Kathi Guarrant Cited at A & M

Persistent night and weekend lab work becomes a way of life for many Texas AGM students, especially those in the University Undergraduate Fellows Program. Kathi Guarrant, senior bioengineering major from Abernathy, typifies the dedication. While doing far-above-average work in her studies, she pursued independent research on electrical properties of blood cell suspensions. And Kathi would have settled for a 30-hour or more day. "I didn't get to do near as much testing as I would have liked," commented the Texas AGM student, one of 52 in the honors program. "An equipment problem didn't allow time to take a lot of measurements. But I was able to duplicate earlier results and also show that as blood temperature increases, its electrical resistivity declines." Miss Guarrant reported her research with other Undergraduate Fellows recently in a symposium. Her project was done under faculty adviser Dr. D. L. Stoner, bioengineering professor. "Regardless of the subject, students gain experience in research design, data acquisition and analysis, and communication of results," explained Dr. Mel Friedman, program coordinator. Her long hours and "a lot of dogs at the veterinary medicine hospital who donate blood" will soon pay off for Kathi. After graduation next month, she becomes the first trainee of InterMedics Inc., a Freeport company that builds pacemakers for heart patients. It's a long way from her Abernathy High School days on the Texas High Plains and a science fair solar energy project. Math, music and medicine were her interests then, but a letter from an Ohio school changed Guarrant's direction. It said her test scores indicated she would be interested in bioengineering. "I'd never heard of it before," smiled the brunette. "But I checked, and discovered the nearest place with such a degree program was Texas AGM." The Texas AGM student is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Guarrant, Box 477, Abernathy. A 1974 Abernathy High graduate, she is a member of Tau Beta Pi, Phi Kappa Phi, Cap and Gown and the Association of Bioengineers at Texas AGM.

N&C--Elsewhere in this paper is a story sent to the Abernathy Review by Texas A. & M. University praising Kathi Guerrant, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Guerrant, and a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Halford, all of Abernathy. This is one kind of news we like to publish about AHS graduates.

N&C--The County of Hale, State of Texas, was organized in 1888. Happy 90th, Hale County.

N&C--The City of Abernathy, Hale & Lubbock Counties, was started in July, 1909. Next year will be the 70th. Plans should start NOW for a big, big celebration in 1979.

N&C--Jackie Barton, who is developing the acreage on the west side of town that he bought from Thelma (Jones) Wesley, says two blocks of Ave. J will be paved in the development. Efforts are being made to have 12th St. (or a portion of 12th) paved from Ave. H west.

N&C--The City of Abernathy last week took delivery of a new, ultra modern city fire truck. It replaces one that has been in service a lot of years. That truck, which still is in very good condition, will be kept in service as a back-up unit. Why did the city spend so much on a new city fire truck when the old one is giving good service? Answer is that the state fire commission, or whatever it is called, demands that city fire trucks be replaced when they have been in service a number of years. Old Red has reached that number of

years. Abernathy would have been penalized on the local fire insurance rates if the new truck had not been purchased. Chief of Police Clyde Vandegriff, who also is a member of the Volunteer Fire Department, says that the city now has seven units that could be sent to a fire if that many trucks were ever needed.

N&C--Abernathy's EMS ambulance recently made four runs in a 24-hour period to set a new record of activity.

N&C--The City's move in purchasing a 77 1/2-acre farm at the crossroads of FM 54 & FM 400 three miles east of Lakeview, and drilling two city water wells on the tract, is not an indication that Abernathy is having water problem. The action of the City Council is having two more wells tied into the city water system is a move to assure an adequate water supply for years to come and to take care of a town that is growing.

The two new wells will produce along with wells on another city-owned farm, the "McKenzie Place" and wells on the airport section four miles east of town. More improvement is to be made in Abernathy's water system, including among other things, an elevated water storage tank.

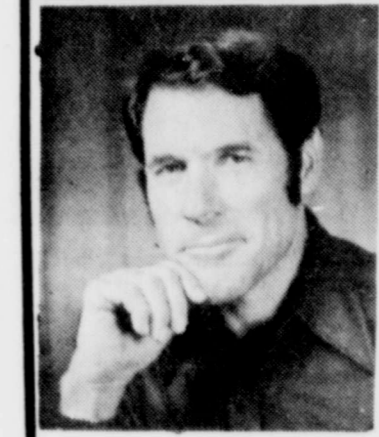

Mrs. Tomlinson, Raymond, Robert and Jack Parsons all attended the Snyder school.

