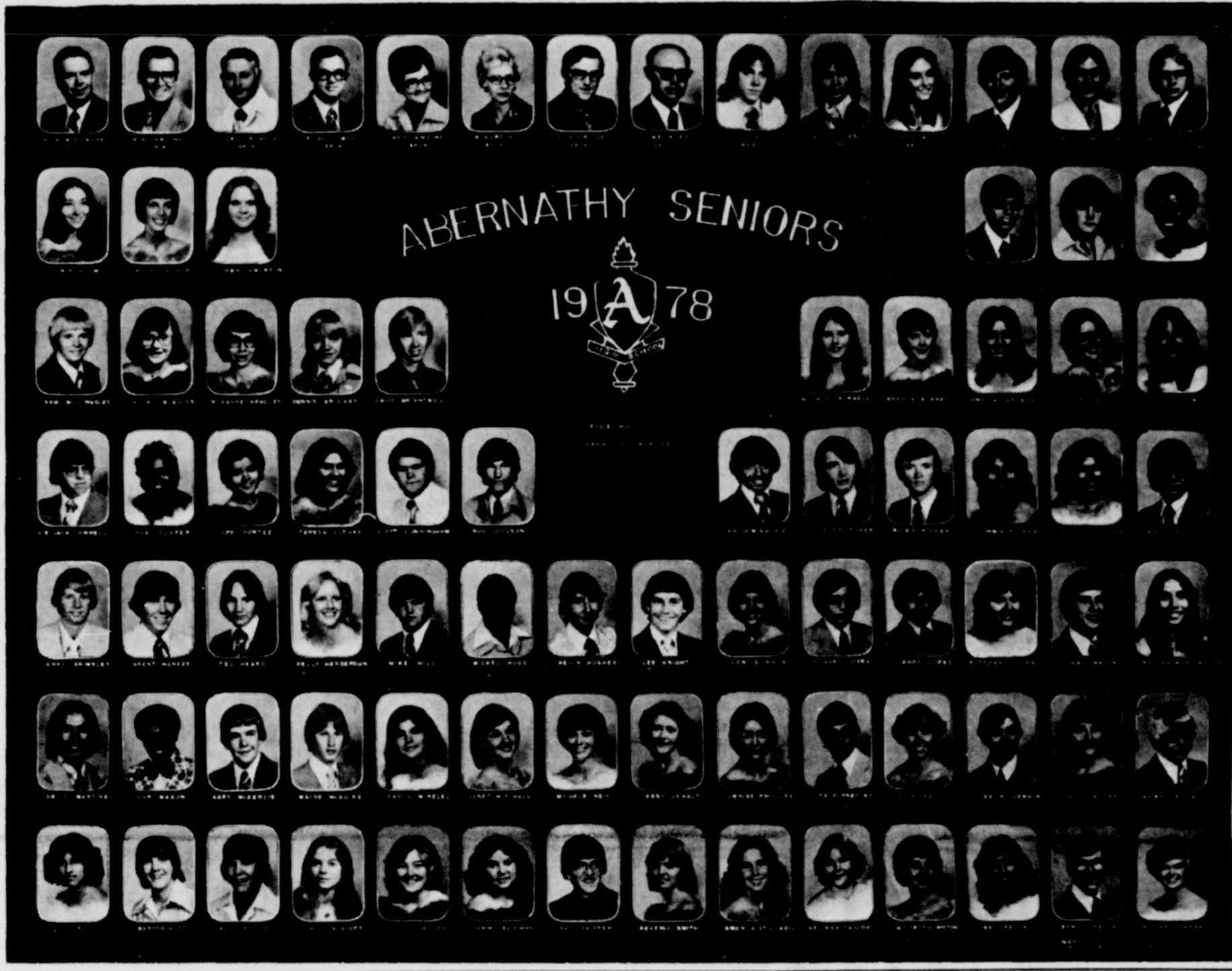

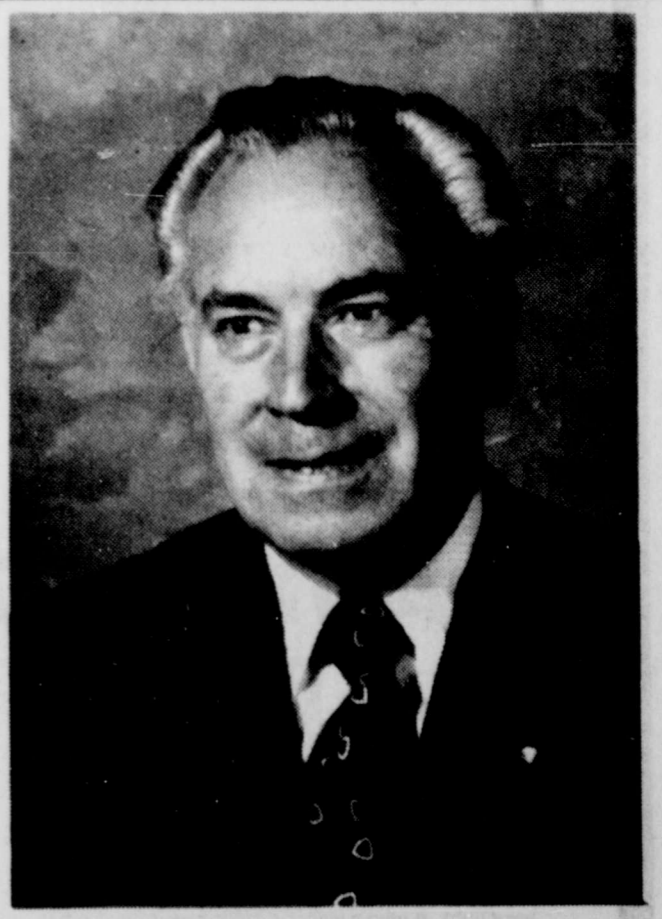

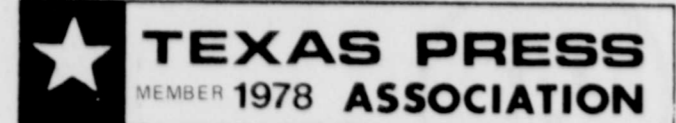

NEWS AND COMMENTS

NGC--Did you know that the average American automobile is made up of some 15,000 different parts? And, that an automobile is the \$5,000.00 price range would cost about \$23,000.00 to restore if it were damaged to the point that all parts had to be purchased separately and put together?

NGC--Hey, fellow Older Texans, Governor Briscoe designated the month of May as "Older Texans Month".

NGC--"A widely publicized estimate that 90% of all cancers originate in the environment has been misinterpreted," cancer scientists said at an American Cancer Society writers seminar in Houston. "Continuing the remarks," the reports says, "As