder. Medicaid is financed by Federal and State governments. The Federal share ranges from 50 percent for the richest States up to 78 percent for the State with the lowest per-capita income. States pay the remaining costs, often with help from local governments.



**New Labor Regulation To Affect AG, Youth**

College Station--Agricultural producers who rely on hand harvesting of short season crops should know about a proposed federal regulation that would allow the hiring of 10- and 11-year old youth for this work, announces Dr. Gray S. Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Presently, as a result of a 1974 amendment to the Fair Labor Standards Act, minors under 12 years of age may only be employed for non-hazardous work with written parental consent and only on farms where the employees do not come under federal minimum wage provisions. This means a farm having less than 500 mandays of agricultural labor during any quarter during the preceding calendar year. The proposed regulation provides for a waiver to permit the employment of 10- and 11-year-old youth in agriculture as hand-harvesters of short season crops on larger farms under certain conditions, points out Nelson. Youth hired under the waiver must be employed during non-school hours and must commute daily from their permanent residence. Any employer or group of employers may apply for a waiver to cover not more than an eight-week period between June 1 and October 15 of any calendar year, notes the engineer. Each waiver application must include signed statements by the employer, employees, county Extension agent, officials of the state employment service and other knowledgeable individuals regarding substantiation of the following provisions of the waiver application: 1. Such agricultural operation "is customarily and generally recognized as being paid on a piece rate basis in the region in which such individuals would be employed." 2. The "industry of such employer has (prior to the 1974 restrictions) traditionally and substantially employed individuals under 12 years of age without displacing substantial job

opportunities for individuals over 16 years of age." 3. The crop to be harvested is one with a "particularly short harvesting season," normally within a four-week period, in the particular region in which the waiver will be applicable. 4. The 12-year minimum age prescribed since 1974 has and would cause "severe economic disruption in the industry of the employer applying for the waiver." 5. Neither the type of "employment" nor the "level and type of pesticides and other chemicals used" would have a harmful effect on the health and well-being of the employed minors. 6. Individuals age 12 and above are not available for such employment. Nelson cautions that this regulation is only a proposed regulation at this time. Comments, pro or con, regarding the proposal are invited from producers and other interested persons and should be mailed by May 4 to Lucille C. 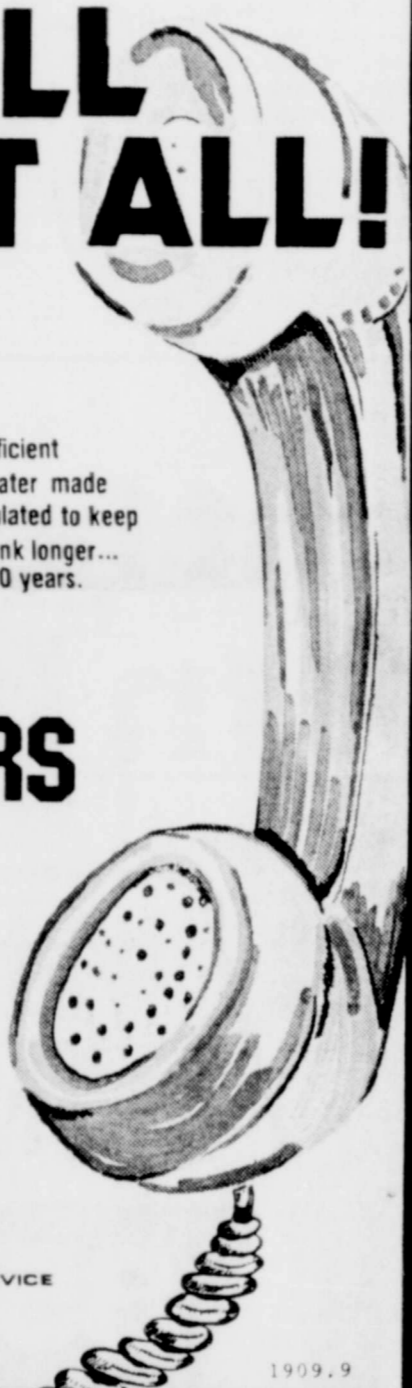

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## Taking A Vacation?

Taking a vacation this summer? Are you going to visit relatives, maybe go to Disney World or Astro-world, visit Dallas or San Antonio. Maybe you are going on a long fishing trip, or camping to get away from it all. You will use the time well and it is very likely someone else will enjoy your vacation and use the time you have given him well. He is called a Criminal and he specializes in burglary, theft, fraud, robbery or whatever strikes his fancy. Your regional law enforcement agencies would like to share with you some

suggestions to keep the criminal away and help you protect your property. There are a number of things you need to do, but starting now if you haven't already, you need to participate in Operation Identification and mark your property. You can obtain an engraver on loan from your police or sheriffs department and they have a Crime Prevention Officer to advise you of the type of property you should mark. For jewelry and other items like paintings, antiques and guns that you do not want to mark you should take a

colored photograph of the property and on the back of the picture write a full description and price. If the property should be stolen you can then give this to the police or sheriffs department and they will be able to conduct a better investigation.

Also if you are going on vacation utilize your neighbors, close relatives and the police or sheriffs office. Your neighbor or relative can help keep an eye on your place, collect mail, ensure grass is kept mowed and yard neat. They can also enter your house from time to time and switch on different lights, put their car

in your driveway awhile and most importantly notify the police or sheriff of suspicious persons and activities around your home. The police or sheriff should be notified of the times you will be away, who has a key and will be around the home, information on cars and lights. They will check your home and be able to respond better to a burglary if they know what is going on.

These are some of the things you need to prepare for now, but there are many things you can do. This is the first in a series of articles to help you protect your property and ensure your vacation is pleasant.

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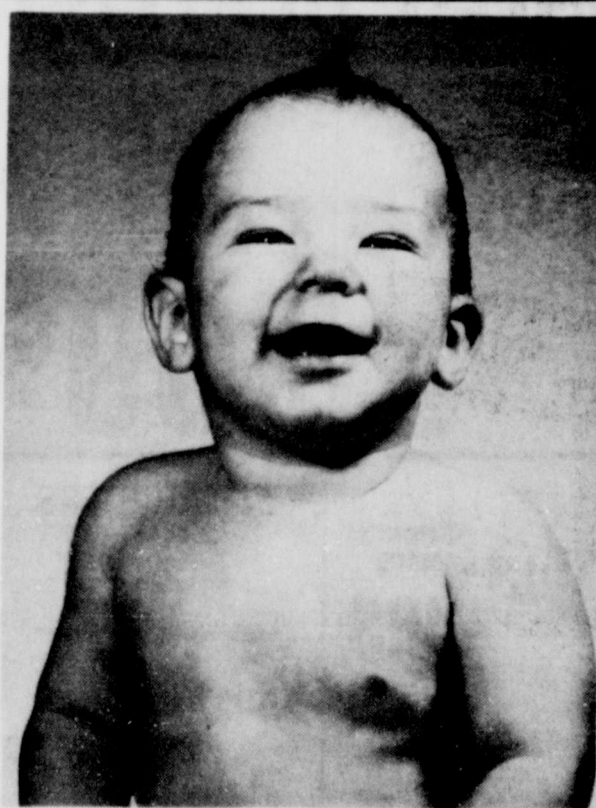
