Webb assumes TASA position

Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent of the Abernathy ISD, assumed the presidency of the Texas Association of School Administrators effective June 1. Dr. Webb has been superintendent of the Abernathy ISD since 1963.

TASA is a member of the Texas School Administrators Council, a coalition of nine school management organizations, which actively promoted education legislation during the 65th Session. The Association is an affiliate of the American Association of School Administrators.

Joining Webb as new state officers of the Association at the same were Dr. Nolan Estes, superintendent of the Dallas ISD, who became president-elect, and Don Robbins, superintendent of the Diboll ISD, as vice president.

In becoming president of the 1,250 member association which represents Texas school superintendents and other school administrators, Webb noted that "TASA is embarking upon a new era of dynamic leadership for school management in Texas."

Webb pointed out that Texas is one of only 12 remaining states that have not experienced the adversary relationships resulting from public employee collective bargaining. Collective bargaining for public employees in other states has "eroded the necessary management prerogatives of school boards and administrators and has contributed to a lack of confidence in public education." On March 10, Tennessee became the first state in the Mid-South Region to have a collective

bargaining law enacted. Advocacy of collective bargaining is a major priority of both the American Federation of Teachers and the National Education Association, and both groups are currently involved in extensive efforts to promote collective bargaining legislation.

Webb stated that "during the next 12 months, TASA will develop a comprehensive awareness program to educate school administrators, school board members and the general public about the negative impact of collective bargaining by public school employees in other states." "Texas has a unique opportunity to learn from the experiences and mistakes of other states," Webb concluded, "and we intend to train our school administrators across Texas to utilize appropriate communication skills and knowledge in dealing with the complexities of employee relations issues."

Webb also noted that the Association is beginning to formulate the legislative proposals which it will present to the 66th Legislature in January 1979. TASA recently conducted a survey of school administrators regarding school finance issues and an analysis of the responses from over 700 school districts is now being prepared for state-wide distribution. President Webb concluded that "TASA will cooperate with other education associations in developing legislative proposals that reflect the Association's commitment as an advocate of improved learning opportunities for Texas' 2.5 million school-aged children."

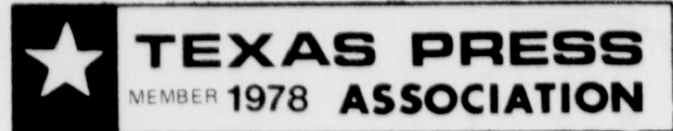

NEWS AND COMMENTS

NEC--Had a good visit with Eddie Kocich, who retired from farming a few years ago. Eddie, who was a hard worker all of his life, like other retirees, thought he would enjoy retirement by taking it easy and traveling. After taking trips to New York City and other sections of the country, and taking it easy, he got caught-up with all that and became very restless. A chance remark by Clyde Pittman lead to his hiring Kocich to help at Pittman's service station. Now, Eddie is working as much as Social Security will let him earn, and is enjoying his semi-retired status. I agree with Eddie, retirement is not what it is cracked up to be.

NEC--Five years ago, school property in San Antonio was being vandalized up to \$160,000 dollars annually. The schools' security chief "put out the lights" around and in school buildings at night. That move brought the vandalism cost down to \$40,000 a year...and, in addition, saved the school district thousands of dollars on electricity bills. Law enforcement officers thought the school security chief had gone off his rocker when he changed from flood-lighting outside and lights on the inside to completely darkened campuses and school buildings. "I got the idea while remembering my boyhood...we were afraid of the dark and those lighted street corners for our night activities," the school security chief stated. His "dark" idea is catching on across the nation, with school districts in Cleveland, Chicago and Los Angeles testing the concept.

NEC--Texas running out of oil and natural gas? I do not believe it. A subsidiary of Santa Fe and a partner in this project has 20,000 acres in Trinity County in East Texas, with a high production find of natural gas. A new well in the Upper Glen Rose formation recently tested to flow a 2.66 million cubic feet of gas per day. A conformation well has been completed at 2.1 million cubic feet per day. An earlier well was completed in April, 1977, in the Pettet formation which flowed 1.5 million cubic feet of gas per day. Texas is being ripped-off by the Federal government in the matter of oil and gas. Gas going out-

of-state should bring as high, or higher, price than that used in-state. WDC Bureaucrats say "No". Texas made a big mistake when it joined the Union. Just think: if Texas was an independent Country we could be drawing foreign aid.