a consequence, the experts believe, the public tends to overreact to fears about cancer-causing effects of air and water pollution at the expense of factors known to cause cancer, such as cigarette smoking."

RITEs HELD FOR POLO SALINAS

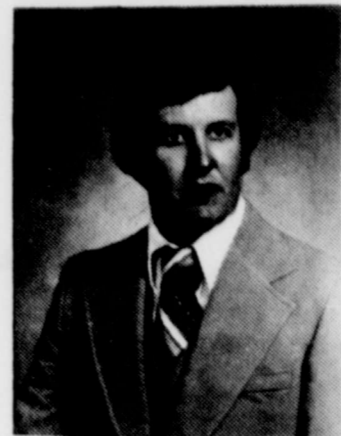
LUBBOCK--A rosary for Polo Salinas, 29, of Lubbock were recited at 8 p. m. Friday in Henderson Funeral Chapel.

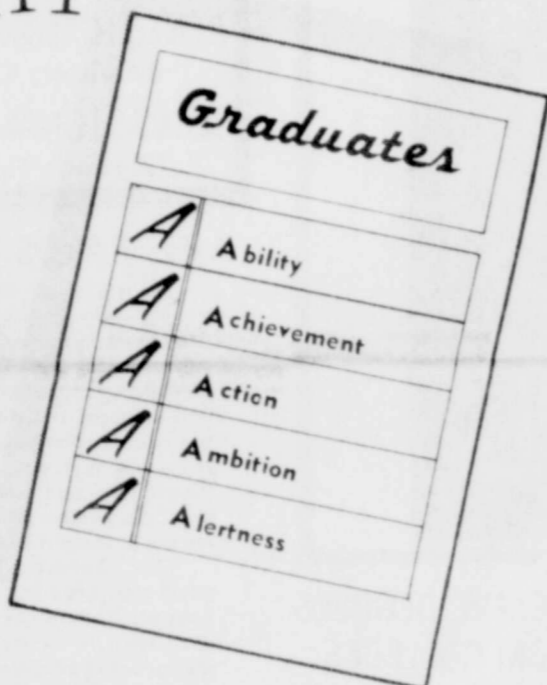

STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

Southwestern Public Service Company, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas and the Public Utility Regulatory Act of Texas, hereby gives public notice of its intent to change its general retail rates in the counties served by it in Texas effective on June 16, 1978.