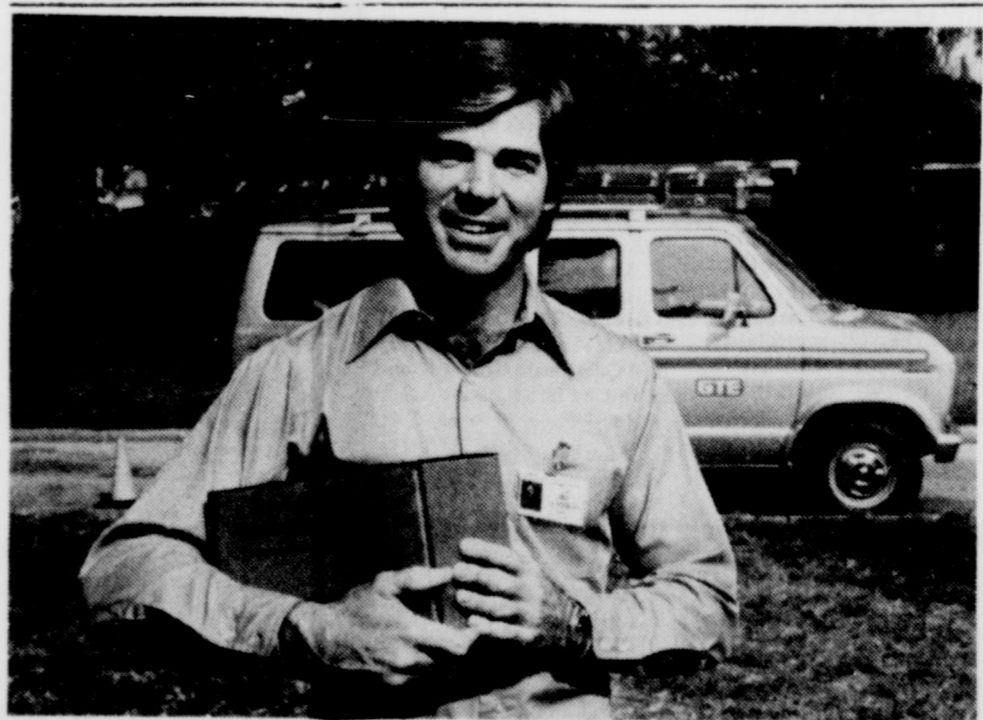

Perserving Farmland Emphasized During Soil Stewardship Week at College Station

COLLEGE STATION--- Without question, land is a limited natural resource. The same can be said for good farmland. Yet some five million acres of rural land are lost to non-agricultural use each year in the United States, about a million acres of this being "prime" farmland.

"The indiscriminate use of farmland for non-agricultural purposes is of concern to many people and is being given special attention during this year's observance of Soil Stewardship Week, April 30-May 7," points out Dr. B. L. Harris, soils and water use specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Extension Service is cooperating in the observance with the National Association of Conservation Districts and Soil and Water Conservation Districts throughout the state.

Theme of the weeklong observance is "Compelling Ventures" and is designed to instill in all Americans the need to venture forth to take care of the valuable land, water and other natural resources God has put on the earth.

Along with the issue of preserving farmland, Soil Stewardship Week is also designed to stress the importance of controlling water pollution caused by

run-off from unprotected farms, ranches, roadsides and construction sites.

"America's good farmland is one of our greatest gifts, yet much of it is used indiscriminately each year for housing developments, highways, shopping centers and the like," says Harris.

"Our challenge is to make wise, better and more responsible use of the land our Creator has given us. We must respond to God's call to be responsible stewards of this bountiful land. Our bountiful supplies of food and fiber depend on the conservation, wise and proper management of our soil and water resources."

Many special programs and church services are being planned to call attention to the responsibility of all people for the protection and proper care of the Lord's earth, adds the Extension specialist.