NEC--No official, including those of the lowest category through to include the U. S. Supreme Court, should be appointed for life. Just as Federal employees, from the office of Senator on down, should have a cut-off age of 70 just as in the private sector. The untouchable Justices can make rulings that foul up the U. S. Constitution beyond the meaning intended by its Authors. The recent ruling by the Supreme Court that cities are open to be sued in court by persons claiming their civil rights have been violated. Seventeen years ago, Supreme Court Justices ruled that cities could not be sued in such cases. The Justices are mere humans, reaping a political plum awarded them by Presidents of the U. S.

NEC--I predict chaos in California in the wake of approval of Proposition 13 before government bodies from the statehouse to the schoolhouse have time to adjust to the loss of some 50% in property tax revenue. It takes a lot of money to operate state, city and schools. If public services are kept at the current level, tax money will have to be generated from other sources. And, you can bet your bottom dollar that legislation will be passed on new forms of taxes that will hit the blue collar and white collar taxpayers deep into their hip pockets.

NEC--Tax relief provided by California's Prop. 13 sounds like Christmas in June. This tax "relief" will help the rich, big property owners...the one's who have been providing the bulk of some \$12 billion in all tax money to various taxing agencies in the state. Also getting big breaks from Prop. 13 will be foreigners, who have been investing

heavily in expensive mansions, and other residential and business property in the recent past. Their savings under Prop. 13 will provide for a greater cash flow out of the United States back to their respective countries. NEC--If Texas goes into drastic property tax reduction the same out-going cash flow will happen in this state. Foreigners are buying up real estate all over the state, including business and agriculture property. Rumors are that foreigners will buy a 17,000-acre farm complex in Texas when the land is prepared for agriculture use.

NEC--Congratulations to Abernathy School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb upon his assuming the presidency of the Texas Association of School Administrators, headquartered in Austin. The story in The Review about Dr. Webb taking over his duties June 1, was received from Charles F. Matthews, Executive Director of the TASA organization. It is an honor for Dr. Webb and for Abernathy. Abernathy Schools have experienced a growth in prestige and in expansion of the school plant under the direction of Dr. Webb and the members of the School Board of Education with whom he has worked since 1963. Dr. Webb came here that year from the Brownfield School System, where he was assistant superintendent. Upon expiration next year of Dr. Webb's term as TASA president, he will be followed in that office by Dr. Nolan Estes, Superintendent of the Dallas Independent School District.

NEC--I've been sitting on an interesting comment for this column since 1976, shortly after billionaire Howard Hughes died. Cliff Howard had an emergency contact with Howard Hughes a lot of years ago, in fact, when Cliff was 19 years old. It was then that Cliff went to California to find work. He did as foreman of a harvest crew. While performing that duty, Cliff witnessed a crash

landing of an airplane in the field where his crew was working. Cliff helped the pilot get out of the downed plane. Cliff took the stranded flyer in a pickup truck to a telephone. He could not get the call through, so Cliff took him to a small airport near another town. The pilot Cliff helped in the airplane emergency was THE Howard Hughes. Cliff wouldn't take pay for helping Hughes, and he does not claim that Hughes made out a will to him. I have been waiting for the "right" time to run this story. And, the "right" time opened up Friday, June 9. There was a story in the A/J on that date about a jury verdict in a court case in Las Vegas. The jury ruled that the so-called Mormon will, a handwritten document claiming to be the last will of Howard Hughes, is a fraud. Had the Mormon will not been declared a fraud, a former gas station attendant would have become wealthy. That so-called will had the man listed as an heir to one-sixteenth of the Hughes fortune. The station attendant claimed that he was remembered in the Mormon will because he had befriended Hughes. He claimed that, years before, he found Hughes stranded in the Nevada desert with an injury, and that he took him to a town. I had waited until the "right" time to run this story to get further details from Cliff Howard, as to dates, time and places, and to examine a page from a California daily newspaper that Cliff has on his real estate office wall about Hughes' plane crash in the field. Friday, after the story in the A/J, I was unsuccessful in contacting Cliff before writing this article. NEC--Abernathy must have some little monsters, according to the following stories told to me. That's about the only name I can find for anyone who would pour fluid on a dog and set fire to it to watch it burn. This story came to light (for us) Friday, June 9, when a lady came in to place the "S100 Reward" adv. elsewhere in this paper. She was keeping the dog for her mother-in-law, who resides in Hale Center. The dog was in the local lady's

