Primary Elections

Voting in the state primaries will be conducted Saturday, May 6, and precinct conventions also will be held on that date. County conventions will be held May 13th in Plainview and Lubbock.

Voting in South Hale County in our coverage area will be at Abernathy City Hall Clubroom and at Lakeview Methodist Church. North Lubbock County voters will mark ballots at Joe Thompson Implement Co., New Deal School and New Deal Clubhouse, and at the Becton Gin office.

Polls will open at 7 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

The election judge for balloting at Abernathy City Hall will be announced.

Henry Scarborough will be the election judge at Lakeview, Hale County.

Arno Struve will be the election judge for the Lubbock County voting at Joe Thompson Implement Co.

The Hale County race drawing the most candidates and attention is the office of Tax Assessor-Collector. Longtime Assessor-Collector Bill Hollars resigned that post a few months ago to take a position in the State Comptroller's office in Austin. Five are in the race for the Hale County office vacated by Hollars. They are Democrats Allene Wallace, Christine Vinson, R. C. Stevens, Larry Hamilton and Joe H. McWilliams.

Seeking re-election, and unopposed, are Henry Heck, Hale County Judge; Mildred Tucker, Hale County Clerk; Harold N. Martin, Hale County Treasurer.

The only Commissioner race in Hale County of interest to voters in our coverage area is for Precinct 2, which includes Lakeview and Petersburg voting boxes. Hale County Pct. 2 Commissioner Lloyd Goldston has as his opponent at Homer Roberson, who is a former Commissioner of Pct. 2, Hale County. They reside in the Lakeview-Petersburg community. Both are Democrats.

[The Precinct Democratic Convention for Abernathy will be held at the city hall, starting at 7:15 p. m. Saturday, May 6, voting day.] (No information was available on area voting in the Republican Primary to be held May 6.)

Sparking first primary voting in Texas May 6th will be the referendum on pari-mutuel gambling on horse and dog races. Another money-involved referendum on the May 6 ballot will be: For or Against "the 1979 Texas Legislature's authorizing higher interest rates on loans under five thousand dollars (\$5,000)."

In the voting on candidates, U. S. Senator John Tower is seeking re-election, and is the leader on the

ballot in Republican primary balloting. In the Democratic primary May 6, front runners for nomination as U. S. Senator are Robert Krueger of New Braunfels, who currently is serving in the U. S. House of Representatives, and Joe Christi of El Paso, former chairman of the Texas Insurance Board. Other names will be on the ballot.

Two names will highlight the Democratic primary ticket for U. S. Representative to follow George H. Mahon in the 19th District of Texas. Seeking to succeed Mahon, who is retiring after this year, are State Senator Kent Hance and Trinity Church Pastor Morris Sheets, both of Lubbock. Three candidates are seeking nomination in the Republican primary for the 19th District office. They are Joe Hickox, Lubbock, a retired U. S. Air Force officer, formerly stationed at Reese Air Force Base; Jim Reese, Odessa, and George Bush, Jr., Midland.

Frontrunners in a long list of candidates for Governor of Texas are the incumbent, Dolph Briscoe, and challenger John Hill, Texas Attorney General. Included in the list of those seeking that office is former governor Preston Smith of Lubbock. All three are Democrats.

Top contender for the office of Lt. Governor of Texas is Bill Hobby of Houston, who has had five years of experience in that office.

The race for Texas Attorney General seems to be shaping up in a hot race between two of the four contenders, Mark White, who has had experience in Texas government as Secretary of State and former Assistant Attorney General, and Price Daniel, Jr., who is a former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Three Democrats are in the race for State Treasurer: Warren G. Harding, incumbent, and Harry Ledbetter and C. R. Sanderson.

Reagan Brown, who was appointed Texas Commissioner of Agriculture when John White went to the USDA in Washington, is seeking an elective term. He is challenged by Joe Hubenak and Don Sewell, all Democrats.

Democrats Mark Wallace, incumbent, and John Thomas Henderson, are in the race for Railroad Commissioner.

Several are in races for State Court positions. James E. (Pete) Laney is State Representative, 76th District.

Democrat Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls is seeking re-election as State Senator, District 30, which includes Hale County.

Hale County commissioners April 24 agreed to pay \$200 monthly to J. L. Irish of Abernathy for renting a building to house Justice of Peace Precinct 3 office, headquartered in the southern portion of the county.

Irish will provide water for the facility while the county must pay other utilities and air conditioning. The building, acquired to provide Precinct 3 Justice Jeanne Marr more office space, is located about three miles north of Abernathy.