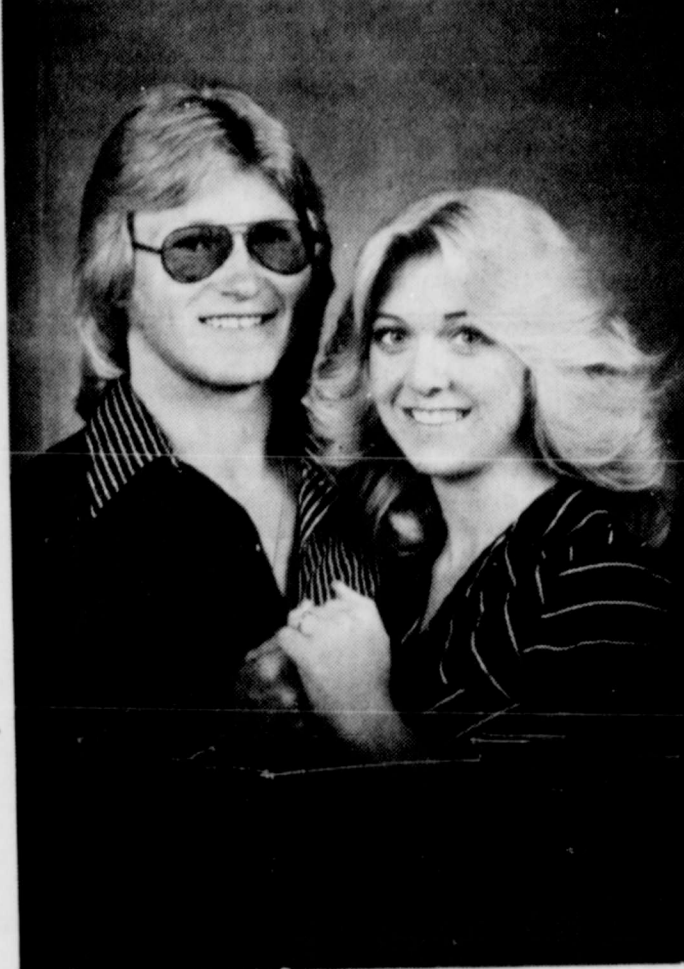

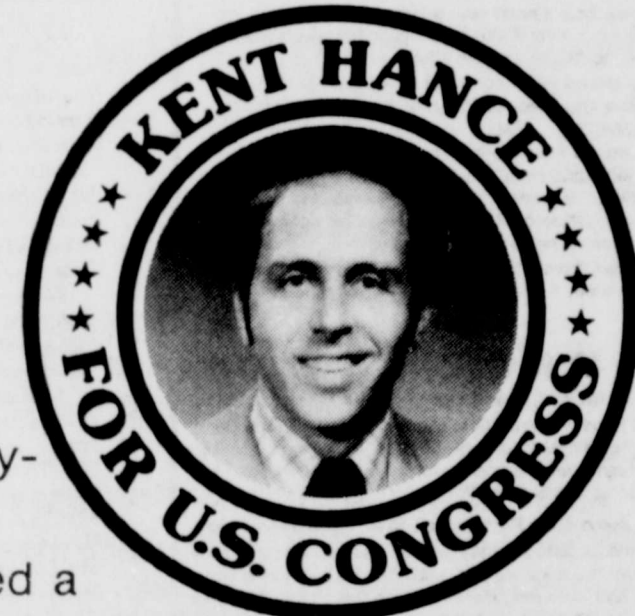

The United Methodist Youth had "parent night" following the evening worship service. Games were played and then the group divided up in four groups and went on a treasure hunt, followed by refreshments.

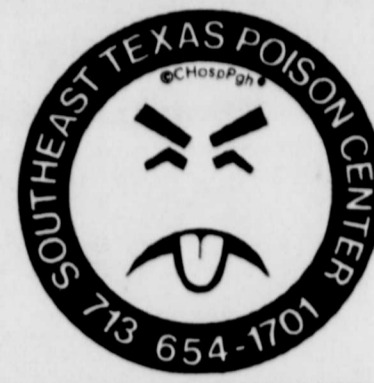

After coming to the states, Dr. Tran attended a course at the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine in Oklahoma City. Besides his Doctorate of Medicine, Dr. Tran holds a diploma of tropical medicine from the University of Bordeaux in France and a diploma from the U.S. Army School of Chemical Corps from Ala. in 1961 and finally a diploma from the U.S. Naval Medical School at Bethesda, Md. in combat and field medicine issued to him in 1964.

Since graduation, besides his general practice in Saigon, Dr. Tran served as assistant surgeon at the Navy Hospital in Saigon; Chief Naval surgeon of the South Vietnamese Navy, assistant of the Department of Ophthalmology, Military General Hospital, Saigon; assistant gynecologist, Clinic of Vietnam Family Planning Association in Saigon; and Deputy surgeon general of the Vietnamese Medical Corps.

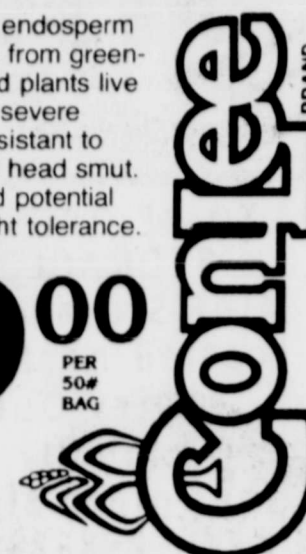