It is expected that the increase in rates for residential, commercial and industrial customers will result in an increase of 8.8 per cent in the company's gross revenue in Texas as compared to that furnished by the existing rate schedule.

Complete copies of the new rate schedule have been mailed or delivered to the appropriate officer of each affected municipality at least 35 days prior to the effective date of the proposed change and copies of the new schedule have been furnished to the Public Utility Commission of Texas. (6-8-c)

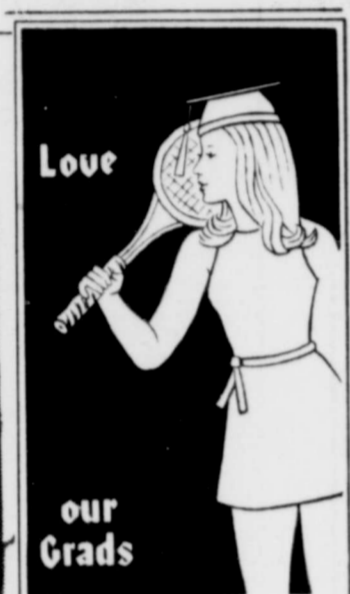

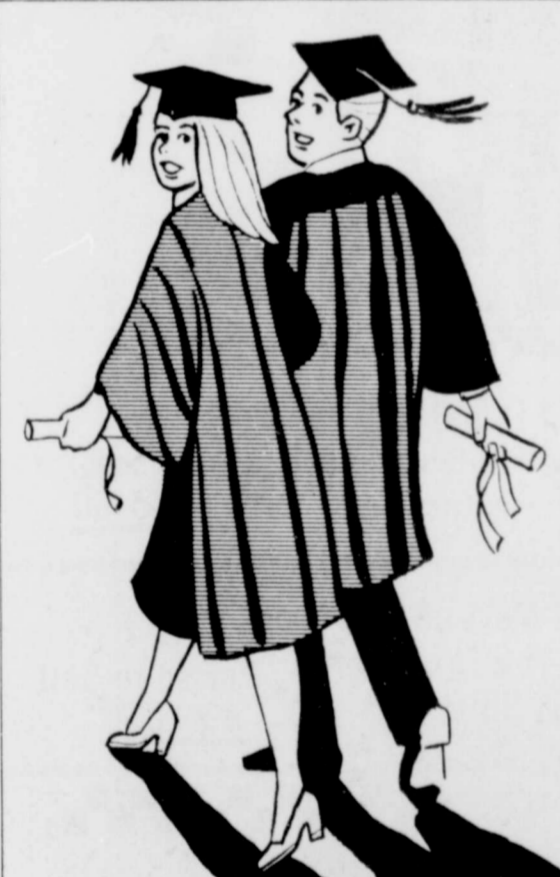

August 1 Deadline For Booster Club Scholarship

It is time for the Antelope Booster Club to take applications to select a recipient of the Fall (1978) semester scholarship. General Provisions for receiving the scholarship are as follows:

(1) The recipient shall be of good moral character and shall obey laws.

(2) Recipient must be a full-time student (registered for a minimum of 12 semester hours) in an accredited college or university.

(3) Recipient shall show qualities of academic proficiency in keeping with college education requirements.

(4) It shall be the responsibility of the recipient to request that copies of his or her grades be sent from the office of the registrar to the President of the Abernathy Boosters Club. Such information shall be passed on to the Scholarship Committee.

(5) Each approved scholarship recipient shall submit a transcript to the Scholarship Selection Committee by August 1. (for recipients desiring consideration for the fall semester) and/or December 1 (for recipients desiring consideration for spring semester.)

(7) Consideration for scholarship and scholarships awarded shall be based upon need.

(8) Recipient must have previously completed three (3) semesters of approved college or university work satisfactory before a scholarship can be awarded.

