Owners Of Roaming Dogs To Get Tickets VINSON WINS IN JUNE 3 VOTING NOMINEES NAMED

The "dog" ticket books arrived from the printer last week, and local dog owners who do not comply with the ordinance on roaming dogs will start getting the tickets. The first ticket issued to the owner will cost him a fine of \$5. The second ticket to the same owner will bring him a \$10 fine. The dog will be picked up by the city when the third ticket is issued to the same owner.

Issuing tickets to non-complying dog owners will be the three city police patrolmen, City Manager Larry Fields and Tommy Overstreet, City Water Superintendent.

Safety Council Books In School

Clyde Vandygriff, Chief of Police, told The Review that a supply of National Child Safety books, underwritten by donations from local business places, have arrived for distribution in the school at the start of next term. Instruction matter in the books is subject-controlled from kindergarten to high school seniors, different books for elementary, junior high school and high school deal with different categories of hazards for each level. The elementary books teach children to avoid strangers who offer candy, a ride or other inducement to get them into a car. Coloring books help teach students on that level.

As ages and grades progress, safety in bike riding and other hazards are discussed. And, as ages and grades further escalate, there are warnings about alcohol, dope and social diseases.

August 1 Deadline For Booster Club Scholarship

NEWS AND COMMENTS

NGC--A preview of the 1979 model automobiles shows a shrinkage in size for the larger cars, and an increase in prices for all makes. If you want a large, heavy, luxury automobile you'd better rush to your dealer NOW and buy a 1978 model. When the 1979s come out the 1978s will sell for a premium price rather than the usual discount after showing of new models. Sometime during the 1979 model year, GM and Ford will introduce front wheel drive on some of their cars, including the Ford Mustang, which will be slightly longer, though lighter in weight. Ford's Fiesta has front wheel drive this year. Also, GM will put front wheel drive on its Chevrolet Nova sometime during 1979. The Nova will be offered with a choice of four-cylinder or V-6 engines. In addition to the Mustang's extra length, Ford's LTD, Mercury Capri and Marquis also will have new appearances. Included in the new-appearance in the GM line will be the Chevrolet Nova. American Motors will have two Gremlins, the chopped-off rear and rounded rear

models. In years to come, there will be more cars powered by 4-cylinder engines, more with diesel engines and more engines with turbochargers. Mopeds like Melvin Johnson is selling will, if gasoline hits \$1-plus per gallon, become more popular for one-rider, around-town travel. It's an extra heavy bicycle frame powered by a one-cylinder engine that gets 150 miles-plus per gallon of gasoline. In addition to the little engine, the moped has pedals like a bike and, in the event the engine dies, you can come in under your own power. NGC--Tickets now are being written against dog owners that do not keep their animals in an enclosure such as a fence, or on a leash and tied in their yards. Tickets will be written by the three police patrolmen, City Manager Larry Fields and City Water Supt. Tommy Overstreet. The first ticket written against a non-complying dog owner will cost him a \$5.00 fine; the second ticket issued to the same dog owner will cost him a \$10 fine. If a third ticket is issued against the same dog owner, the city will pick up the dog. The roaming dog problem is not quite as acute as it was a few months ago. Thanks to the dog owners for their cooperation with the city. If you have a dog problem, call city hall.

NGC--In the law enforcement line, Abernathy has another very grave problem. Chief of Police Clyde Vandegriff reports that his department handled more juvenile cases in the first five months of 1978 than it did for the entire year of 1977. Some of these cases have cost school taxpayers a lot of money from a break-in and theft, and some \$800 in vandalism of an air-conditioner on top of a school building. The same night, the same vandals did several hundred dollars in damage to a student's car that had been left on the campus that night. In the heavy vandalism case, three Abernathy juveniles and three men from Hale Center did the damage. The local youths are being handled as juveniles, which they are, and charges have been filed against the three Hale Center men who damaged the school and the car. Vandegriff says that city officials are considering placing a curfew to clear Abernathy streets of the underage youths at a certain time every night. Local Policemen report that some youngsters roam around town until 2 or 3 o'clock at night. One policeman had to shove a shell in his police shotgun to convince youths engaged in a gang fight that he meant for them to stop. The youths dropped their chains, iron pipes and other weapons and fled when they faced the shot-gun. In another incident, a police officer fired his gun into the air, stopping a large number of gang members marching west on Main Street at a late-night hour. The school, or city, whichever is responsible, should provide more security officers at local football games, starting THIS YEAR. There was a gang fight of sorts north and west of the football field last season.

NGC--The City Council will consult the city's attorney to see what it will take in the way of local ordinances to force parents to pay in full for the damage their offspring do on these vandalism sprees. There is a Texas law to that effect already. Also, they will consult the attorney on drawing an ordinance to set a night curfew. NGC--Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Bargain Plant Can Leave Owner Wilted

AUSTIN--Marked-down plants can often give Texas consumers less than they bargained for, notes Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.
"Sometimes a sale isn't a sale at all," Brown said. "It's just a way of unloading poor quality merchandise."
Brown recommended that buyers watch out for plants with shriveled leaves and those that are root-bound or have not had routine maintenance.
The Texas Department of Agriculture checks plants for bugs and disease, but not quality.
"Though most nurseries are conscientious in maintaining their stock, some lack the personnel to do so," Brown said.

Beef Production High In SPS Service Area

According to Sam Thomas, manager of agriculture development for Southwestern Public Service Company, 4,373,850 fat cattle were produced in the SPS service area for 1977. This production, revealed in a recent survey conducted by SPS, is the third highest in the history of the industry. The survey which has been conducted since 1963 is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to production of fat cattle in the southern great plains area.

"During the 1977 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,734,740 head and is barely 10,000 head under

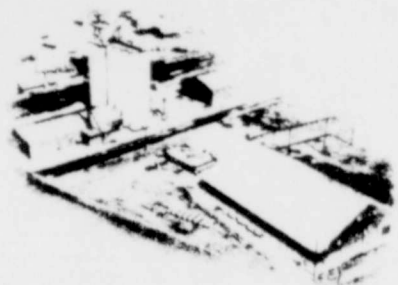

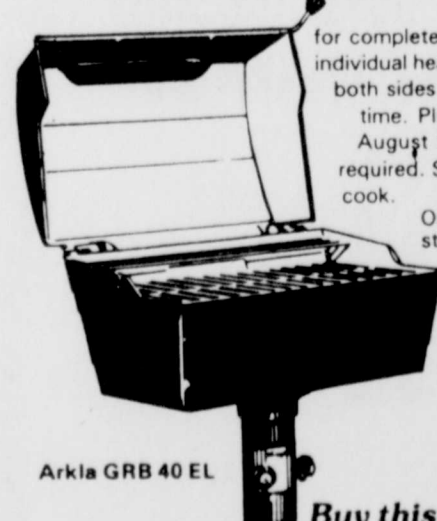

Everyone is encouraged by the county agent and Neal Burnett, chairman of the Chamber Agricultural Division to bring in their diseased plants and their insects for identification on June 12.