Mrs. Marr currently operates out of an Abernathy city office. According to county officials, her quarters are very small and in need of additional space.

The decision had been expected since commissioners verbally agreed to the transaction at their last meeting but delayed formal action because the item was not on the printed agenda.

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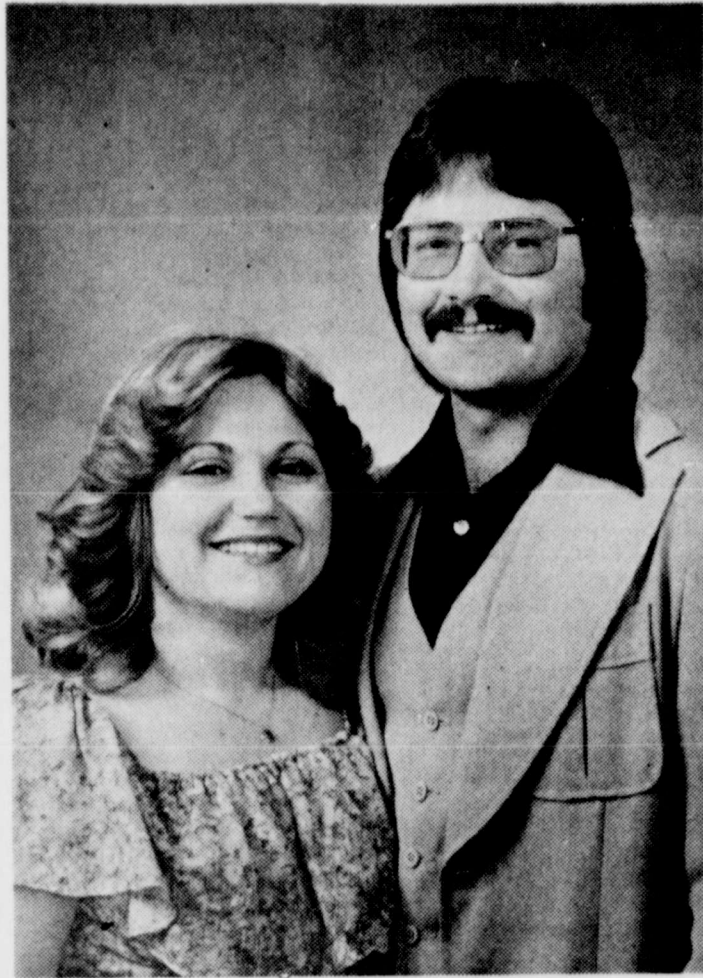
JUNIOR TRACK MEET TO BE HELD AT IDALOU

Cattle scabies found in eight Texas counties

Texas had 10 confirmed outbreaks of psoroptic cattle scabies during March, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) veterinarians. Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Gaines, Lubbock, Randall counties reported one each; Deaf Smith and Swisher counties reported two outbreaks each.

The Texas cases were part of 42 confirmed outbreaks in eight states in the western and central United States, that occurred during March.

Dr. Glen O. Schubert of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) said that the scabies problem has been growing in recent months in many cattle-raising states. However, strict regulations imposed by several states should help bring the problem under control.

Scabies is caused by tiny parasitic mites that puncture the skin of cattle and feed on the body fluids released from the wounds. The wholesomeness of meat is not affected, but economic losses for cattlemen can result. The mites are killed by dipping cattle in pesticide solutions permitted by USDA.

Proposed Farm Law Changes Increases Cotton Loan Rates

Farm law changes approved April 26 by a House-Senate Conference Committee have the solid support of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock-based cotton producer organization.

If passed and signed by the president, in particular, would bring the method of setting the cotton loan much closer to the method called for in PCG legislative policy adopted in January of 1977, officials note. In addition the new measure would put a four-year 48-cent minimum on the base U.S. loan, "which is still

too low but is certainly better than the 44-cent loan we have now," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson.

The 1977 law required the Secretary of Agriculture to set the loan at the lower of two levels, one to be calculated from an average of U.S. spot market prices, the other from an average of the Liverpool "A" Index, a compilation of Northern Europe prices.