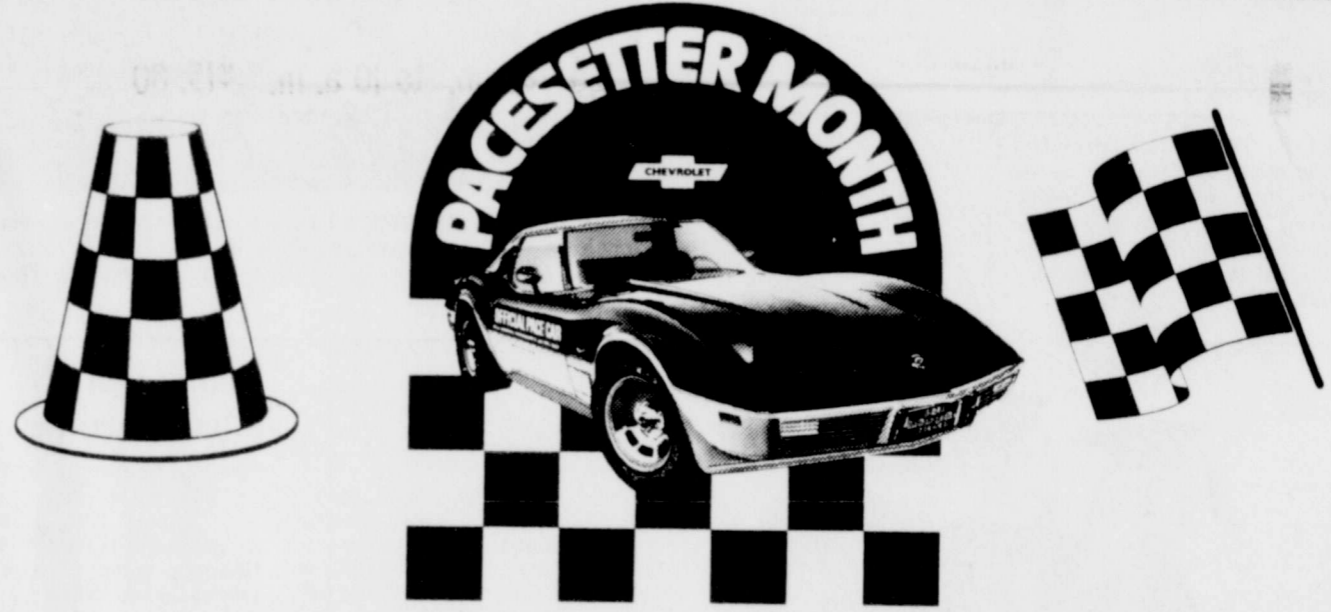

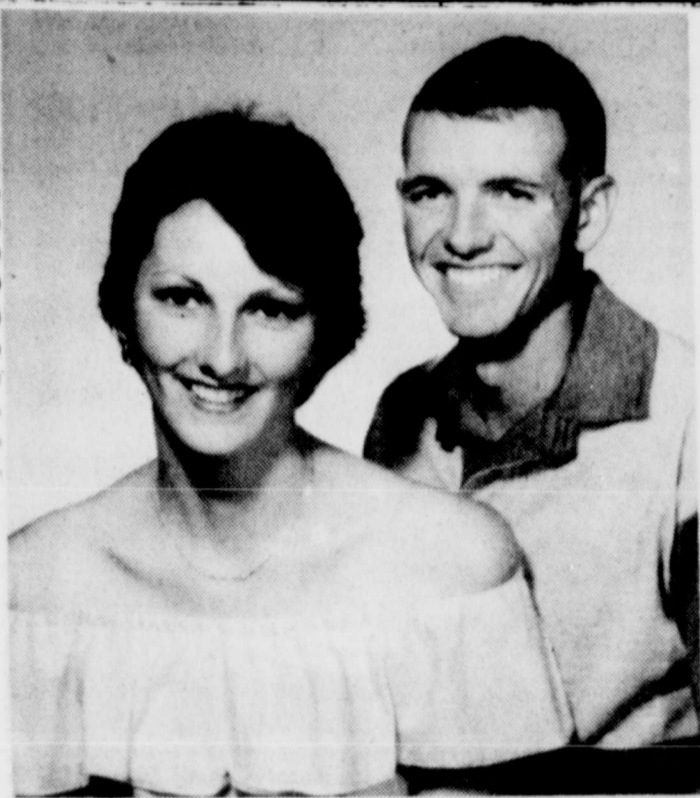

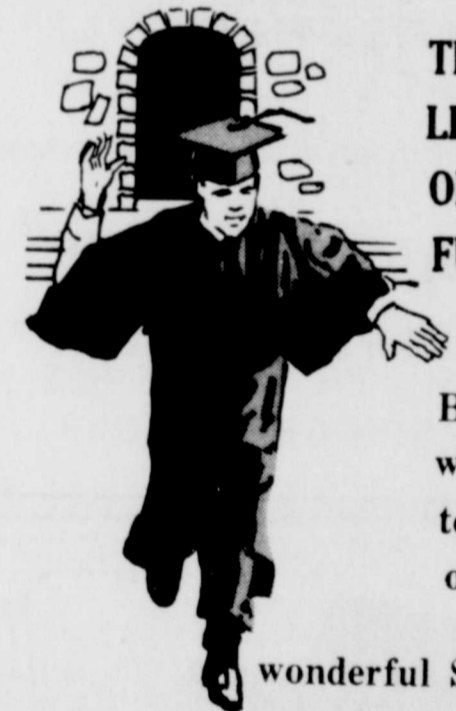

Highway 70 bids to be submitted

AUSTIN — Bids for the improvements of US 70 in Hale County will be opened at the May 17-18 letting of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The project extends on US 70 from the Lamb County line to Interstate 27, a distance of about 19.3 miles, and consists of asphaltic concrete level-up and then addition of asphaltic concrete with sprinkle treatment. A seal coat will be applied to shoulders.

When completed, the project will extend the life of the pavement and provide an improved riding surface.

Merlin Bennett of Plainview, the department's engineer in charge of the work, estimates that about 80 working days will be required for completion. Overall project supervision will be by Lubbock District Engineer George F. Wall.

