Hale County now has a Tax Assessor-Collectorelect. She is Christine Vinson of Plainview. In Saturday's Democratic Primary Run-Off Election, Mrs. Vinson received 1,874 votes, compared with 1, 178 votes for her opponent, Allene Wallace, also of Plainview. The two ladies defeated three men in the May 6 primary to gain the run-off spots. In that election, Vinson beat

Wallace by only two votes. This has been a bad year for incumbent Hale County Precinct Commissioners. Lloyd Goldston lost his bid May 6, for re-election as Precinct 2 Commissioner. He was defeated by Homer Roberson in a two-man race during the first Democratic Primary last month. Precinct 4, Northwest Hale County, drew three men in the May primary, forcing a run-off. Incumbent Tom (Jigger) Wheeler lost to James Belk in the June 3 election.

previously completed three (3) semesters of approved college or university work satisfactory before a scholarship can be awarded. Application forms may