PCG HAS SOUGHT, since the 1977 Farm Act was first con-

sidered, to have the U.S. loan based solely on U.S. prices. The legislation now pending still includes in the loan-setting process a calculation of both domestic and European prices, but the formula for each would be revised. And perhaps more importantly, Johnson points out, the new legislation would permit, but would require, the secretary to use the "A" Index calculation. "While we still would prefer a law that doesn't even mention foreign prices in the U.S. loan

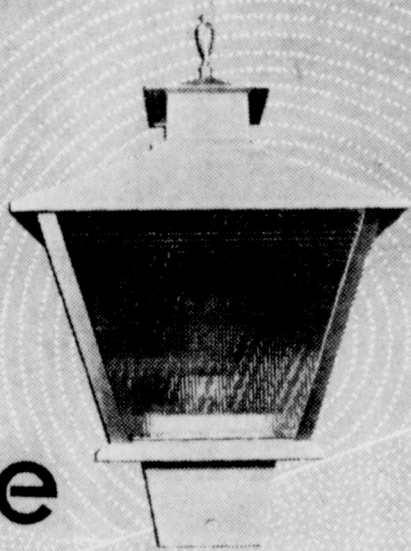


Statewide, the program totals \$20.0 million for construction on 387.7 miles of Farm and Ranch to Market Roads in Texas.

County Judge Henry Heck Reports To The People of Hale County

First, I want to express my thanks to you for making it possible for me to have had a responsible part in county government for these seven and one fourth years. I cherish your continued confidence and support as we look forward to the next four years.

I think that this is a good time to review, with you, some of the things that have been accomplished and to look ahead to plans not yet realized. It would be naive of me to assume that what has been done is the work of one person. It has only been possible through your cooperation and the support of the Commissioners Court.

When I became your County Judge, we were able to finalize a redistricting plan that had already been initiated in response to Court rulings that demanded a more equal division of precinct voting strength. Study is being made at this time to update the present plan.

In 1971, we had no Juvenile and Misdemeanor Probation Department. Juvenile matters were handled by the Child Welfare Department, and Misdemeanor probation was served by the Felony Probation department. I was instrumental in obtaining a grant through South Plains Association of Governments from the Criminal Justice Commission for funds to establish these two departments, that, have since progressed to the point of being very favorably recognized throughout our area.

A tax adjustment was effected that brought assessments of valuation more in line with actual or true value. This, combined with Revenue Sharing funds, made it possible to build a much needed addition to the jail, providing "approved" space for female and juvenile offenders. Additional office space was also provided along with modern kitchen facilities. Other renovation is currently being done in the jail. This is required in order to comply with provisions set by the Jail Standards Commission. I do not like a lot of it any more than you, but we have no choice. Some of the regulations call for facilities that a lot of us do not have and cannot afford in our own homes. It is a costly process and the end is not in sight.

The Ware Hotel was purchased and a portion of the ground floor was converted to the County Tax Office. Other space is now being arranged for office space that will further expedite the renovation of the Courthouse. I feel sure that all of us are proud of the Courthouse Annex.

We have recently made provisions for improvement in the County Prosecutors' office with provision for a full time County Attorney, with other help that may be needed. This will enable us to expedite the handling of Misdemeanor cases in compliance with the recent "speedy trials act".

The program for Courthouse renovation is already in operation. Priorities had to be changed when Hale County was given the 242nd District Court. A present courtroom has been renovated in order to be available for this Court. It will also necessitate another courtroom in the basement which will be made possible when the new offices in the Annex are completed.

Updating the tax structure has been accomplished in a way that will make possible the use of Revenue Sharing Funds for permanent improvements. This will enable us to proceed on a pay as you go basis with considerable amount of Courthouse renovation. This will require the need of much smaller bond issue than would have been needed in the earlier plan.

I could talk with you about the day to day routine, but I have tired to keep this report as brief and to the point as possible, in the hope that you can feel that we, your elected officials, do try as best we know how, to serve you in a credible way. I want to, again, commend the present Commissioners Court for their dedication to a common purpose.

I promised you that I would be a full time County Judge. I stand by that promise. I also promised to strive for a program of fuller cooperation with the City Governments of Hale County. I submit to you, that with the cooperation of our Commissioners Court and the cities involved, we do have a healthy and positive relationship. Through a program of quarterly meetings, we are continuing to work toward a better understanding of our mutual interests.

I enjoy serving as your County Judge, and solicit your continued cooperation and support. The office door is always open and I want you to know that you are always welcome.

calculation formula," Johnson continues, "if the new Conference Committee measure becomes law we will at least have a chance to convince the secretary that the 'A' Index figures should not be used when using those figures would set the loan at a level below the level indicated by domestic prices."

THE "A" INDEX calculation used to set the 1978 loan at 44 cents was equal to 90 percent of the average index for the first two weeks of October, as specified in the law. The new measure calls for this

calculation to be based on the 15-week period from July 1 to Oct. 15 each year.

Current law, the 1977 Act, calls for setting the loan at the lower of (1) 90 percent of the adjusted "A" Index average or (2) 85 percent of the three-year average of U.S. spot market prices. If the Conference Committee measure becomes law, the domestic calculation will be based on the previous five years, dropping the high and low years and averaging the remaining three.