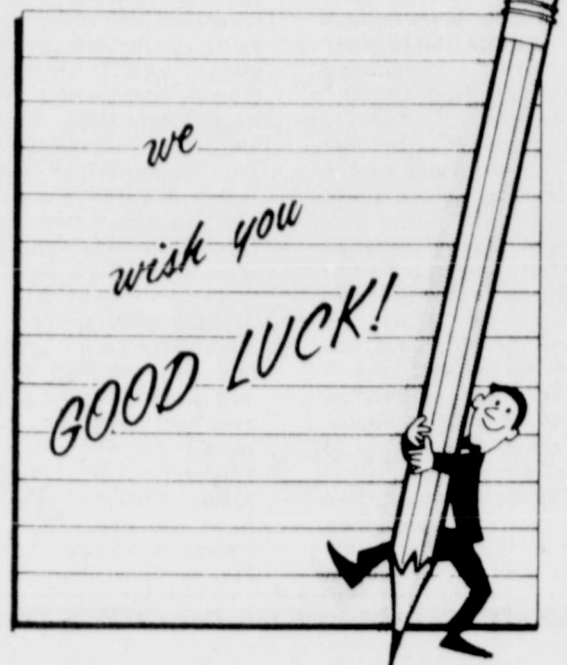

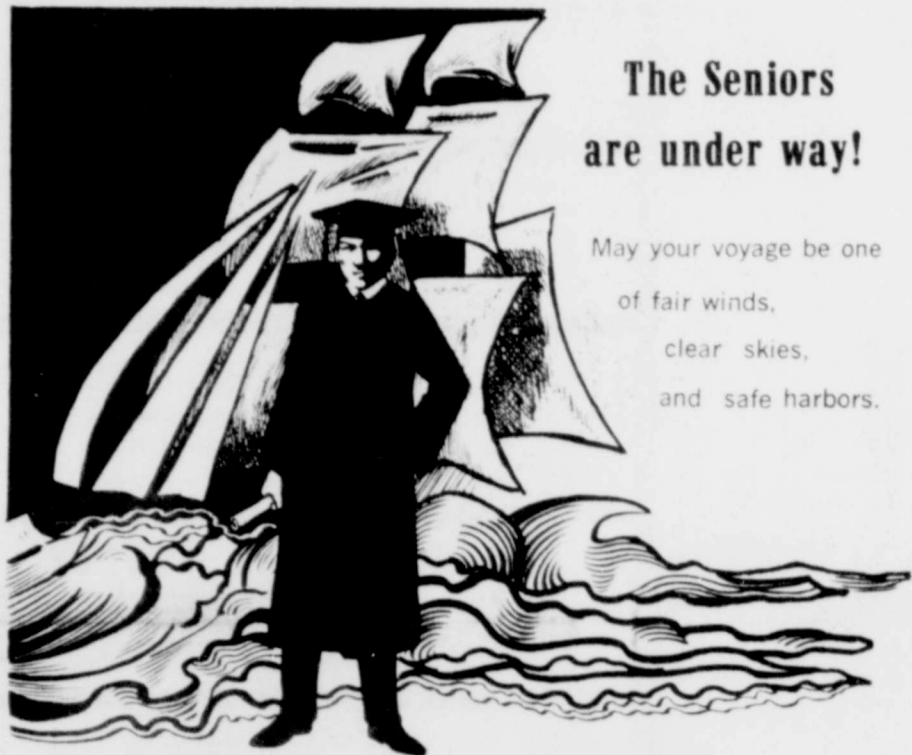

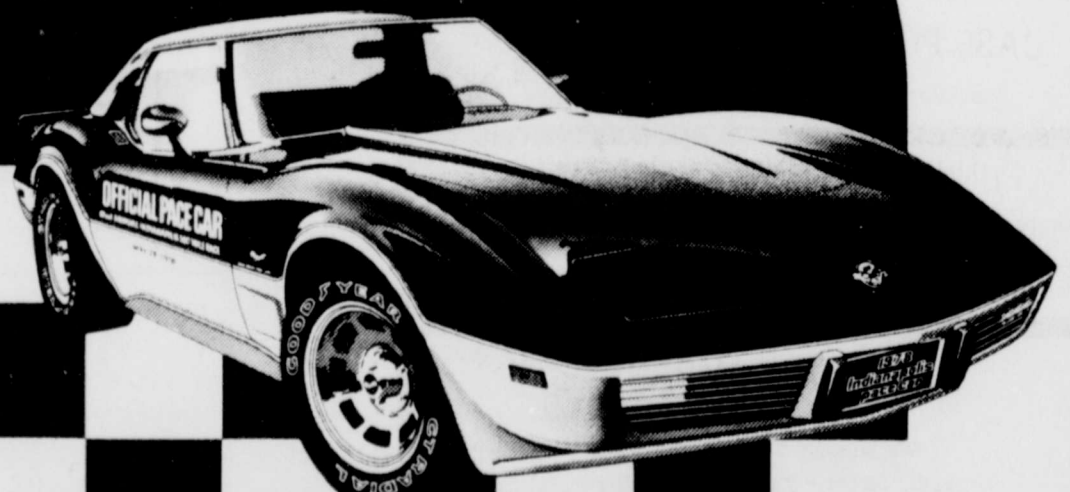

S. W. P. S. CO. RATE INCREASE

Southwestern Public Service Company announced that it has filed for a general retail rate increase in the cities and counties served by the company in Texas.

The request was made with the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas on or about May 12, 1978 and the company is requesting that the increase become effective 35 days after the filing date.

It is expected that the proposed new rates will result in an increase of approximately 10 percent for residential, commercial, industrial and school customers. This would result in an increase of about 8.8 percent in the company's total revenues from Texas, or about \$22 million annually. Rates to wholesale customers and for retail service to municipal customers would not be affected.

The last base rate increase in Southwestern's rates for residential, commercial and industrial service was granted in 1974 and amounted to about 10 percent.

Increased costs of building new power plants, as well as the increased costs of labor, materials, money and taxes were cited by the company as the major

reasons for the proposed increase.

In 1972, SPS made the commitment to switch from gas to coal as the primary fuel for their generating plants. This decision was made due to a long-range forecast which indicated increases in the cost of gas and diminishing availability. The present cost of new gas is about 70 per cent higher than the cost of coal. Government regulations have restricted the use of gas as a boiler fuel.

Southwestern's first coal plant, a \$100 million, 356.7 megawatt facility located in the north part of the company's system, went on the line in 1976. The total cost of this plant was almost three times more than a gas-fired plant of the same size. The second 356.7 mw coal unit is scheduled to go on the line in June of this year.

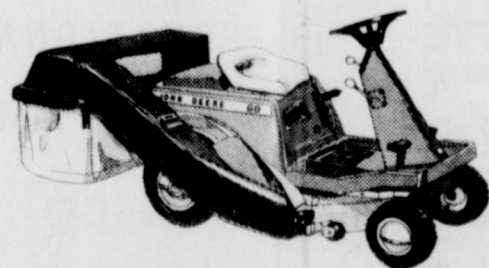