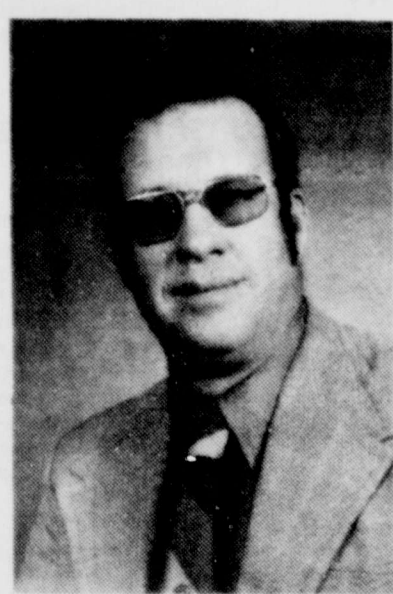

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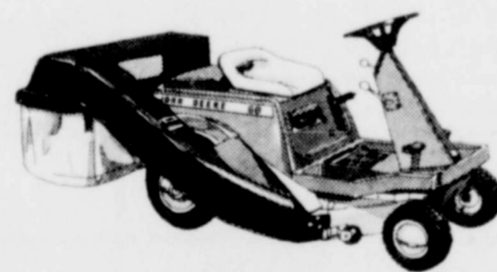

USDA Announces New Regulation For Food Stamps

Proposed food stamp reforms to eliminate over one million participants with the highest incomes, and to make the program more accessible to several million poor not currently participating--especially the elderly and working poor--have been announced by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland.

Families owning luxury cars would be made ineligible for food stamps and persons convicted of food stamp fraud would be disqualified for up to two years. Some students would be dropped from the program, while others would have to sign up for work half-time to get food stamps.

The new regulations also would do away with the requirement that participants pay a certain amount in cash to receive food stamps. Under the proposed new regulations, a family currently required to pay \$95 a month for \$174 in food stamps--or a net benefit of \$79--would simply receive the \$79 in stamps without having to come up with cash first. This action was proposed by President Carter, who said some poor families are unable to get food stamps because they cannot make the required cash payment.

The proposed changes announced today would implement reform food stamp legislation passed by Congress last year.

"We expect the changes to be of particular benefit to the elderly and working poor," Secretary Bergland said. "More elderly and low-income working families will now be able to participate and improve their nutrition."

The secretary said the new law, and the proposed regulations, were designed to "strike a fair balance" in food aid to the needy.

"The changes would assure that those with the highest income--and those not significantly in need of food stamps--would no longer qualify, while we do a better job of reaching those who truly are in need," Secretary Bergland said.

The proposed rules lower the net income levels for food stamps to the federal poverty level and simplify eligibility determinations by replacing most itemized deductions now used in the program with standard deductions.

The rules are intended to take effect late this year. The U.S. Department of Agriculture plans to accept comments on the proposals until June 16, and to issue final rules this summer. States will then be allowed several months to prepare

Social Security Information

RAY PURCELL, SOCIAL SECURITY REPRESENTATIVE
QUESTION: Is it true that the recent changes in the social security law eliminated the monthly work test?

ANSWER: This is true for most. Beginning with 1978 work deductions will be figured based on a beneficiary's total earnings for the year. Unlike in the past, payment will not be due or paid for those months a working beneficiary earned less than a specified monthly amount nor will a self-employed person be paid for those months in which he did not render substantial services. There is an exception--the monthly test will be applied only in one year during a beneficiary's lifetime. Usually, this will be the year a person files for benefits. In most cases, the monthly work test will not apply for persons already entitled if they have ever received benefits under the monthly test provision. A few beneficiaries have been paid erroneously for 1978 as the monthly work test was applied when it should not have been. These beneficiaries will be notified shortly of the erroneous payment.

Issuance of the proposed regulations follows 17 public hearings conducted by the department last fall in urban and rural communities across the country to assure public input into the rule making process. Comments on today's proposal should be sent to Nancy Snyder, acting deputy administrator for family nutrition programs, Food and Nutrition Service, USDA, Washington, D. C. 20250.