Ninety percent of this three-year average of U.S. spot market prices would become

the maximum level at which the loan could be set. The "A"

Index computation would be the minimum, and the secretary would have authority to set the loan at any point between the two.

Following the formula set out in the pending change, Johnson says, would result in the loan for 1978 being raised to 48 cents, the statutory minimum. For 1979, depending on what prices do for the remainder of this year, the loan would be anywhere between the 48-cent minimum and about 51 cents, he concludes.

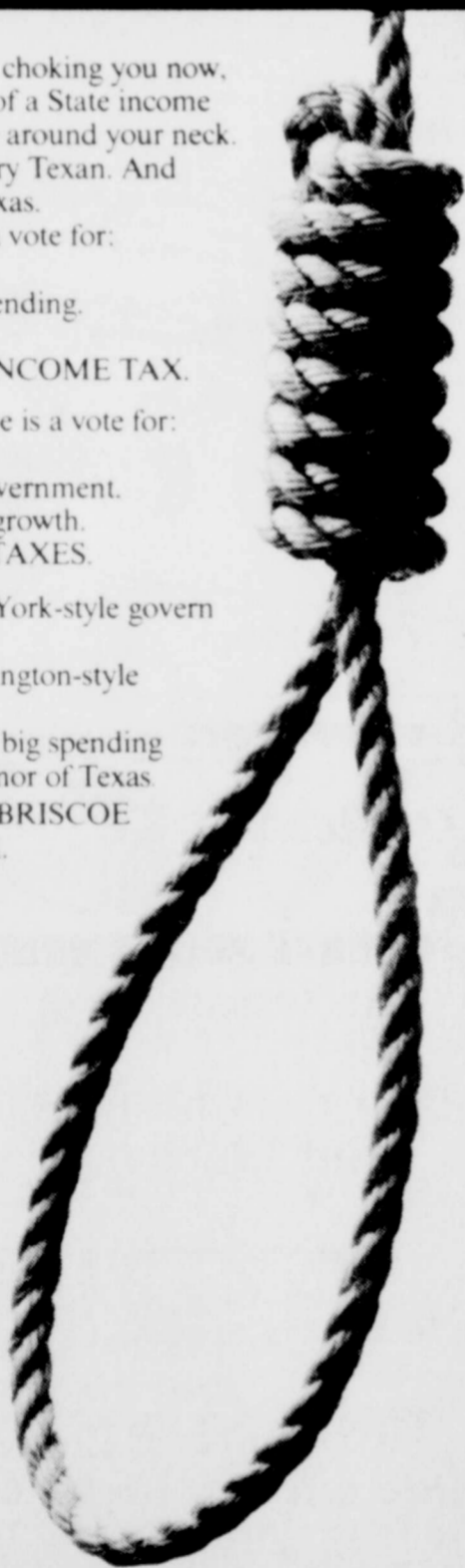

4-H NEWS

Between the year 2000 the world must learn to produce as much food as it has learned to produce since the beginning of time, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. By the turn of the century there will be an estimated two months to feed for every one mouth being fed today.

Supplying enough food and fiber to meet future needs will not be an easy job. It will require more and better research and technology, more efficient use of land and energy, and improved crop protection methods, points out Vicki Winter, assistant county extension agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This is where the 4-H program comes into play. Young people in the national 4-H agricultural program supported by International Harvester Company, may one day play a key role in helping to feed the world of the 21st Century. Many of these 4-H members may decide to apply their 4-H training and experience in choosing careers in agriculture, a broad and dynamic industry that employs directly or indirectly almost a third of the U.S. labor force.

THE 4-H AGRICULTURAL program is conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service for boys and girls, 9-19. It encourages 4-Hers to "learn by doing" the skills and practices that make for more efficient, profitable farming. 4-H agricultural projects and activities range from animals and poultry to plants and soils; energy, machines and equipment; and ecology and natural resources. Young people enroll in one or more of these areas to gain experience and keep up to date on new and improved practices. They also share their knowledge with their family and community.

Program members are eligible for awards donated by International Harvester and arranged by the National 4-H Council, a nonprofit educational organization serving 4-H. Four members per county may earn medals of honor, and one 4-H'er in each state can win an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago. Six national winners receive \$1,000 scholarships. Winners are chosen by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Further information on the 4-H agricultural program is available from the county Extension office, at 8th and Ash or call 286-7466.

4-H is open to all youth, 9-19, regardless of race, color, or national origin.