The department plans to issue additional proposed rules to implement remaining provisions of the new food stamp law in coming months. Future rule makings will include provisions on state plans of operation, accessibility of services, outreach, special procedures for use in disasters, and operation of the food stamp and commodity distribution program on Indian reservations.

Built-In Accident Potential Listed

COLLEGE STATION----Some accidents will remain inevitable until the design of certain tools and equipment is changed, says Dr. Gary S. Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Nelson cited a recent experience as an example. "Has the following or similar incident ever happened to you? The other day I volunteered to work the concession stand at the local baseball park. After closing, it was dishwashing time. I turned on the right hand faucet knob to rinse a dish in cold water and, after scalding a couple of fingers, I realized that the individual installing the faucet had reversed the hot and cold water lines. I then noticed the sign behind the sink intended to warn me of this hazard. Throughout the evening, I continued to make mistakes with the faucet. Sign or no sign, the force of habit was just too strong."

This incident points out a common cause of many accidents, points out the engineer. "This is the design of our tools and equipment may be incompatible with common human characteristics, experience, and expectancy."

When a designer builds or installs equipment without taking into account a host of common human characteristics involving man's physical size and strength as well as such things as his perception capabilities, his habits and customs, the designer is setting a trap for the equipment user's eventual and inevitable accident.

"There are many examples of these errors in design," notes Nelson. "Did you ever drive past the intersection where you intended to turn because the signs were too small or cluttered to read at normal speed? Did you ever drive a car where the headlight beam indicator or the turn signal indicators were hidden by part of the steering wheel? Did you ever trip on a stair and then discover that one step was higher than the rest?"

As of May 15, everyone who applies for a social security number has needed to provide evidence of his or her age and identity, Don I. Wortman, Acting Commissioner of Social Security, has announced.

Most affected by the change are native-born applicants under 18. To establish their date of birth, these people will need to submit a public or religious record of birth. If a birth or baptismal certificate is not available, another document may be used if it is at least one year old and shows information such as the applicant's name, address, age, signature, or photograph.

They must submit a second record such as a vaccination record, a school record or a driver's license, to establish identity. Parents applying for a social security number for their preschool children will need to furnish only a birth record if no other record of age or identity has been established for the child.

Applicants under 18 need not appear in person at a social security office to apply for a number and submit documents. They can apply by mail, and their documents will be returned to them by mail after they are noted on the social security record and certified by a Social Security Administration employee.

"THE NEW requirements are designed to protect the applicant's social security record by helping to assure that it is complete and accurate," Wortman said. "These

procedures will help prevent another person from misusing a social security number, either knowingly or unknowingly. This is a subject of legitimate concern both to Congress and to the public."

Applicants 18 and over must appear in person at a social security office and bring with them a birth certificate and another document proving identity.

Since most people 18 and older already have a social security number, each applicant will be interviewed to make sure that he or she has never been given a number before. The SSA interviewer will certify that the interview took place and that the applicant submitted documentation.

FOREIGN-BORN applicants of any age must submit evidence of their United States citizenship or their alien status to show they are lawfully admitted to the United States. Procedures for this group are unchanged.

Anyone who has lost his social security card and who applies for a replacement must show a driver's license, voter registration card, school identification card, or other proof of identity. The social security office will check the new application against information already in the applicant's record before issuing a replacement card.

Under old procedures, persons under 18 did not need to prove their identity to get a social security number. Those

18 and older were required to establish their identity, but could apply by mail and send in documentation with the application. Persons applying for a replacement card were not required to establish identity if they could produce any part of the old card, or if they knew their social security number.

BESIDES HELPING to assure the integrity of an applicant's social security number, the new procedures will help the applicant later in life when he applies for benefits in future years, Wortman said. Since his age will have been established at the time he received his social security number, he may not need to submit proof of age a second time. People now must submit proof of age at the time they apply for benefits.

Under Federal law, an employee must furnish to his employer his social security number for purposes of reporting social security taxes. He must also furnish the number to the Internal Revenue Service as a taxpayer identification number. State and local governments use the social security number for tax purposes, driver's license and motor vehicle registration, and for public assistance payments. Each year social security issues 7 million new numbers and about 4.4 million replacement cards.

People applying for a new or replacement card under the new procedures are urged to apply well in advance of the time they will need the number—at least six weeks.
